Mrs Hilda Gallpen 19-11-1917–21-8-2013 A Remarkable Lady

Family and many, many friends attended a service at Christ Church, Lancefield on the 28th of August 2013 to give thanks for the life and work of Mrs Hilda Gallpen. Hilda, aged 95 years, was a wonderful community member and belonged to, or supported a large number of groups within our town and beyond.

Some years ago the then Shire of Romsey awarded her the Citizen of the Year in appreciation of her voluntary work.

One of her greatest interests, ranging over 80 years was the Girl Guide movement where she began in Carnegie, then Murrumbeena before moving to Lancefield in 1970 where she began the Lancefield Guide Company and was later the area's District Commissioner and also served on the Victorian State Council.



Her work was honoured when she was one of 100 women described in the book Girl Guides, Australia, Leadership for Life published in 2010.

Other groups included Red Cross, the CWA, the Anglican Church and Guild, Hospital and Fire Brigade Auxilliaries - for many of these she was the President. She also sponsored an award at the Junior Cricket Club for "a child who really tried hard", maintaining an interest in all young people.

Hilda was a tower of strength and had a profound influence on many of us, a great organiser and a very good memory.

A lady of many talents she stitched beautiful tapestries and fancy work, her knitting was lovely and she won lots of prizes at CWA events. A pretty good cook too.

Until the end of her life she was still writing letters, doing crosswords, reading, knitting and always interested in what news visitors could give her of the lives of her friends in the local area.

This remarkable lady will be long remembered with respect and affection by a large number of people; her friendships were long standing and deep. Mervl Green

The group was nominated for the state Landcare awards at Government House in August. 2 boxes of red gums have been given to Romsey Golf Course.



Council takes time to compile exorbitant repair list for Lancefield Park House – wastes no time in voting to tear house down.

The Lancefield Park Committee (LPC) and concerned Lancefield residents waited almost three hours at the August Macedon Ranges council meeting, only to walk out disillusioned after a 10 minute discussion resulted in councillors voting four to three in favour of removing or demolishing the iconic Lancefield 'Park House'.

At the previous Council meeting in July, council officers were instructed to inspect the house, and list works to be undertaken for it to be suitable to rent out. Taking much of the month to complete an extremely detailed list of works, the officers submitted an extensive list that only reached the Lancefield Parks Committee two days prior to the August council meeting.

"We were effectively given one day to consider the list of works, with what we believe to be exaggerated costings, to make the task of keeping this historic house cost prohibitive", said Vivien Philpotts

Through Councillor Henry McLaughlin, the LPC asked for time to assess and respond to the report and provide a more realistic 'community' costing for consideration, however this request was denied, in a charge lead by Councillor Joe Morabito, who also denied any knowledge of the petition signed by over 200 local supporters

of the house.

Councillor Morabito further frustrated Park's volunteers and community members by incorrectly stating that the entire council parks budget contribution of \$16k per annum has been dedicated to maintaining the house, when that money contributes to the maintenance of the entire park.

The implication was made that the LPC, who had managed the house for over 20 years, had not maintained it. Both the tenant and the real estate agents had no complaints with the house but the council decided work needed to be done to bring it up to their standards. Council spent \$60k on the house and when the LPC indicated that they could not cover the costs imposed on them they handed management over to the council. Two years later the LPC are asking for time to establish if they can viably take back management of the house and keep it at the standard the council demands - at no cost to the council.

While much has been made of the \$60k that has been spent on the 2010 renovation including a new kitchen, flooring, roof repairs and windows, the ongoing operating and maintenance costs for the premises totals approximately \$6k per annum, and are easily covered by rental income.

Currently there are only five houses available for rent in Lancefield, with most of these houses listed at between \$300 and \$500 per week.

The Park House was previously rented out at approximately \$145 a week for three bedrooms and a huge yard for children, not to mention space of parkland to play in!

Council deemed that the Lancefield Park House was too isolated for lower income earners to rent, yet the house was occupied until recently, by the same family for more than 14 years. That family in return for their piece of heaven. kept an eye on the park's extensive precinct and reported suspicious activity to police, proactively reducing the number of damage complaints and incidences of anti social behavior.

"Just because a family may be looking for an economical solution for housing, doesn't mean they are solely reliant on public transport or a need to be close to the CBD", said Vivian Philpotts

"When you consider the number of people who use the parkland even though it is not in the CBD. this parcel of land and this house, contributes enormously to the Lancefield community, and that it can be so easily disregarded by our Council concerns the Lancefield community greatly", she said.





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Weather Comment

This report is shaping up to be not as positive as last month with a smaller number of rainfall events and smaller totals. Although I have measured 47mm which in itself is a reasonable total for the month some warmer days and strong winds have seen the surface water in the paddocks disappear and some forecast showers have not eventuated and this makes me a little concerned about the Spring. The soil is however still wet and this is a positive sign for growth. There is evidence of some growth in the paddocks and especially around the house and the mower has had a couple of runs. I have moved the sheep off the Lucerne paddock and there is some movement there also and I will close the other paddock next week in preparation for hay cutting.

The lambs have been marked and inoculated and are doing well, 25 lambs from our small flock of 20 has been a good result, "TOBY" the triplet lamb that we are hand feeding has overcome his troubles and now thinks he is a human being (or else we are sheep!), and has become part of our day to day routine. The cattle have had their last bale of hay and were not too concerned about eating it, a good sign. The other cattle have struggled a bit during Winter but should pick up from now on.

Typically as one would expect there is lots of colour in the garden now and with the nicer weather it is easier to be encouraged outside. There are always weeds to deal with and now with Spring growth the grass/lawn plots require mowing with greater regularity. The bulbs are beautiful despite the wind although many daffodils are nearly finished but ranunculi and Dutch iris are getting started, it all follows on. Vegie plots are underway with onions, silver beet seedlings and strawberry plants but still a bit chilly yet. Robert Green



Water board

Take care with water use as reservoir recovers

Lancefield's drinking water is now being sourced entirely from the Garden Hut Reservoir, after good winter rainfall boosted water levels. This follows a period where Western Water needed to supplement the town's drinking water supply with bore water.

"Garden Hut has recovered well after a reasonably wet winter, but we still need Lancefield residents to take care with their water use," Western Water's Acting Managing Director, Rob Franklin, says.

"Garden Hut is a small reservoir of 112 million litres, which can drop very quickly when the hot weather arrives and water use goes up. In that case, it is very likely we will need to add bore water into Lancefield's drinking water supply again."

During the summer of 2012-13, water use in Lancefield soared to 235 litres per person per day, an increase of 35% on the previous summer. Western Water is currently progressing options for improving Lancefield's water security, with a plan to connect the town to the region's water supply network.

"This would give us more options for supplying drinking water to Lancefield as we move water around the network, including water sourced from Rosslynne Reservoir in Gisborne and the Melbourne supply," Mr Franklin says.


Australia Day award nominations now open

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
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



Through a range of activities, parents were shown how they can engage in enjoyable learning activities in the home that supports the learning that occurs at school.







Vancesa's garden

October is the month to get cracking with sowing and planting. although tender plants will need protection until early November, just in case winter has one last frosty nip up its sleeve.

A bit of work now for luscious strawberries later

Strawberries will benefit from a feed of liquid fertiliser diluted according to the instructions on the pack or a home-made 'tea' which can be made from compost or manure mixed with water. The liquid should be diluted until it is a pale tea colour.

Check each strawberry plant and remove any leaves that show signs of grey mould. If you are growing strawberries in a garden bed it's a good idea to put clean straw under the berries as they grow to keep

them in good condition but straw does tend to provide a cover for pests.

There's no easy fix to this one, you'll need to keep checking the mulch or you'll lose those precious berries to greedy slugs and snails.

While chooks will gladly eat the pests for you, they might nibble or tread on the berries in the process. This is one reason why some people prefer to grow strawberries in special planters or hanging baskets.

I've even seen special raised beds which are actually on legs off the ground entirely and protected with copper tape if you want to go that far.

Dealing with aphids

Aphids can be a real nuisance at this time of year, timing their appearance to take advantage of all that luscious new green growth. Roses and fruit trees can be particularly vulnerable to attack and a spray with pyrethrum will usually be an effective solution.

Before you spray always check to see if there are any ladybirds on the plant. If there are, don't spray as the ladybirds will do the job for you.

Citrus

Citrus trees can benefit from a spray with white oil at this time of vear to tackle scale which looks like a black mould on the leaves.

If you've been growing a citrus in a pot October is a good month to plant the tree out, although you can continue to grow a variety such as a Meyer lemon in a large pot quite

happily. In our climate citrus that are planted out need a warm, sunny spot, somewhere well-drained that they'll be protected from frost. If you can't meet those conditions it's probably best to keep them in a pot.

How to get your tomatoes to produce early crops

Whether your plants are on windowsills indoors, in a greenhouse or already outside and protected from frost, the trick to increasing production is to be sparing with water and feed while they are young.

Too much food and water at a young stage just creates a plant with masses of leaf which is too lazy to flower because it's doing very nicely thank you.

Remember that flowers and fruit

are the plant's way of reproducing and if it sees no need to waste energy on early production it will wait until later in the season to set fruit and you might end up having to make a lot of green tomato chutney.

On the other hand a plant which thinks it might not make it through the season because conditions appear to be tough is going to flower and set fruit much faster, in order to ensure its genes survive. Once a tomato plant starts to flower, all its energy goes into making fruit and you can increase the food and water regime. Another tip is to rake aside any mulch around ground-planted tomatoes until the weather gets really warm. If this isn't done the soil remains cool, hindering the

plants' growth.

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

Dogs Attacking Sheep

As the township of Lancefield develops and more and more houses are placed on the outlying estates the issue of dogs roaming free becomes more of a problem.

I have recently been speaking to a couple of local farmers who between them have lost in excess of 20 sheep to dog attacks.

When you consider the value of a lamb to buy these days at market with heavy lambs bringing up to \$120 a head and restocking lambs ranging from \$50- \$65 a head (National Livestock Report figures) this is a lot of money to lose. Even if the sheep are ewes each ewe is capable of producing two lambs per annum. These are significant

losses.

If you live in a rural area but work elsewhere during the day you need to be sure that when you are not at home your dogs are not wandering loose on your property. It is your responsibility to ensure they are secured on your property and not able to wander. Dogs like people get bored, and start wandering and before you know it they are chasing your neighbour's sheep. Not great for relations between neighbours.

These tensions can soon escalate when your neighbour comes home to find your dog in his paddock worrying his sheep and shoots your dog which he is quite within his rights to do.


The Domestic (feral and



nuisance) animals act 1994 specifically states, at

Section 30

(1) the owner of any animals or birds kept for farming purposes, any person authorised by the owner or an Authorised Officer may destroy any dog or cat found at large -(a) in the place where the animals or



by the owner of an Authorised Officer does not incur any civil or criminal liability for acting under section (1).

You then have to explain to the family why Fido is not coming home tonight and why you suddenly need to pay the neighbour compensation for his lost stock.

You may also face charges in the Magistrates Court for allowing your dog to wander and allowing your dog to attack.

Be aware that any dog can attack sheep. Dogs as small as Fox Terriers right up to your bigger

German Shepherds and Rottwielers have attached sheep. This is especially so if they are in the company of another dog. Time and again I hear reports of two or more dogs working together to attack a mob of sheep.

I have also heard Dr Hugh Wirth of the RSPCA stating on ABC radio that once a dog learns to attack sheep or other livestock you cannot train them not to do so. Prevention is certainly better than the possible cure.

Once your dog has attacked and injured sheep or other stock they can then be declared a dangerous dog by the shire and rigid guidelines are put in place to ensure is your responsibility. no further attacks occur. These guidelines can include the dog

being in a fully fenced run when at the home address. Any time the dog is removed from the run it must be on a lead and in most cases muzzled. This is not a great life for a dog that is used to having the freedom to roam the back vard and play with the kids.

In some more severe circumstances the dog must be put down. Although this may seem extreme to some dog lovers it is in some circumstances the best thing to do.

It is not your dog's fault if he gets shot, it is not the farmers fault if he shoots your dog.

The bottom line is that your dog







Running To or From?

Any time a teen runs away, it's a complicated situation. It usually feels like it came out of nowhere. But many times they may have tried to communicate something that will give parents a clue as to why they ran away.

If it's happened to you, consider thinking through some of the things your child might be responding 'to': Could running away be a symptom of a family structure that's broken? Is your child running away from something that is difficult? Are they being abused (if this is the case unfortunately no one usually knows about it). Are they not being respected or valued? Is there

something going on that you don't know about?

On the other hand, they could be running 'to' something. Maybe your child wants to express their independence or punish your family. They could be running toward a dream, or to another person whom they think can help them achieve their dreams.

Every parent needs to take the time to figure out if something needs to be fixed. If it's not fixed, the child will continue to run away. And as much as it seems like the child running away is the only problem, it's really just a symptom of a bigger problem.

When a teenager decides to

run away from the household, it traumatizes the entire family

Despite your worry, anger, frustration etc. they will only come back home if the family leaves the light on for them.


Children's Picture Books:




Tales from Celtic Lands by Caitlin Matthews RRP Reviewed by Gabbic Smith






