

SKATE PARK MIGHT FINALLY BE BUILT



It has been 19 years, but it looks like the Lancefield Skate Park might finally be built. It has been a very long road of multiple committees, fundraising, car washes, different locations and many community meetings, petitions and discussions.

However, this last year has led to the approval of a location and a design. Our town specific design for the skate park supports BMX, skateboards, scooters and even roller skates. The motifs and landscaping will be thematically linked to the Lancefield Archaeological Swamp. This will be a place for the whole community to use.

The Macedon Ranges Shire Council have pledged \$130 000 of the annual budget to the project. The Skate BMX Committee will now be busy applying for grants to raise the remaining \$120 000 for stage one (\$250 000 total) and the an additional \$60 000 for stage 2.

We are asking for anyone with ideas or ways to help us reach our final goal to contact the Lancefield Neighborhood House on 54 291 214.

Thanks to all the people over the past 19 years who have helped bring this project to this point.

LANCEFIELD FIRE BRIGADE MORE STATISTICS

I will continue this month with the rest of the house fire statistics started last issue. I would point out that these fires may not have totally destroyed the houses but will certainly needed to involve fire brigades as well as causing major damage and inconvenience to the occupants. It is a fairly regular item on the evening news at night so please take care that it does not happen to you. Back to the statistics and the first one is by far the most common, leaving cooking utensils unattended nearly 600, washers and dryers not serviced 46, computers overheating 11, incorrect and careless use of heaters 237 again a major cause. Overloading of power points 19, other un-attended appliances 38.

Facts - Grease on tea towels has been known to ignite inside a clothes dryer also hairdryers have been known to fall off a sink, turn on, heat up and cause a fire.



CHAUNCEY STREET LANCEFIELD

CONNECTING THE DOTS BETWEEN PHILIP LAMOTHE SNELL CHAUNCY AND WILLIAM THE CONQUEROR

What a discovery for the residents of Chauncey Street Lancefield! Philip Lamothe Snell Chauncy (1816-1880), after whom the street was named, was, as he wrote in 1878, descended 'in a direct line from Chauncy de Chauncy, who rode by the side of William the Conqueror, as may be seen by reference to Burke's Landed Gentry'. Note, however, that his name is spelt 'Chauncy' not 'Chauncey'. So why was our street named after him?

When the editor of the Lancefield Mercury suggested I write an article on Chauncey, I was keen to find out what I could about him. Philip Chauncey and Alex Black, I learned from the Historical Society's publication Lancefield History Trail: Our Early Beginning An Historic Look at the Making of a Town surveyed the township in 1854. But nothing else appeared to be known about him. Let me elaborate here on what I have found so far.

Philip Lamothe Snell Chauncy was a sketcher, amateur photographer, modeller and surveyor. He was the only son and third child of William Snell Chauncy (1781-1845) of Wickfield, Berkshire, and Rose Theresa Lamothe (1774-1818) daughter of the French surgeon Dr Dominique Pierre Lamothe. Chauncy was born in Datchett, Buckinghamshire on 21 June 1816. When he was a little more than two years old his mother died. His father remarried, subsequently having five more children.

Under the patronage of his step-uncle, the aurist, Sir John Curtis, and because of his indifferent health, he trained as a



surveyor in London. At the age of 23 and again because of his health, he chose to emigrate to Australia to join two of his sisters. As a single man, he departed London on the Dumfries in June 1839 and arrived at Glenelg, South Australia in October 1839.

After his arrival in
Adelaide he worked as
a labourer – this brief
experience he came to believe,

held him in good stead to work in Australia. In 1840 he married Miss Charlotte Kemmis, in Adelaide and in March 1841 the family moved to Fremantle, Western Australia where he was appointed Assistant-Surveyor. In Western Australia he gained 'important experience amongst the natives, in whom he took much interest, learning to speak several dialects'. In February 1847, he was 'plunged' into his first grief by the death of his much loved wife who was the daughter of an Irish clergyman of the Church of England. To cope with his grief he took twelve months leave from his position in Western Australia and visited Melbourne and Sydney.

When he returned to Perth in 1848 he met and married Miss Susan Mitchell, the daughter of the Reverend William Mitchell, another Church of England clergyman. In April 1853, after eleven years in Western Australia, he resigned his appointment as Assistant-Surveyor and sailed in the barque Alibi for the goldfields in the Colony of Victoria. The family landed on his 37th birthday, 21 June 1853. On reaching Hobson's Bay, his brother William, who was chief engineer of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company, met them and invited them to stav at their home until they could find a place to live in. Chauncy was soon appointed by Captain (later Sir) Andrew Clarke to be District Surveyor at McIvor (Heathcote) and the growing family moved there. He surveyed the Heathcote township (including the cemetery where he buried one of his sons) and selected and surveyed Echuca. In 1867 Chauncy requested, and was granted. furlough (what we would now call long service leave) on full pay. He left Heathcote and the family resided in Melbourne for 12 months. Sadly, Chauncy's wife Susie died at Argyle Cottage, Jolimont on 30 September 1867, aged 39 years.

After residing at Heathcote, Chauncy was subsequently and successively transferred to Dunnolly, Castlemaine, Camperdown and Ararat. However, in Ararat Chauncy had to deal with controversy in his role. The Church of England Messenger recalled that:

From this last-named place [Ararat] he was removed (without inquiry), at the instance of Mr Graham Berry (the then Treasurer), in consequence of some complaints made against him by reason of his interfering with what he (Mr Chauncy) regarded as dummy selections. Mr Grant, however (then Minister of Lands), not only appointed Mr Chauncy to a more important district – Ballaarat – but duly compensated him for the loss and inconvenience he had sustained. Mr Chauncy remained in charge of the Ballaarat district until the dismissal, on 'Black Wednesday' (8th January 1878) of the Civil servants. He was finally retired on a pension.

Philip Chauncy was a passionate man with diverse interests. He felt deeply for the Australian Aborigines. Throughout his explorations and surveying in Victoria, he filled notebooks containing the names of rivers, lakes, mountains, valleys and towns in Victoria with native names and meanings. The notes were published in R B Smyth's Aborigines of Victoria, a magnificent publication in two large volumes (MS8129) held in the State Library of Victoria. As noted, he also learned several Aboriginal dialects.

In his memoirs, written in 1878, he expressed his deep love for his first wife, Charlotte and his second wife, Susan. He was the proud and loving father of nine children, eight of whom survived to adulthood. His son, Auschar Philip Chauncy (1855-1890) also became a surveyor in Victoria. Philip Chauncy wrote The Memoirs of Mrs Poole and Mrs Chauncy (his wife) for a family audience. Mrs Poole was his sister. The memoirs were published in Ballarat in 1873.

Most of Chauncy's papers are held in the State Library of Victoria (MS8129, MS9287, MS8129 and MS9227).

They were donated by a descendant, Christobel Chauncy, in the 1980s. Examples of his survey plans survive in the records of the Crown Lands and Survey Department, Melbourne. Correspondence between Chauncy and the Lands Department, as well as Surveyors' Field Books (VPRS 16685) are held at the Public Record Office, Victoria. Some papers are also held in the State Library of Western Australia.


Despite the fact that Chauncy's name was clearly spelt without an 'e' while he worked for the Lands Department in Victoria (1853-78), he acquired the additional letter to his name when Chauncey Street was named to honour his work, presumably after 1854.

Chauncy was a devout Christian and was a member of the Ballarat Church of England. At the age of 64 and after a brief illness, surrounded by four of his children, he died at his home on 9 April 1880.

There is much more to be discovered about this fascinating man's life and might be the subject of a later article. In the meantime, it would be interesting to know how many streets in regional Victoria can claim a connection to William the Conqueror!



A TALE OF TWO CITIES SODOM & JERUSALEM

SODOM. (Jerusalem, next month). Abram (Abraham), now very prosperous, and his nephew, Lot and their families had settled in Canaan and their numbers had so increased the land was unable to support the two family groups. Abram graciously asked Lot to choose where he preferred to go -Lot chose the plain of Jordan "which was well-watered and like the garden of the Lord".

Lot pitched his tents near the city of Sodom. "Now the men of Sodom were wicked and sinning greatly against the Lord." (Genesis 13:13.) Homosexuality was a characteristic of the men of Sodom, and the people of the Jordan plain because of their vile and corrupt life-styles had become detestable in God's eyes, His judgement fell upon them, despite His long-suffering and mercy over a very long period, yet they still did not repent of their despicable ways. Judgement came in the form of an earthquake which destroyed the entire region, only Lot and two

daughters escaping, gone was the "garden of the Lord" leaving only the desolate area around the Dead Sea. Did Lot make a right choice? His life ended in ignominy - his two daughters, fearing the end of the family line, after getting him drunk, committed incest with him. Their two sons, Moab and Ben-Ammi - the father of the Ammonites - growing down the years became bitter enemies of the Israelites. (Genesis 19). God's judgement came down on Sodom and the region for their sinful, wilful ways even though, "the Lord is gracious and compassionate, slow to anger and rich in love."



Over a period of about three weeks this index rose from a minus reading to a positive reading and back to a minus one. Quite scary really. Snow fell in some areas locally but not in Lancefield.

Not a great deal to report from the farming front. The ewes should start to lamb at the end of this month and as we have not found a buyer that will keep me occupied for a while. The cattle here appear to have remembered what a bale of hay and a couple of toots from the tractor meant and headed for the hay feeder poste haste. This will help me yard them when the time comes. Markets continue to be strong although lambs have eased a little.

The garden has some flowers in it with flowers like camellias also bulbs are showing up as well as self sown cottage plants. As winter is now half over we should have more to report next month


CHILDREN'S PICTURE BOOKS


Grandma's House by Alice Melvin RRP \$29.99





CHANGE TO WATER SUPPLY

Bore water has been reintroduced to Lancefield water supply this month.

Western Water General Manager of Customer and Community Relations Graham Holt said the Lancefield supply had been 100% surface water since March, using water made available through the Romsey-Lancefield pipeline connection to Western Water's broader supply network. "However, poor inflows in 2015 have seen the surface water levels drop in local reservoirs. Using some bore water in the Lancefield supply system will preserve local surface water until the reservoir levels recover."

Mr Holt said the amount of bore water in Lancefield's supply will be around a third of the overall supply.

With low proportions of bore water in the supply, it is unlikely that customers will notice any changes to the taste or odour of their water, Mr Holt said.

Low levels of fluoride, from water in storage reservoirs, may be found in town supplies until reservoir levels recover. All water supplied by Western Water is safe to drink and is fully compliant with the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines. If you have any concerns about your water supply, please contact 1300 650 425.




