"We are proud that over recent years, the Mt Macedon ANZAC Day Dawn Service has grown in size and become one of the largest attended Dawn Service's in regional Victoria," Mr Mildenhall said. "However, Cameron Drive and the existing car parking infrastructure at The Cross can no longer cope with the number of people who wish to attend the Dawn Service each year and from this year, anyone wishing to attend the Service will need to catch

Mount Macedon Road will be closed to Dawn Service traffic from the corner of Mount Macedon Road and Honour Avenue, and Mount Macedon Road and Straws Lane from 3:00AM on ANZAC Day.

CHARLES JOSEPH LA TROBE IN OUR NEIGHBOURHOOD

Victoria's first Lieutenant-Governor (1839-54) was the English born Charles Joseph La Trobe (1801-75). He was the son of a gentleman and educated in the Moravian faith. Always fascinated by topography, he loved painting or drawing mountains and other natural features and as a youth his artistic talents were encouraged.

After his schooling, in 1824 he left England for Neuchâtel in Switzerland where for three years he was tutor to the spoiled young aristocrat, the Comte de Pourtalès. One of the



perks of the job was that he became a keen mountaineer. In addition, he met Sophie de Montmollin whom he married in September 1835. La Trobe then came to the attention of the Colonial Office in London and was first posted to the West Indies. They were so impressed with his work that in January 1839, Colonial Secretary, Lord Glenelg, offered La Trobe an appointment in Australia as Superintendent of the newly settled Port Phillip District of New South Wales.

La Trobe and his family (his wife Sophie and oldest child Agnes) arrived in Melbourne on 3 October 1839 where he must have been overwhelmed with the enormous task of transforming a colonial outpost into a civilised settlement. Having only been settled officially in 1835, parts of the Port Phillip District was largely unexplored or mapped. Here La Trobe was at his happiest, riding out to the most remote districts, meeting the squatters and recording his routes.

In the 15 years La Trobe spent in the Port Phillip District, he made 94 journeys outside Melbourne. His first four visits were from Geelong to Point Lonsdale, to Dandenong and Western Port, and to Cape Schanck and Point Nepean. He visited the Mt Macedon, Mt William, Kilmore and Kyneton



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areas on 10 occasions. His sketches on these tours documented the landscape in the earliest period of European settlement. Between 25 and 28 October 1840, only one year after his arrival and on his fifth official journey to see Victoria, La Trobe travelled to Mt Macedon, Tallarook and Kilmore where he staved with the squatter, Colonel Henry White, a founding member of the Melbourne Club. It was his first expedition to the Goulburn River. His only

diary note is that, after he was kicked 'from a led mare... [he] ...returned to town on the 28th from Tallarook, though suffering from the kick on my calf; breakfasting with Col. White, and changing horses at Kilmore'.

He next visited the area in July 1842. It was his 14th journey around Port Phillip and his second visit to Goulburn, in particular to the Goulburn Aboriginal Protectorate. On this occasion he seems to have retraced his steps, but notes that 'It was probably on this journey that I ascended Mt Macedon... We were on ...(the central rock) on a day of such surpassing clearness that we saw the whole of the Sierra of the Grampians perfectly from Mt William to Mt Sturgeon'. I am now keen to investigate his exact routes for these journeys and to consult original pastoral leases as well as finding out more about the squatters he visited! Of course, there is a huge La Trobe archive at the State Library of Victoria and the Public Record Office and I look forward to delving into these collections as well as putting his trips into the social and political context of the time.

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

A large oak tree located in Dunsford St, Lancefield is scheduled to be removed in January 2015 due to public safety issues.

Following an arboriculture assessment, the tree was found to have weaknesses in the frame, which means that it poses a public safety risk. Macedon Ranges Shire Council has decided to remove the tree rather than risking damage to property or injury to the public.

The nature strip will be reinstated with soil and grass until a replacement tree of a similar species is planted during the winter months of 2015, which is the optimal time to plant deciduous trees.



PASTOR'S PARABLES STORY OF VALENTINE'S DAY

The story of Valentine's Day begins in the third century with an oppressive Roman emperor and a humble Christian Martyr. The emperor was Claudius II. The Christian was Valentinus.

Claudius had ordered all Romans to worship twelve gods, and had made it a crime punishable by death to associate with Christians. But Valentinus was dedicated to the ideals of Christ; not even the threat of death could keep him from practicing his beliefs. He was arrested and imprisoned.


During the last weeks of Valentinus's life a remarkable thing happened. Seeing that he was a man of learning, the jailer asked whether his daughter, Julia, might be brought to Valentinus for lessons. She had been blind since birth. Julia was a pretty young girl with a quick mind. Valentinus read stories of Rome's history to her. He described the world of nature to her. He taught her arithmetic and told her about God. She saw the world through his eyes, trusted his wisdom. and found comfort in his quiet strength.

"Valentinus, does God really hear our prayers?" Julia asked one day.

"Yes, my child, He hears each one."

"Do you know what I pray for every morning and every night? I pray that I might see. I want so much to see everything you've told me about!"

"God does what is best for us if we will only believe in Him," Valentinus said.



"Oh, Valentinus, I do believe! I do!" She knelt and grasped his hand.

They sat quietly together, each praying. Suddenly there was a brilliant light in the prison cell. Radiant, Julia screamed, "Valentinus, I can see! I can see!"

"Praise be to God!" Valentinus exclaimed, and he knelt in prayer.



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On the eve of his death Valentinus wrote a last note to Julia, urging her to stay close to God. He signed it, "From your Valentine." His sentence was carried out the next day, February 14, 270 A.D., near a gate that was later named Porta Valentini in his memory. He was buried at what is now the Church of Praxedes in Rome. It is said that Julia planted a pink-blossomed almond tree near his grave. Today, the almond tree remains a symbol of abiding love and friendship. On each February 14, Saint Valentine's Day, messages of affection, love, and devotion are exchanged around the world."





Bike Safe Macedon Ranges requested the signage and we are very grateful to the Shire and its officers for erecting these signs. All road users have a responsibility to not only obey the road rules but courtesy and respect for each other goes a long way to making our roads safer. Sharing the roads is a two way street. We as cyclists are vulnerable road users and ask motorists to Pass us with Care as if we are a motor vehicle, giving us at least one metre in slow moving traffic and a minimum of 1.5 metres at higher speeds. Motorists need cyclists to be clearly visible on the roads. Cyclists wearing black and dark colours are much harder to see against black bitumen and against the shadows from trees along the road. Please consider for your own safety and that of all road users that you are clearly visible day and night. Flashing lights make a big difference in the day time as well as lighting you up at night.





lambs that I bought in January 2014 being returned to Kyneton Ewe sale and were amongst the top pens sold and I am very proud of that. For a number of reasons I did not buy any sheep to replace them one of which was the lack of feed at the present time and it is too soon to expect any great change even after the rain we have had recently. The cattle continue to thrive but I am feeding a round bale of hav as necessary to help maintain their condition until the situation hopefully improves.

The garden welcomed the recent rain and we have planted some more flower seedlings for Autumn colour and we still have some summer blooms giving a display in our garden. We also have planted more lettuce seedlings to replace those that have run to seed.

Our vegie plot has provided lettuce, silver beet, beetroot, and we picked our first two tomatoes the other day. The only problem we have had is with carrot seeds which after three tries have failed to strike, each with a new packet of seed. Help Vanessa!

Second XI Batting - Jordan Ladzik (165 runs @ 41.25, highest score - 65 not out)


Second XI Bowling - Patrick O'Meara (11 wickets @ 10.09, best bowling - 3/14)

JANICE STANTON RETIRES

Lancefield Primary School lost a big part of its history recently when much loved and admired teacher Janice Stanton retired after 35 years of service. In fact Lancefield itself lost a part of its history considering how many of our children have been entrusted in her care over the years.

Janice graduated from Coburg Teachers College in 1973 and scored her first teaching job at Epping Primary, after moving through a few schools she found herself at Lancefield Primary School in 1990 – and she never left!

As Janice reflects on her career she says "Lancefield Primary was a different place then to what it is now. The current atrium, library, multi-purpose room & toilet block were not there. There wasn't the unit planning or cohesiveness there is now back then, as a teacher you ran your own show." In her first year she was the Junior Unit Co-ordinator and has seen student numbers get as high as 225 at one stage. She had no idea how many children she had taught over the years until former principal Stephen Van Gils informed her at her retirement dinner that in fact she had taught 605 local children in her time. Now that's local influence!

It was no wonder students, parents, friends and colleagues were lining up in tears to give her a hug goodbye on the last day of school with her proud parents Ernie & Barb watching on given the two mottos that she always taught by. "I've always kept in mind two things, firstly that it is my mood that makes the day, and secondly, not everyone comes from the perfect home so be aware that you might be the only joy in that child's day, so make it special".

Along with her husband Chuck she is hoping to spend more time with her family and grandchildren and visit her daughter who lives in London and see Europe. Janice won't be idle in her retirement for long though. She has a great interest in dyslexia and other learning disabilities and would like to do some consultancy work in schools as well as helping graduate teachers.

When asked what she will miss most about teaching she said, "I'll miss the people. I'm not a member of a church, a sports group or a singing group. This is my tribe and that's why I don't think I'll be gone for good".

The American philophoser Jacques Barzun said about teachers, "In teaching you cannot see the fruit of a day's work. It is invisible and remains so, maybe for twenty years." That has proven to be the case because in the room across the hall from Janice sits middle school teacher Brendan Chapman, the same Brendan Chapman who as a grade one schoolboy sat before Janice Stanton all those years ago, just one of those lucky 605 children.



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
