A host of activities have been arranged from October 18-24 as a celebration of the significant paleontological findings in a large amount of megafauna bones unearthed from the Lancefield Swamp. The first 'find' in the swamp was made by a well digger in 1843.

After several months of pre-planning, the 'Extinct' festival is to be launched at the 2015 Lancefield Agricultural Show, on Sunday, October 18. The festival winds up with a grand finale on Saturday, October 24 (Lancefield Farmers' Market Day).

The festival is expected to attract many visitors from the Macedon Ranges, and much further afield.

Members of the local organisers hope the megafauna festival can become an annual event, and much will depend on the support which is generated.

Interest has spread Australia wide, with the Perth Mint generously donating a set of megafauna coins valued at almost \$500 to help promote the festival.

Specialist guest speakers are coming from as far afield as Perth and Western Australia to shed light on the importance of the discoveries in the Lancefield Swamp (part of the rear section of the Lancefield Park).

Bones from extinct giant kangaroos, wombats, long beaked echidnas, koalas and marsupial lions now form part of the palaeontology collection at Museum Victoria.

Museum representatives are actively supporting the festival, and a display of fossilised bones from the Lancefield

site will be on show at the Mechanics' Institute during the week. The museum will also feature on Show Day.

Bendigo Community Bank is a major supporter of the festival, as is Macedon Ranges Shire Council. Their backing has been paramount to the festival taking place.

The distinctive replica giant kangaroos and marsupial lions created by locals Mike Jones and Michael Meehan have been strategically placed in and around Lancefield for several weeks, serving as a real promotional tool, and the men's shed members have constructed five Diprododons (giant wombats) to add to the atmosphere.

The megafauna committee appreciates the generous support from various local businesses and individuals.

Lancefield Neighbourhood House has been a driving force in ensuring the festival developed from an idea to reality.

The town's two schools have been heavily involved, with local artist Brigit Heller commissioned to ensure all the students create individual art works.

Drumming workshops at Woodend and Lancefield are expected to galvanise participants for a community band to perform on the final day of the festival.

Visiting street entertainers and the Baracuda Drumming Band are coming to Lancefield to enliven proceedings.

Chain saw art exponents Robby Bast and Angie Polglaze are going to create a megafauna theme on two huge pine tree stumps in Lancefield Park.

All over the world the concept of Men's Sheds is growing as an important part of good relationships and avenues to support the health of men in the community. Their brief is to provide spaces for men to meet together, to pursue hobbies and to do various forms of community service.

The Lancefield Neighbourhood House Men's Shed is an excellent opportunity for the men in our community to come together and enjoy the company of other men. Sometimes retirement and /or living alone can have a negative effect and men can feel low or lonely.

The prime focus of our group is to provide a friendly and supportive place for men to meet, to participate in projects and to make links with our local community.

This year we were honoured to receive the Romsey/ Lancefield RSL 'Spirit of Anzac' award for our contribution to the community and to men's health. We were presented with a certificate and a generous prize donated by Wayne from First National. This makes our efforts most worthwhile to be recognised by our community.

Other great projects 'on the go' are our giant wombat skeletons for the Mega Fauna festival and the "Kids in Sheds' is continuing with another small catch up group from Lancefield PS and next term Romsey PS students will participate.

'The Shed' is open Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 10 am to 4 pm. Working days are Tuesday and Thursday; lunch and friendship day is Wednesday.

Membership is open to all men in our area. It is a non-profit making organisation. Cost of membership is \$20, of which \$5 is towards affiliation with the Neighbourhood House. The balance is used to maintain the needs of 'the Shed' such as tool purchase, maintenance etc.

IDEALTIME FOR SUMMER PREPARATION

The weather is cool and fairly dry, hardly the conditions to be thinking about fires and Summer heat, but these conditions are ideal for making preparations to bring your property to a *Fire Safe* condition.

Clean up and dispose of debris that would assist in the spread of fire. At this time of the year a fire is an excellent way to dispose of this material and I would suggest that a number of small heaps is the safer way to go. I have written this before but always supervise your burn offs and have some type of water supply to enable them to be confined.

It is too late to do this after a burn off has escaped. Consider the current weather e.g. wind and temperature. It is advisable to notify VICFIRE on 1800 668 511 and give the exact location of your burn off. If the cleaning up is done well it assists the fire service to control any outbreaks as well as easing worries for you should such an event occur.

Nobody can be sure that anywhere is totally safe but a reduction in the amount of fuel can be a great help. Keep the grass around houses, sheds and other infrastructure short

either by mowing, grazing or spraying and you will have gone a long way to towards protecting your property.

The next consideration is the protection of people - at this stage CFA advises residents especially in high risk areas to devise a fire plan for their own protection. Advice is available on the CFA website and by creating this plan you are lowering the possibility of tragedy occurring.

It is important that the plan is written down and all members of the family know and practice carrying out your plan. This is probably enough on this subject this month. As mentioned each month any person interested in finding out what we do, how we train, and to consider joining, come down to the fire station on a Sunday morning.





One of the ongoing projects funded by the Op Shop is covering the cost of a Defensive Driving course for all 3435 residents who have just got their drivers licence.



THE ANZAC SPIRIT AWARD

The award presentation night was held at the Romsey Community Centre

In the presence of the Executive members of the Romsey-Lancefield RSL, the Mayor, Councillor Jennifer Anderson and Councillor Henry McLaughlan from the Macedon Ranges Shire Council.

In all about sixty people attended the award presentation.

The three nominees for the award were: Mrs Vivien Philpotts of the Lancefield Neighbourhood House for her involvement in a range of community activities, Mrs Shirley Kishere of the Romsey-Lancefield & District Historical Society for her book of collected letters, articles and photographs about local serving members in WW1 and the President Mr Graham Knell and Secretary Mr Mario Drago of the Lancefield Men's Shed for its important contribution to men's health and wellbeing in the community.

The Mayor Councillor Jennifer Anderson announced the winner and presented the prize.

The winner of this year's Anzac Spirit Award was the Lancefield Men's Shed. They were presented with a cheque for \$150, a medal and a framed certificate of congratulations.

This year's winner will have their names engraved and added to the Anzac Spirit bronze statue, which is retained in perpetuity at the Romsey Community Centre.

The Anzac Spirit Award is sponsored by the RSL's Wayne Smith, former RSL branch secretary and ex member of the 4th/19th Prince of Wales Light Horse. It was established to reward examples of exceptional commitment, unselfishness and enthusiasm by persons or organisations in the area within the last 12months.

Many of the young men who became Anzacs in 1915 were drawn from small towns and villages. Reading their diaries tells us how strongly they were linked to home and community and how powerfully those links sustained them. In fact, there is little doubt that the close-knit community spirit they took with them provided the foundation for what eventually became the Anzac spirit of mateship.

We hope by the presentation of this award will do something to keep that spirit alive.

WEATHER COMMENT

RAINFALL HAS BEEN SADLY LACKING

The weather is a common topic of conversation with anybody that you happen to meet at the present time whether from the farming community or the gardeners in our area. While the last few days have been Spring like the rainfall has been sadly lacking in quantity.

I was looking over the farm this morning and there is some sign of growth but only where the paddocks are without stock. The lucerne paddock which has been without sheep for 3 weeks is showing little signs of growth so the prospect of a good hay crop is also not too promising. The rain has come in very spasmodic falls but with a total of 44mm for the month since my last report, should have had more effect.

The ewes and lambs are progressing well as I was wise enough to have saved a paddock of feed for them so that they could get a good start but they will soon be out in the main paddocks and will hopefully continue to grow out there.

Toby is now a very large sheep and in spite of keeping him on a small area never seems to lose any weight and is still thinking he is a human being not a sheep and responds to our voices when he hears us. We have almost finished his feed regime and we are not likely to continue for this year at least.

My future comments on the state of the cattle market will mostly be gleaned from the Media as I find the saleyards a difficult environment these days and as we will soon be without any cattle of our own I will not need to go there. At this time there does not seem to be any easing of prime stock prices and I suppose the same can be said for store cattle also. Sheep and lambs also are selling well.

The garden is now showing that Spring is on the way. Daffodils, jonquils, our first tulip and shrubs are providing some colour and are easily seen as we travel our area. The vegie patch has been dug over and the soil is showing the benefit of a dressing of lucerne and sheep manure over the Winter. Lots of worms.



MAINTENANCE Allocation for LPS

Labor Member for Macedon, Mary-Anne Thomas, was thrilled to announce that much needed maintenance funding has been allocated for the school's heritage-listed administration building.

"During last year's election campaign, the Principal of Lancefield Primary School and school council raised ongoing concerns with me about much needed roof repairs," Ms Thomas said. "As soon as I was elected, I made it a priority to visit the school and write to the Minister about the school's maintenance".

Schools in Macedon will share in more than \$550,000 of extra funding in 2016 as part of the Victorian Government's plan to make Victoria the Education State. The 2015/16 Victorian Budget was the single biggest injection of

WHAT DID HAPPEN AT THE

LANCEFIELD SWAMP?

The fossilised bones of hundreds, if not thousands of Australian megafauna animals have been preserved in the clay of Lancefield Swamp.

Procoptodon, the giant shortfaced kangaroo, was so heavy that it is uncertain whether it could hop. And Diprotodon was the largest marsupial ever, weighing up to three tons. Bones from marsupial lions and long beaked echidnas and other animals which roamed this area have also been identified.

Why did these animal remains accumulate at Lancefield Swamp?

District residents are encouraged to attend an important and unique discussion night at the Lancefield Mechanics' Institute on Tuesday, October 20 (7pm -9.30pm) chaired by Michael Meehan.

Three eminent Australian palaeontologists who led excavation campaigns at Lancefield in the 1970s, 1990s an early 2000s will discuss what occurred at Lancefield Swamp, and why the site remains of major scientific importance in understanding the demise of Australian megafauna.

Based on research at Lancefield, not all academics agree what happened.

Lancefield identity, Syd Green, was involved in all three "digs" and he will provide a local perspective. Be prepared for plenty of interesting theories, questions and answers! The visiting speakers are Dr Joe Dortch (University of Western Australia), Dr Sanja van Huet (Monash University) and Dr Richard Gillispie (University of Woologong).




