

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Weather Comment 14-7-12

No El Nino!

It seems I got carried away last month with the prediction in the rural press of an El Nino effect for the coming Spring. My article would have hardly reached the Editor before it began to rain with about 60mm during the next week and this has been followed by 50mm two weeks later and with some minor falls in between giving a total for the month of 125mm.

The paddocks are now showing some soft patches and it is time to watch where I drive on parts of the farm. The springs are flowing and this too is a good sign for the coming season. Another indicator

appeared when I had the fence replaced here at home - the old post holes were filling with water when the posts were removed and most of the new posts were able to be driven without the need for digging pilot holes for them.

The mention of El Nino has not entirely gone away with the report of some of the signs still showing up on the wider scale weather patterns so at this stage the situation is inconclusive .

In the future my remarks about stock will be based on my observations of other people's stock as we have leased the farm

and will have only a small number of cattle and the sheep to report on and there will not be anything this month.

The report from the garden is much the same as last month, the vegie patch has been forked over and some gypsum added to hopefully make the soil less sticky, however it will not be long before planting can start . The rose pruning has been finished and there is an occasional flowering shrub in flower around the town. Spring is coming.


of the Bank.

Women on boards: breaking the glass ceiling with a board

There was a time when corporate Australia thought that working women would be the end of civilisation as we know it and women were asked to leave work if they married or reached the ripe old age of 35. Thankfully we have come a long way from those times and I hear some say, we have a woman Prime Minister, a woman Governor General and a woman Premier and numerous women in parliament, what else do women want? Yet the number of women on the top 200 Australian corporate boards is just 14 per cent. Do we really believe that more than 50 per cent of the population representing 70 per

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Vanessa's Garden

As we are in a cooler region, August could be a great time of year to get going if you want to make a rock garden. Big or small, they are very versatile and. when built well, go a long way towards creating a helpfully lowmaintenance area of the garden. If you like the idea of looking out at rocks, gravel and specimen plants, and you have a relatively small garden, you could even consider making the whole space into a rock garden.

The only qualifications with rock gardens are that they need full sun and good drainage. This makes them ideal for a sloping area of the garden that you might otherwise just leave to grass. If the drainage is not ideal in your garden, or your patch is flat, generally this can be overcome by building a mound. The core of this can be strengthened with rubble, if you have or can get hold of some.

In planning a rockery you'll need rocks of various sizes. The biggest should not overwhelm the space, unless you are going for something dramatic, such as a standing stone effect, which will draw the eye and be something of a focal point. Also of course, if you have a really big boulder, you are likely to need mechanical aid or at least 3 strong backs to manoeuvre it into place.

Generally therefore, it may be easier to stick to rocks of a size you can handle yourself. This also makes it much simpler to try out various groups and placements until you get the effect that feels right to you. The idea is for your rockery to look reasonably like a natural outcropping. If you're stuck for ideas, a drive out to Tooborac or Pyalong will show you something of the granite bones of the area and give you an idea how Mother Nature goes about things. Of course, these boulders are on a very large scale! But shrink the clusters a bit in your mind and you'll get a general feel for what looks natural and what doesn't. That said, in the end it's your garden and you're the one who is going to live with it, and look at it on a daily basis, so if you want to put rocks in tight groups or lines, it's up to you.

Rockeries also look more natural when a fair proportion of the rocky bones are softened by growth. It might be that you can source older rocks that are already weathered, but if you have to buy stone from somewhere, the chunks can look quite raw. While time will take care of that, you can speed up the process by covering the exposed surfaces with a coat of starchy water. This will give lichens a foothold.

In placing rocks, make sure you leave large enough spaces to create planting areas and pockets. You'll also need to use a particular soil mix. Rather than the type of fertile humus-rich soil you might expect to use in ordinary garden beds or the veggie garden, you need a very well drained mix, with plenty of fine gravel. You can start off with ordinary garden soil (as little clay as possible) but for best results you should add up to 50% fine gravel and quite a bit of decayed plant material. Garden compost may do the job or you can buy something like a peat moss. The idea is that this well-drained mix simulates the environment that rockery plants would thrive in naturally.

You should not mulch a rock garden with organic material, as the typical alpine plants don't like it. You'll typically get a much better result with fine gravel, spread to about 3-5 cm thick.

Choice and mix of plants is of course down to your taste, but rockeries tend to show off best plants such as dwarf conifers and small alpines. There is a great variety to choose from, depending on your height and spread requirements and whether you want your plants to creep, tumble or grow in mounds and tufts.

Local schools which have registered and/or started the eSmart program are: Sunbury and Macedon Ranges Specialist School, Sunbury Downs Secondary


College and Sunbury Heights, Killara, Bolinda, Lancefield, Gisborne and Romsey Primary Schools.





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Macedon Ranges receives \$30,000 boost to bushfire resilience

Minister for Planning, Matthew Guy has approved funding for Macedon Ranges Shire to ensure planning, training and appropriate mitigation measures are in place to better protect the Shire from bushfire threat, Donna Petrovich said today.

In February the Victorian Coalition Government invited councils to share in \$800,000 to support the new bushfire planning provisions introduced last year to increase the protection of communities from bushfires. Macedon Ranges Shire Council is one of 16 councils across Victoria to have received funding through an expression of interest process.

The Coalition Government recognises that the Macedon Ranges region in one of the State's most bushfire-prone areas, said Mrs Petrovich. This funding will

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complement the range of Coalition Government programs and initiatives to minimise the risk of bushfire to the communities in the Macedon Ranges.

Macedon Ranges Shire Council has received \$30,000 to help communities better understand the need for bushfire planning provisions and the role they play in making communities more fire resilient. The project will ensure landowners are familiar with the requirements of building in bushfire areas.

Mrs Petrovich said the funding will also facilitate property inspections to verify whether landholders are maintaining their properties in a fire-ready condition. Property maintenance and vegetation management are important factors in reducing the risk of bushfire and planning permits issued in a Bushfire

Management Overlay include a condition that bushfire mitigation measures must be maintained on a continuing basis.

Mrs Petrovich said that the Macedon Ranges community would also reap the benefits of other funded bushfire projects including CFA funding to assist landowners with planning permit applications, work towards a national standard for construction of community fire refuges, and training for council officers and industry practitioners in bushfire building, planning and design.

A collaborative approach between the State Government, the Macedon Range Shire Council and the community will greatly improve the effectiveness of bushfire mitigation programs in the Macedon Ranges region, said Mrs Petrovich.

After reducing our fees 12 months ago the decision to keep them at the same rate was a very positive step towards making tennis one of the most affordable family sports. So what are the fees?

A Family Membership will cost a maximum of \$215 for twelve months. This includes your insurance and registration. So two adults and it doesn't matter if your family has three kids or a dozen, the maximum you will pay is \$215. This is great value.

A Single Adult Membership will cost only \$130 which includes insurance.

A Junior Membership will cost only \$80 which includes insurance.

A Social Membership for those that just want to come and have a hit whenever they feel like it but not play any competition will cost you only \$55 and also includes your insurance.

We have also introduced a "new" Affiliated Membership - If you are already a member at another club (have paid Tennis Vic Registration and Insurance) but also wish to be a member at Lancefield you pay only \$25.

As a club we have been working very hard at fundraising for the new courts over the past 12 months. In the coming year we are concentrating on making tennis more fun and providing more opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to play tennis. There will be more social evenings to enjoy over summer. There will also be more tournaments and coaching for the juniors and opportunities for the seniors to play competition tennis.
