Children of Courage Award

Lancefield Romsey Lions club hosted a Children of Courage Award last month. This was the first for this year. (Remembering our Lions year starts in July) These awards were introduced in 1983 to acknowledge a special group of young Australians and their families in the hope that such recognition would act as encouragement for their future, help them to believe in themselves and increase their self-worth.

To be eligible for an award a child needs to be between the ages of five and fifteen. Children of Courage Awards are awarded in three categories:


 Special needs, Children with special needs who have shown courage in the face of adversity. This includes disabled children, or those who have undergone long periods of medical treatment, surgery or hospitalisation, causing pain or trauma.

 Bravery, Children who, without regard for personal safety, have been instrumental in the preservation of life and/or property, or who have rendered assistance in an accident, or whose concern for others is worthy of recognition.

 Sporting, Children who have overcome personal hardship and/ or disadvantage to achieve a high degree of sporting prowess, either individually or as a team member.

This award is given to these children so that they can be recognised with an Inscribed Plaque, Inscribed Trophy and a Lions Teddy.

The recipient to get this award was Eliza Consiglio from Lancefield. Her parents Christine and Colin and other family members were joined by many of the Lions club members to



see Eliza receive her award. Eliza's journey began back in 2007 she had been seriously unwell for several months, previous that had led to two separate hospital admissions. Eliza had a Sacrococcygeal teratoma (A tumour at the base of her coccyx bone) Stage 1V which has been removed. The tumour took the space of her whole pelvic cavity and had spread to her lungs, spine and ribs.

Eliza has endured endless stays in hospital, needles, general anaesthetics, blood Transfusions, over hundreds of diagnostic tests and the list goes on and on, without the major player of all being the intensive chemotherapy. Today we see a determined, bright, cheeky little girl who has proven beyond all doubt what it means to have courage and give everything her best shot.

The Children of Courage Awards are an important and worthwhile annual project for the Lancefield Romsey Lions Club. Council elections

One month out from the opening of nominations for council elections, the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV) is calling on prospective candidates to make the decision to stand. Mr Rob Spence, CEO of the MAV said that it was important to have diverse representation around the council decision-making table that was reflective of our diverse communities.

"Over 750 local government election hopefuls have now attended candidate information sessions across Victoria, with a further 22 sessions still to run before nominations open on 20 September.

Standing for council is a great way to contribute and directly influence a better future for your local area."Being a good councillor is not about your age, gender or occupation. Each individual's perspective is valued and relevant. The breadth of councillors' diverse experiences, energy and insights can help to improve outcomes for the community. Regardless of whether you want to put your hand up to nominate for council elections, August is the time to check your details on the voters' roll. Voting is compulsory at council elections if you're on the State electoral roll for an address where there will be a council election.

"You can also apply to be included on a voters' roll if you own property within a municipality but are not a resident; or if you're an occupier who pays rates - usually a tenant or business owner. If you previously applied to be on a voters' roll, you will need to re-enrol if you're still eligible as your enrolment is only valid for one election cycle. Voters have until 4pm on 31 August to check they're on the voters' roll and their details are correct," he said.

Hall happenings

Our committee has been busy behind the scenes over the last few months and would like to take this opportunity to update you from our end. The Mechanics Hall committee were very excited to hear they were successful in gaining a \$4000 grant from Macedon Ranges Shire Council. This will enable us to move forward and have our master plan completed by an external company.

I attended the announcement ceremony in Gisborne and saw many faces from Lancefield and surrounds who were also successful with their submissions. Congratulations to you all.

We now have a gated area for our bins and the key for this gate will be available to you when hiring the hall. The hall committee were

also successful in getting some funding from DSE to fix a drainage problem in the kitchen, this is now piped directly to the septic and avoids overflow into the grease trap. We have bypassed the meter system for the heating in the hall, this now eliminates the need to use the coin meters when running the heating in the venue. We are also currently in discussion with the Macedon Ranges Council to have new heating installed. We look forward to the outcome of these discussions and will update you once we have news.

The Committee have also been working closely with the NHH who have agreed to provide funding for blinds in the annex area of the hall for privacy purpose. We look forward to moving forward on this

and have the blinds installed as soon as possible.

As many of you may be aware we have had the floor upgraded in the main hall. We have had some teething problems re the cleaning of the floor after functions. All users need to read the instructions provided for cleaning the floor to ensure it is kept to the standard it is now. Using products on the floor puts a sticky film on it, please avoid using any detergents or floor cleaners in the hall.

We have a new phone number, including an email address and a texting option is available for hall bookings. New signs have been made, and are currently being erected to ensure the number is clearly visible to hall users. Flyers have also been distributed around

We do plan to move forward with a large refit once our master plan has been completed and grants can be sourced and approved. Until then all these works being completed are very much needed and take many hours of negotiation and perseverance.

Volunteer Emergency Services benefit from equipment grants

Volunteer emergency services in the Macedon Ranges Shire will share in a \$11.95 million. Government investment in operational equipment, vehicles and amenities upgrades. Newstead CFA, Romsey CFA, Benloch CFA, Woodend SES and St John Ambulance Australia -Woodend Division were among 261 volunteer emergency services units across Victoria to receive funding under the 2012/2013 Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP), Romsey CFA will receive \$55,000 for Field Command Vehicles, Benloch CFA will receive \$1,000 for amenities upgrades, Woodend SES will receive \$25,819 for Homatro Rapid Intervention Kits and St John Ambulance Australia - Woodend Division will receive \$1500 for Heartstart defibrillator training, pads and administrative support.







WEATHER COMMENT 11-8-12

I am writing this a little earlier than usual due to commitments next week but I don't expect it will have a big effect on this article .A thank you to Craig for the additional heading on last month's comment, it created a bit more of an impact in regards to the remarks about El Nino which of late is not being mentioned in the rural press .The winter as we all know has been cold and wet much like the winters we used to expect years ago. Perhaps my memory is not what it used to be but I can remember lambing times when we were cold and soaking wet day after day.

There has been no shortage of rain again this month with a total to date of 56mm but also has been variable in the district. The Deep Creek has been quite full at times although it has not flooded as yet. As we travel to Kyneton we also noticed the Campaspe flowing strongly but again not flooding.

Looking back at last year's figures

I saw that we were heading into a lower rainfall period for about a month or so but this does not look like being the case this year. The report on the stock is still minimal, too soon to make any judgement on the lessees cattle and little change as far the sheep are concerned.

We have put one of last year's Dorper lambs in the freezer but have not sampled it as yet. A few more flowers in the garden now as Spring approaches with camellias and japonicas adding their colour plus the garrya with its catkins and little correas that the wattle birds and the honeyeaters enjoy.

The ever reliable bulbs are doing their bit to brighten the grey days, also pansies and violets [pink and blue]. The brightest display at the moment is being produced by the anemones. Gardening is not on the agenda at the moment but when the weather warms up we will be back into it.





Training continues on a priority basis and we have received a new Training Discussion Paper via D.V.D and this is being worked through as part of our training programme We have also received a newsletter from the Chief Officer expressing regret over the events at Fiskville and sorrow for the pain and stress it has caused. The C.F.A. states that it will implement all the recommendations from the Professor Joy Report and are proposing another eleven actions that they will also put in place. Hygienists and environmental management experts have been engaged and advise that there is no evidence to support the closure of Fiskville .C.F.A.will be instituting a regime of individual health monitoring and further retrospective health studies are proposed. C.F.A. Sunday will be held this year on November 25th when many Brigades will be open .

FREEDOM

How refreshing to read Joanne's in restricting liberty and freedom. piece on the indifference of young Modern societies have difficulty in Australians, about democracy. Yes adjusting to freedom and Australia "most children excuse themselves

from political engagement". Why? Because we have it so good. Abraham Lincoln said: "Ruled by the people for the people". A democratic system gives citizens the most freedom. Freedom refers to a relation of human beings to other human beings. Some people live for others, but

as in nature, the majority lives

for themselves. Society is an

environment where "survival of the fittest" rules.

One of the great advantages of democracy is that it gives us not only liberty and freedom of action, but also freedom of thought. Liberty is the absence of control and coercion, by others.

What we don't know is often more important than what we know. Yet children can learn from experiences and history is part of that. Of course we haven't complete control over liberty and freedom, as far as choice is concerned. We have very little freedom over the function of our bone marrow, a bit more over the function of our lungs and a lot more about the choice, what we want to do, read or see.

There are however great dangers

is not immune to this. Coercion is evil and it corrupts the individual, as a tool of others. It reduces us into bondage or slavery. In the early days, there were traditional limits on behaviour. One mainly obeyed the laws of the King/Queen or ruler.

Nowadays some organizations like governments, trade unions, student organizations, sporting clubs, monopolies and the like, think they have the right to exclusive privileges.

However there can only be a free society, if there is no coercion, except in the case of the laws of the land.

There used to be a certain innocence towards behaviour and parents played a big part, in instilling self-control and frugality, in their off-spring. Religious observance was meant to lead people, to a happier life. The more freedom we get the more we lose sight of the comfort there is, in alleviating distress. Nowadays there is, less guidance towards individual acts.

In 1776, Adam Smith, a scholar in moral philosophy, wrote: "Money is a powerful force towards responsibility

and self restraint. But when life is stimulated with credit, responsibility and behaviour is often thrown out of the window". When Henry Kiesinger came to Australia, to promote the creditcard, It created an ideology of spending, helped by modern technology, such as ATM, Internet banking, email shopping etc.. This led people from their spending constrains, towards more consumption on credit, instead of saving "for a rainy day". It put many people into debt.

Even a long time ago, Charles Darwin wrote, in the 'Origin of Species', "No man can be free, who is in debt". Did we listen? People talk about deficits, as if they are a normal phenomena, but they are actually a shortfall of money. The results are inundation by mountains of debts, not only for individuals, but for Councils, States and even whole countries. If one cannot repay one's debts, freedom is lost. Lack of freedom is merely a license to exploit.

Let us hope that our younger generations recognizes the freedom they have under our democratic system. Otherwise we won't be able to freely, write such words as

The maximum assistance available for each eligible activity is \$15,000 with the total assistance provided not exceeding \$50,000. Another Scam

A local resident has reported that he recently received a phone call from a person with an Indian accent stating he was from a Government Department. He went on to advise the resident that his pension had been underpaid by \$5000 and if he gave his bank details they would arrange for the money to be deposited into his account. The local resident was quick on the uptake and told the caller that Centrelink already had his bank details so they wouldn't need them. He further suggested that as the caller had his phone and address details he could send out a cheque as payment of the outstanding amount. The caller said, "I suppose we could too." And then hung up. Needless to say no cheque has been received. The caller did give the resident a contact phone number with an 02 prefix and a call reference number.

When the resident tried to call the number it was not connected.

These scams are becoming more and more common all the time. The rule of thumb is do not give our account details to anyone over the phone or internet who contacts you. If someone does contact you and asks for these details, get as many details as you can and then try to confirm the information by calling them back. Or finding another means of confirming the information they have given you. If they are part of a scam the information will not stand up to scrutiny.

It Pays To Stay Legal And Use Your Cruise Control.

In these difficult financial times we are all looking for something we can rely on. One thing you can rely on at the end of the financial year is that the fines for traffic offences will increase. The fine for speeding between 10 - 25 kph over the limit has gone up from \$244 to \$282 and of course the loss of three

demerit points. If you sneak up to more than 25 kph over the speed limit you are now looking at \$387 4 demerit points and one month's suspension.

Driving an Unregistered car is now \$704.

Driving when not the holder of a Drivers Licence is also \$704

If ever you were looking for a good reason to set that cruise control at 5 below the speed limit, this is it. It's safer for you and other road users, it will save you fuel, and it will certainly save you money if it prevents you from being booked for speeding. It makes sense,

I often shake my head when I see a flash new car with a perfectly good cruise control and the driver says to me, "I didn't realise I was speeding." It reminds me of the ad that used to say "Use it or Loose It." The same applies to your cruise control, use it or risk losing your licence.



A National Year of Reading

This year, 2012, is the National Year of Reading. It is about encouraging children to read, to keep keen readers engaged and to make Australia a nation of readers.

In Victoria we have a long history of encouraging and acknowledging the importance of reading. The Victorian Premier's Literary Awards were established in 1985 by John Cain and Victoria continues to be a national leader in literature. I think we all acknowledge the importance of reading to children. It provides a strong positive influence and can install a lifetime of benefits. But we now have a changing literary landscape with the emergence of ipads and e-books that is

causing much discussion amongst parents, teachers and researchers. Some schools are even removing the books from their libraries and totally replacing them with online databases. There are some that say children will choose an e-book over a print book and that their comprehension is just as much, or better, than with a print book. Others say old school books have time and research on their side - we know that the number of books in the home and family literacy behavior is highly predictive of positive educational outcomes for children. So who is right? Time will tell, but what everyone seems to agree on for now is that getting kids interested

in reading, and firing up their imagination, is what is important, regardless of the format. Whatever the outcome of the research for children's learning outcomes with new or old technology, chances are e-books and old school print books will have some overlap and each will offer some unique benefits as well as limitations. Personally, as a keen reader, former librarian, and a member of the Ministerial Advisory Council on Libraries I hope the reports of the death of the print book are greatly exaggerated (apologies to Mark Twain).

Why send my child to 3yo Kinder?

I sometimes hear Mums talking about whether to send their child to a 3yo Kindergarten class. The process certainly has its pros and cons. I can recall clearly the disadvantages of 3vo Kinder - the 2 hr time allocation was more of a hindrance than a help to things and for the cost of the fees childcare provides more hours and doesn't stop for the holidays! Having said that, my next child will definitely be going to 3vo Kinder. Why? I strongly believe that going to 3vo Kinder made my son's transition into 4yo Kinder so much easier. Whether a child has had no exposure to out-of-family care or just because the kinder structure and social expectations are new, 3yo kinder can provide a valuable transition step towards 4yo kinder. Especially at a small country Kinder like Lancefield, the child returns to the same room and yard space and often some of the same teaching staff and friends. With 4yo set to be 15hrs/wk in the immediate future, anything that assists a successful start and smooth transition is great in my book! Having recently moved to

Lancefield, it also proved an invaluable opportunity for our family to meet other families in the community.

Another reason I stand a 3yo Kinder advocate is the whole issue of 'school readiness' that is being spoken about increasingly by professionals in early childhood learning. As I understand it, this concept is trying to encourage children to be sent to school when they are socially and emotionally ready, rather than by chronological age. Research suggests that children who are socially and emotionally ready to cope with the challenges of school (as opposed to just 'learning')



do much better academically, socially and emotionally in the short and longer term. Feedback received from schools has indicated that once a child has started school, repeating a year can be challenging. Parents may or may not be aware that repeating 4yo Kinder is not an easily arranged task. The government only provides each child one year of 4 yo Kinder funding. Even where a parent is prepared to pay the full fees, places for 4yo Kinder are in high demand so spots may simply not be available. Should a child be identified as benefiting from an extra year of kinder, 3yo Kinder is

the easier year to extend.

And Kinder teachers, especially our highly experienced Lancefield staff, are the best people to not only talk to about this issue, but to have the opportunity to watch your child over the 3yo Kinder year and make informed recommendations about sending a child to 4 vo Kinder or giving them another year of 3yo. I had this very experience with my son. He did 2 years of 3yo Kinder and now as we head down the path towards school next year, I am so glad we waited. Had he started this year I am quite sure he would have felt overwhelmed. I can see his potential to be more robust to the challenges of school and have a better opportunity to make a good start to the very long process of schooling. On the other hand, a concerned parent might well discover their child's development is on par with peers and is, in fact, ready to roll!







Letter from Henry McLaughlin

"A Romsey Pool"

The issue of the proposed Gisborne Aquatic Centre expansion has received a lot of media attention and has resulted in some confusion. The Macedon Ranges Shire Council Aquatic Strategy holds a vision of indoor aquatic facilities in Kyneton, Gisborne & Romsey.

The Gisborne Pool was built in 2005 and the Kyneton Pool in 2011, two excellent facilities. The third spoke to the aquatic strategy, being a Romsey pool, is subject to a council funded feasibility study this year. In Aug 2011 a \$7.85m expansion of the Gisborne facility was put to a council vote and not supported. In July 2012 the same proposal was put to a Council vote and once again not supported. The July 2012 decision was challenged at a Special Council Meeting on 8th Aug 2012 and again not supported. The decision

was further challenged at a Special Council Meeting on 15th Aug 2012. On this last occasion, the challenge was withdrawn moments after the meeting commenced.

There are certainly strong arguments as to why the Gisborne pool should be expanded. Gisborne is the largest and fastest growing town within the shire and its pool is expected to reach capacity by 2016. I did not support this proposed expansion for the following reasons.

a) We are now in the last 8 weeks of the current Council's term and such a major decision should be left to the incoming Council.

b) As we are entering times of economic uncertainty what may be argued an "affordable" increase in your rates today may be less affordable in the near future.
c) Shire wide equity. One way to ease

the pressure on the Gisborne pool would be to fulfill Council's aquatic strategy and develop a facility in Romsey. It has been argued that the local community does not have the population to sustain such a facility however as Romsey/Lancefield residents currently travel to the Gisborne pool, excess Gisborne patrons could also travel to a Romsey pool. It's the same distance each way.

When you ask what your Councillors have done over the last four years there are number of significant and tangible achievements that can be listed however to appreciate the full picture one must also take into consideration what your local Councillors have prevented from happening. This is but one example.



Vanessa's garden

With this year's veggie crops in mind, it may be a good time to talk a bit about crop rotation. The main reason for moving most things around year by year is simply that it helps keep the soil healthy. Of course you'll usually be adding some kind of food to the soil around your veggies, whether granular or liquid, but that's generally not enough to compensate for growing the same crop in the same place year after year.

Crops don't all take the same nutrients out of the soil or need the same type of food. For example, nitrogen promotes leaf growth, which means it's great for things like lettuces and beans, but of limited use with root crops. Feeding too much nitrogen to a root crop can mean that you see terrific healthy growth above ground, leading you to expect a bumper crop, but in fact all the plant's energy ends up going into the top, and the roots end up being spindly and disappointing.

Growing your veggies in a different spot each year also helps in the fight against pests and diseases. The number one defence plants have is the health of the soil they grow in, which helps makes them strong enough to withstand attack. Growing things in the same place every time risks depleting the soil and weakening

plants.

Some crops leave useful trace elements behind. For example your beans and peas. Their roots grow nodules which act as nitrogen fixers, enriching the ground for successive leafy crops. When the pea or bean crop is harvested, cut the stem or haulm off at ground level, to leave the roots to feed a later crop of greens.

There are a number of similar tips to factor into an ideal crop rotation. There are many resources online and you can find a great selection of gardening books at Red Door bookshop too. However, here is a simple outline of a basic four-bed rotation system to get you started. It doesn't matter how much or how little space you have, beds can be scaled up or down. Even if you are growing in pots, it's worth noting what goes best after which crop.

BED ONE. Assuming that you grew some tomatoes last year, designate that spot Bed One. That ground should have been limed, ideally at the end of the harvest, just after pulling out the plants. You could have then sown plants which prefer a good dose of lime, such as broad beans and (early) peas to overwinter. If you haven't limed the ground or planted broad beans and peas, don't worry, you can still use the

ground for later peas and (when it's warm enough) any beans that you want to grow. As you harvest, empty spots can be filled with broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower.

BED TWO. If you grew peas and/or beans last year, designate that area Bed Two. This is where you put your root crops this year. You can also put your onions and garlic (the latter if not already round your roses) in these beds. Remember, you can leave most carrots and parsnips in the ground over winter. Parsnips especially, as they benefit from frost which turns their starches to sugar and makes them sweeter.

BED THREE. Work in a good deal of well rotted manure to this patch. Here is where you will plant your sweetcorn, pumpkins and zucchinis when it's warm enough. Remember to plant sweetcorn in blocks rather than rows, to help with pollination. Post crops, this bed can be sown with a green manure to be dug in, in early spring.

BED FOUR. This is the spot for this year's tomatoes. Remember to lime the ground after the crop has finished. This bed can also carry capsicum and eggplant.

Lettuce is not fussy and can be tucked in anywhere convenient. Strawberries are much the same, except they should be moved every three years, to avoid build-up of disease.

Local Women Encouraged To Nominate For Council Elections

Speaking in Parliament this week Donna Petrovich encouraged women in her electorate of Northern Victoria to consider running for the 2012 local government elections.

Mrs Petrovich said that despite making up over 50% of our population and being major consumers of local government services, women represent only 29% of local councillors across Victoria. "Gannawarra, one of the municipalities in my electorate has no women councillors, while Greater Bendigo, Loddon and Swan Hill have only one woman each," said Mrs Petrovich.

Mrs Petrovich served as a councillor for the Macedon Ranges Shire for several terms and was the first female mayor elected to the municipality. "My experience of serving on council was very positive and rewarding. Getting involved in local government is a fantastic way to help your local community and really become a part of the fabric of that community."

It is usually women who deal with local government services like maternal and child health services, kindergartens and aged care services and it is important that women's views are adequately represented on council. "I urge them to get involved in local government for the betterment of their communities."

A message from the President of the Lancefield Football /Netball Club

Lancefield football netball club moving forward to 2013 and beyond.

While off-field the LFNC is strong

and performing well, there is no doubt that the last couple of years have been tough on the field for the young men and women who proudly represent our Club each week. The strategy of investing in our own young people through all grades (which is different to some other Clubs in the League) is really starting to pay dividends - and the second half of the season has seen a very competitive unit that augers well for the future.

So, what is next for the LFNC? Firstly, the club is committed to supporting our young netballers and footballers and if they also commit for next year and beyond we will see the club move forward into another successful period.

Off field the club is financially sound and has facilities that are in good condition. Since I have been president over the last 6 years I have been promoting the community club theme and how it is important to have a club in the area for our youth to come and play sport and enjoy 'mateship' that will last a lifetime.

The club has survived for many years with a very small hard working committee. This is the area I feel where our club is lacking and needs much more support. our three trainers who start at 8am on game day but don't finish working till around 5.30pm after the game cleaning rooms and picking up rubbish around the ground. all those volunteers who come in and help Lorraine Kraus in the canteen throughout the year including our netballers. Without this help it would very difficult for Lorraine to run a successful canteen (and how would we survive with out Lorraine?), but more helpers are needed to cut down the hours done by everyone.

The workload to run a successful football netball club needs to be shared and taken up by other people in the community - whether it is parents / partners of footballers and netballers or people from the wider community that can lend a hand for a couple of hours a week to keep our club alive.

There are so many areas around the club that need the support of more helpers to lessen the work load on the few people that put in week in and week out.

It is this lack of support and not the lack of finances or players that will adversely affect the longevity of the club.

2012 will be my last year as President and Melinda Giles has signaled the end of her time as Treasurer. As well, some other committee members may not be staving on. I am flagging this now so that interested people can come to the club and be advised what has to be done and what is involved. Our AGM will be held in October

when a new committee will be formed. But a lot of planning and organisation has already been put in place. For example, if the new committee would like the current sub committees that run the swap meet and quick shear to continue in these roles then they are happy to run these events for another year. Additionally Simon Choate is happy to provide all the information required to run the \$10,000 draw next season.


Personally I will of course be happy to sit down and talk to the new committee and provide all the information necessary to ensure a smooth transition and keep the
