In December 2016 Deep Creek Landcare celebrated its 30th anniversary and awarded Life membership to 6 members in appreciation of their consistent contributions to both local and regional Landcare activities as well as their commitment to improving local environmental sustainability.

The members recognised were Pat Toomey and George Lobb from Romsey, Robert Green from Lancefield and former local residents David Blicblau, John Blamey and Stephen Hendy.

The specific contributions of each of these volunteers are amazing Robert Green was an original founding member in 1986 and later served many terms as President and has been a member since day one.

David Blicblau was Secretary, President of DCLG and also President of our regional group,

John Blamey and Pat Toomey both served many terms as President with John coordinating a very successful rabbit reduction program in the mid 1990s.

George Lobb's focus has been on the implementation of our goals through practical on ground assistance.

Stephen was Treasurer from the time of the group's formation in 1986 until October 2016 – more than 30 years!!

Each has been a member and committed to Landcare activities for more than 20 years.

President Hayley Goodman presented each of the Life Members with a certificate to recognise their achievements and provided their partners with a beautiful arrangement of native flowers. The presentation to partners recognised their direct efforts at working bees and other Group events and the behind the scenes support they had provided. The awards were presented at the annual DCLG Christmas Luncheon held at Glen Erin Restaurant on Rochford Road.

In 30 years the Deep Creek Landcare Group has completed a significant range of projects in our district of which we are very proud. The Group was one of the first Landcare groups to be established in Victoria. Some key projects have included

The establishment of an indigenous vegetative buffer zones along the Deep Creek to protect water quality and the identification of pest plant and animal species and the development of control programs. Extensive revegetation projects on public (Doggetts Bridge, Sheahans Crossing amongst many) have provided a template for much broader schemes that Melbourne Water and others have adopted.

"Rabbit busters" program in the early 1990's which saw an area of Mt William identified as a having a significant rabbit plague. The plague was successfully controlled and the site continued to monitored for many years - it was seen as a benchmark for rabbit control projects.


"Dung beetle release" to assist livestock farmers to control nutrient run off into waterways.

Preservation of the endangered pigmy perch fish species in the Deep Creek. A partnership between DCLG, Melbourne Water and Western Water was formed to survey isolated populations and target habitat protection and revegetation projects to protect the vulnerable species.

25 years of Landcare Anniversary Garden – established in January 2012 in the grounds of the beautiful Lancefield Park.

Continued support of Junior Landcare with 3 local primary schools, girl guides and scouts.

The Lancefield Primary School Playground Club stopped by Lancefield Recreation Reserve to see the new equipment being installed.

The children conducted an online survey and asked families in the area for the playground equipment preferences during last year.

The community responded recommending items such as a double flying fox, basket swing and large slide. The children also spoke with a couple of playground companies to investigate the best options for their community park.

After a couple of onsite visits and an audit of existing equipment the children felt confident to write a playground strategy for new and ongoing equipment.

With this information the LPS Playground group

made a submission with the Lancefield Park Recreation Reserve in October. They worked together to write a grant application as part of the Lancefield Park Renewal Grant from DELWP. The children's submission was successful. Today they are very proud to see the results of their hard work.

This project wouldn't have been possible without the support of the Lancefield Neighbourhood House Coordinator Vivian Phillpotts, Lancefield Park Reserve Secretary Judy Stammers, Lancefield Primary School teachers Mrs Waterman and Mrs Lyon.

Special mention to SafePlay and the Lancefield Park Recreation Committee for completing the works. The playground is now open soon for the whole community to enjoy.

MORE PARKS PROJECTS ON THE WAY

Lancefield Park Recreation Reserve is now in its 138th year. Many things have changed over those years as the Park has evolved into what we have today. They would have seen a lot of activity lately especially in relation to the projects that have been funded by DELWP as part of the fire recovery funding; the new public toilets and netball/tennis club change rooms are underway, we have four new pieces of playground equipment and the new tractor was presented to the committee in mid January.

There are four more projects from the funding which are being organised and we should see the skatepark begin construction in the next few months. There is also the ongoing maintenance the Park Committee undertake which has been consumed lately by the incredible season of grass, and more grass. Many places, particularly the swamp/ cross country area, were too wet to even get a tractor into until recently.

The season was also a good one for planting trees and there are new ones along the walking track at the back of the Park. It was also a time for quite a lot of tree limbs to fall which keeps the committee busy cleaning them up, arborists were employed to do work on the trees in the avenue, along the walking track and the four cypresses near the cricket nets. A couple of dead elms were removed from the avenue



and these will be replaced in autumn.

The work on the trees in the Park is extensive and ongoing but they are a magnificent feature and we are lucky someone decided to plant them all those years ago. Future work the committee has planned for the Park includes; creating a pedestrian access gate at the south east corner to accommodate residents from all the new houses; removing the woody weeds along the fence lines and drains (again); more planting; installing larger pipes under the crossing at the back of the equestrian area to avoid the walking track being washed away again; investigating painting the Laurie Green annexe; reinstalling the picnic table which had to be moved for the playground extension; moving the chainsaw sculptured, giant lizard bench; and various other projects.

Lancefield Park is a huge community asset which is maintained by a small group of volunteers from the committee and some people from the various user groups. Support is always welcome and there is the opportunity for people to join the committee at the AGM this year which will be held at 8pm on Monday 20 February in the Laurie Green Pavilion. BUS POOLING WORKS FOR LANCEFIELD AND **ROMSEY COMMUTERS**

The Lancefield Romsey Commuter Bus celebrates 35 years of delivering a cost-effective, comfortable and safe service for local residents commuting to Melbourne.

The service started in 1981 with the help of the Shire of Romsey, which is now part of the Macedon Ranges Shire Council. In 2000 a community co-operative was formed to manage the bus and since then it has operated as the Lancefield Romsey Commuter Bus Co-op Ltd.


The service departs Lancefield Monday to Friday at 6.35am and then picks up passengers in Romsey. It drops passengers off at three stops in Melbourne in the medical, education, business and shopping precincts bright and early. The service is often trialled by locals looking for alterative ways to commute to the city. Most make the switch to the bus after realising that the daily drive to Melbourne is tiring, unsustainable and expensive.

In times of increased fuel costs and traffic delays, the cooperative's travelers enjoy a relaxed and air-conditioned ride without the hassle of parking, all for \$60 per week. Casual travellers are welcomed too.

Over the years the service has attracted a diverse range of commuters from apprentices; university students; administrative, IT, retail and medical staff; doctors and lawyers. There are people on the bus who have used the service for 15 years and others whom are new to the area.

According to Lynn Rowley, a scientist with the Royal Children's Hospital, "I have travelled to Parkville on the bus for 11 years and could not be happier with the service. It is the only direct service to Parkville and the city. I used to drive to Sunbury to catch the train to North Melbourne and walked to work but it was time consuming and exhausting. I thought there had to be a better way to travel. The bus is reliable, on time and it really takes the stress out of travelling. Commuters are friendly and choose to do a range of activities on the bus they can snooze, read, knit, and work on laptops or chat. It is a social atmosphere where we have had the occasional pizza stop on the way home and we have an annual Christmas party" says Ms Rowley.

"The service is the most competitive of its kind with the weekly cost to commuters of only \$60, which is significantly





cheaper than public transport or driving. More importantly, "everyone gets a seat, the bus is comfortable with lots of leg room, heating and cooling. All revenue covers petrol, tolls, parking and bus services with an upgrade approximately every 5 years."

There have been times where we have had long waiting

THE ENTERPRISING MR MACGREGOR: STOCKBREEDER AND PIONEER PASTORALIST

The enterprising Mr MacGregor was an ambitious and talented Scottish Highlander who tried his luck as a shepherd in a new country and made good. MacGregor quickly realised the qualities required for cattle, sheep and horses in the

harsh Australian climate and led the industry in breeding programs. In 1869 he established studs of pure Booth Shorthorns, Clydesdale horses and Border Leicester sheep at his property,

'Inverauld' at Riddells Creek and 'Clunie' at Darraweit Guim near Romsey — his studs were to become famous throughout the colonies. MacGregor's life was one of extremes. He was highly successful in his venture draining the Kooweerup Swamp in Victoria and as a pastoral pioneer in the Channel Country western Queensland. At his peak

of

of power in the 1880s the family holdings totalled thousands of square miles of rich cattle country. The Federation Drought dealt MacGregor's pastoral empire a drastic blow. His major losses were exacerbated by his ill-advised attempts at money-lending and property speculation. This biography of Duncan MacGregor is a thoroughly researched, exciting and highly readable account of how he survived the ordeal and lived to tell the tale. It is the compelling story of a remarkable life.

Currently there is a wonderful retrospective exhibition by award winning Castlemaine writer and illustrator Rachel Tonkin, whose work spans over 50 years. The exhibition includes a beautiful drawing of a cat and dog, framed by Rachel's grandmother and placed on a wall in her kitchen when Rachel was only 4 years old. 
Painter Jenni Mills will open her studio door at 18 Stuart Drive on February 11, 12 and 18 from 10am to 3pm.

KNOW THE RULES TO HELP TARGET 155

Western Water is urging Lancefield residents to be aware of Permanent Water Saving Rules when using water this summer. Permanent Water Saving Rules are sensible guidelines that make sure we take care with our drinking water. Being aware of the rules will help households keep their water use to 155 litres or less per person per day, which is the aim of the State Government's Target 155 campaign.

Under Permanent Water Saving Rules you can: Water your garden or lawn with a watering can, bucket or handheld hose with a trigger nozzle at any time, Water your garden or lawn with a watering system such as a sprinkler only between 6pm and 10am, Wash your car with a bucket, hand-held hose with a trigger nozzle or high-pressure cleaning device at any time, Use water for a fountain or water feature only if it recirculates water.

Things that can help you achieve Target 155 include shorter showers, only washing clothes when you have a full load, and mulching your garden to keep water in the soil.

Western Water will be at the Macedon Ranges Sustainable Living Festival in Woodend March, offering advice about Permanent Water Saving Rules, along with plenty of watersaving tips and giveaways.

PASS WITH CARE



Quite often these spates occur when we have out of town offenders coming through our area and they will often hit Romsey, Riddell and other towns in the area in the same spree.

From a business perspective one or best aids in defeating these offenders is modern technology such as good quality CCTV cameras and recording systems, good quality alarm systems. which was a distinctive yellow with a black lid and circulated it via social media to his friends and put it on his wall. At 11 am that same morning one of his friends was at the Lancefield servo and saw a ute with a tool box on top of it that seemed the same. They discreetly took a photo with their mobile phone which was promptly sent to the victim. He identified it as being identical to the stolen tool box and reported it to Lancefield Police.

Upon checking the CCTV footage from the Service Station we were able to not only identify the tool box as stolen but the ute was towing a large tandem trailer that had also been stolen from Gisborne. The CCTV footage also showed the offender getting out of the ute and entering the service station. From this we were able to identify the offender and at a later date we were able to catch up with and charge the offenders with offences relating to the tool box and the trailer. We were also able to recover a second stolen trailer. Unfortunately the trailer form Gisborne has not yet been recovered.

The icing on the cake was that on the same day that the tool box was reported stolen a person who knew both the victim and the offender became aware via social media of what had occurred and arranged for the stolen tool box to be returned complete with its contents.

A great outcome for all concerned other than the offender who will shortly face court in relation to a number of serious charges.




Organisers are looking forward to a memorable weekend with a party theme, while many participants plan to continue fundraising until the Relay closes on the Sunday morning.
