CELEBRATION OF THE SPRING SHOW

This is year is a big milestone for the Spring Show. The

Lancefield CWA branch is celebrating the tireless efforts of

our very special member Mrs Betty Bucknell.

Mrs Bucknell has been running the Spring Show for the last 28 years and, although still heavily involved, is retiring from the helm this year.

It all began in 1987 when, only 12 months into her membership with CWA, Mrs Bucknell was advised by an outgoing secretary that "You could do this!" and over the reins were handed.

With the original schedule hand typed and copied on a duplicator, Mrs Bucknell went to work in putting on the best Spring Show she knew how. And it has gotten bigger and better every year since, thanks to her enormous dedication.

Mrs Bucknell told me that she loves looking over her old records and has a suitcase full of them at home. I was lucky enough to be able to look at a few of the schedules that she had brought with her.

The original from 1987 shows that you could enter for 10c per item and visit for \$2 (which included a cup of tea). Although today it is 50c to put in an entry in the show, the admission price is still \$2!

Starting out as a Friday afternoon event, today sees the planning starting months in advance and the actual show talking place over 2 full days. It is not uncommon for Mrs Bucknell to be at her station in the back room from 7.30am till late in the evening, just to make sure everything is ok.

Full of stories about the show, Mrs Bucknell fondly remembers a young boy who entered his home grown daffodils. An adult entrant who spied the young boy placing his entries, was so impressed that he gave the little boy some of his special daffodil bulbs to take home and look after. Mrs Bucknell said the boy kept at it and entered for the next few years to the point that he was bumped up to the intermediate section.

Although the show has been run relatively drama free, Mrs Bucknell recalled the time that a judge, who was driving from Mornington way, got stuck in traffic. There was a minor panic and phone around but a replacement was soon found and all ended well.

The Daffodil Society started supporting the show not long



after Mrs Bucknell took over and throughout the years they have been a terrific source of judges, entrants, not to mention the amazing and unique daffodils that are on display every year.

The show has always been well supported by the local primary schools, who decorate the walls with their vibrant artwork, girl guides with their many entries, the hall committee who have always been generous with the hall and of course the locals who continue to enter their prized goods.

There have been a few changes over the years with the introduction of extra days, morning tea, lunches, computers and photocopiers, CWA merchandise introduced, last year saw the eftpos machine at the show for the first time and this year the whole show is being computerised.

In honour of our inspiring member, this year there will be an award introduced for the most inspirational piece at the show, selected by Mrs Bucknell.

A special presentation will take place at 2pm, Saturday 12th at the Spring Show to both Mrs Bucknell and the recipient of the award.

CHAINSAW ART AT

THE SHOW

TWO well-credentialed chainsaw sculptors will be displaying their skills at the annual Lancefield Agricultural Show. They will convert two very large cypress tree stumps into a permanent megafauna art attraction at the showgrounds (Lancefield Park).

Lancefield Agricultural Society is very appreciative of a \$3140 community funding grant from the Macedon Ranges Shire Council for the drawcard project.

There will be a multitude of attractions at this year's show on Sunday, October 18, including the launch of the week-long Extinct -Lancefield Megafauna Festival.

Show committee president, John McCarthy, said the show will have something for all age groups, and chainsaw sculptors Angie Polglaze and Robby Bast are looking forward to coming to Lancefield.

Angie has been a full-time chainsaw sculptor since 1997, working and competing in events around the world. She has been involved in public art projects in the USA, Canada, the United Kingdom, Germany and Australia, and has been a trend setter in a field which was once largely a male-only activity.

Her creative designs incorporate the use of colour; the big footballer at the entrance to the Gardiner Reserve at Gisborne is one of her creations in the Macedon Ranges.

Robby Bast is a versatile chainsaw and experienced sculptor, and his speciality is carving out wooden animals.

The stumps to be carved are from two very old trees near the north-east corner of the park.

Sculpting the tree stumps will take place on the Sunday, and be completed the following day.

Megafauna and Lancefield Park will then have a

The Museum of Victoria, MRSC, local utilities and local groups, including Deep Creek Landcare, will contribute to the following planned activities: Chainsaw sculpture of cypress stumps at Lancefield Park. "Mini Dig" / "Sandpit Dig" as an archaeological experience

Talks, with opportunities for discussion, on the following subjects – extinct local bird species, fossils / bones from local areas, Lancefield archaeological site excavations and local extinct species

Fossil Roadshow – identification of fossils / bones etc brought along by local people. Display of extinct monsters in Lancefield. Street Theatre at LF market. Endangered species and how to assist their survival. So, round up your fossils and bones and be ready for all the fun.

Other recent Landcare activities have included another roadside clean up along Lancefield—Kilmore Road and planning for future revegetation programs.

Landholders, don't forget we also have access to expert advice that can assist you with vegetation and erosion control.

This year's raffle is a hamper of CWA home made goodies, from Lavosh through to homemade sauce, sure to delight any food lover.


A great range of CWA cookbooks, tea towels and aprons will also be available to purchase on the day.

Wurundjeri culture: Uncle Bill Nicholson captured the attention of students at Lancefield.


Over 300 students from Lancefield's two primary schools attended the recent Lancefield Megafauna Festival preliminary education day.

There was plenty of enthusiasm during the sessions at Lancefield Mechanics' Hall.

Speakers from Museum Victoria shed light on the type of megafauna fossils found in Lancefield, and further afield.

They drew attention to the giant animals and reptiles which once roamed the countryside.

Uncle Bill Nicholson, from the Wurundjeri Tribe Land and Compensation Cultural Heritage Council, outlined aspects of Aboriginal culture in Australia, with particular reference to the famous green stone axe quarry at Mt William, near Lancefield.

Lancefield-based Brigit Heller, the artist appointed to co-ordinate schools' activities during the festival, provided an insight into what the students would be doing.

They will all be given the opportunity to create individual art works.

The youngsters showed plenty of interest in the fossils on display. Some of these originated in Lancefield and are part

Bronwyn Wilson, former director of the Kyneton Museum, co-ordinated the day and was pleased with the interest shown, and the information provided by speakers.

David Pickering, from the museum's palaeontology department, said the museum expects to be represented during the inaugural Lancefield Megafauna Festival, which runs from October 18-25.

The festival will open on Lancefield Show Day -- Sunday, October 18.

SODOM & JERUSALEM

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A TRAGEDY ON ROMSEY ROAD

On Tuesday the 11th of August 2015 a single-vehicle accident occurred on the Romsey–Woodend Road. As a result, a Hesket local lost his life. Without in any way preempting the Coroner's decision, initial indications are that the driver swerved to avoid a kangaroo.

Some years ago we had a tragic fatal accident on the Lancefield—Tooborac Road where a vehicle just north of Lancefield swerved to avoid a kangaroo and collided head on with an oncoming vehicle.

It is human nature to attempt to avoid a collision and to swerve around obstacles on the road. Accidents are costly, and it is extremely inconvenient if you live in a rural area to be without transport. But – and it is a really big but – the loss of a life is far more costly and damaging to the whole community.

Cars can be replaced and repaired. You cannot replace a human life. By all means, brake hard in an attempt to minimise the damage should you be confronted with a kangaroo but unless you have been able to reduce your speed to such an extent that you have complete control of the vehicle, do not swerve. If you do hit a kangaroo, most modern cars are fitted with air bags and offer far greater protection than older vehicles without air bags, so the chances of you being injured by a collision with a kangaroo are far lower.

We need to get this message out to our younger drivers. Certainly the circumstances of every incident/accident will be different, but as a general rule swerving at speed to avoid an accident will be far more dangerous than braking in a straight line. Once again, modern braking systems are far superior to those of the past and you may be able to steer and brake at the same time. But please try to avoid swerving harshly to avoid a collision.

We all need to adjust our driving on local roads to suit the conditions. This includes reducing our speed early in the morning and from dusk onwards. The numbers of kangaroos seem far greater this year than in previous years.

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It is not unusual to see mobs of 50 to 60 kangaroos in roadside paddocks, and in the mornings and evenings they are more active and move closer to the roads to feed.

It's not just around Lancefield that we have a problem. Every morning I hear police being tasked to dispatch injured kangaroos around the Macedon Ranges and beyond. Only a month ago I was travelling to Bendigo for training and was tasked to dispatch two Kangaroos at different locations near Heathcote that had been hit by cars.

If you do hit a Kangaroo and it is safe to do so, please stop. Take the time to check if it is dead and if it isn't call ooo. If it is dead take the time to pull it off the road so another driver does not come to grief trying to avoid it. If you can, check for a joey and if you think it has a joey call the Wildlife Rescue Number 13 000 WILDLIFE or 13 000 94535.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank those persons who stopped at the accident scene on Romsey Road the 11th and assisted. It was really wonderful to see people prepared to stop and help a stranger in need. A truck driver from Wallan who took the time to stay chat to the injured driver and take his mind off his circumstances, a shop keeper from Romsey who held his hand and comforted him, the mum from Romsey who was first on scene organised the emergency services and then stayed to help. Wonderful humanity from everyday people. On behalf of the driver, his family and myself, my thanks to you.

Footnote: Prior to completing this article I was called out to dispatch yet another injured kangaroo on Three

Chain Road near Croziers Road. This kangaroo was hit at about 10.30 am. Be careful they are out there.


PROPERTY

A locked car is far less likely to be accessed than an unlocked car, and time and time again we take reports regarding thefts from unlocked cars, which can be very frustrating. Lancefield Primary School has been supporting the Jeans for Genes fundraiser for the last ten years. The staff and students have identified this fundraiser as one on our high priority list as it is all about helping research birth issues which affect children. We were also very privileged recently to attend a two hour session at the Lancefield Mechanics Hall in preparation for the *Extinct* – Lancefield Mega Fauna Festival which will take





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


place in October. Students learnt about bones that were discovered in the 19th century near Lancefield Park. Uncle Bill Nicholson, Wurundjeri Elder, joined palaeontologists from Museum Victoria for a day of fun and history discussing the bones of the giant wombat (Diprotodon), which seemingly became extinct due to climate change.

Local artist, Brigit Heller, will be working with the students to create individual art pieces for the festival. She was also present to talk with the students about the art work that will be produced. We cannot wait to participate in this wonderful community event.

Lancefield Primary School has also been taking part in the Sporting in Schools program for the past two terms. In Term Two, we had local members of the community run netball skills sessions and a boot camp for our students. This term, we are running a gymnastics/circus skills program across the school and skills sessions for basketball; again using the expertise of members in the local community.

Recently, our Prep students also completed their first 100 days of school. They spent the day celebrating all things 100 and were presented with certificates at assembly to commemorate this special occasion.

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COMMUNITY SPORT AND INFRASTRUCTURE FUND

Local MP, Mary-Anne Thomas, is encouraging community sports clubs across Macedon to apply for funding to improve their facilities. Grants for the Community Sport and Infrastructure Fund are now open and are an opportunity for clubs to update rundown facilities and infrastructure.

"Community sport is at the heart of our regional communities and Labor is investing in the facilities of grass roots clubs so local sport can continue to grow and thrive. Importantly, the fund includes \$10 million to develop female-friendly facilities so that clubs can build or upgrade women's change rooms. Women are joining community sports clubs in record numbers however women's change rooms are often rundown or non-existent," Ms Thomas said.

"Appropriate facilities and change rooms are critical

to support women's participation in local sport and these grants represent a great opportunity to enhance women's facilities". AFL Goldfields Netball Manager, Kim Bailey said.

The Community Sport and Infrastructure Fund also provides grants for up to \$100,000 for cricket facilities, up to \$3 million for local pools, up to \$650,000 for major facilities and \$100,000 for minor facilities upgrades. Local councils will need to apply for the grants but sporting clubs and community organisations can seek support for their project through council by submitting an Expression of Interest.

Ms Thomas added, "Local sports clubs deserve modern, safe facilities. The Labor Government promised them, and is getting on with delivering them."









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
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2015 SENIORS FESTIVAL: IT'S YOUR TIME TO ENJOY



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




affects them in different ways. This novel is really enjoyable; it keeps the reader wanting more and is written really well.


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When I visited my sister in the south of France recently I met a few Australians in the town of Albi. Amongst them were our own Andy Moore and Glo Moscattini who came cycling all the way from Spain across the Pyrennes Mountains on their way to Paris.

They were participating in the Semaine Federale du Cyclotourisme, a week of cycling based in Albi this year. It was the 77th year and it was certainly an international event with many nationalities taking part with their various flags showing. In total there were over 13000 bike riders and more

than 2500 volunteers.
