It's been a big few months since we launched Casserole Club in October 2014 and it's safe to say that we're officially up and running in the Lancefield and Romsey area!



LANCEFIELD FIRE BRIGADE


LIGHTNING STRIKES TWICE!

Friday 13th lived up to its reputation last Friday when as a result of a thunder storm two lightning strikes were reported at the same time. The brigade responded with three vehicles and fortunately with the heavy rain with the storm none got away. I would remind people to be aware of the roads, even minor or seldom used roads, in their area as this can greatly assist as Brigade members with their local knowledge will know where they are. Another item of assistance is the use of rural property numbers when calling OOO. These numbers are designed to allow people to locate a property and allow emergency services to calculate the distance along that road to the incident.

The Brigade has also attended a number of small fires and this is an indication that fire restriction regulations are not being followed. A bit of rain does not mean that they can be ignored. Become aware of the regulations but the easiest thing to do is do not burn anything until the restrictions cease. Permits may be granted under specific conditions but these must be applied for through the Fire Prevention Officer.

This month's article has been a bit of a lecture so I will finish with this comment, be aware, be careful and be safe.

McNutts Lane, Lancefield has been recently closed to traffic due to safety concerns on the existing timber bridge. Alternative routes available to traffic are Mcintosh Road via either Kilmore-Lancefield Road, or Cemetery Road. Council has scheduled the replacement of the timber deck for this financial year under the 2014/2015 Capital Works Program. The \$30,000 project will commence in April and take four weeks to complete. Council wishes to thank the community for their understanding whilst the road is closed and works are completed.



The football season is soon to begin, involving senior and junior sides, with pre-season training in full swing.





Recently Mary-anne Thomas attended assembly and then stayed to participate in a discussion about the priority issues that schools are facing.


FIRST AID COMES TO LANCEFIELD PRIMARY

Through the First Aid in Schools program, trained St John presenters led students from all classes through tailored sessions on the importance of First Aid and what to do in the event of an emergency.

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

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WEATHER COMMENT

JUST AS WELL I DIDN'T MAKE ANY RASH PREDICTIONS ABOUT THE COMING YEAR...

I have been looking at last year's records and have found that at this stage of last year we had less rain than we have recorded this year. 2014 at the end of February 30mm whereas this year we have had to date[15-2] 52mm the difference, of course, has been a run of 34 days without a measure.

The paddocks started to show some promise of growth after the January falls but this soon disappeared as the hot days returned with strong winds sucking the moisture out of the soil. Just as well I didn't make any rash predictions about the coming year.

The weather continues to be hot and there does not seem to be much of a chance that we will get a repeat of Friday's storm activity or any other change in the weather pattern in the foreseeable future.

Not much on the farm front, the lambs have been drenched weaned and shorn and have taught themselves to eat hay from the hay feeder which is there for the cattle to eat. Quite a sight to see them around the feeder when the cattle are not there.

The cattle still are in good condition and we will wait for Autumn to make the decision about selling them. I am reminded that Toby must get a mention. He is enjoying his biscuit of lucerne hay each evening and is always reminding us at about 5pm that he is there and would like a feed.

Our little vegie plot is doing well and has kept us supplied with onions, beetroot, lettuce, tomatoes, silver beet, potatoes and beans. Acting on advice from a great Romsey gardener we have tried planting another carrot crop and wait with some confidence.

The recent rain might encourage the tiny seeds to grow. Some areas of the flower garden are still colourful but the heat has knocked many plants. The oleander and buddleia plus dahlias, gladioli, also smaller perennials, summer annuals and even an Easter daisy are in flower.

Please continue to watch this space.

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
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
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ROMSEY'S INAUGURAL ANTIQUES AND COLLECTIBLES FAIR



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AFTER HOURS HEALTH SERVICE OPENS IN MACEDON RANGES

The Macedon Ranges has a new after-hours health care service. Happy Bodies Health Service (HBHS) officially opened its doors on Friday 30 January. The Service will be operating from the Riddells Creek Neighbourhood House, 59 Main Road Riddells Creek, and will be open on Friday and Sunday nights between 6.30 - 10.30pm for a six month trial period.

After hours services in the Macedon Ranges have been virtually non-existent over the last few years. Carers, parents and unwell members of our community have had to make difficult decisions after their usual health care provider is closed.

The options have included: do nothing and wait (which can be extremely stressful); drive considerable distances out of the Macedon Ranges to seek access to other health services; or as a last act of desperation, call an ambulance, unintentionally tying up the shire's limited ambulance paramedic resources. HBHS aims to fill the after hour void by offering a walk in, no appointment needed service from 6.30 - 10.30pm on Friday and Sunday evenings. This innovative new service will provide triage, assessment and management (including prescriptions) to the residents of the Macedon

HBHS is led by a local Nurse Practitioner/Physician Associate and has a supportive staff including a registered nurse, primary care paramedic and health & medical

service assistants. The service is designed to supplement services that are already provided by your local doctor during the hours when he/she is not available. Happy Bodies Health Service is not a replacement for your regular GP. We are here for those out of hour health crises when you are just not sure what to do.

Nurse Practitioners can assess patients, diagnose, prescribe medication, order tests, refer to specialists and provide an advanced level of patient care.

At HBHS, we will provide first line patient care subsequently referring patients back to their usual GP for ongoing management.

So if you, a family member or a friend are just not feeling right, have a tummy ache, developed a rash or require a check up, and it is a Friday or Sunday evening, then come and visit Happy Bodies. No appointment is needed and you don't need to phone. People seeking assessment can simply drop in.

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

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

From 25 April 1915 to 9
January 1916, troops from
Australia, New Zealand, the
UK and Turkey engaged

Gallipoli peninsula. The

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
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LANCEFIELD GOLF CLUB REPORT

The new watering system is currently being installed and connected and to date 5 greens have been completed. Great work from all those involved.





NEVER BORING IN LANCEFIELD

Lancefield has avoided high levels of bore water in its drinking water supply this summer, thanks to the new Romsey-Lancefield pipeline. The \$1.75m pipeline, constructed last year, allows water from the wider Macedon Ranges supply system to be transferred to Lancefield via Romsey, from the Kerrie Reservoir. Western Water has been boosting Lancefield's water supply over this summer with a small percentage of bore water, compared to up to 70% bore water that was needed last summer. Water is due to start flowing from the Romsey-Lancefield pipeline into the Lancefield storage basin in late February or early March. Less reliance on bore water should mean an improved and more consistent taste for Lancefield's drinking water. Once this occurs, the Lancefield bore will be rested, bringing the town on to 100% reservoir water. The bore will be available to supplement Lancefield's drinking water again if needed. The Kerrie Reservoir is supplemented with water from Rosslynne Reservoir in Gisborne, the Macedon Ranges' largest water storage at more than 25,000 million litres. The pipeline also means Lancefield, along with the rest of the Macedon Ranges, has the backup option of using water from the Melbourne supply system if needed. This gives Lancefield a more secure water supply, in line with other towns in the Macedon Ranges.





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REFLECTION ON WHY LANCEFIELD

Whenever I see advertising "It's how the locals like it", it reminds me of Lancefield. Why...?

Our local policeman, Constable Barr wrote about, how long he was stationed in our town and that he hoped to stay here for ever. Fay Woodhouse wrote some time ago: "Lancefield my new Landscape". 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VANESSA'S GARDEN

LOOKING A BIT JADED?

AUTUMN FLOWERS

If your garden is looking a bit jaded after summer, you might like to plant some Japanese anemones which provide a lovely dappled patch of colour at this time of year, flowering in white or rosy pink. The flowers are held high above the plant's dark green foliage on thin stems which move about in the slightest breeze, and you might know this plant by its more common name of windflower.

They are easy to grow, asking only to be kept moist and have compost in the soil. They do well under deciduous trees and make great cutting flowers, keeping well in the vase once

PRUNING DECIDUOUS FRUIT TREES

I don't know about you but the apricots, peaches, plums and nectarines have had a bumper year and many people have said the same thing. I think it was a combination of no strong winds when the fruit was setting, the patch of heavy rain we had in January and then the temperatures remaining steady for the following fortnight.

However a heavy crop sometimes brings the disappointment of broken branches with it and these need to be dealt with as soon as possible. Pick a dry, low-humidity day and make a clean cut as close as possible to the next viable spur or branch. The aim is to avoid leaving behind an ugly and unproductive spur.

While you're out there with the secateurs and pruning saw, long whippy growth can also be tackled by cutting the branch or spur back to a good fat, outward-facing bud. You can thin out crowded and crossing branches at the same time and the pruning cuts will heal quickly, sometimes better than in winter.

PREPARING FOR WINTER CROPS

If you're thinking of having a go at growing onions and broad beans from seed, now is the time to get the soil ready. Both these plants, and winter brassicas such as cabbages, Brussels sprouts and kale, prefer a non-acidic soil so you'll want a neutral to slightly alkaline pH (7-7.5). PH test kits are inexpensive, simple to use and readily available in garden centres and hardware stores. Appropriate soil improvers for low pH are lime or dolomite dug into the bed. If the pH is too high, sulphur will bring it down. Once treated, leave the bed for a couple of weeks, then add some well-rotted compost and you're good to go!

GORGEOUS GARLIC

I generally plant my garlic this month for harvesting in late spring-early summer. It's really easy to grow, either in the veggie plot or, as I've mentioned in previous articles, round your roses, which also helps keep them free from aphids.

All garlic needs to succeed is well drained soil in full sun and a regular drink of water in early spring.

Plant it by breaking the bulb into individual cloves and plant each one pointed end up and about 7cm apart and with just the pointed tip poking through the soil. It's a good idea to cover them with some chicken wire at first otherwise curious and greedy birds often have a go at pulling them out and then find they don't like the taste but your precious cloves are left lying about on the surface.

Garlic is ready to harvest when its leaves are mostly brown and only a couple of green ones remain. Or you can do as I do and leave it in the ground until the top is all brown. Hang to dry for a couple of weeks to harden the skins and your homegrown garlic should keep for about 6 months as long as it is then stored somewhere dark and dry.





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
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Macedon Ranges Shire Council is inviting community comment on the findings of a feasibility study into establishing a regional equine centre in the shire capable of hosting world-class events.

The equine industry contributes an estimated \$140 million each year to the local economy. The Victorian Government has contributed \$60,000 to the project, with Council providing the balance of the \$95,000 project.

The study has looked at a range of facilities options including indoor and outdoor arenas, stabling, yards, exhibition, entertainment and conference facilities. It has also considered other possible uses such as dog and agricultural shows and exhibitions.


