Weather Comment 15-1-12

It seems no time since my last article, how time flies. No figures this month just some general remarks about our changeable weather - last week it felt as though Winter had returned with the heater on for a couple of nights and now promising to return to Summer conditions. Again if we look back to this time last year much of the country was being devastated by the floods that occurred at that time and from which many places have not totally recovered.

Very little to report on the farm front, cattle numbers are as before and the cattle are not progressing as I had hoped, so with an abundance of hay I am considering starting to give them some supplementary feed in the near future. It means a drawn out commitment but should produce satisfactory results in the way of weight gains. The Dorpers seem to handle the hot conditions and it is not unusual to see them camped in the sun during the day. We sold the first-cross ewes at a very large Special Ewe sale in Kyneton and have replaced them with some first-cross ewe lambs which we will grow out and again put them back on the market at the same sale next year.

The garden as is usual at this time of year is looking a bit ordinary though there is still some colour from roses and gladioli. We continue to harvest our beans also planted some more seedlings to keep the supply going. A couple of ripe tomatoes but these plants along with the onions are not doing as well as we would expect. However we keep trying.

I send my thanks to all those who read my weather comment and for your kind remarks when we meet.

LANCEFIELD FIRE BRIGADE

At the time of writing we have had a quiet start to the fire season and with support of all the residents this should continue through the Summer period. Please be aware that any suspicious fires during this period will be reported to the Police who will decide what further action may be taken. The other regulation that is often overlooked is the requirement for any machinery that is in contact or in the vicinity of flammable material, such as dry grass, leaves etc MUST be fitted with an efficient muffler and also carry a fire fighting knapsack or a 9 litre fire extinguisher fully charged with water. This is usually taken to be tractors, utes etc but it is also applicable to ride-on mowers hand mowers and such that are being used in the conditions as mentioned previously. It is also a good idea to regularly clean any grass clippings from the deck of ride-on mowers as there can be a build up of debris which can ignite and provide fuel if anything goes

Please when reporting a fire or other incident make sure that the correct information is given to the operator as this is vital and enables the Brigade to reach the scene as quickly as possible. You may be asked for a street or rural road number, a cross road/street to enable the operator to establish a reference point again to enable a quick and accurate response.

I stress again the importance of this information to all concerned

Is there Platypus in my Waterway?

Have you ever wondered if platypus live in your local river or creek? Learn more about the wonderful world of the platypus at information sessions to be presented by Port Phillip and Western Port CMA in partnership with Newham and District Landcare Group, Jacksons Creek Enviro Network and the Wallan Environment group. Join guest speaker Geoff Williams as he leads you on a walk through a platypus habitat. Afterwards, Geoff will discuss information and incentives to help landholders and community groups to protect platypus, encourage them to live in local waterways and monitor their presence. 

Wombats enjoy creek home 'renovation'

More than 15 years of work to restore natural vegetation around Romsey's Deep Creek has been given the tick of approval by some important local residents - wombats. Investigations last month by Western Water and Deep Creek Landcare Group led to the discovery of wombat burrows by the creek, the first sighting of the animals in many years. "We had found burrows in the area and wanted to check what kind of animals were using them before beginning a program of fox and rabbit baiting," Western Water's Managing Director, John Wilkinson, says.

"We set up a night vision camera with a motion detector, and were pleased to find that we had recorded wombats as well as the expected pest species."

Camera footage shows wombats digging and feeding on grass, with one ambling up to the camera lens for a closer inspection.

"There are two wombat dens, each with multiple holes, which suggests we have at least two families living and breeding in the area," Mr Wilkinson says. "This is a great reward for many years

of work removing willows and other weeds, and replanting the area with indigenous vegetation to create a habitat for native wildlife. Other animals that have taken up residence around the creek include echidnas, swamp wallabies and kangaroos."

Western Water owns 3km of creek frontage along Deep Creek as part of the Romsey Recycled Water Plant site.

"This is one of many creek frontages on Western Water property around the region, and groups and Melbourne Water on projects to remove weeds and revegetate," Mr Wilkinson says. to Melbourne Water, is used to fund these kinds of projects."

Victoria backing efforts for national plan to cut waste

The Victorian Government is backing a call for community input to help develop a national plan to reduce packaging and litter and to improve resource recovery. Parliamentary Secretary for Sustainability and Environment Donna Petrovich is encouraging public comment on a new consultation paper that examines options to cut waste.

A Regulatory Impact Statement (RIS) released last December by Australia's environment ministers examined the merits of various models including container deposit and industry-funded schemes. All industry and stakeholder groups throughout Northern Victoria are urged to contribute their views on these waste reduction options. The RIS considers seven options to improve resource recovery and reduce litter associated with a wide range of consumer packaging, including food wrappers and beverage containers.

Public consultation with industry and stakeholder groups on the RIS will occur in February 2012 with submissions due by 30 March 2012. The RIS can be found at: www.ephc.gov.au/product_stewardship/ packaging_impacts



Bank chair Tim McCarthy announced that 19 local groups would share more than \$26,000 in "community investment" funds for worthy projects. The funding is on top of \$24,000 to be handed out in sponsorships to local clubs and groups this year. A further \$14,000 will be allocated to our local emergency services, including our CFAs. Mr McCarthy said an independent panel of prominent local residents assessed applications for the "community investment" grants, and their recommendations were assessed by the Bank.

WOMEN

Women are important in life. One only has to see what happens in countries where women have no place in society. In the few years that I have lived in Lancefield I have witnessed the important role women play. The women of Lancefield are of course no different from those anywhere else. Not only in this town do they play their role, but in society in general. For a man, it may be risky to write about women, especially in a country town. Are we men biased? Maybe, but I've been living more than eighty years amongst females, so I dare to have a go just the same.

Some writings tell us that Eve was created from a rib from Adam. My local doctor tells me that both women and men have 24 ribs. Yet women are not equal to men. Some women want equality with men. This can never happen because women are different. The biological division makes a woman

dependent on a man. This is not meant to be derogatory, because men depend equally on women. Over history women have always been subordinate to men. In ancient times women were no more than slaves. Not only to one man, but sometimes to many or even whole tribes of men. In present day times, women are more equal.

Women are mentally different. In normal life situations they are less competitive then men and women are usually better at evaluating risk. Researchers at the Radboud University in the Netherlands found that a man's brain performs less well when they see or talk to a woman they fancy. Most women are oblivious to this. But it means that women have power over men. Many women use this advantage, unknowingly through coquetry, flirting or her charm. Although a man thinks he is the "boss", he can be a slave to his sexuality. But

to her liking. This is mentally and physically absorbing. Yet it creates an even greater love for each other. If selfishness from either the man or the woman or even of both enters this equation, the whole process collapses. In such a case either partner can completely destroy each 🤌 other. This happens even in peaceful towns, like Lancefield.

Because women are also physically different, their life offers different tasks and responsibilities. One woman finds satisfaction in housekeeping and/or bringing up kids, another in the excitement of adventure. The natural purpose of humans is procreation, to produce offspring and it is normal that both men and women want their children to grow into better citizens than themselves. 
As a man, I found women fascinating. They are certainly different, physically and mentally and thank goodness for that.



Vanessa's Garden

Over the last couple of months I'm pleased to say there have been some successes in the new vegie garden, notably tomatoes, beans and courgettes although the soil still needs a lot of improvement. The bed with the most clay in it has hosted root crops to help break up the ground and predictably they haven't done very well as crops, but they are helping break up the soil. The newspaper and compost mulch has made a difference but there's a way to go yet. I've needed to help the plants along with regular drafts of liquid fertilizer this year.

Blossom-end Rot can crop up on tomatoes about now. It happens if the plants dry out and then get a sudden heavy watering and the best solution is simply to water consistently if you can. A good deep water followed by mulch will help stop them drying out too. You can draw the mulch right up to the stem, as that doesn't seem to cause stem rot in tomatoes like it can do with trees. The hot compost heap under its straw blanket certainly worked in terms of producing a good amount of rich compost for the garden. However at this elevation I'm not convinced it was necessarily any faster than any other method. On the other hand the straw blanket did stop any weeds getting hold on top and it all looked neat and tidy while it was transforming.Companion planting appears to have helped my baby lemon tree settle in, as both tree and the under-planted lavender are thriving. However I couldn't honestly put hand on heart and say that I've seen much improvement from putting the carrots and leeks together. The garlic and roses have been a great success. The roses which have had garlic round them have not needed spraying for aphids

at all. If I do have to spray later on, I'm going to try the old recipe of boiling a good double handful of rhubarb leaves in about 2 litres of water. Strain and cool. Squirt a drop of detergent in and this will do for the aphids without harming the

I'm giving the young lemon a weekly water at the moment and a good feed of a slow fertilizer (such as blood and bone) once in January and again this month. As it is such a baby tree I've also steeled myself to cut off its first fruit so that the tree puts its energy into getting established. So far no sign of scale but if I do see the characteristic sooty mould then a diluted white oil spray should sort them out.

Olives, bit of a mystery there. We have had a tiny amount of fruit set on our two (youngish) trees and I'm not sure why - is it just the wind ripping the flowers apart before they had time to set?

Weeds of course are a constant battle. I'm trying not to give in and use glyphosate, so I'm out there with the boiling water to tackle weeds in the gravel and brickwork and wielding a hoe between plant rows. Little and often is the key.

Mid-February is also a great time to start planting winter vegies. Carrots sown now should germinate quickly and be a reasonable size by May. Carrots should not go into ground that has recently been heavily fertilized or they will fork and, if possible, try

not to let the ground dry out while they are germinating.

Finally for this month, make sure stone fruit are fully ripe before harvesting as they will not sweeten up after picking. The exception to this is if you are going to bottle them, in which case do pick slightly early.


