Powerful Objections to a Transformer The placement of a power transformer on the centre plantation.



Some Information

Streetscape History

- Volunteers from the community and council workers have been working on the Lancefield Streetscape project for ten years.
- The first project, with the suggestion of building toilets on the first plantation, caused a huge upset in the community.
- The latest project has also seen many volunteers and council workers spending many hours consulting with the community, negotiating constant planning hurdles and organising and paying for the work that has been done to date.
- Three years to organise trimming and removing bushes, installing seating, upgrading the kiosk, restoring the rotunda, adding lighting and organising a path (still to be completed) just to have an industrial box stuck in the middle of everything.

Why do we want the transformer relocated?

- · Lancefield's Plantation is unique
- The transformer is here for the long stay it will always be the centrepiece of the township if we don't rally to get it relocated.
- It is an historic plantation which enhances the township – it is about views, trees, relaxation – not industrial metal boxes
- Seating has been purchased that will mirror the seating on either side of the cenotaph it was just waiting for the kiosk to be upgraded before they were installed. The idea that people could sit and contemplate the cenotaph and the view down the plantation is no longer possible.
- · It's a great graffiti surface!
- Suggestions have been made to plant bushes around it – bushes have just been removed to open up the vista of the plantation and stop them being rubbish collection sites.
- Suggestions have been made to put tourist information boards, or advertising around the box – again

a great graffiti surface and will they be an enhancement to the street in ten, twenty or fifty years time - who covers the replacement when they get faded or damaged?

What action are we taking?

- There is a petition circulating for Powercor to relocate the transformer

 not for the Shire to use ratepayers money. The cost for Powercor is minimal.
- Despite the fact that the Shire did approve the site, there were alternatives - it seems hard to believe that Powercor was so insensitive to the location they selected.

The Mayor has said if 1000 signatures are collected he will ask council to support our petition – a big ask in a community of 1200 with 27% of those being under 18 (2006 Census figures).

If you would like to support the effort to have the transformer moved please sign the petition.

Transform Lancefield

I write to advise outcomes and ongoing action in regard to the article on the front page of The Free Press on 1st June 2012 regarding the placement of a power transformer on the centre plantation in Lancefield, MRSC Mayor, Cr Henry McLaughlin stated that "the location is totally inappropriate" and stated that Council had not been consulted in regard to the placement of the transformer and he had requested an urgent on-site meeting with Powercor.

We have since been informed by Cr. McLaughlin and Council Director of Assets and Operations, Mr Dale Thornton that Council was consulted in regard to the placement of the transformer and that it "ticked all the boxes" in regard to engineering requirements. The position the transformer has been placed in was one of

three sites proposed, one of the others being near the toilet block on The Crescent. We have also been informed that Powercor are exempt from any Planning Permit requirements that everyone else is subject to. Apparently, at no time in the consultation or decision making process in regard to the placement of the transformer did alarm bells ring that the centre plantation and indeed the whole of High Street is under a council heritage overlay. It is an area used for the Farmers Market and community events and where we (Community Action Plan Streetscape Committee) intended to place some seating for people to sit and contemplate the cenotaph and the view down the plantation. We were waiting for the extension of the verandah around the Lioness' Kiosk to be completed prior to their installation but we were required to obtain a Building Permit and were waiting for this to

come through.

A petition is being distributed around the community which is showing that most residents and visitors to Lancefield feel very strongly that the transformer should be moved. Cr Henry McLaughlin the Mayor, is fully supporting our efforts to have the transformer moved and we hope to have support from the whole council after their next meeting later this month. We want Powercor to take responsibility for being so insensitive to the community. We would also like there to be a review of the rights for Powercor to build wherever they like without having a check list to cover items such as heritage overlays or community wishes. We would also like to see some process within Macedon Ranges Shire Council to prevent a similar situation arising again.

"To make democracy work, we must be a nation of participants, not simply observers. One who does not vote has no right to complain" Louis L'Amour. I wonder what the American author would make of the Lowy Institute survey that shows many Australians are quite indifferent about democracy and younger Australians in particular do not believe democracy is the best form of government. Of those aged 18 to 29, 23 % believe that it doesn't matter what kind of government we have. They believe that 'it doesn't matter what kind of government we have" 37 % say non democratic rule can be best, and only 39 % believe

democracy is better than other forms of government.

This disconnection of young people from the political system is a problem. While they may seek to excuse themselves from political engagement they are possibly more affected by the outcomes of the democratic process than others. The impact of political decisionsn today will have a decisive and cumulative effect on their socioeconomic circumstances across their lifetimes. Are they disengaged because we have a stable political system, they don't like the major

political parties, or is it just youthful boredom? What will it take for our younger citizens to embrace and participate in democracy and how do engage them? I am interested in your thoughts.






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

We Can All Help Prevent Crime

You may have seen recent Road Safety media releases about "We Are The Toll". In the same way we can all do our bit to reduce road trauma, by not drink/drug driving, reducing our speed, and avoiding becoming fatigued. We can also all do our bit to reduce the rate of crime in our community.

Recent statistics collated within our region have indicated that a large number of offences could easily have been prevented by simple measures. In many cases where thefts of cars or from cars have occurred, the vehicles were not locked. Similarly many homes that are burgled are not locked.

This relaxed attitude is to an extent symptomatic of living in the country and feeling removed from crime. The media often concentrates on events that occur in the city and as such we grow even more complacent.

We all need to recognise that all these thefts are costing our community. There are increased insurance premiums, increased police man hours spent investigating crimes that could be spent preventing road trauma and the fact that a lot of items stolen, in particular jewellery that has a sentimental value, can never be replaced.

So what are we going to do about it?

Being more aware of locking up cars and houses is the first and easiest step, but there are other things we can do to make our homes more secure. Not every idea will suit everyone but there are lots of ideas and doing something is better than doing nothing.

There is nothing however to stop you putting your head lights on (low beam) early in the morning, in the evening or even during the middle of the day when the gloom of winter is upon us.



The Worst Journey In The World

by Apsley Cherry-Garrard RRP \$26.95

This is my favourite book It is story of Captain Scotts'

last expedition to Antarctica, told by one of its members. Apsley Cherry-Garrard was an enthusiastic contributor and was also closely involved in the final loss and eventual search for Scott's party that made it to the South Pole (only to find that Roald Amundsen had got there before them). Apsley is obviously an admirer and staunch defender of Scott and writes beautifully and with great emotion, about his experiences. His agonizing choice about whether to wait any longer at the depot for the lost party and thus risk his own life, and his

eventual decision to go back to base, obviously haunted him into old age. His description of the search for the bodies of his comrades and his earlier near-disastrous trip to Cape Crozier (with two of those who would later perish in the polar party) to collect Emperor Penguin eggs in the middle of winter is harrowing and very compelling. He also includes many details and his views on the practical workings of a polar expedition in the early 1900s, as well as many passages from Scott's own diary and those of other members of the expedition.

This book stands as a complete record of an expedition that became famous mainly as a tragic story, but was seen by Cherry-Garrard as much more than just a story of a simple race with a winner and a loser. I recommend this book to anyone with an interest in polar exploration and I rate it as highly as Shackleton's, South.

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Vanessa's Garden

Following on from last month, I want to expand on tree planting. Proper soil preparation when planting new trees is key to giving them a flying start. The size of the hole, the depth of planting and the nutrients/soil you backfill the planting hole with are the three main points.

Done well they will all contribute to the strength and health of the tree and by extension, to the quality of flowers and fruit.

The planting hole needs to be wide, wider than the root ball by some3-5 cm all round and this is to help the roots spread. If the tree has particularly long roots you can either trim them or make sure the hole is big enough that you don't have to bend them to fit. Bent roots may grow in a spiral and fail to provide the tree with strong and balanced support.

The hole should be no deeper than the current soil level in the pot which you bought your tree in, or if bare-rooted, no deeper than the soil mark on the tree trunk. If you dig too deep a hole you'll generally find yourself in poorer quality subsoil, which won't help the tree take hold. If there's no help for it and you find this layer closer to the surface than you'd like, then make the hole a bit bigger, take out a generous amount of this poor stuff and replace with good soil from elsewhere in the garden.

Clay can be a particular

problem in this regard. Should you have set your heart on planting your new tree in a spot which proves to be cold, sticky clay as soon as you lift the first shovelful (and you'll know by the weight and difficulty of lifting that shovel) planting can still be successful but a bit more work is required.

Simply removing a holes worth of clay and filling with better soil can often mean the tree ends up standing in a pool of freezing water, as the surrounding clay acts a bit like a well and the tree is likely to die. While it is still worth replacing the soil, you should also either create a mound, so that the tree is planted higher, or insert simple drainage so that any surplus water has somewhere to go.

Like all young things, baby trees need extra feed. My old granddad started his tree planting preparations several weeks in advance of the big day. The dogs would be regularly groomed within an inch of their lives and the hair carefully stored or failing that he'd have the feathers of any chook heading for the pot. These would be dropped into the base of the planting hole with a heavy dusting of dolomite on top. He would finish this off with a layer of good soil (even using the upside down turf from where the planting hole had been opened) and then plant the tree on top.

Elaborate yes, but it always

produced good results as the baby tree had a slow-release supply of calcium and other vital trace elements to draw on.

The final thing to do before placing the tree in its hole, is to bang in a wooden stake for support in the first couple of years. Wood please, not metal. Although wood may rot quicker than metal, it won't transmit heat/cold down to the roots in the way that metal

On placing the tree in its hole, backfill with a couple of shovels of good soil and then agitate the trunk to settle the soil so that there are no air pockets under or in between the roots. Firm gently with your boot and cover the roots with another shovel of soil.

When the roots are covered you can add a light handful of blood and bone and then about a half bucket of water to help settle the soil. When that has soaked in continue backfilling with soil until you've reached the top of the hole, carefully firming with your boot every so often.

Tie the tree to its stake with a suitable tie, either something which will rot quickly or an adjustable tie, to avoid it cutting into the trunk. Finally, prune the tree to outward facing buds, place a tree guard if necessary to avoid browsing wildlife and look forward to new life bursting forth in the spring.

We need to talk about Kevin is fictional, although the personality and traits of Kevin and his mother, Eva (who is the narrator), may be loosely based on real people. After all, there are numerous mentions of real life experiences of high school shootings and massacres. The story is a series of letters written by Eva to her husband, although she never sends them, in which she reflects on Kevin and tries to answer the question - was it all her fault? The letters recount details of Kevin as an extremely manipulative and calculating child, even at the age of 3 years old he is able to plot revenge against his mother. Eva details conversations she has had with Kevin as a child and these conversations give Kevin a sense of intelligence and rationality which doesn't seem to fit with the behaviour of a 'normal' child of comparative age, but then again, perhaps this is exactly the point? Do we question the accuracy and perspective of Eva as she recounts her memories or alternatively do we challenge our own ideas of what is 'normal'?

Furthermore, the debate of nuture vs nature is essentially the basis of this book, if Eva had done something different, would Kevin be different? If she had loved him more, would he have done what he did? OR would it all be exactly the same?

the ground is not only extremely dangerous, but reflects badly on the club and when caught by the

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



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New Community Projects Funded

Macedon Ranges Shire Council has welcomed a funding announcement by Parliamentary Secretary for Regional Development, Damian Drum, today for the development of community infrastructure in Bullengarook, Carlsruhe and Lancefield. In addition to the \$276K committed by the Victorian Government, Council will make a combined in-kind and cash contribution of \$140K towards the community projects, bringing the total funding commitment from state and local government to \$416K.

The community projects include upgrades to a range of infrastructure to support community recreation and events in the three towns. Mayor, Cr Henry McLaughlin said he was pleased that Council was able to work with the state government to support local communities in achieving some of the goals in their community plans:

"These projects have been driven by community needs and priorities and Council is pleased to be able to support them, both in applying for state funding on the communities' behalf and in making a direct contribution to these projects," he said.

The community planning groups also welcomed the funding announcement and are looking forward to informing their town residents that these projects will be implemented.

The community projects involve:

- upgrading the Bullengarook Recreation
 Reserve for it to host community and equestrian
 events by improving driveway access, installing new
 toilets and upgrading existing facilities such as the
 Old School Hall building and stage
- upgrading the Carlsruhe Yelka Park and surrounds by installing public seating, walking trails, car parking, toilets and indigenous cultural interpretative signage
- upgrading community facilities in Lancefield by constructing a performance space in the common, improving the Mechanics Hall, walking/cycling path network and undertaking a feasibility study to investigate the capacity of the Laurie Green Pavilion at Lancefield Park to host events.
