


#### **Hanging Rock Cross Country**



"I encourage people to get their nominations in so the critical work that many in our community do is recognised."


The seventh annual National Disability Awards will help to build awareness of disability issues and recognise the important role that people with disability play in local communities. Australia wide and internationally.

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# **C.W.A Spring Show Dates Confirmed**

We are pleased to announce this year the Spring Show will be held on the 13th & 14th of September.

As with every year, there is bound to be a category to suit everyone from the little ones with their cooking and flower displays, right through to the Over 80's section. Why not use this chilly weather to start planning your entries.

Throughout the year the C.W.A ladies study a country of interest. Last year we studied Cambodia, this year our country of interest is New Zealand. It was with this in mind that we came up with the recipe of the month.

According to "Ladies A Plate, the collection"\*, these Spice Crisps, have been modelled on a New Zealand biscuit Griffin's Gingernut. The Griffin's Gingernut is famous in New Zealand because Sir Edmund Hillary is said to have taken packets on his

climbing and aid expeditions to the Everest region of the Himalayas.

After sampling them at our meeting, we can understand why Mr Hillary might have done so. We thought they were so delicious we'd share the recipe.

#### Spice Crisps

Ingredients: 170g butter, 1 cup sugar, 1 tsp vanilla essence, 1 egg, ¼ cup treacle, 2 ¼ cups plain flour, 2 tsp baking soda, ½ tsp salt, 1 tsp cinnamon, ¾ tsp ground ginger, ½ tsp ground cloves, 1 cup extra sugar (for coating the biscuits).

Method: 1. Cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy, add the vanilla, egg and treacle and beat well. 2. Add the sifted dry ingredients and mix until a smooth dough is formed. 3. Scrape the dough into a small bowl, cover with a plate and refrigerate for at least an hour to firm it up. 4. Preheat the oven to 190°C and line two baking trays with baking paper, or butter them lightly, 5. Put the extra sugar in a shallow plate. 6. Take teaspoonful's of the dough and set them out on the bench. Once the dough is all divided up, roll each spoonful into a ball and then roll them in the sugar before placing them in rows on the baking trays. Don't flatten them at all - they'll do that themselves in the oven. 7. Bake for 8-10 minutes. When done, the biscuits will have spread and cracked, and they will smell cooked and delicious. Don't let them brown too much. 8. Transfer the baking paper and biscuits to a cooling rack and leave until they are cold and store airtight. Makes 48

You don't need to be trained to use one - the machine will talk you through what to do, but please call us if you would like to attend a future training session. Also please phone the House if you would like a map of where they are located.



### Vanessa's garden

#### Winter Flowering Plants

Try a salvia for winter colour and garden perfume.

Salvias are a great choice for winter colour in the garden. They are a prolific and successful plant family with over 900 varieties which are adapted to a wide range of climate conditions. Salvias can be grown as an annual or perennial and they come in sizes ranging from small, compact bushes to large shrub varieties. They are easy to grow, will thrive in the dry AND cope with heavy rain.

When flowering they typically throw up spikes which can vary from blue and purple tones through to white and orange; and while most put on their best show from spring to late autumn, there are important winter flowering varieties too.

Winter-Flowering Salvias Winter salvias originally came from the cool mountainous regions of Central and South America and they start coming alive in autumn, ready to flower in winter and early spring.

These winter-flowering salvias can form quite large shrubs but this means they easily fill any gaps in your borders, providing interesting contrast when summer plants die down for winter or lose their leaves. Then as other plants start to fill out




in spring, the winter salvias can be cut back.

One interesting winter salvia is fruit-scented sage (salvia dorisiana) which has bright pink flowers and a fruity scent. It grows to between 1.5m and 2m in height and copes with sun or shade. Another winter possibility is salvia madrensis, which is unscented but has masses of yellow flowers on long spikes. Where to plant Salvias These versatile plants can be used in a number of situations and

combinations. Single larger plants look striking in borders or you can use some of the smaller ones to edge borders and paths where they will act as living mulch. Many of these smaller salvias have the additional bonus of scented leaves, which gently release their scent as you brush past.

True sage, garden sage, meadow sage and common sage

These are all names for salvia officinalis, my favourite, and the one I call 'official' sage. This edible and medicinal herb is a must for any



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#### garden.

Sage has been respected wherever it grows as a native species. The ancient Mediterranean civilisations as well as the Native Americans, are well documented as having regarded sage as an essential culinary and magical/medicinal herb. In fact the word salvia derives from the Latin salvare, which means to heal or to save and a recipe for sage pancakes has been traced to the 5th century B.C.

Over the centuries sage has accrued an impressive résumé including the reported ability to help conception, treat the plague, protect against witchcraft and spells, enhance memory and bestow immortality. Sounds like a classic example of an inflated résumé to me!

Nevertheless, just as many myths and legends have some distant historical basis, the praise for sage is not entirely unfounded. Sage contains phytosterols which are said to have a cooling action. In one study, using an infusion of the leaf reportedly reduced excessive

perspiration by as much as half. These properties may also make it useful for treating colds. Sage can help to dry up phlegm, and medical herbalists sometimes advise gargling with a sage tea to assist in the treatment of coughs and tonsil or throat infections. Supporting this usage is the fact that the essential oil extracted from sage contains alpha and beta-thujone, camphor, and cineole, which are antioxidant and antimicrobial. For safety, any medicinal use of

sage should be undertaken under the guidance of a gualified medical herbalist and as a complement to mainstream medical treatment. Thumbs Up

Versatile, tough and good to look at - salvias get a thumbs up from me as a plant for all gardens.

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


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# **No Tears For Film Society**

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
Bram Stoker's Dracula, Names and other details for the film had to be changed because the studio could not obtain the rights to the novel.



# What Education . . . ?

It is a pity that education is such a political football. Most parents strive to give their offspring a good education. Parents demand a right to education while others neglect their responsibilities.

Because of those parents, schooling is made mandatory. Children need equal opportunity but also direction, to grasp literacy, numeracy, history, geography, communication, personal competence and ethical behaviour.

Education is not just schooltraining. It is also about certain common standards of values, and children with stable parents are likely, to understand those values better. Teachers can't do all the education. It is the responsibility of the parents.

Everybody in Lancefield, will receive the notices from our Neighbourhood House, "the heart of our community".

Apart from the activities in art and craft, it also offers training in all sort of things. Nothing is for nothing and education is no different. It costs not only time but also effort and of course money. Some parents are able to spend more on their children's training, than others. However, according to the education expert Ben Jensen, of the Grattan Institute: "The world best school systems, are rarely the expensive ones."

Schooling in Australia has been dismal. When I came to Melbourne in 1951, there were only a handful

of High schools. A few years later there was a brisk building program of schools, but no teachers to fill them. We haven't learned much from history. Now, it is called, the Building Education Revolution. This time it is building gym halls, canteens, libraries and meeting halls. But again a shortage of good teachers.

Mr. Peter Turner, director of Catholic schools said: "With good and dedicated teachers, one can even teach in a tent". Children can't face the future, if we don't make use of our experiences of the past.

Cicero, said: "Not to know what happened in former times, is to continue as a juvenile".

Nowadays, there is less and less teaching. The latest copout is, "Personalized learning", "Agile learning" or "Self-directed learning", where children do their own thing. My eldest son experienced one of these, in the seventies, with very poor results.

It is now even argued, that in modern times, a scanner will do the reading, a computer will do the writing and a calculator will do the arithmetic, history we'll find at Wickepedy and geography we find at Google. So what are schools for? To promote low intelligence ?

Some of to day's students do not respect adults and/or teachers. Because of that, teachers operate in a difficult world. Misbehaving sports-people are looked upon, as national heroes.

Hong Kong, Singapore and Korea have reformed their schooling, which ranked them, at the top in international assessment of literacy, numeracy and science, in a matter of 10 years.

It is not just their schools that check on literacy, numeracy, communication and personal competence, most Chinese parents teach their children these faculties, as well as ethical behavior, even respect for teachers. There is a difference between education and school-training.

Some successful people never fitted in schools. Richard Branson suffered from dyslexia, but it doesn't deter him from achieving his goals. I think we can be proud of our Victor Chang and Sir Arvi Parvo, neither of them, could even speak English, when they came to Australia.

The latter escaped the Russian occupation as a refugee, studied on a scholarship in Germany, migrated as a 20 year old to Australia, had to study again, for his Australian university degree and became head of Western Mining Co. Later chairman of BHP and several other

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Australian companies.

And what about Lindsay Fox, who was told to leave Melbourne High School, because of his lack of interest in his school. These people had to re-educate themselves over and over again and learn the hard way.

To grade people as to whether they have been, at a good school or a bad school, is a no-no. Education is not "one size fits all", controlled by bureaucrats in Canberra.

Human beings are genetically endowed with the ability to learn by imitation. Not all children have the same ability and the teaching of children should be a priority duty of parents. However we must understand, that it requires both effort and humility. I believe we are not born, wise, rational and good. We have to be taught those things.

One is only as good as the things we ultimately do.

Aged care services set to expand

Kyneton District Health is set to introduce a wider range of services to elderly people in the community following the decision to close the Thomas Hogan Residential Aged Care facility.

The additional services will be aimed at keeping residents in their homes as long as possible, before they need to enter residential aged care. There will also be additional in-hospital services.

'The most important people involved in this decision are the residents of Thomas Hogan and their families, and we will work closely with them to enable a smooth transition of residents to a new home and ensure every resident receives the best care possible,' said KDH Chief Executive Officer Jennifer Gale.

'This change is part of an Australia-wide trend for public hospitals to move away from operating nursing homes to instead providing a range of services available to all elderly members of the community.'

Ms Gale said while KDH had licences for 30 beds, there were only 15 residents at Thomas Hogan.

'In recent years we have seen a steady decline in the number of residents,' she said. 'At the same time there has been a growth in the number of beds provided locally by both private and not-for-profit operators, to the point where there is really no need for us to provide a nursing home.'

'We believe aged care is a service that we should provide to the whole community, and this will be a much better way for us to deliver that service."

Ms Gale said additional services would be developed that aimed to keep elderly residents in their homes longer. 'It is more rewarding for people to stay in their own homes, with appropriate support, for as long as possible, and we aim to ensure that is delivered in our region.'

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
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#### **Dear Editor**

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



### Bore water still on tap as dry continues

Lancefield has had no respite from the dry weather, leading to an increase in bore water being fed into the town's drinking water supply.

Bore water levels are now up to 80%, with water from the Garden Hut Reservoir making up the remaining 20% of Lancefield's drinking water.

If dry weather continues, the percentage of bore water will continue to rise and water restrictions are likely.

"The Bureau of Meteorology's rain outlook for central Victoria in June and July predicts a 60-70% chance of below average rainfall," Western Water's Managing Director, Neil Brennan, says.

"This means the Garden Hut Reservoir is not likely to recover

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#### from its current low levels any time soon," he says.

"Western Water is currently investigating options to ensure Lancefield's water supply is secured into the future. In the meantime, residents need to continue to be careful with their water use."

Western Water began adding bore water to Lancefield's drinking supply earlier this year, and is regularly monitoring the water supply to test levels of hardness and ensure it meets all drinking water guidelines.

Bore water is typically harder than reservoir water as it contains higher levels of dissolved minerals. This can reduce the effectiveness of soap and detergents, and can have an impact on some household appliances.



# Incorrect use of heat bags prompts warning

CFA is warning the community about the dangers of incorrect use of heat bags which could be fatal.

CFA Loddon Mallee Region Community Education Coordinator Paul Tangey said for your own safety, you should only purchase heat bags with instructions and ensure they are used according to the manufacturer's instructions.

"Contents of a wheat bag can be much the same as grass or crops that are heated daily during summer and in most cases cools down overnight. The constant change in temperature may cause the material to become flammable and ignite and for this reason, heat bags should not be used as a bed warmer or while you are in bed," he said.

"You should also never leave the microwave unattended while heating the bags – the same principal as cooking with stove tops, grillers and ovens."

"They are no different to any other electrical appliance in the home - faulty wiring is dangerous."

"The kitchen is the room of the house which is the single largest cause of fires. A fire in your kitchen can cause extensive damage."

"Kitchen fires are also responsible for a high level of personal injury so pay attention in the kitchen."

Some safety tips to help prevent electrical fires:

 Ensure that all switches and power cords are in good working order and wires are not exposed;

· All repairs need to be carried out by a registered electrician. Do not attempt to do it yourself;

• Using multiple power boards can overload power points, as can the use of double adaptors without overload protection;

· Don't place extension leads under carpet or furniture;

 Install safety switches in your home - these isolate power instantly from your switchboard if a short circuit is detected; similarly a surge protector will isolate your power if a sudden surge of power is detected.
