Our fabulous Show really does have a whole day of activities for all ages to enjoy. Entry is \$10 adults and \$5 for children.



My name is Nicole Rowan and I'm proud to run as an endorsed Greens candidate in the East Ward in the Macedon Ranges Shire Council elections.



Expand Your Impact provided participants with resources to build their vision, mobilize their 'A" team,

the know how to 'talk-up' their project and be resource reach. "Skills and support ensures that valuable time and energy invested into a project will deliver great outcomes," explains Karen.

The day began with everyone spending time reflecting on their project and their vision. "The Make a Change Program has been great," says Vivienne Philpotts, of Lancefield Neighbourhood House. "Spending dedicated time to really get close to your projects is invaluable." She shares her vision for Lancefield to be a; "happy, healthy and connected sustainable community. To be a model for other towns who want to make a difference."

Participants on the day shared projects to impact not just a township, but everywhere! "My vision is a world that is driven by hope not fear," says Lucy Mayes. Her project is called Hope Hour. She is inviting communities around the world to participate in Hope Hour. "People might choose to participate by organising small family gatherings, or a whole community event," smiles Lucy.





Tracy Kemp, of the Lancefield CWA, explains the positive difference that the CWA makes; "We look at women's and children's empowerment, we want to make women and children matter in every country." She is now identifying local websites and newsletters to share CWA information to activate the wider community to support women and children.

Like Tracy and the Lancefield CWA, many people have projects that seek to impact and address disadvantage. Projects that empower others to create an even better life for themselves. Jackie Neiuwenhuizen believes that literacy has a profound impact on people's lives. "My vision is to train volunteers to use a program to teach other people how to read." Her vision expands creatively to set up a purpose built caravan. "The caravan will be a mobile classroom that can go to the people who want to learn to read, rather than have them go to a classroom."

It has been an incredible journey since starting the Make a Change program in the Lancefield region. Thank you

to everyone who expressed interest, participated, helped spread the word and got involved.

MEGA PLANS FOR THE EXTINCT! FESTIVAL.

A talk by passionate environmentalist, prolific author and former Australian climate commissioner, Tim Flannery will be one of the highlights of this year's Extinct! Megafauna Festival in Lancefield. Prof. Flannery will speak about extinction and changes in the central Victorian Landscape at the Lancefield Mechanics Institute on Saturday as part of an exciting programme of events being held on Friday 25th and Saturday 26th of November. Much of Prof. Flannery's work over decades has focused on understanding changes in the Australian environment, including the contributions of megafauna and humans.

The programme for the Lancefield Megafauna Festival—which will be launched during October—will also include tours of the nearby Mt William—or Wil-im-ee Moor-ring—Stone Axe Quarry with a Wurundjeri elder. These tours are offered on both festival days and will give visitors to the region a chance to see of the National Heritage-listed site on Friday, and to stay locally and enjoy the festival and Lancefield the next day. The megafauna festival will overlap with Lancefield's already popular Farmers Market on Saturday morning.

During the week leading up to the festival, organisers are also hoping to host a group of palaeontologists who will carry out research in Lancefield Park, or Lancefield Swamp as the site is endearingly—and once again appropriately—also known. This includes a plan to map the site with the help of a drone and Ground Penetrating Radar. Conditions permitting, the plan also include the opening of an excavation in order to better understand past water flow across the site, which is key to understanding the

unusually rich accumulation of fossils across several sites in Lancefield Park.

The Extinct! programme will also include children's entertainment and performances in the Centre Plantation opposite the Mechanics Institute during the afternoon, further talks with a focus on the history of the Australian environment, and there will be a chance to explore the history of Lancefield both on foot and at the Local History Centre.

The Extinct! committee are looking volunteers to help out prior to and during the festival. Please contact Lancefield Neighbourhood House (5429 1214) if you would like to support this community event. Also required are donations of equipment for 'the dig' such as a small excavator with operator for the first day, loans of sun shelter, shovels, spades, wheel barrows, a generator for pumping water, sand for filling sand bags, etc. For festival news and information and updates on the plans for the dig contact the Neighbourhood House and visit the festival Facebook page which is regularly updated.

The Extinct! Lancefield Megafauna Festival is a project of Lancefield Neighbourhood House, funded by Macedon Ranges Shire Council, with the Lancefield Community Bank® branch of Bendigo Bank as a major sponsor. Lancefield Community Bank® Company Director Mike Meehan said the festival, which is now in its second year, was helping showcase Lancefield and its important place in the prehistory of Australia. "The Extinct! Lancefield Megafauna Festival is focusing a national spotlight on Lancefield and our district", he said.



PASTOR'S PARABLES

WE ARE WHAT WE BELIEVE.

As a rule, decisions we make are based on what we believe to be true – thus there will always be consequences as a result of our beliefs. If we do not believe in the laws of gravity, will our beliefs stop us from the consequences of falling?

We should really consider what we believe. If our beliefs are based on a scientific theory like evolution (lack of supportable evidence means it is a theory, not a fact) we believe we are cosmic accidents with no high purpose - born simply to breed, suffer and die.

Sadly this is the grim message being taught as fact to our children in schools. They quickly learn the irony that the ultimate point of evolution is that all existence is ultimately pointless. As a society we are now reaping the consequences - in high suicides rates, depression, lack of direction, lack of hope, break-down of family, rampant crime and a mass dependency on drugs. If, as a society, we believe and teach that our existence is ultimately pointless, do we think there will be no repercussions?

The Bible states, 'The fool has said in his heart, "There is no God" (Psalm 14:1)'; even though God's handiwork is plainly seen in creation (Psalm 19:1). If we reject the biblical claim of God and Jesus Christ, what are the consequences if we are wrong? John 3:36 says, "He who believes in the Son (Jesus Christ) has everlasting life; and he who does not believe the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." There are always repercussions to our beliefs. Even if we fence-sit or say we believe in nothing, all our decisions will be based accordingly and we should consider the cost - both individually and collectively as a nation. So what are the consequences of a belief in Christianity? It offers everlasting salvation, a code of integrity, a sense of purpose, a hope for the future and a meaning to all existence. (John 3:16)


The afternoon also offers a chance to learn more about Relay For Life, and prospective teams and individuals

LANCEFIELD PRIMARY SCHOOL

PLAYGROUNDS AROUND THE WORLD

Each term Lancefield Primary School offers clubs where students can pick a group according to their interest. This term children could choose the Playground Design club. Although the students looked at playgrounds around the world, their focus was on how to improve the existing playground infrastructure at Lancefield Park. LANCEFIELD AND ROMSEY PRIMARY ROCK THE PREMIER'S READING CHALLENGE

Students from Lancefield Primary School have successfully completed the 2016 Premiers' Reading Challenge.

Labor Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas MP said the Challenge aimed to encourage local kids and young people to read more books, more often.

Over a six month period, participating students in Prep to Year 2 need to read 30 books, while students in Years 3 to 10 are encouraged to read 15 books.

In 2015, more than 204,100 participants from 2800 schools, early childhood settings and homes took up the Challenge, reading nearly four million books.

17 schools in the Macedon area are participating in the Challenge including Lancefield Primary school and Romsey Primary School.

"It's great to see the enthusiasm that Lancefield and Romsey Primary School students have for taking up the challenge to read more." MsThomas said.

While at the school, Ms Thomas also got a tour of the recently completed Indigenous Flora and Fauna Corridor, and the maintenance of the library gutter and fascia that were funded by the state Government.







BUSHFIRE AND GRASSFIRE MYTHBUSTERS

Taken from the CFA web site www.cfa.vic.gov.au

There are a lot of myths out there around bushfire and grassfire – from I'll be told when to leave' to 'only brown, dry grass can burn' and 'I'll be right if I just jump in the dam'.

Myth: CFA will come to my rescue/someone will tell me when to leave

CFA protects over 2.1 million Victorian households with over 2,100 trucks — that's 1 truck for every thousand homes. So don't wait for us to come to you!

It's possible that during a fire you would not even see a truck or firefighter.

Last fire season, one fire alone occupied 300 firefighters and 62 brigades (around 5% of our brigades).

If a fire starts near you, there may not be time for anyone to give you a warning.

Myth: I'll be safe in a Neighbourhood Safer Place (Place of Last Resort)

Most Neighbourhood Safer Places (Places of Last Resort) are your local sports oval (Lancefield's Safer Place is the Hall in the crescent). Neighbourhood Safer Places (Places of Last Resort) do not provide any food, drink, supplies or facilities. They should only be used when all other plans have failed.

Myth: I'll be safe if I leave as soon as I see fire.

Don't think you can outrun a fire in your car - roads could

be closed or jammed with cars, livestock, power lines and fallen trees, and thick smoke makes it impossible to see.

Research and fire investigations show that many people lose their lives after making a last minute decision to leave.

Myth: Only dry, brown grass will burn

Dried out brown or golden-covered grass over 10cm tall is a fire risk. However, some grasses – such as Phalaris grass – will burn even when green.

Myth: It's an 'average' year so I don't need to worry.

'Average' is a technical definition from the weather bureau. Even in an 'average' year in Victoria, major fires occur and lives can be lost.

Myth: Fires only start on hot, dry, windy days.

Fires can start suddenly on any day.

Myth: It's been really wet; fire's not a big risk this year.

Lots of rain prior to summer doesn't mean that a fire isn't an issue. In fact, it can mean that fires are worse because there's lots of healthy vegetation around. A string of hot days is enough to dry it out, making it easier to burn.

Myth: A Total Fire Ban is the same as a Code Red Fire Danger Rating.

Fire Danger Ratings are your triggers to take action – they predict how a fire is likely to behave and how hard it would be to put out IF one started. A Code Red Fire Danger

Total Fire Bans are legal restrictions about what you can and cannot do during fire season to AVOID a fire starting. If you break a Total Fire Ban restriction – such as by lighting a campfire or a liquid fuel barbecue – you can be penalised with large fines and imprisonment.

Myth: You ask me to leave all the time/Code Red days happen all the time.

A Code Red Fire Danger Rating is very rare and extremely serious. Since Code Red was introduced as a Fire Danger Rating in mid-2009, there have been only two days where a Code Red rating was forecast and these forecasts were limited to one or two fire weather districts only.

Myth: I have a Fire Danger Period Permit so I'm fine to use fire on a Total Fire Ban day.

A permit to use fire during the Fire Danger Period does not allow you to do so on a day of Total Fire Ban. If you want to use fire on a Total Fire Ban day, you need to apply for a permit in accordance with Section 40 of the Country Fire Authority Act 1958.

Myth: Flames are the only thing that can hurt me in a fire. Radiant heat (the heat you feel from a fire) is the biggest killer in a fire- it can ignite surfaces, crack or break windows, and melt plastics. Most people who die in bushfire die from exposure to radiant heat. The best protection from radiant heat is to be far away from a fire.

Myth: It's only the main fire that I need to worry about/ I'm not that close to the bush so I'll be fine.

Embers can start falling up to an hour before a fire reaches you.

Embers can start a fire up to 35km away from the main fire, and ember attack can happen before, during or after a fire.

Myth: Staying in my car is more dangerous than getting out of the car and running for it.

If you're trapped out in the open, having something between you and the fire is better than nothing. Your car offers slightly more protection from radiant heat. Many people don't stay in their car because they're worried about petrol tanks exploding-this is highly unlikely.

Myth: I'll be alright if I jump in the pool, dam or water tank.

People have died sheltering in pools, dams and water tanks.

Although water provides some protection for your body, your head remains exposed so you're in real danger of getting burnt or inhaling smoke. If you lose consciousness you may drown.

Water tanks rarely have inbuilt escape ladders so the risk of drowning is high, particularly given how exhausted you'd be trying to stay afloat through a fire. Also, plastic tanks can melt above the water line and trap you inside.








It makes up 60% of our bodies, we drink it, cook with it, bathe and swim in it, irrigate our gardens and sports grounds with it – in fact we couldn't live without it.

Now is the time to celebrate it, with October 16-22 marking National Water Week.

This year's theme is "Water – life – growth", aimed at encouraging people to use water wisely to ensure there is enough to meet the needs of future generations.

Western Water is supporting this goal through the State Government's voluntary Target 155 program, which asks people to use no more than 155 litres of water each per day.

Customers in the Western Water region used around 185 litres per person per day during 2015-16, up almost 10 litres on the previous year.

With summer approaching and the region switched over to the Melbourne supply system after local reservoirs dropped to low levels, it's a good time to be using water




wisely.

There are lots of simple measures to save water, such as taking a four-minute shower, only running dishwashers and washing machines with a full load, and scraping dirty dishes instead of rinsing.

Outside, you can reduce water use by choosing plants with low water needs, mulching to keep water in the soil and using a pool cover to prevent evaporation.




Lancefield Bowling Club has an excellent grass green, and a brand new kitchen, with other groups using the clubhouse at times for get-togethers and meetings.




