LANCEFIELD & ROMSEY COMMUNITY BANKS

A CENTURY OF REFLECTION ON THE FIRST WORLD WAR

More than 70 members of the Romsey and Lancefield community gathered at Romsey's Lone Pine on Monday in a solemn ceremony to mark the centenary of the first shot in the Great War.

Romsey-Lancefield RSL Sub-Branch member John Wyke – the oldest active serving member – unveiled a bronze plaque dedicated to the memory of the district citizens who marched off 100 years ago to serve their country in World War 1.

The plaque, and another to be unveiled in Lancefield on Armistice Day this November, were funded with a \$4500 grant from the Romsey and Lancefield Community Bank branches.

"The Bank is proud to be involved in this project to honor the memory of those who served in the Great War and the creation of a place where members of the Romsey and Lancefield communities can come and reflect," Bank senior manager Rod Browning said.

The Lone Pine site, on the corner of Main and Palmer Sts, includes a Reflection Chair provided by the Macedon Ranges Council and solar lighting from the Romsey Region Business & Tourist Association.

Romsey-Lancefield RSL Sub-Branch President John Lynch said the unveiling of the plaque was a day to involve the whole community in commemorating the sacrifices made by residents of the district in marching off to war.

"The ceremony gave us the opportunity to reflect on the sacrifices of local families whose sons didn't come home, and the impact on the families of those who did return," Mr Lynch said.

"There were wives who were left without husbands, fathers left without sons, children left without fathers.

"There were also the returned soldiers, who with their families were affected for the rest of their lives by the physical and mental scars of what they had suffered and seen





on the battlefield.

"This plaque and this site is a lasting memorial to all those who served in the war and to their families.

It gives us an opportunity to reflect upon a shared history and show our gratitude and respect to those who served in the Great War and to their descendants.

"Husbands and sons from Romsey, Lancefield, and towns and suburbs all around Australia answered their country's call to arms in 1914 and sailed off to fight in the war to end all wars on the far side of the globe.

"Many of them did not return, but are still remembered and acknowledged here a century later."

Mr Lynch said Romsey's Lone Pine was planted in 1971. The seedling was from a pine in the Ballarat Botanical Gardens, which grew from a seed brought back from the Gallipoli Peninsula in the 1960s.

The annual Winter Lunch was most enjoyable, everyone found the talk by Dr. Paul Carter entertaining as well as amusing.



Twice a month, on a Sunday morning, scenario training taken from the C.F.A. skills training manual will be on the agenda. Training of this type may also be held on a Thursday night.

be qualified as firefighters. At the end of September skills maintenance for structure qualified members will be available.

A Group Exercise will be held on October 11th and this will involve all the Brigades in the Romsey and District Fire Brigades Group. Details are still a work in progress.

During the month the Community Education team from District 2 attended the Lancefield Primary school. The children were able to look through the smoke house, which is another vital training aid. 


WHAT'S ON AT THE NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE - CHRISTMAS ALREADY!





WEATHER COMMENT

IT IS A VERY CONFUSING YEAR

It is a very confusing year as far as making some sense of the current weather outlook is concerned. As we would all be aware, rainfall has been limited. In our gauge we have only recorded 39mm for the month.

We have also had two very severe frosts at the start of last week with some surprising results. The capeweed looks as though it had been sprayed and this is something that I do not recall happening before.

Since last month there has been some water in the creek but still no run off into the farm dams and we are now looking for a good substantial fall of rain to make this happen. As far as the outlook is concerned an El Nino is still being mentioned but a positive report on " Landline "at lunch time today mentioned rain in western Queensland which may be the change in weather patterns we are looking for.

The grass in the paddock here at home is now showing some positive growth after a spell of two months, so it is now time to bring some cattle in to make some use of it. I do not expect to need to feed the ones I bring in but the remainder out on the farm will need to be fed for another month or so. My comment about the ewes not lambing was not accurate as we had a set of twins and a single

lamb not long after I wrote that but they are still slow.

The winter weather in early August took its toll with some of the usually hardy plants severely burnt by those two mighty frosts [not only the capeweed] e.g. Agapanthus nerines, Alstroemeria and pots safely placed in sheltered places also look quite sad . However Spring is almost upon us with bulbs and blossoms, camellias and wattles all helping to brighten the view.

Toby is now one year old and had the chance to meet some "proper" sheep that were put into our stock yard for an hour or two recently. He did go down to have a look but soon wandered off and showed no more interest. Of course like most pet lambs he does not think of himself as a sheep.

ANESSA'S GARDEN

I saw a whole heap of raised bed in the outside area of Cottage Plants on High recently, which they've cleverly filled with shavings and are using to stand their trees in (great way to stop them falling over by the way) and it reminded me that I wanted to put in some raised beds before Spring starts in earnest which surely, can't be long now?

Now I have a lot of space to play with but I also started thinking about how to successfully grow veggies in a raised bed when space is limited and you may not have the space to rotate crops or devote a whole bed to a single crop.

As so often with gardening, success comes down to careful planning and proper preparation.

A raised bed is an opportunity to give your plants the very best of planting conditions. You don't have to rely on what Nature has given you in the garden, you can fill your bed with good topsoil and a generous dose of nutrients.

Compost, the contents of the Hoover and a generous sprinkle of blood and bone will get your plants off to a really

Remember that raised beds are likely to dry out fairly quickly, although the compost and of course a covering of mulch once the soil has warmed up, will help to retain moisture. Nevertheless, a drip system is likely to save you time and effort if you have more than one bed - otherwise you'll just need a handy water source and a decent watering

As for what crops to grow, plan the best use of space in

your raised bed and resist the temptation to cram things in. It will help ensure you get high quality results to feed the whole family. For example if you were planting leeks, lay the plants out (in a row) around 5cm apart.

This is closer than you would plant them in the ground but we are working with limited space here and you deal with the crowding as they grow by harvesting every second leek as a young 'un and that way the others get to fill out and you get a longer harvest.

Also think about what you and your family like to eat and what's expensive to buy. There's no point in growing veggies no one really likes and there's also not much point in using your limited space for slow-growing and cheaper items such as onions.

Next, think about what grows well together and what competes. There are many good small books on companion planting (Red Door may have some and can certainly order for you). For example, leeks like growing near brassicas such as tatsoi but don't like peas.

Finally, think in three dimensions and make the most of your space by growing one or two taller plants such as cut-and-come again rainbow chard. Remember to put your taller plants at the 'back' of the raised bed, i.e. furthest from the sun, otherwise they will shade your other plants and turn them spindly as they compete for precious sunlight.

To make the best use of space, plant quick growing lettuce and radishes in gaps where you've harvested. Roll on Spring!







Past grant recipients have included Lancefield Park Recreation Reserve in 2013 and Lancefield Community Garden in 2012.


Sammy grants, named for Western Water's slithering mascot Sammy Snake, are aimed at garden projects with education and health benefits for students or the community.







own comfortable pace, this is not a competition.


The other four towns will be holding the same course concurrently and the milestone 5km and 10km runs will be held as one group to share the joy of such a great achievement.
