



WEATHER COMMENT

Well, winter is certainly with us with a big change in weather systems since my last article. Our records here show 16 recordings and 81mm of rain over this period. Towards the end of June there were 9 consecutive rainfall measurements and while they were not large falls this situation has not been usual for some time. As I travelled the paddocks this morning I was surprised to see that many of the gutters and gullies were still not running so most of the rain has soaked in and will replenish the subsoil moisture for later in the season. The steers have settled in well and are enjoying their weekly round bale of hay. The ewe weaners are continuing to thrive but it appears that we have a problem with the older ewes as we have not had any more lambs and this needs to be investigated to find the reason.

It seems that we should have a good season once the temperature starts to rise and this should be sometime next month as the days get longer. The weather has not been very conducive for gardening but most of our roses are now pruned and we are starting to see early varieties of daffodils and jonquils putting up some flowers as well we spotted a snowdrop yesterday ao it is all starting to happen. 

LANCEFIELD FIRE BRIGADE

IMPORTANT REMINDER!

I will start with an important message that, although it has been written about before it has become necessary to remind our residents of the correct procedure for the reporting of any situations that require the attendance of the Brigade. The first thing to do is call OOO and only OOO and when prompted ask for FIRE BRIGADE.

You will then be asked for the exact location of the particular incident that you are reporting. It is very important to be very precise with your information. The names and if applicable street number or rural road number will be of great assistance to the operator taking your call who has to locate the incident on a computer screen and then call out the appropriate Brigade.

You will also be asked the names of the nearest cross street or road as a further aid to the location of the incident be it fire or road accident or any other cause of concern. If you are in an unfamiliar area a moment or two to get the details correct can be of assistance. This reminder was brought to our attention by a call out to a local incident that proved difficult to locate. PLEASE TAKE NOTE.

A further reminder to call only 000 and not any brigade member as this can only lead to delays in notifying the Brigade. Burn offs should be notified to 1800 668 511 and this can prevent the brigade from being turned out for a false



alarm. THANK YOU.


Families will also be taken on a tour to see the family

Bike Safe Macedon Ranges winter visibility campaign asks cyclists to Light Up the Road. The campaign is sponsored by a Gisborne & District Community Bank community grant and Macedon Ranges Signs. It was created in response to requests from both cyclists and motorists, following feedback from an on line safety survey Bike Safe recently conducted.

Cyclists can increase their visibility by wearing clothing that stands out against the road during the day and by wearing reflective clothing at night.

Front white light and rear red light clearly visible for at least 200 metres are legally required at night and in poor visibility conditions: lights in these conditions significantly

increase cyclists' safety.

Bike Safe also encourages cyclists to use a rear red flashing light day and night to increase their visibility on the road.

Motorists should expect to see cyclists on any road in our region, they could be in the next roundabout, at the next intersection and around the next bend.

Look for cyclists and see them, their safety depends upon motorists being alert to their presence.



VANESSA'S GARDEN

GROW YOUR OWN STAPLES - POTATOES

In the past, growing your own potatoes was the preserve of those lucky enough to have a big vegetable plot but there are a couple of proven methods of growing them in containers that you might like to try.

Before anyone says it – I know it's far too early to plant potatoes – but it's not too early to prepare the ground or get your container ready.

I love growing potatoes – gotta love a hefty baked potato in winter and then the first small, fresh golden salad ones from the early harvest. And half the fun is the lucky dip treasure hunt of carefully digging around to find the buried gold (or blue, red and even purple....).

You can order tubers now but personally I feel that where we are, it's still a wee bit early and you'll need to store them somewhere dry and dark until early spring. Around here of course we can get frosts until Cup Day but the trouble with waiting until then to plant potato tubers is that it can start to get hot quite quickly, meaning your young plants are starved of that early chance to get firmly rooted before the dry sets in.

It's Hobson's choice really – plant early and risk frost, or wait and risk seeing them struggle. I tend to plant in October and have plenty of cover available in case of a late frost – fleece is effective and widely available but needs to be carefully placed and secured as it floats away on the merest breath of wind and tears quite easily.

IN THE VEGGIE PATCH

 Don't work your soil when it's very wet as that will just compact it but you can fork in a light dressing of compost or well-aged cow manure. If working a wide bed use a plank to stand on as that will help spread your weight and minimise compaction.

· Use a dibber to plant tubers if you have one — it's not really worth buying one if you don't because you can use a small trowel just as well. My dibber is a family heirloom, well over 80 years old but it's just a pointed stake about an inch thick and foot long with a small handle at the other end. It does a great job of making a potato sized hole about 4-6 inches deep (I suppose that's about 10cm in new money). Leave a couple of feet (about 30cm) between tubers and about the same or a little more between rows.

· Sprinkle with some good all-round fertiliser such as

blood and bone; give 'em a drink and keep an eye on them. If the soil looks like it is drying out (for instance if we do get that El Nino) then you'll need to keep them moist. But not wet as that will lead to rot.

Generally aim to plant around late September/early
 October but remember the need for protection unless your vegetable garden is very well sheltered indeed

CONTAINER GROWING

You can get purpose made 'potato bags' or sacks but it is just as easy to make your own. One method is to stake some chicken wire in a cylinder about 3 feet/1 metre in diameter; or use a black plastic garbage bin (you'll need to pierce it for drainage) or similar. Fill the bottom with good compost or a soil/compost mix, place 4 tubers on the soil, just cover with more soil/compost and top that up with straw, manure and a sprinkle of fertiliser.

Just as soon as the growing tips are about 2 cm above the cover, add more straw/manure/compost so that just the leaf tips show and repeat until harvest or your container is full, whichever comes first.

You'll need to make sure the container doesn't dry out but, again, aim for moist rather than wet.

HARVEST

Once the plant has flowered, look for the first signs of leaf yellowing and that's the time to get your new potatoes. If you want to maximise your crop don't dig the plant up at this stage. Instead root around very gently for the baby new potatoes which should be fairly near the surface, and leave the deeper ones to mature. Once the plant looks like it is really dying off stop watering and harvest the larger potatoes once the plant has completely died.

Harvest a wire container by dismantling it (reuse the compost and straw as mulch). A bin will need to be gently dug out or tipped on its side.

You may leave the main crop harvest in the ground for 10 days or so to help the skins thicken, which helps them store better. Don't leave it too long or grubs will have a feast instead of you. Once dug up store your crop in potato sacks, somewhere ventilated (so they don't sweat) and out of direct sunlight.

FREE SERVIC SAFER

If you live alone, are concerned about your personal safety or were to be involved in a personal emergency the Macedon Ranges Community Register may be able to help.

The Community Register is a free service provided by Macedon Ranges Shire Council and local police, and is available to older people, those with a disability or who are frail. It is of particular value to those who may have little opportunity to get out in the community as it offers a weekly or fortnightly phone call by a trained volunteer.

Members receive an identification card that fits into their wallet or purse and are encouraged to carry this with them when they leave home. This will help emergency services locate next of kin if the member is involved in a personal emergency.



Being a member of the Community Register does not guarantee evacuation in an emergency-members need to formulate their own emergency plans with family, neighbours and friends. However the register can assist by providing resources to members such as the CFA Fire Ready Kit.

Throughout the year, the Community Register circulates a newsletter to members. This provides information about staying safe and comfortable at home. The CFA also provides replacement smoke detector batteries free of charge to the Community Register for distribution to members on an annual basis.







ENROLTO VOTE SAYS MEMBER FOR MACEDON

According to a recent Australian Survey on Political Engagement, Australians believe in the principles of our democratic system, but they are mostly not engaged in politics. Thankfully this disengagement was not evident at the recent Q & A style debate at the Gisborne U3A. I was fortunate to be part of the panel that discussed "Is the present method of voting for the Australian Senate the best, or even the only way to ensure a fair democratic outcome for the whole community?" It was a lively and entertaining event, with over 100 people attending. Questions were put from the audience about the complexity of the Senate ballot paper, where preferences go, how to determine who the candidates are, the general political process and was compulsory voting the best way forward for democracy?.

What did become evident at the forum, and this has been borne out by surveys, is while we hold the ideals of the democratic political process in high regard, we have a healthy degree of scepticism for politicians and the major parties!

The U3A group is obviously politically aware but what is of concern is the lack of interest in the political process by young voters. The oldest age group of voting age ie 65+ is about twice as politically active as the youngest age group, those 18-24. While there are pockets of political activism among this age group, they are strongly values-driven and their attachment is to issues rather than traditional political organizations. Young Australians are failing to enrol to vote. This is not a new problem, but the gap appears to have widened in recent elections and we're



seeing that the commitment to vote amongst younger people is continuing to erode. In an effort to boost young enrolment the VEC is targeting young voters with a series of candidate forums and an online forum for first time voters to prioritise questions and share their views using social media, Facebook and Twitter.

WORKING OUR WAY TO HEAVEN
