

The Spring Show is nearly here... Start Cooking

The Spring Show is nearly here. Friday 13th and Saturday 14th September. We are busy planning and arranging the ever wonderful weekend and we hope you are enjoying preparing your goodies for the show. The schedule is being delivered to local businesses shortly so keep your eyes peeled.

This month, our resident chef and much loved CWA member Tracy Kemp has shared with us her Sponge recipe. We hope that you have great success with it – make sure you read through the recipe first for Tracy's "secret" tips on how to achieve a light fluffy sponge.

Ingredients:

5 eggs, 3/4 cup caster sugar, 1 cup cornflour, Heaped teaspoon plain flour, 1/2 teaspoon bi carb soda.

Preparation:

Oven to 180°C. Grease 2x 8 inch cake pans. Make sure bowl and beaters are squeaky clean and free from any grease.

Method:

Sift the cornflour, plain flour and bi carb soda 3 times.

Separate eggs (use room temperature eggs). Beat whites till fluffy and gradually add sugar, beat until thick and light.

Add egg yolks 1 at a time, beat until fluffy again.

Cut in sifted ingredients with a metal spoon (this keeps more air in the sponge).

Mix only until dry ingredients just combined.

Divide between the 2 pans (for a prize winning sponge, weigh tins and make sure mix is evenly spread between tins).

Drop tins onto bench from about 6 inches 3 or 4 times to remove air bubbles, smooth tops lightly and put into oven quickly (don't leave door open too long) Cook for 20 minutes.

Remove from oven and turn out onto cake rack covered with a tea towel, this stops rack marks on cake top.

Once cool turn over and leave to get cold.

Fill with cream and fruit and dust top with icing sugar to serve.

Good luck, we look forward to seeing many prize winning sponges at the Spring Show.

Western Water's Water Plan in place for 2013-18

Western Water's new five-year plan for capital works and pricing has come into effect after being approved by the Essential Services Commission. The Water Plan 2013-18 includes plans for a \$3.8 million pipeline linking Lancefield to Western Water's wider drinking water network, scheduled for construction in 2014.

"This pipeline will help ensure Lancefield has a secure water supply, with different water source options available," Western Water's Managing Director, Neil Brennan, says. "We will be visiting Lancefield over the next couple of months to talk to residents about this project, and get some feedback.'

Lancefield customers who would like to take part can email feedback@westernwater.com.au with any questions or suggestions. Under the new Water Plan, bills for an average customer will go up by less than one dollar a week for homeowners and around 28 cents a week for tenants this year. Tiered pricing for water usage will remain, which means higher water users pay more for their water. Price rises are spread out over the five years, rather than a large upfront increase, in line with feedback Western Water received from customers during the Water Plan consultation process. The new Water Plan 3 came into effect on 1 July 2013.



All of these books this month are shortlisted for the 2013 Children's Books Council of Australia awards.



Peggy by Anna Walker RRP \$24.99 Hardback. Review by Angus Webb

Peggy the chicken lives in a small house in a quiet street. A long gust of wind blows her to city. In the city she gets lost and wanders around trying to get home. Peggy sees lots of things she has never seen before until she spies sunflowers like the ones at her house. She follows the sunflowers to a train station and onto a train and then they get off the train and she loses sight of them and hears a noise overhead - THE PIGEONS! The pigeons took Peggy home.

Dad's note: Sometimes a review prompts many more questions than it answers. I think Angus really liked this book, but you might have to come in to have a look at it to clarify. I thought it was a great book kids' myself.

Then when they are ambushed by the notorious outlaw Ned Kelly, Lightning Jack leaps out of trouble and back to the wilderness. But then Sam can't resist a race and rides Lightning Jack against the ghost of

Phar Lap at breakneck speed...Sam's horse is a gallant horse, a midnight horse, the horse in every dream.

This is a wonderfully imaginative book with beautiful colourful illustrations. A definite must for the horsey child!



To get To Me by Eleanor Kerr RRP \$19.95 Review by Emma Stevens


This book has great illustrations and the right level of anticipation for travel-hungry 3-5 year olds.

When Edith met a cheeky young lyrebird on her garden path, she could not guess that he would one day be known as 'A Miracle of the Dandenongs'. Soon, James the lyrebird was singing and dancing for Edith, mimicking the birdsongs and other sounds that echoed through the bush. Word of their friendship spread and people travelled from near and far to film and record James. But with people came change.

This true story, retold by Jackie Kerin and beautifully illustrated by Peter Gouldthorpe, celebrates a remarkable friendship between a gardener and one of Australia's most extraordinary birds.



Award Winning Filmmaker to Feature at 3rd Heathcote Film Festival



While the fictional town of Toombaworth could be a stone's throw from Heathcote, the similarities between the two end there; in Toombaworth 'nothing changes and there's shit all to do' ... in Heathcote, the story could not be more different as the fledgling Film Festival, founded and run by a group of energetic and arts-savvy locals, illustrates.

The Festival, now in its third year, will feature a diverse range of Australian and International short films at the RSL Hall on Saturday 31st August. The film, which has already won two Swinburne Graduate Prizes, the Deluxe Award for Best Director and the Richard Franklin Award for Best Film, comes to Heathcote fresh from the Byron Bay International Film Festival where Lucy won Best Young Australian Filmmaker 2013 and its Hollywood premiere at the Women's Independent Film Festival where the film earned an Award of Merit.

As well as enjoy the diverse and entertaining range of short films for which the Festival is becoming known, guests at the cocktail gathering prior to the main evening screening will enjoy a selection of local wines and canapés from Heathcote Wine Hub @ Cellar & Store and The Willow Room, both located in Heathcote's High Street, while well-known Kyneton

foodstore Monsieur Pierre will cater for the dinner following the evening screenings.



Now is therefore a great time to clean up sheds

I hope you've been enjoying the cold weather and the chance to warm up by the fire and indulge in long slow-cooked casseroles and hot chocolate thick enough to stand your spoon up in (MAD gallery does a particularly good version).

The early morning view has been absolutely spectacular on misty, frosty mornings, driving down the hill into Lancefield. At first we are hemmed in by forest and there's just the hint of brightness ahead. As the valley opens out, there's one spot where the rising sun streams through a small group of trees growing on a tiny island in the middle of a dam. When conditions are right, water like glass, frost


and mist combine to turn this spot into a scene reminiscent of classic Japanese art.

Although mid-winter is officially well past, most gardens are still dormant in our cool climate. Now is therefore a great time to clean up sheds and surrounding storage in preparation for spring. Sheds tend to accumulate a fringe of 'things that might come in useful one day' but rarely do. So make a clean sweep and take everything you haven't used for a year to the tip. If you're anything like me, this will give you a marvellous sense of achievement for at least a couple of hours after you come back from

Planting for privacy

If you've been thinking about improving your garden privacy. plants make a great long lasting screen and this could be an ideal time to plant a screening hedge.

Many people opt for evergreens both for density and the speed at which they grow. And grow, and grow. Eventually they can get too tall and take up too much of the garden and your neighbours might find themselves in rather more shade than they'd bargained for. Native plants might be a better option and here are a couple of native plants you might like to consider.





and surrounding storage in preparation for spring

Acacia fimbriata - sticky wattle. Hardy and frost resistant and produces a spectacular display of gold in spring. Grows and spreads to about 4m.

Callistemon viminalis - weeping bottlebrush. Likes clay soil, branches grow gracefully down to the ground. Grows lots of pale red brushes in early summer which birds love. Grows to between 3 and 4 m.

Narrow areas between houses

Planting for privacy in a narrow space means thinking about climbing plants rather than trees or shrubs.

Golden honeysuckle or a jasmine could be good choices as they grow relatively quickly, look good and smell nice. There are many other options including climbing roses and clematis varieties.

For even more privacy you could attach a lattice or trellis to extend the fence height, giving your climbers a greater area to cover. If you choose this route, do make sure to attach the trellis very securely as it will have to bear weight. It's best to do this by creating a high degree of overlap with the fence. I'd also advise alerting your neighbour to your plans, not least because some climbers get rather bushy and your neighbour will probably end up

having to prune on their side.

In the veggie garden

If you're in a sheltered area you may be able to get away with first sowings of radishes and kohlrabi. I'm in a very exposed area and I'll be waiting another month or so. My winter Lucerne has been a bit of a failure as green manure, although my overwintering broad beans are standing well. If you have access to a greenhouse or a sunny window sill you could start cabbage and onions from seed under covered seed trays, looking to plant out in a month or so.

Weather Comment 15 -7-13

What a (nice) surprise.

What a surprise. A very welcome rainfall total over the last two days, 40mm and just when things were starting to look as though it had decided to stop raining we get this rain event.

I had looked at the forecast for this week on Friday and no way were we to expect this sort of rain until perhaps later in the week. Very very useful. Prior to this the last substantial fall was 12-5mm on July 4th and before that not a great deal during June I have just come in from feeding our cattle and the paddock is showing signs of getting soft but is still not a major concern yet.

Follow up rains are still needed to produce a good Spring. For the first time in many years I expect our hay shed to be empty by the end of August and that is a cause for concern and hope for a good hay cut this year. Hay of course is quite scarce and any on the market is very expensive and I don't envy the dairy farmers in particular who are doing it tough.

In last month's article I wrote that our ewes should

have started to lamb by this time, and this has proved to be the case a set of twins and two singles at the moment.

I find it quite rewarding watching them skipping round the paddock. I perhaps shouldn't push my luck by writing that there has been no sign of foxes yet.

The cattle are still vocal when they hear the tractor start up and come looking for hay even if I am going off to do something different Nothing changes in that regard. The cattle are holding their condition and with the warm weather getting closer and hopefully more rain we should soon have plenty of grass to continue with their improvement.

There is little to report from the garden side of things, weeding has been a large part of work and it has not been hard to fill the 'green bin 'each fortnight. I will stop now as a 'cuppa' is being made which is always a pleasant time.

Encouraging young people in McEwen to have their say at the ballot box

The Australian Government is providing funding to the Australian Youth Affairs Coalition (AYAC) to run a range of activities to encourage young people across Australia to have their say where it matters most – at the ballot box.

The Government will invest \$150,000 in Australia's Youth Matters 2013 - Making First-time Votes Count, providing first-time voters with the opportunity to tell politicians and the wider community what issues are important to them in the federal election and what they will be voting on.

The survey will ask 'first-timers' in McEwen to nominate their

top five youth issues such as the difficulty of getting a job, the cost of tertiary education, and their top five community issues which could include marriage equality, climate change, the affordability of housing and rental prices for young people and poverty.

The survey will also ask firsttimers to nominate key focus areas within each issue that political parties should be asked to respond directly to. The top 10 issues and feedback from the survey will form the basis of requests for information from political parties and the development of a publicly available 'summary sheet' of the positions of parties on certain ssues.

The Government will fund a range of activities that include:

Selecting and training 10 17first timers to engage at least 50 first-time voters to tell their stories about why the top 10 issues from the first-time voter poll are important to their lives. These stories will be made available to young people through a website

Hosting a 17living library event to allow the first-time voters to tell their stories to the media, MPs, AYAC, invited organisations and other decision-makers.





Message from the Mayor

I take this opportunity to highlight a few of the most recent happenings around the shire to keep our community informed.

Community Satisfaction Survey

The independent Community
Satisfaction Survey results for 2013
were recently released. The results
reflect higher levels of community
satisfaction with Council's overall
performance and direction than
previous years.

While we will maintain a focus on continuous improvement and take on board the community's feedback, it is very pleasing that in all five core performance areas (and in comparison to similar councils) the community has noted good overall performance in our

collective works and services, and in our partnership with the community.

2013/14 Budget

At the Council meeting on 12 June Council adopted its 2013/14 budget with amendment that will reduce the rate revenue by \$723,000 and lower the average rate increase from the proposed 6.9% to an actual 4.9%. This is the sixth year in a row that the average rate increase has remained below 5%.

The \$723,000 saving was achieved by removing the purchase of new land for a proposed early years hub in Gisborne from the budget. Council will instead explore the option of building the hub on a small portion (10%) of the Council owned original proposed site of Daly Reserve.

Council also upheld its proposal to sell four pieces of vacant land in Gisborne to fund the construction of a \$1.5 million netball complex, to which Council has allocated \$800,000. An adjustment to the draft budget was also made to provide \$90,000 for refurbishments to the Bluestone Theatre in Kyneton, which will require the support of a \$290,000 state government grant.

Council took on board community feedback and adjusted the budget to better meet community expectations. As these are economically challenging times, we have sought to keep rates as low as possible while maintaining all our services and allowing for some much needed capital works due to a growing population.

Walking and Cycling Strategy

Council is currently developing a comprehensive Walking and Cycling Strategy for the shire.

During the budget process, Council received some submissions in relation to cycle safety. Although some of these requests were well beyond the capacity of Council to provide an immediate solution, they will be considered as part of the development of the new Walking and Cycling Strategy. Many of the roads in recent requests/submissions are the responsibility of VicRoads.

Council is committed to walking and cycling safety in the shire and for the benefit and enjoyment of our community, and I look forward to the outcomes of the strategy.

Community Funding Scheme

Council's annual Community

Funding Scheme has this year awarded \$164,000 to 52 local community groups for projects with a total combined value of \$375,000.

I praise the standard and range of applications we received. Of the 70 applications received this year, 74 per cent were recommended for funding.

Many applicants are contributing to their projects in other ways such as fundraising, sponsorship and in kind support, bringing the total value of projects happening on the ground to over \$375,000.

A high percentage of applications were for community projects, followed by sporting activities, arts and tourism events, and initiatives relating to family and children's services in the shire.






