

Ten years ago 10 junior firefighters along with trainers Barry Barnett and Bob Williams and their partners travelled to Austria where the juniors competed in the CTIF junior firefighter games. After the games they travelled to Belgium where the team met Michiel Fossez and Gunther Braekevelt both volunteer members of the Roeselare Fire Brigade.

Along with members of their families Michiel and Gunther hosted the boys for a week showing them around many places in Roeselare and surrounding areas of Flanders. One of the places they visited was the Menin Gate in Ypres where they were invited to lay a wreath on behalf of the Romsey/Lancefield RSL - a memorable event organised by Michiel Fossez.

The Menin Gate is a very large arch built over the road entering Ypres and on its walls are listed the names of soldiers who were killed but their bodies never found. The names of some 55 000 soldiers whose bodies could not be found are listed on the Gate.

One of the coaches of the team,

Bob Williams, has a connection with the Menin Gate: his grandfather's cousin George Henry Williams was a corporal in the Australian Infantry serving in Belgium in 1917 and was reported missing in action. Bob tried to find his name on the Menin Gate without success.

A decade later Bob and Pauline and Barry and Karen travelled back to Belgium to meet Michiel and Gunther again and like the previous time 10 years earlier they extended their great Belgium hospitality.

This time they visited Passchendaele, a First World War museum where Michiel along with Museum staff were able to find information about George Henry Williams. They found records that showed the field where it is believed George was killed.

With the assistance of Michiel and Gunther, Bob was able to visit that field and left a poppy in an appropriate spot in memory of George. At that time of the year the field was planted with corn but after the corn is harvested Michiel along with his son Ruben will return to see if they can find anything in the field.

Although it is nearly a century since the First World War in Belgium, remnants of the war are still being

Later that night we attended the ceremony that is held nightly at the Menin Gate. After the ceremony with the information gained by Michiel, Bob found the name of George Henry Williams on the wall where a poppy was placed in his memory. Michiel along with Ruben will visit both these places to check to see if the poppies are still there, if not they will replace them for Bob.

Unfortunately this time we did not get to meet up with Michiel's parents Guido and Elenora as they were not in good health. They also did much for the boys and us ten years ago.

It is amazing how a meeting with these two guys and their families 10 years ago has turned into a life long friendship and how it has connected Lancefield to Roeselare.

We have invited both Michiel and Gunter come and visit us and we will have to wait and see if we have an opportunity to return the hospitality and friendship.

Free service helps people feel safer at home

Do you live alone? Are you concerned about your personal safety if you were to have a fall in your home or while you were out and about? If you, or someone you know would answer 'ves' to these questions then the Macedon Ranges Community Register may be able to help.

The Macedon Ranges Community Register is a free service provided by Macedon Ranges Shire Council and local police to frail older people and those with a disability, to assist them in feeling safer living at home.

Members receive an identification card that fits into their wallet or purse that they are encouraged to carry with them when they leave home. The card provides valuable information to emergency services in the event of an emergency. Members can also choose to receive a regular phone call from a volunteer to check on their welfare.

Inspector Ryan Irwin from Victoria Police said the register provides police with information that can be used to assist residents in times of need.

The Register also provides members with information and advice about avoiding heat stress and coping with difficult weather conditions. Also, if needed, it can act as a referral service for other Council services such as

All volunteers working on the register have undergone Police Checks and relevant training. Access to all personal details is available to authorised people only.

Being a member of the register does not guarantee evacuation by emergency services in an emergency and each member will receive a copy of the CFA's Prepare Act Survive - your fire ready kit to assist them in preparing their own emergency plans.

Armistice Day

In 1948, at an Armistice Celebration, (Armistice was the declaration of peace at the end of World War I) it was declared on November 11 at 11.00 am. So 11, 11 at 11. They did that symbolically because they felt that they were at the eleventh hour. They actually felt if the war continued, the whole world would be destroyed by it. Over 20 million people were killed in World War I. It was the bloodiest, most destructive war in history up until that time, So they declared an Armistice. Even till today some celebrate that.

Omar Bradley, one of the Generals in World War II makes this commentary and I think that history has borne his testimony to be true.

"With the monstrous weapons man already has, humanity is in danger of being trapped in this world by its moral adolescents. Our knowledge of science has clearly outstripped our capacity to control it. We have many men of science; too few men of God. We have grasped the mystery of the atom and rejected the Sermon on the Mount. Man is stumbling blindly through a spiritual darkness while toying with the precarious secrets of life and death. The world has achieved brilliance without wisdom, power without conscience. Ours is a world of nuclear giants and ethical infants. We know more about war than we know about peace, more about killing than we know about living. We do not know how to make peace. Jesus' Gift of Peace




Lancefield is very fortunate to have the Shed as part of the Lancefield Neighbourhood House and for two years now has been developing as an important aspect of the life of Lancefield!

Weather Comment 14-10-13

Last month I really put my foot in my mouth...

Last month I really put my foot in my mouth when I made remarks about the possibility that the rain pattern was changing for the worst and next day we recorded 43mm, not my best effort, however at this stage totals have again been on the light side also the weather is cold which has a detrimental effect on pasture growth.

On last Thursday I toured the farm to evaluate the amount of feed and I was quite disappointed, a little bit of rain since then and a change of paddocks may improve the situation and some milder days forecast for later in the week should make a difference.

The rainfall for the month, which includes the 43mm

mentioned above, has been 95 mm so there must be plenty of moisture in the soil, maybe it is the warmth we need to make things grow.

The sheep flock was shorn last Tuesday and yielded a very good result with the wool being well grown and to my surprise of very good colour and strength as I had thought that the wet months may have caused some yellowing of the wool. They averaged 4-8 kg a head which again I was very pleased

The lambs are also growing well and will continue to do so. Our 'triplet' pet Toby is out on grass and has been reduced to two bottles a day but still lets us know when he thinks its feed time The

steers here are now starting to lose their winter hair and as the grass has improved they are now gaining weight and look very good also.

The garden is now looking more springlike; the early bulbs are now finished and the later flowering plants are providing a colourful display along with the deciduous plants coming in to leaf the garden has taken on a very pleasant outlook.

We have added beetroot seedlings to our vegie plot but this area of the garden is slow moving as well and the only thing growing well is the "lawn "which is needing weekly mowing to keep it under control.

Are you fire ready?

With the fire season just around the corner, it's important to make sure that you, your family and your property are fire ready.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council's Fire Management Officer will begin inspecting private properties for fire risk throughout November and December. Fire Prevention Notices will be issued to those properties that pose a serious fire risk to their neighbourhood.

The penalty for failing to comply with these notices has increased significantly this year to \$1,440.

If you receive a notice, don't ignore it. If it is not complied with, Council will be forced to complete the work required and you will be charged the associated costs, in addition to the \$1,440 fine.

Community Emergency Preparation Planner

To help you to prepare your property and household in the event of an emergency, call into any of Council's offices and pick up a free Community Emergency Preparation Planner.

This useful planner provides useful information about preparing for the fire season. It also identifies

the actions that everyone should take on high fire risk days and encourages community members to share information about emergencies.

Fire Ready in the Macedon Ranges Film Council has also produced a short film, Fire Ready in the Macedon Ranges, which highlights the importance of having a bushfire survival plan and provides tips on how to support your family and neighbours to be fire ready.

The film was produced in partnership with the Mount Players Theatre Group and the CFA. It can be viewed on our website, mrsc.vic.gov.au/fireready

Don't forget, you can find us on Facebook. Search for Macedon Ranges Emergency Alerts and 'like' our page. This page focuses on helping you to prepare for and respond to an emergency in your town or region, such as a fire, flood or heatwave. This page does not replace official emergency alerts from the CFA, Victoria Police or SES.

Remember, being fire ready is everyone's responsibility, so make sure you take the time to prepare yourself, your family, your animals and your property so that you can stay safe this summer.

Don't rely on mains water during fires, Western Water warns

Western Water is warning Lancefield residents to have an independent water supply ready if they plan to stay and defend their home this fire season.

"If electricity is cut or our infrastructure is affected by fire, our pumps may fail, cutting the mains water supply," Western Water's Managing Director, Neil Brennan, says.

"If we have extremely high demand for water from customers and the CFA during a fire, water pressure may also drop."

Mr Brennan says residents should consult their local CFA about their options for an independent water supply and plan ahead.

"We are also doing all we can to prepare for summer, with backup generators ready and water storage tanks at high capacity to cope if we have a fire," he says.

Mr Brennan says Lancefield residents can also help the community to be prepared for fire season by 'adopting' a fire hydrant.

"The CFA needs to be able to access fire hydrants quickly and easily," he says.

"You can help by keeping fire hydrants near your home free of debris and vegetation, and calling us if you think a hydrant needs maintenance."

Vanessa's garden

November is here and with Christmas just around the corner and good spring rains behind us it is turning into weed beds full steam ahead in the garden.

Summer garden colour

Now is a great time to plan and plant annuals for a hard-working summer garden full of colour. Many species do double duty because as well as looking good they attract pollinators and other useful insects that eat pests. You've a wide range to choose from including: cosmos, sunflowers, nasturtium, dianthus, gerbera, verbena, snapdragons, petunias, Shasta daisies, marigolds, phlox and celosia. Alyssum can be tucked into rockeries and chamomile is great at filling patio cracks or anywhere you want a bit of sweet groundcover that gently spills over hard edges for a lovely

softening effect.

Act now to prevent unused areas

If there is a part of the garden you won't be able to use or plant up this year - which can happen for any number of reasons - the risk is it that it becomes covered in weeds and a bit of an eyesore. It can also give you to a good dose of gardener's gloom every time you look at it and see the monumental weeding task growing before your eyes. A simple solution is to sow a green manure crop.

A thickly sown green manure crop (such as millet, Lucerne or clover) covers the soil and keeps the weeds from getting a foothold. But it does far more than that as these crops are also great soil improvers. The deep-rooted green crops such as Lucerne do a fantastic job of

drawing deeply buried nutrients to the surface and improving the soil structure at the same time.

All green manures can be turned in just before flowering to further improve soil structure. You'll replace gardener's gloom with contentment and have a bed ready for autumn planting.

Veggie garden to do list

With your beds prepared over winter and early spring and early plants romping away, November is a great time to get started with main plantings of everything you want to eat in the veggie line.

We can still be caught out by frost until Melbourne Cup day but as long as you keep an eye on the weather forecast and have fleece or other temporary covers ready to go if necessary, you can plant

out lettuces, capsicum, eggplant, leeks, cucumber, climbing and bush beans, squash, sweet corn, zucchini, rocket and successional sowings of carrot and beetroot.

Tender herbs such as basil can be planted outside now too. It also lives quite happily in a pot on the kitchen window sill if you want to keep it really close at hand for last minute additions to summer salads and pizzas. Other staples of the herb garden such as parsley, sage, marjoram, rosemary and thyme are a bit tougher and can be planted earlier in spring but should still thrive if planted this month. Once established they need little supplementary watering.

There is one note of herbal caution - if you are planting lemon balm and mint it really is best to confine them to pots. They are

both thugs and if you let them talk you into putting them in the garden they'll take over in no time at all.

Slip, slop, slap for plants

As the sun gets fiercer some sensitive plants may need a bit of extra protection. You probably won't need it until December/ January but now is the time to think about whether you want to accept the risk or prepare a couple of simple movable shade cloth 'tents' or covers that you can deploy if needs be.


Any plants that you see regularly wilting in the noonday and early afternoon sun such as eggplant and capsicum, are likely to welcome a bit of shade and produce better crops when you reduce heat stress with some temporary shade protection.




In view of the above, I respectfully request a retraction and apology be printed in your next edition.






On Yer Bike Mate

Lancefield Police currently have a girl's pink and white 18 speed mountain bike that was found in Raglan Street. If you are the owner of this bike or know who it might belong to please give me a call on 54 292000. If I am not in leave a message.

Motorbikes For Christmas

I know you don't want to be reminded that Christmas is coming and your bank account is about to take a plunge for the worse. However if you are thinking of buying a motorbike for your son/daughter for Christmas you might like to first consider where they will be able to ride it.

If the person you are buying the Motorbike for is too young to get a Learner's Permit (18 years of age) then the only place they can legally ride unlicensed on Private Property or as a member of a Motorcross Club on club property. The days of riding in the bush without a licence are gone. Having said this when it comes to riding on Private Property it is not that simple either, please read on!

Macedon Ranges Shire Council Local Law No. 10 came into effect on the 25th of September 2013 and limits where Motorbikes and Recreational Vehicles may be used within the Shire.

"motorised recreational vehicle" means all mini bikes, trail bikes, motor bikes, motor scooters, gokarts, motor cars and any other bike or vehicle propelled by a motor which is normally used for recreational purposes, but does not include any vehicle used primarily in respect of primary production, construction or maintenance or motor homes or buses.

The use of these vehicles is controlled as follows by section 24 of Local Law No.10

Motorised Recreation Vehicles (1) A person must obtain a permit to use or allow others to use a motorised recreation vehicle on land owned or occupied by him or her if: (a) that land is within a residential, commercial or industrial zone; or (b) that land is less than 4 hectares. 1. Penalty: 10 Penalty Units (1) Whether a permit is required under sub-clause (1) or not, a person must not use or allow others to use a motorised recreation vehicle on land owned or occupied by him or her, which in the opinion of an authorised officer causes a nuisance

to others because of sound, smell, dust, smoke, soil erosion or any other factor that causes a nuisance. 2. Penalty: 10 Penalty Units (2) In addition to the requirement that the use of a motorised recreation vehicle on land must not cause a nuisance, a person must not use or allow others to use a motorised recreation vehicle on land owned or occupied by him or her: (a) unless it is possible to maintain a 500 metre distance from where the motorised recreation vehicle is being used and any neighbouring dwelling;

(b) unless it is fitted with a muffler that effectively reduces external noise from motor vehicles or motor cycles and a spark arrester; (c) the number of vehicles is no more than 2 motorised recreation vehicles at any one time on land which is less than 20 hectares or no more than 4 motorised recreation vehicles at any one time on any land

greater than 20 hectares; (d) the motorised recreation vehicle is not used continuously for a period in excess of 1 hour after which no motorised recreation vehicle must be used for a minimum 2 hour period; and (d) the motorised recreation vehicle is not used other than between 10am to 6pm Monday to Saturday and 1pm to 4pm on Sundays and public holidays; and (e) on a day declared to be a Total Fire Ban Day under the Country Fire Authority Act 1958. 3. Penalty: 10 Penalty Units Given that one penalty unit is about \$144.36 this is quite a substantial penalty.

As you can see from this By
Law riding in the town is not an
option and even riding on small
acreages could be in breach of this
By Law dependant on the size of the
property and the duration for which
the bike/vehicle is ridden. This By

Law is not that new and there have been restrictions on the riding/ driving of Recreational Vehicles for some years now, but you need to be aware of them before you purchase a recreational vehicle.

My advice is that if you are considering the purchase of a motorbike, for a person too young to get a Learners Permit, make sure you first have somewhere they can ride it.

You need to have someone with a substantial property who is prepared to allow you to ride on their property or alternatively you could join a properly organised Motocross Club and ride on their track.


It is better to know this now as the cost of the bike could be equalled by the cost of the penalty for riding it where you shouldn't.

Council's New Local Law No.10

Macedon Ranges Shire Council recently adopted a new local law that covers a range of activities that impact on the amenity of our community, such as animal keeping, activities on roads and streets, consumption of alcohol in public places, street furniture, burning off and lighting fires.

Some of the key changes as part of the new Local Law No.10 include:

- restrictions around using motorised recreation vehicles on land less than 4 hectares and the times of day at which you can ride and proximity to neighbouring houses
- changes to restrictions on open air burning. Burning off is now

prohibited on land less than 4,000 square metres (one acre).

However the Municipal Fire Prevention Officer can lift restrictions for a period of time for fire prevention purposes and this will be advertised in local newspapers and on Council's website. On land greater than 4,000 square metres, changes have been made to the times when people can burn off and the amount that can be burnt at any one time.

- changes to fencing requirements on building sites that have existing fences
- restrictions on caravans / motorhomes being used as dwellings on vacant land





Romsey & Lancefield Districts Historical Society Inc.

Romsey and Lancefield District Historical Society have a great day planned for Sunday, November 3rd, to celebrate some milestones associated with the historic Seymour Cottage in Romsey.

Sidney Seymour was born in 1813, in Somerset, England. He married Elizabeth Moon in 1840 and they travelled on the Himalaya to Melbourne - quite a perilous journey in that era. After working as a carrier of goods, Sidney and a mate tried their luck on the goldfields. The Romsey Examiner for June 1st, 1900, tells us 'for the first six months he only made rations. Before the end of the year, however, he and his mate had cleared 240 pound each, from gold mostly found in 21 days." Sidney and Elizabeth (Eliza) bought land at the first land sale in Romsey in 1855. They settled with their

family (eventually 10 children) near the Five Mile Creek (now Romsey) and farmed about 300 acres.

The cottage was their home. They erected the dwelling in 1855. During these gold-boom years, many kit houses were imported into Melbourne. They were made from S. E. Asian Meranti, and, according to expert advice from Melbourne University Department of Architecture, the cottage - really a substantial dwelling -appears to be made from left over door panels of these kit houses.

This very special day celebrates 200 years since Sidney Seymour was born in 1813; 100 years since he died in 1913, and yes, he was 100 when he died!

The house and garden have been restored by volunteers and many relics of that pioneering era have been acquired for display. Take the

time to come and browse through the rooms and learn some of the history of the era, see some of the common implements and utensils in use at the time, and get the flavour of the era by joining in some of the simple common games of the time. You will enjoy a tour of the cottage, morning or afternoon tea, or a sausage sizzle lunch. The Cottage, in Palmer Street Romsey, is open from 11 - 3:00 on Sunday, November 3rd.

Elizabeth Moon showed some nous coming out as our Sidney's spouse. They shared sorrows and joys with ten children, 3 boys, and resided in Romsey's first house.
