WEATHER COMMENT

.OOKING GRIM

Well, my efforts to change the weather pattern last month did not have the result that I had hoped for, in fact the rainfall for the month was less than previously and our situation is now looking grim. The thunderstorm last night only gave us 3.5mm and with showers over the last few days have left us with a total since, my last article of only 24.5mm. At this time last year we were starting to get some rain but not so this year.

Feed is becoming very dry and fairly sparse. Hay has become popular with the animals and because of this the hay shed is also starting to look on the empty side. In our case the lambs from last year are headed for market this week and the cattle will follow suit shortly. Toby of course is exempt from this occurrence and is still having his daily rations which, as usual he lets us know when he is ready for a snack. It will be an interesting situation to see how everything sells, at the moment the markets are quite strong so we hope for a good result.

The stock have maintained their condition with the aid of hay. In spite of having moved around the lambs have not forgotten what a hay feeder is all about, of course cattle never forget where there is a feed. The garden is also showing the effects of the dry conditions and there are now few flowers on show, still some roses and dahlias are the main ones. The vegie plot is still providing some provisions for the table but is also starting to reach the end of its cycle. We can only wait and see what happens next as we progress towards Winter

LANCEFIELD FIRE BRIGADE

I had intended to report on the Brigade's Biennial meeting but that will be postponed until next month. The reason being the need to remind the residents again about the need for caution when planning to conduct a burn off. The brigade has attended a number of incidents since the lifting of the restrictions in place over the Summer period. It is important to take a number of conditions into consideration before lighting any sort of a fire.

These are in no special order but all need to be looked at to prevent the fire escaping and causing damage to your own or neighbouring property. Have an adequate supply of water on hand and equipment to enable the area to be kept under control also someone to operate it at ALL times. Do not leave any fire unattended. Study the wind speed and direction, low wind is a necessity for you to be able to control a burn off. Study the surrounding area for dry vegetation and make an effort to remove it if possible.

It is a good idea if you have a large amount of material to dispose of to make a number of small heaps as these will not generate as much heat and therefore are less likely to escape. Plan your burn offs late into the afternoon. As the days cool down the danger is reduced and the side effects minimised and your burn is not headed into the warmer part of the day with the consequences of increased risk of an escape. It is basically an exercise in common sense and I also remind people that because the fire restrictions have been lifted it may not be safe to burn under all conditions

Please feel free to contact the Brigade if you have any questions and finally notify the Burn Off Notification Line on 1800 668 511. Please take care in this very dry time and help reduce the number of incidents the Brigade is called out to

of trapping I very easily caught 13 mynas, and that pretty much cleared my garden of them. Then last spring a pair started checking out next-door's eaves for a possible nesting site: I moved the trap closer to where they were hanging out and caught three birds. Since then, no mynas to speak of.

"What I have noticed - and this has been quite dramatic and exciting - is a marked increase in the smaller native birds in my garden: two species of thornbills; silvereyes; smaller honeyeaters such as yellowfaced and white-eared; blue wrens; a pair of grey fantails

KEMAL'S GALLIPOLI.

In Europe the battle at Gallipoli is not very much commemorated. It was not until we came to Australia, that I learned about Anzac Cove and Lone Pine. In 1992, I traveled with my wife to Gallipoli. Whoever has been there, or any of our locals who think of going there for the centenary celebrations, will be overwhelmed by the 22 000 graves in the cemeteries and the futility of the war that had to happen.

After his victory over the Anzacs, Kemal wrote on the mortuary monument at Lone Pine:

"Those heroes that shed their blood and lost their lives... You are now laying in the soil of a friendly country. therefore rest in peace. There is no difference between the Johnnies and the Mehmets to us, where they lie side by side here in this country of ours ... You, the mothers, who send their sons from far away countries wipe away your tears, your sons are now lying in our bosom and are in peace.

After having lost their lives on this land they have become our sons as well." (1934)

Mustafa Kemal (Atatürk) was not only a victorious general in the Ottoman's army. He was an equally great statesman. In 1923 he replaced the Muslim orientated Ottoman empire. He established the Turkish Republic and became its president. He ruled with a single party and introduced a Western (Swiss) legal code of conduct, for the Turkish population, including the family unit as being the most important.

Equal rights for women (even in divorce). He forced a divorced man to pay alimony He minimised the rule of Islam in Turkey. Western dress and headgear (no women's veil or men's fez). He introduced the Western calendar. He abandoned the Arab language in Turkey

He introduced equal education for girls and boys. He ordered the Western alphabet, in schools, law and government.

He made the use of surnames compulsory and gave himself the surname of Atatürk (= father of Turks), which nobody else was allowed to use.

He died in 1938. He was a remarkable statesman.




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ENCOURAGE CHURCH



goes on especially in those countries where Islam holds sway.



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
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



SEWER MAINTENANCE UNDER WAY

Your sewerage system is out of sight, out of mind, and Western Water is working hard to ensure it stays that way. Contractors will be working across the region over the next few months assessing the condition of sewerage pipes and carrying out any maintenance needed.

There are more than 1,200km of sewerage pipes across our region that need regular inspection, cleaning and repairs. Residents might see people over the next few months working around sewer pipes, or they may receive a letter advising them Western Water contractors need to access their property for the work. This regular maintenance ensures that when people flush they can be confident their wastewater is being safely and effectively removed and treated. Western Water treats more than 8,500 million litres of sewage a year at its seven recycled water plants.

The sewage is treated to produce high quality recycled water, most of which is pumped to sports grounds, school ovals, parks and businesses across the region for irrigation.

Mum goes to work by Libby Gleeson and Leila Rudge. RRP \$24.95


In this book, lots of mums drop their kids off at a childcare centre before going off to work. The book compares how each of the mums spends their day

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
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

Willy's Mum By Scott Tulloch. RRP \$14.99





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
