Funding Boost For Lancefield Show

The Lancefield Agricultural Society will receive \$5734 to extend the existing sheep and poultry exhibition shed at the Lancefield Reserve. The show society have been allocated the funding through the Government's 2012-13 Agricultural and Pastoral Society Grants Program. The grants program has been benefiting Victorian communities for the past 12 years by providing grants of up to \$10,000 for projects that improve facilities at showgrounds.

Bore water boosting Lancefield drinking supplies

Very low rainfall and a big rise in water use over recent months have led to bore water being added to Lancefield's water supply. Water use across the town this summer is up 56 per cent compared to the previous year. As of January the town's drinking water was a blend of around two-thirds bore water to one-third reservoir water. Good rainfall over recent years has meant Lancefield was receiving 100 per cent reservoir water. However, the reservoir that supplies the town is small and depletes rapidly when there is no rain. The proportion of bore water may need to increase if rainfall remains low. Western Water will closely monitor the situation and consider introducing water restrictions if needed. Residents may notice their water has a different taste, colour or smell as bore water has a higher mineral content than reservoir water. However, all drinking water supplied to Lancefield is filtered and treated at the town's water filtration plant to ensure it is safe to drink and meets all the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines. Weather Comment 15-1-13

It is time to start another year of trying to make some sense out of our weather patterns and the consequences that they have on our daily lives whether it be as farmers or gardeners or just being part of a rural community. It is two months since I sat down to write a weather comment and it has been an abnormally "dry spell" to use the term from the Weather Bureau as stated in the rural press recently. When looking through our rainfall figures for the last four months it is somewhat scary. My predictions of a good season mid last year, came to nothing with rain well below average for latter part of the year, in fact for any time of any year. Since my article written for the December Mercury in November we have measured only 35 mm with nothing so far this month

The pastures while quite long in many places are short of nutrients, but the stock are doing reasonably well while the weather is warm, this can change later on when it turns cool. A bit too early to be thinking

along those lines yet. The live stock markets have taken a large fall in recent months. At the Ewe Sale in early January prices were down by around \$100 compared to the sale held at the similar time last year. The consequences are disappointing if you are selling but quite the opposite if you are buying. A strange business pleasing some and disappointing others. The cattle market shows a similar trend with low demand resulting in lower prices. The wet season in the north of Australia is also is not as wet as usual and this also has a long term effect on the cattle market .

There is little to report about the garden, everything is showing the effects of the low rainfall and, even with the aid of the water tank and pump the garden is struggling and our aim is to preserve as much of the established plants as possible, the annuals will no doubt return next Spring. We can only hope that the season will return to normal as the year progresses.

The Australian Way

When I first set foot on Australian soil in Darwin, on January 3rd 1951, the first Ozzi I met, asked me: "How are you mate. How do you like Australia?" Being born in the Netherlands, a bit of a stiff society, I couldn't help liking the Australians, with their relaxed way of doing things. We certainly live in "The Lucky Country". Many other nationals are not so lucky. Australia is mainly a rural and mining country. These as well as the service and intelligence industry are strong.

Education is important and my father, who was head of TNO (the Dutch equivalent of our CSIRO) was amazed by what Australian scientists achieved.

Although "She'll be right Mate" is sometimes frustrating, Australians have done great things. Think

of the SNOWY MOUNTAINS SCHEME, cheap instant electricity. The HOLDEN car? The Americans liked it and bought it. The VICTA lawnmower? Developed here, sold to the Americans. The VICTA aeroplane developed here? Sold to New Zealand. If this give you a headache think of ASPRO. Then there are the DRIVERLESS TRAINS in the Pilbara, the CANBERRA BOMBER. The HILL'S ROTARY CLOTHES LINE, ARNOTT'S BISCUITS sold to the Americans, PETER'S ICECREAM (The health food of the nation) sold to the Swiss, CAMPBELL'S SOUP, the Americans even gobble that up. The ARGYLE DIAMOND MINE, producing the world most valuable pink diamonds, with only a hand full of people. So

the list can go on and on.

Of course Australia has only a small population so here there is only a limited market for everything. But then think of this small retail market. The MYER EMPORIUM, sold to the Americans. 

Vanessa's garden


Well, in spite of netting my peach and apricot trees, the rosellas and crows did their best to thwart my efforts over January, and although I know that it's not the best way to ripen peaches, I ended up picking some early and ripening them under cover in a seed tray. It didn't work that well but the intense aroma of warm peach when I lifted the plastic lid was heavenly!

Growing a Sensory Garden

Being outside in a natural environment no matter whether it's bush, an urban park or a rural backyard, is a great antidote to the rush and electronic chatter that seems to intrude into almost every corner of life these days (if we let it). Mother Nature does things at her own pace and relaxing outside helps us to slow down too. It's also said to reduce stress and blood pressure so I thought I'd put together some ideas for making the most of your garden's potential to contribute to your well being.

Start by introducing your favourite colours and remember to plant in clumps of three or five for the best splash of colour. Widen the visual appeal by including plants with interesting foliage, such as trees which put on a show of autumn colour. An Acer will often turn a fabulous

Next on the list is the sense of touch or feel and for this we need some plants with different textures. Lambs' Ears is an obvious example (if you can keep it in check) with its wonderfully touchable, velvety soft, grey foliage. Feathery ferns are another possibility. You might also satisfy this sense by using different materials on walkways, from tiles, to brick, crushed gravel or stone pavers. Plants that attract butterflies also add movement and colour to the garden. English lavender and most varieties of Hebe will do this job for you. Where possible, plant some things close to your most used route through the garden and make sure some of them are scented as you'll be more tempted to slow down and brush the plants. Daphne would do

crimson and keep its brightly coloured leaves through to the first frost or gale. If you have some small conifers and are feeling brave you could try your hand at clipping them into whimsical shapes, although do be careful, or you'll take a clip too many and end up with a twig. Another way to add eye appeal is using unusual planters and a dash of creativity. I have seen successful plantings in old tyres (painted or not), aged watering cans, elderly wheelbarrows and even retired gumboots.

well here, or thyme and both are low maintenance once established. The main thing with scented plants is to space them round the garden. Clumped in one spot the combined aromas could turn a pleasant experience into an eye-watering assault on the senses.

When you go into your garden what do you want to hear? Water can be relaxing both to look at and listen to and helps soften background noise from neighbours or traffic. As always, if you do put in a water feature and there are children around or likely to visit, remember to make sure it is child safe. If you would like to hear more birdsong the best invitation is to introduce the appropriate plants. Good all rounders include Grevilleas, kangaroo paws, banksias and bottlebrushes. Birds are also attracted by a safe water supply so you could also install a (cat proof) birdbath.

And of course, last but not least, as a keen vegetable gardener I could hardly neglect the sense of taste. Grow as many herbs and vegetables as you can I say. Lastly, remember whatever you decide you don't have to do everything at once, pick one small area to work on at a time and any task becomes manageable. Slow is good!

Macedon Ranges Film Society Thinks Big



The grim story of the World War Two German invasion of Russia, and Hitler's mad attempt to capture the city named for Stalin, and the eventual encirclement and destruction of the the Nazi armies has been written about many times, but I found Antony Beevor's telling of it the most compelling. I'd recommend reading this book in summer, as the descriptions of the cold of the Russian winter will leave you shivering on even the hottest day.



Cancer fundraisers out to beat \$1m

Raising money for cancer research is all the more meaningful when one is given a say in where the funds are directed. Every year the Cancer Council Victoria recognises teams who raise more than \$5000 at Relay For Life events by letting them nominate an area of research for assistance from a list of priority projects. In 2012, five teams participating at the Lancefield/Macedon Ranges Relay For Life earned a Research Award. Between them they collected more than \$45,000, with the highest fundraiser, Evergreens, amassing \$17,465. Other teams to win awards were: Romsey Birdies \$9316; Lynne & Wendy's Walkers \$8325; Team Cutajar \$5686; and 3 Ways \$5322.

More than \$110,000 was raised by the 34 registered teams in 2012, bringing the event's tally for the past 10 years to \$984,249. A record number of cancer survivors and carers attended last year's Lancefield/Macedon Ranges Relay For Life. Organisers hope to have another strong turnout for this year's opening lap which is dedicated to cancer survivors and carers. Whether a team member or not, all are encouraged and welcome to join in the celebrations.

The smaller walking track introduced in 2012 will again be used this year at Lancefield Park and tent sites will also be inside the oval boundary, both moves which have enhanced the event's atmosphere. Live music and performances, children's activities, and cancer health information will feature over the weekend. Meals and refreshments will be available.

Relay For Life is a major fundraiser for the Cancer Council Victoria. Last year \$5.2 million was raised by events across the state to fund cancer research, education, advocacy and support services.

The Lancefield/Macedon Ranges Relay For Life starts at 3pm on Saturday, March 2 and runs until 10am on March 3.
