#### WINTER FIRE SAFETY

The Brigade would also like to take this opportunity to talk about winter fire safety and the CFA and MFB Home Fire Safety Campaign, 'Safe Mistake Zone' which was launched on Monday 30th May 2016. There are over 3,000 preventable house fires in Victoria each year. Most of these house fires are caused by someone making a mistake – a moment of carelessness, forgetfulness or neglect. The Safe Mistake Zone Campaign is an innovative and engaging initiative that encourages the community to think about the small mistakes that lead to house fires, and to make a safe mistake instead. You can visit the safe Mistake Zone Website to play a fun and interactive safe mistake game. You will also be able to find out how many house fires were in your local area last year. And download useful home fire safety resources.

Remember: Only working smoke alarms save lives You are 60% less likely to survive a house fire without working smoke alarms.

When you sleep you can't smell smoke. By law, every home must have at least one working smoke alarm – but the safest option is to install an alarm in every room where someone sleeps. ## MISINFORMATION RE SKATE PARK

I have been most disappointed recently to see my name mentioned in two separate articles in relation to the Lancefield Skate Park. One in the Free Press and a second in the Midland Express.

On both occasions a local resident has suggested that the Lancefield Police have concerns regarding the Skate Park Project and have gone as far as to suggest the police were surprised at the small number of objections to this proposal.

I would like to state for the record that, as the Officer In Charge of Lancefield Police Station, that I fully support the Lancefield Skate Park Project. I was in fact involved in the development of the first Skate Park Group whilst on the Committee of the Lancefield Drop In Center many years ago.

For in excess of 10 years this project has had my full support and I have authored a number of letters in support of this project. It continues to have my full support.

The reason I support this project is that I recognise that not all young people want to be involved in an organised sport. As such we need to provide a variety outlets/opporunities for these young people to get out and enjoy themselves in a less organised setting. An example of where this has worked successfully in Lancefield is the old BMX track which has been used for years and years by hundreds of young people.

Is a Skatepark which will be situated in the same area really any different? From a policing perspective we have had very few problems at the BMX track over the years and I don't see that the Skatepark will be any different.

I would in fact argue that the Skatepark is more likely to have a positive effect from a policing perspective in that kids that are active and happy are far less likely to be involved in the commission of offences. The old adage about "Idle hands creating mischief" rings true for me.

I also have a personal recollection that I would like to share. Many years ago the Macedon Ranges Shire had a set of portable steel skate ramps which they would move from town to town. When in Lancefield they were situated on the Netball Court. I recall taking my son up there with his newly acquired skateboard and being really impressed at the way the older more experienced skaters took him under their care and assisted him to get going. Showed him how to do a drop off the half pipe and showed great patience (he needed it). So not only was it an exciting and fun experience for him, but I could see that it was a way for older and younger people to mix and form bonds across an age gap.

Lastly I would like us all to remember that we were all young once. The reason I mention this is that at one meeting many years ago with regards to the positioning of the Skate Park a comment was made by a member of our community in opposition to the location that "People entering the park will be confronted by youth" Isn't that what parks are for?


I would be much happier to see our park full of people, young and old, having fun and enjoying the towns greatest asset rather than walking the streets disaffected because there is nothing to do.

## GETTING IT RIGHT IS IMPORTANT

#### LANCEFIELD RUBBISH

The Neighbourhood House has just undergone a waste audit with Kerbside Pride to discover how we can improve practices around reducing and sorting the rubbish we collect. The auditor from the Loddon Mallee Waste and Resource Recovery Group gathered information from the Neighbourhood House, Op Shop, Town House and Mens Shed. One bin with incorrect recycled waste, a 'contamination', causes the whole truck to end up in landfill rather than being recycled, so getting it right is important. We have not yet received the suggestions from our audit but know that some outcomes will be new bins with information on what is to go into them. We will also be receiving a new receptacle for collecting used batteries at The Town House and will have the ability to collect used light globes as well.

## DEEP CREEK LANDCARE GROUP Covering Lancefield – Romsey and Monegeeta Districts

### CELEBRATING 30 YEARS OF LANDCARE

Landcare is celebrating 30 years and Deep Creek Landcare was one of the original groups. Established after a public meeting was arranged by local councilor Kevin Tully and a founding member Robert Green.

Since its inception it has been an active group in the communities of Lancefield,, Romsey, Goldie and more recently Monegeeta. Originally the group's area encompassed Rochford, Newham, Cobaw and Darraweit Guim who later established their own groups.

Key projects included "Rabbit Busters" in the early 1990's.

Weed identification and education workshops and publications to assist landholders and community members to get on board with pest and weed control, which included the "dung beetle release" projects to assist livestock farmers to control nutrient runoff into waterways.

In repairing land degradation and adopting better farming practices, the importance of the Deep Creek – which is a major tributary of the Maribyrnong catchment, helping restore biodiversity to areas whose

loss and fragmentation of habitat due to land clearing and overgrazing .

A partnership was formed between DCLG, Melbourne Water and Western Water aimed to preserve the endangered pigmy perch fish species in the Deep Creek and to survey isolated populations and target habitat protection and revegetation to protect the vulnerable species.

DCLG's main aim are to protect and enhance the integrity of remnant vegetation, protect and expand the intrinsic value of wildlife corridors, establish along the creek to protect water quality and to identify pest plant and animal species and develop control programs.

Tens of thousands of trees and shrubs have been planted in extensive revegetation projects on both public and private land. A significant portion of these plant species have been purchased thru Tree Project which is a non for profit organization.

Much of our support funding is from Melbourne Water stream frontage projects that assist both private landholders and the group's projects on public land along







## LANCEFIELD PARK RENEWAL FUNDING PROPOSAL-JULY 2016

Following the Lancefield-Cobaw Fire in October 2015, the Victorian Government announced \$1.5 million to fund priority projects in the Lancefield area to help the community recover as quickly as possible:

- ☐ Lancefield Mechanics Institute Hall- \$150,000 for the upgrade of toilet facilities
- ☐ Lancefield Park Tennis Netball- \$450,000 for the upgrade of change room facilities
- ☐ Lancefield Park Renewal- \$800,000 for upgrading facilities at Lancefield Park
- ☐ Benloch Community Meeting Facility- Up to \$100,000 to construct a community meeting facility at the Benloch CFA Station

The Lancefield Park Renewal Project will provide recommendations to DELWP for the allocation of \$800,000 in funding to Lancefield Park. User group and open community sessions were held in April 2016 to start the process and help understand community priorities for this funding. A project reference group and project control group comprising the user groups of Lancefield Park and the Lancefield Park Committee have been established to provide DELWP with an accurate picture of how the community wants this grant to be spent in Lancefield Park.

#### HOW WILL THE PROCESS WORK?

Following initial consultation sessions, Lancefield Park user groups and community members are now encouraged to submit proposals for consideration to the Project Control Group. Groups and community members can submit any number of proposals.

But woven through The Gene, like a red line, is also an intimate history - the story of Mukherjee's own family and its recurring pattern of mental illness, reminding us that genetics is vitally relevant to everyday lives. These concerns reverberate even more urgently today as we learn to "read" and "write" the human genome - unleashing the potential to change the fates and identities of our children.

Majestic in its ambition, and unflinching in its honesty, The Gene gives us a definitive account of the fundamental unit of heredity - and a vision of both humanity's past and future.

#### WESTERN WATER

### ONLY FLUSH THE THREE 'P'S, WESTERN WATER WARNS

Western Water is reminding customers to think twice about what they put down the toilet or drain at home, to help prevent sewer blockages. Only the three 'P's - pee, poo and paper - should be flushed down the toilet. Other items including wet wipes, rags, sanitary products, nappies, and personal items such as cotton buds can block sewer pipes, and lead to sewer spills. Sewer spills can mean raw sewage entering waterways, streets or even people's homes. If the blockage is in the sewerage pipes within your property, you are also responsible for the cost of clearing the blocked pipe. So-called "flushable wipes" are increasingly causing problems in the sewerage system as they do not break down quickly in pipes like toilet paper. Cooking oils and fats should also never be poured down the sink, as they can build up in pipes and cause blockages. Let them cool before placing in the bin or in the compost.

Western Water regularly inspects its 1,200km of sewer mains, including monitoring with closed circuit TV cameras, to help identify and clear blockages before they cause sewer spills. Western Water treats more than 9,000 million litres of sewage a year.
