I am sitting in the study writing this article and wondering how to word it. The sky outside is grey but does not appear to promise much if any rain. I would point out that I have written along these lines before and been proved wrong, however I am not that confident this time. The diary is open at the rainfall figures and since writing last month we have recorded only 25-5 mm which is not a figure to give confidence for the months to come. The countryside is showing signs of the effects of the lack of our usual Spring rains with the grass drying off and turning brown. Even if we get rain it will not be of any great benefit to pastures but would help perennials like lucerne or summer fodder crops sown to help bring animals to improved weight and marketability.

I have just been reminded to mention Toby so this a good moment to do that. The next job with the sheep is to put them through the dip as we have for some reason this year had a severe infestation of lice and this one of the most effective ways of controlling this problem, so Toby, along with all our other sheep will be going for a swim in another week or two. This process ensures that all the sheep are completely treated. While this is not a procedure that we now do every year with the production of backline treatments it was many years ago

required by law to keep lice under control. A very labour intensive activity. Our cattle continue to improve but the feed situation needs to be assessed regularly and the need for hay feeding to begin .We hope to cut our hay next week and as with other things production will be down

Our garden is still very colourful with irises, self sown shirley poppies and love-in—the-mist doing really well.


Many of the perennials are also flowering, pride of place goes to pink paeony which has blossomed for the first time. Plenty of tidying up to do with tops of the earlier bulbs dying off now And how could one not comment on the roses, not only our garden but around the town too. The vegie plot is coming along and we have finally planted two tomatoes so hopefully no more frosts Beans and carrots are planted and are just showing through the soil. The news from the garden is considerably better than that from the farm. We need something to help us along.

COMPUTER SCAMMERS AT IT AGAIN

I have recently had a phone call from a local concerned that he had had multiple phone calls from a person with an Indian accent trying to get access to his computer. These persons often claim to be from Microsoft and can sound quite convincing.

The day following this call I had reason to call a person in Romsey who informed me that I was very lucky as she had been about to blow a whistle in the phone when I called. She also had been the victim of multiple calls of this nature and was ready to get a bit of her own back. It seems from these calls that our area is again being targeted.

So how so you deal with these types of problems especially if your computer is affected? The Australian Federal Government in association with the State and Territory Governments has just launched "The Australian Cybercrime Online Reporting Network" which has the acronym "A.C.O.R.N"

SO WHAT IS CYBERCRIME?

- Crimes directed at computers or other device (such as hacking), and
- Crimes where computers or other devices are integral to the offence such as online scams and fraud

In short A.C.O.R.N will:

- · Make it easier for the public to report cybercrime
- · Allow them to access the information they need to protect themselves online
- Make it easier for agencies to handle reports of cybercrime, and
- Provide a clearer picture of the cybercrime affecting Australians



To access this service go to www.acorn.gov.au it will take you about 15 minutes to fill out the report online. Once a report has been submitted ACORN will determine whether it should be referred to an agency for consideration and possible investigation.

BATTERY RECYCLING

While we are on the subject of batteries - did you know they are the most common form of household hazardous waste? In landfill, the chemicals inside batteries can leach from

their casings and pollute land and water with heavy metals that are toxic to life. Most of them contain cadmium, lead, mercury, copper, zinc, manganese, lithium, or potassium, which are all hazardous to the environment and can have very negative effects on your health.

If placed in your household rubbish one battery can contaminate the contents of an entire wheelie bin.

Household batteries can be dropped off at The Town House for recycling.

Large and car batteries can be dropped off at Lancefield




VANESSA'S GARDEN

THIS TIME OF YEAR IT'S REALLY IMPORTANT TO

This time of year it's really important to take good care of any plants in tubs or pots, which can very quickly dry out. How will you know? Well if you find that water poured into the top of the pot seems to appear straight out of the bottom it's likely that your pot has dried out. This can happen before the plant shows much sign of stress but although the plant may still look healthy, it is quietly suffering. What's happening is that the root ball is drying out, creating gaps inside the pot and allowing the water to run off before it does the plant any good. However you can generally fix the problem with slow trickle watering provided the plant isn't visibly dying. This will help the root ball swell again.

Feeding is also important this time of year and an effective way to manage this is to spray the leaves. This is called foliar feeding. A solution of seaweed concentrate (readily available in nurseries) sprayed on once a month will do the job very well. For best results spray in the early morning or in the evening, as spraying in full sun could scorch the leaves and also the liquid may evaporate too quickly to be of full benefit to the plant. Make sure you dilute the concentrate according to the instructions on the packet, to avoid damaging particularly sensitive plants. Citrus trees love this form of feeding, as do roses, camellias, hydrangeas and azaleas. They will produce healthier looking leaves and stronger flowers, giving you a longer-lasting display of colour.

If you're stuck for Christmas gift ideas, remember plants can make beautiful, useful and enduring gifts. Plants which look good for months on end, don't grow too



big and are easily planted in most gardens include:


Camellias. Won't be in flower at Christmas but generally tolerate a wide range of soils, can handle a bit of shade and don't take up much room. An added bonus is that they flower in late winter when much of the rest of the garden is asleep.

Azaleas. Rarely more than half to a metre tall and can be popped in just about anywhere including in full sun.

Daphnes. I like these for their fragrance, which, with little maintenance on your part, will fill the garden during winter.

These three will also grow happily in tubs with a daily water during the hot months, so when you're at the nursery choosing a plant, why not buy an attractive pot to round off your gift?







SUSTAINABILITY/ENVIRONMENTAL GRANTS

Our Sustainability team have been rewarded for all of their hard work with a \$46 000 grant to establish a Flora and Fauna Corridor to our beautiful wetland area. The purpose of this project is to establish a corridor (walking pathway) from the school to the existing wetlands to restore and protect the existing waterway and re-establish indigenous flora. Strategic boardwalk placement will prevent high traffic areas from degrading the fragile habitat. Installation of a dry creek bed, alongside a pathway, complemented by indigenous plant species will direct and filter the natural flow of water. The introduction of native grasses and vegetation will create extended habitats for local fauna and further assist in contributing to the Lancefield catchment for Deep Creek, the longest and major tributary of the Maribyrnong River system. This project is planned to increase the enjoyment of the under-utilised area between the school and the wetland by the local community and also encourage ongoing learning opportunities for students. We are also proud recipients of \$2000 Western Water Frances Environmental Grant which will be used to redirect storm water to the wetlands along with an Energy Efficiency grant of \$10,000. 

SHOU MEI SUMARAC

Shou Mei was born in a remote mountain village in the north of Taiwan.

Whilst studying English language in Taichung, by chance she walked by a gallery where an artist was working in the window. Mesmerized by his work she used to gaze at him until one day they finally exchanged smiles. Shou Mei, dreaming she could paint like him walked by for the next few months until she plucked up the courage to step inside the gallery. During this first conversation they realised that they came from a very similar poor village background. On subsequent meetings, realising Shou Mei could speak a little English, they agreed that she would translate for his American and British customers that frequented his gallery in exchange for painting lessons. He would allow her to sit next to him and he would instruct her in his techniques. After six months he gave her a blank canvas and urged her to begin painting. She asked if could she copy one of his paintings, her favourite being a autumn forest scene. This was to become her first work.

Too embarrassed to be seen, she painted in the back room and after six attempts both where satisfied with her first painting (this painting will be exhibited). The artist that mentored Shou Mei for two years is non-other than Wong Shong Kwan who later became the most famous and celebrated artist in Taiwan. All his paintings are



now collectors items. Shou Mei will have two of his original paintings on display at Wu Lin Retreat for her inaugural exhibition

Shou Mei came to Australia in 1976

and continued to paint on and off in her spare time. Her favourite subjects are Australian rural scenery and classical Chinese style. In this exhibition "IMAGES FROM TWO WORLDS" she will display a blend of Australian/European & Chinese works dating from as far back as 1975 to the present.

A CUPPA FOR YOUR THOUGHTS

It's 'T' time for Kyneton District Health, which is rolling out an innovative Tea for Ten community engagement project across the Shire. KDH is keen to know what the local community thinks, knows about and wants from its health services.

At morning teas hosted at tables in townships across the Macedon Ranges, KDH is inviting groups of ten people to think, talk and tell their thoughts on three key questions about KDH. "Whatever we hear, we will feed it back to our community so we are all clearer on what people think, know and want. We see this open communication as an important part of KDH building

It's now seeking others to get involved and host a kitchen tea in towns across the Macedon Ranges Shire. The two pilot


groups have shown that the information gathering is incredibly valuable.







HIGH STREET, LANCEFIELD: PROPOSED DRAINAGE UPGRADES



To alleviate the flooding that occurs in High Street, Lancefield during heavy downpour, Macedon Ranges Shire Council is proposing to undertake works to remove the existing culverts/drainage pipes under driveways.

Council intends to alter the road level within the parking bays and use the existing bluestone rocks as new kerb and channel. This will allow the water to freely flow to existing drainage infrastructure at the corner of High Street and The Crescent.

The works are proposed on the southern side of High street between Raglan Street and The Crescent. Council aims to start the works in February/March 2015, and they are expected to take four weeks.

Affected property owners have been notified of the proposed works, and will receive further notification one week prior to commencement of works.

In this festive Russian folktale, Babushka travels to Bethlehem to meet a very special baby. Along the way, she gives away all of her gifts, arriving at the stable empty-handed. There she learns the most important lesson of all - the more you give away in love, the more you receive.



Count my Christmas Kisses by Ruthie May RRP \$19.99 Reviewed by Red Door Books





CLEAN ENERGY PETITION

The Macedon Ranges Clean Energy Petition, launched at the climate march last month, is about to take to the streets. The petition has the strong support of the sustainability groups across the shire. It asks the council to produce a road map to be carbon neutral by 2020. "If we are to avoid the dire consequences of runaway climate change we need to quickly move our energy use to renewables", said Rob Bakes local



petition coordinator. "Our initial investigations strongly indicate that a solar powered council could be carbon neutral by 2020, and then would reap the financial rewards from huge savings in electricity costs".

If the council installs enough solar panels on each of their buildings to generate the energy requirements for daytime use, the installation will pay for itself in three to five years.

After that period the electricity is free.

These savings can then be used to buy green energy for night time use (4.5cents extra per kw.) Street lighting, for instance, is estimated to be at least twenty -five percent of the council's energy use.

This would stop carbon pollution in its tracks from the shire's electricity use, and make it carbon neutral by 2020.

The savings in electricity could then be used to tackle other areas of carbon pollution where the shire is being asked by its constituents to clearly demonstrate commitment and leadership.

Other initiatives could include the formation of a Macedon Ranges Energy Foundation which would finance and drive the uptake of renewables into the wider community once it had achieved its aim of assisting the local council.

We urge everyone, for all you love and cherish, to support this important plebiscite. With broad apolitical support across our community, the Macedon Ranges could become a stand-out example of practical climate initiative. Global warming is a dangerous threat which needs to be addressed urgently.
