### FEDERATION TRACK IS OPEN

Great news from the Council – the track between Lancefield and Romsey has been fixed (temporarily) and is now usable again.

Council's Manager, Engineering and Resource Recovery, Eng Lim, said: "At its May meeting, Council approved \$10,000 funding to undertake minor repairs on the trail between Romsey and Lancefield. This decision noted the trail's importance in promoting healthy activity and enhancing the community's wellbeing. The minor works were completed on 16 June. This popular trail is now open, and we look forward to people using it again.

Further work is needed to rectify all the damage caused by the flooding in October 2022. We continue to seek funding for permanent repairs to this trail, and others affected by the last year's floods."





# FOOD SHARE AT THE TOWNHOUSE

- A GREAT WAY TO REDUCE YOUR SHOPPING BILL.

As we all know, the cost of food is through the roof, but readers might like to know that the Lancefield Townhouse, in conjunction with the Romsey Neighbourhood House, is now in a position to offer an alternative for a lot of your grocery items to assist you with reducing the cost of your weekly food shop and save on fuel and travel as well.

When I called into the Townhouse, I found that I could buy a can of lentils for 50c, a one kilo packet of white rice for 50c or a 500gm packet of pasta for 50c and a 1 kg packet of authentic Japanese Udon noodles for \$1. Other preprepared items such as pre-cooked tubs of a mix of brown rice and quinoa, a variety of sauces, mayonnaise and many other items. Meat is sometimes available, too. The Food Share has added a range of breads and potatoes, fresh fruit

and fresh vegetables to their list of available goods.

The Lancefield Townhouse and the Romsey Neighbourhood House have become a Foodbank agent. They receive donations through Second Bite, which is a Coles supermarket initiative, and from a Nature's Cargo business.

If you are struggling to make ends meet, you can apply for monthly credits or just take some of the pressure off and donate towards the goods you take which helps support the project for others. As they say at the Townhouse, 'Food Share is for everyone'.

# WALKING TRACK EXTENSION

We were very pleased to see the new walking track extension project completed in May. The new section of the track starts at the netball changerooms and meanders around the cricket nets, sweeps past the new tennis/ netball courts, then around the second oval and connects with the existing track.

Just hours after completion when the committee went to look at the new track it was already peppered with footprints, pawprints, pram tracks and bike tracks. It is pleasing to see the community out and enjoying it straight away. We hope it is enjoyed for many years to come.

The Committee of Management would like to acknowledge the wonderful work done by Erin Foster on behalf of the Lancefield parkrun in her application for the grant to undertake the track extension.

The grant which Erin applied for was one of the Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Community Funding Scheme grants, which provides public money to not-forprofit community groups for projects and initiatives that benefit residents of the Macedon Ranges.

#### FLOOD RECOVERY SUPPORT

In April DEECA opened their online applications for flood recovery support for damage done in October 2022. We jumped on and applied straight away. We are seeking support to repair damage to the walking track, replace sand washed away from the equestrian arenas, address the drainage issues on the east side of the oval and replace soft fall at the playground. We have just heard that our application has been successful – we hope to have the work started in July.

### Contract awarded for new sewer main for Lancefield

Greater Western Water (GWW) are upgrading part of the Lancefield sewer main to improve the network and ensure reliable sewer services for the local community.

The project's contract was recently awarded to Jaydo and construction will begin in early 2024.

The work will be carried out in stages along 6.5km of the sewer main, running from Tickawarra Road to the Lancefield Sewer Pump Station on Melbourne-Lancefield Road.





# MASTERPLAN SUBMISSION TO COUNCIL

The Macedon Ranges Shire Council Draft Budget provided funding for a new Masterplan in other recreational facilities in the Macedon Ranges, including Romsey, Riddells Creek, Kyneton and Gisborne. However, Lancefield was overlooked. The Committee of Management jumped into action to have funding for a new Masterplan for Lancefield included.

The Committee invested hours of work preparing a formal submission to the MRSC and was strongly supported by our community. We were exceptionally grateful to receive letters of support from Mary-Anne Thomas MP, Rob Mitchell MP, Lancefield Neighbourhood House and the RRBATA Committee. As well as our user groups: Lancefield Junior Football Club, Lancefield Senior Football Netball Club, Lancefield Equestrian Group, Lancefield Pony Club, Lancefield Tennis Club, Lancefield Bowling Club, Romsey Lancefield Girl Guides, Lancefield parkrun, Northern Cycling, Lancefield Cricket Club, Lancefield Men's Shed, and the Lancefield Agricultural Society. We would like to publicly thank all our supporters - especially the 20 folk who turned out on a cold night in Lancefield to support us when we gave an online

presentation to the MRSC special meeting. They were kept warm with delicious soup made by Judy Stammers and bread rolls donated by Dina from the Lancefield Bakery. Thanks also to Bill Balcam, who managed to distil an 8-page submission into a lively 3-minute presentation. Well done everyone.

The MRSC funded a Masterplan in 2012 for Lancefield Park which helped Lancefield Park and our user groups obtain funding and grants for essential maintenance and some upgrades, but that Masterplan is outdated, and we have experienced great difficulty in obtaining funding recently, and our facilities need improvement. The rate-payers of Lancefield deserve their fair share of Council funding for open space and recreational activities. By funding a new Masterplan, the MRSC will be putting Lancefield Park on a fairer, more even footing with other Macedon Ranges facilities, which will assist the Lancefield Park and its user groups in being more competitive when applying for grants and funding. # THE QUILT SHOW

On Saturday 27 and Sunday 28 May, A Patch of Lancefield held a quilt show in the Lancefield Mechanics' Institute Hall. A wide range of quilts, large and small, was displayed on stands constructed as a walkway to enable people to walk through the hall and admire the quilts.

Of particular interest to me was the display of the Presbyterian Church 'Sale of Gifts Quilt 1896', part of the Historical Society's collection. The quilt has an interesting history. In September 1895 a 'sale of gifts' event was planned by the Lancefield Presbyterian Church. It had been many years since the Church had appealed to the congregation for funds. Sewing meetings were held regularly and 'a good supply of useful articles' was made for sale at the planned bazaar. The last week of February 1896 was chosen for the fair and the ladies worked 'assiduously for many months' to



manufacture the articles for sale. The Lancefield Mercury reported on 20 December 1895 that:

A feature of the event will be an autograph quilt, which will contain over 400 names beautifully worked in different colours. Anyone desirous of handing his or her name down to posterity will have to hurry up if they wish to secure a square on the quilt. 26 February 1896 was chosen as the date for the opening of the sale of gifts. It was officially opened by the Hon. John Gavin Duffy, Member for Dalhousie, Kilmore and Lancefield in the Victorian Legislative Assembly.

A large advertisement appeared in the Mercury, inviting the community to the opening ceremony as 'This event should prove one of the most unique of its kind ever held in the district'. Fancy goods stalls, refreshment stalls and special attractions were a feature of the day. On the day, 'in the presence of a large assemblage', chaired by Mr James Hemphill, JP, Mr Dufffy opened the bazaar. Also on the platform were Messrs J Waddell, J Harley, G Forsyth and J Cameron, members of the church committee. The opening of the event and the sale of goods proved to be a great success; the stalls continued selling their goods until the following Saturday evening.

For many years, the 1896 Quilt has been displayed, albeit inadequately, at the Historical Society's rooms at the former Courthouse amongst other Historical Society memorabilia. The beauty of the display in the Mechanics' Institute Hall was that it was possible to see the names of each person who had contributed to the creation of the quilt embroidered on the 1896 quilt.

While I was standing and admiring the display, Lancefield local, Syd Green came and pointed out his great aunt Phyllis Derrick's name. There must be many other families whose names of loved ones are also embroidered on the quilt. It would be terrific to hear some of the stories.

The 'Sale of Gifts Quilt 1896' remains of great significance to the residents of Lancefield and Romsey. If rumours that the Historical Society are offering the quilt to other historical societies to be kept in better conditions than exist at the Courthouse are true, this quilt may be lost forever to our townships' histories!



On one of our annual weekends in August, we also hold another tournament in Echuca, where teams from various clubs around the state gather to play at the Port, outside the Star Hotel.


We meet on the Friday night at the Star for a get together and then over Saturday and Sunday we play our favorite game, culminating in a lunch at the hotel.



### SOCIAL PRESCRIBING AND THE **NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE**

For several years various countries around the world have been exploring the benefits of social prescribing as a way to improve people's physical and mental health and take the strain off health care systems. Australia is now one of those countries and studies have been looking into the benefits since 2021, with the Victorian Government just starting some research trials, with results from around the world showing positive outcomes.

So what is social prescribing?

There are a few definitions:

"Social prescribing is an approach that aims to improve health and well-being. It connects individuals to nonclinical services and supports that address social needs, such as those related to loneliness, housing instability and mental health. At the person level, social prescribing can give individuals the knowledge skills, motivation and confidence to manage their own health and well-being. " (Daniel F Morse National Library of Medicine BMJ Global Health 2022)

"Social prescribing is when health professionals refer

patients to community support services for non-medical activities, in order to improve their mental and physical health and wellbeing."

Who is social prescribing for?

- people with chronic conditions
- people who are lonely or socially isolated
- people at a high risk of mental health illness
- people who are vulnerable, for example because of their

age or their financial situation. What have Neighbourhood Houses got to do with it?

There is a recognition that Neighbourhood Houses play an essential role as providers of services that support social prescribing. At Lancefield we run many activities that are about connecting people, reducing social isolation and supporting vulnerable individuals. Other activities might be about learning new skills or contributing to a project, and we have around 60 volunteers who find great rewards for themselves whilst they contribute to our community in various ways.

The Neighbourhood House volunteering opportunities







range from committing to a weekly shift, getting involved in a one-off project or just working by yourself to help with

You can volunteer to work at the Op Shop, Townhouse, Mens Shed, Community Garden, Food Share or Farmers Market. We need people for tasks such as feeding the chooks, scrapbooking the history of the house, watering the street barrels, maintenance jobs, helping in the office or computer work. We also need some volunteers to help with food preparation and cooking and drivers and admin people for our community transport project. Basically, we say if you want to do something we will find something to fit your interest and skill level.

The Feed it Forward community lunch is on Tuesday 27 June in Romsey and Tuesday 25 July in Lancefield. Consider joining us or bringing along someone you know who might benefit from an outing.

### STAY COSY THIS WINTER


Some quick and effective tips:


### **VOLUNTEER**

The ultimate aim being to live a balanced lifestyle around your unique needs, desires and dreams that align with your true authentic self.


My book is a personal self-development program that will give you tools and a structure to get your life back on track.

### ROMSEY ECOTHERAPY PARK AWARDED **PARK OF THE YEAR**

Romsey Ecotherapy Park has taken out the Park of The Year title at Parks and Leisure Australia's 2023 VIC/TAS Regional Awards of Excellence.

The award recognises well designed and managed new or significantly revitalised parks or open spaces and best practice in design and management. Romsey Ecotherapy Park was awarded for its innovative design and strong community collaboration.

The park is the culmination of a 14-year communityled initiative by Romsey Ecotherapy Park Inc. which, in collaboration with Council, set out to create a regionally significant place to enhance health and wellbeing for all ages and abilities. Through extensive community consultation, a plan was created for an innovative nature-based space for passive recreation, incorporating visual cultural elements, unique sensory and therapeutic opportunities and capacity for open-air performances and events. The park officially opened in October 2022 and features a climbing forest, ropes course, flying fox, water features, a sensory garden, a 'woodland ramble' and an events space with picnic and BBQ facilities. Adding to the innovative design are numerous sculptural installations highlighting the talent of local artists and a special 'Story Telling Chair'. The design also includes sustainable features such as solar lighting to illuminate pathways and recycled and locally sourced

materials. Existing trees were retained during construction, and more than 4000 native and exotic plants were added with an emphasis on texture, scent and floral display as well as resilience and low water usage. Mayor Annette Death said the project was a great example of how Council and the community can work together to achieve a positive outcome.

"The park has become a wonderful feature in the community, where children can play and everyone can gather and enjoy the surrounds," she said. "It's strengthening community connections while providing a unique open space for recreational activities."

"I want to again acknowledge the hard work and commitment of Romsey Ecotherapy Park Inc. and the Romsey community, who were fundamental in helping this amazing project come to fruition."

The park was designed by ACLA Consultants, built by Commercialscapes and made possible through the support of various contributors including Council, Regional Development Victoria (Victorian Government), the Australian Government, Romsey Ecotherapy Park Inc., Lancefield Romsey Community Bank (Bendigo Bank) and Freemasons Foundation Victoria.

As a VIC/TAS Region winner, the Romsey Ecotherapy Park will contend for the National Park of the Year award in October 2023.
