

Skate Park in Lancefi Location...Location...Location!!

Community support for the Lancefield Skate Park has been strong and consistent throughout the past decade or so. However, there has been one sticking point



for the Skate Park which has stopped it from being built. That is the location.

The Neighborhood House initiated a survey in 2012 as requested by the Youth Action Plan. The question was - do you want a skate park in Lancefield? Do you want it at the Men's Shed (on the main road, near the Primary School) or next to the BMX track (in Lancefield Park)?

Overwhelmingly, the community voted for the construction of the skate park next to the BMX track (80% of over 650 votes). In a town where there are less than 2000 people, the petition response defines community opinion - the town wants a skate park and the town wants it next to the BMX track.

The Lancefield Park Master Plan 2011 has a skate park on their agenda.

The Lancefield Park already has an excellent BMX facility that was recently renovated by a local resident. The youth from Lancefield are already using the improved BMX facility. The next step the community needs to know is what are the Park's plans for the Lancefield Skate Park?

Community members came together on Thursday 15th November to have another go at creating a Lancefield Skate Park. Representatives from MRSC, Romsey Lancefield Rotary, Lancefield Romsey Lions Club, the Neighborhood House, Park Lane, parents and young people met to discuss the petitions outcome. As Graeme Treadwell (MRSC Recreation Officer) pointed out, the support evidenced by the people present at the meeting can result in potential funding for a skate park from the government.

The people present at the meeting agreed on a few things - that the skate park location is going to affect someone wherever it is placed.

The location at the Park is opposed by some residents

of Park Lane; conversely the location at the Men's Shed is rumoured to be unsupported by members of the community. The skate park needs to be utilized by young people of all ages. The skate park may need to be specifically designed to fit where it is built. The skate

park needs to be in a public space with lots of traffic. Most importantly, everyone agreed that the decision for the skate park location is the only thing stopping it from going ahead.

The people present also disagreed on a number of things. Namely that skate parks have a history of vandalism, aggression, bad language and rubbish associated with them. Pauline Neil of MRSC pointed out that it is the bad reputation of a few that mars the rest. Mrs. Neil said it was an urban myth that skate parks have such poor reputations when in reality they are an asset to the community increasing young people's sense of belonging and engagement to their community.

Particularly in rural communities with limited transport opportunities.

In practice, Mr. Treadwell has found that skaters are often too distracted with skating to bother with misbehavior as skaters come to skate. Their interest in their sport lends to the youth taking care of their equipment also. Finally, the committee noted that skaters are not just teenagers - many are in their twenties or even under the age of ten. Skating is also a family sport that people of any age can get involved in and their parents come along to watch. Many on the committee spoke of attending skate parks out of town for this purpose.

On conclusion, the meeting resulted in the formulation of the new Lancefield Skate Park Committee with Ben Richards as President. A couple of the committee members are going to meet with the Park Committee to see how we can all progress. The committee also agreed to redirect some of the skate park funds towards some benches at the BMX track (after Park's approval). The committee would like to thank the community of Lancefield, particularly all of the kids who have fought hard for this over the years. Thanks also to the Lancefield Romsey Lions Club, Romsey Lancefield Rotary, Lancefield Neighborhood House, Macedon Ranges Shire Council and parents of young people in Lancefield.

With persistence we will eventually get there.

Open letter to Macedon Ranges Shire Council

On Friday 19th October an important ceremony was held at the Mt William Green-stone Axe Ouarry near Lancefield, to mark the hand-over of title to the traditional custodians - the Wurundjeri people of the Kulin Nation. As local residents and Co-Convenors of the Macedon Ranges Reconciliation Group we are proud that this historical event has taken place in our community. We would like to recognise the vital role of the Macedon Ranges Shire Council in bringing about this important act of reconciliation. Our Council has demonstrated great leadership, working in partnership with the Wurundjeri people to protect the Mt William Green-stone Axe Quarry a nationally significant Aboriginal heritage site. Since gifting the property to the Indigenous Land Corporation in 1997 the Macedon Ranges Shire Council has supported the Wurundjeri people to protect and manage the site, which was granted National Heritage Listing earlier this year. We hope the new Council will continue this commitment and support Council staff to build on these relationships with Aboriginal people and recognition of their history and culture.



It has been a year of contrasts, going from a wet Winter to the dry Spring that we are now experiencing. It appears my remarks about El Nino earlier on may come back to haunt me. It was surprising to watch Landline two weeks ago and see them say that the SOI was positive and reduced the likelihood of a strong El Nino effect over Summer. The weather is certainly difficult to predict especially by a layman with no training in this field. I will just say that with only 18mm of rain

fall for the month it is cause for concern for the rest of the season.

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

The flag and bearded irises are in full swing, but it's the cottage plants that provide the surprises. Also the roses which I nearly forgot to mention and the lovely old fashioned blue Ixias. Vanessa's Garden

With many plants exuberantly in full flower. December is a high point in the gardening year. Here are some tips to help keep the garden looking great for as long as possible and a couple of ways to bring food plants into your garden without setting aside a dedicated veggie area. For those with a veggie plot, there are a few key things to look out for.

To help keep your garden looking good, fill some pots with summer bedding. Pots can be a great way of adding a fresh splash of colour, similar to changing cushion covers to give furniture a quick lift.

In spite of your garden's general vigour at this time of year, the aftermath of the first flush of flowers can start to look really untidy and straggly about now, so cut the offenders back to encourage new growth. You can plug any gaps in the borders with pots of dahlias, or almost any medium sized annual such as marigolds.

Deadheading also helps to keep the garden looking fresh. Little and often is the key, especially if you have a lot of roses. Repeat flowering roses should be taken back to the point on the stem where you can see a strong new bud shoot, and they will generally happily take off again.

It's also safe to remove the

remaining untidy leaves from spring bulbs, such as daffodils. They need five to six weeks after flowering to feed up and removing the foliage any earlier deprives them of their ability to collect energy, leading to a poor show next spring.

The Tasty Garden

When you'd like a few edibles without a full vegetable garden, there are ways you can make a big difference for a small outlay in cost and time. The addition of a few herbs to your cooking livens up almost every meal. Widely used herbs (such as rosemary, thyme and chives) are hardy and, once established, will happily grow in poor soil in full sun. They will grow in pots or you can tuck them almost anywhere you have space. The nearer the back door they are, the more likely you are to use them. Summer lettuces for salads will also do well in pots. Do you grow nasturtiums? The flower petals are edible and add a vibrant splash of colour to summer salads.

In the Veggie Plot

For a steady supply of leaves, sow salad crops in succession, with two to three weeks between sowings. Keep to short rows, sown thinly, for a regular supply and to minimise the chance of a glut.

Powdery mildew can often plague wide-leaved plants such as zucchini. It is made worse by watering over the leaves, which not only spreads the disease, but can mean water doesn't really get to the roots. If you haven't got a drip system going, cut the bottom off a 2 litre plastic soft drink bottle, poke it in by the stem when you plant out your pumpkin or zucchini and water directly into the bottle. Water deeply once or twice a week. It's worth marking the spot with a cane, or the bottle will get lost amongst the exuberant foliage later in the season.

If climbing beans aren't setting pods, don't bother misting the flowers with water. The UK's Royal Horticultural society has tested this theory and hasn't found any evidence that it works. The society has found that pollinating insects seem to be more attracted to white rather than red bean flowers and suggests sowing accordingly.

You can harvest garlic as soon as the foliage starts to fade. Although you can use it 'green', to fully ripen the bulbs for storage, it's best to hang them in a warm dry spot. Bend onion tops over to stop them if they start to show signs of bolting.

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
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


David Cockcroft has been working closely with the



IS IT BORING???

Every year at this time I trot out the usual talk about how we all need to be safe on the roads over the Christmas period. To be quite honest I get a bit bored with writing it each year so I dare say you are all pretty much over having to read it.

What I would like you to do this year is remember. I don't want you to remember my usual spiel about Speed, Fatigue and Alcohol. What I would like you to do is to remember someone that you knew who has passed away. It does not have to be someone who has passed away in the past 12 months just someone who you cared about that passed away. I want you to remember some of the feelings you felt, the sadness, despair, regret, and perhaps helplessness. An inability to change the course of events.

If someone dies of a serious disease there is often little we can do to stop that course of events. We can offer our support. be there for them, we can pray

for them, and look after their family and friends when they have passed. We can donate to research organisations to find cures, we can walk in relays and grow moustaches or maybe buy a badge. These are all great things and we must continue to do them, but can we personally stop disease in its tracks, no. This is why it is so important that we do take care on the roads over the Christmas

Holiday period and at all other times for that matter. Most road deaths and injuries are caused by human error. A moment's inattention a wrong decision. These are deaths that we can all do something to avoid. We have proved this by the huge reduction that has occurred in the road toll over the past 20 years. Too many people still die. Time and time again people walk away from functions intoxicated get in their car with their family and drive off. We need to say something! We need to stop them not because it is against the law but because we care about them. Time and again we answer the mobile phone while driving, putting ourselves and all other road users at risk. Time and again we get in our cars after a hard weeks work and

drive long distances to get to a family Christmas location tired and fatigued. We know what it's like to feel helpless when someone dies, it's a terrible feeling. Imagine how much worse it would feel to be responsible for the death of someone else or for the death of a friend or family member. Or to realise you had the chance to say "Don't drive I will take you home." And didn't.

We can all speak up and stop someone from driving intoxicated. We can all wipe off 5 and slow down. We can all pull over and have a power nap. We can all pull over before we answer our phone. We can all ring 000 when we see that car weaving from side to side. These are choices we make, these are choices that can kill or save lives. The Road Toll is not boring, it's tragic. 163 deaths on country roads in Victoria last year. 129 Rural deaths for the 12 months up until midnight the 13th of November this year.

We need to do something, we can do something, we are not helpless!

Have a safe Christmas. Make safe choices.


much-needed support to local volunteers.







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Local Organisations Encouraged To Apply For Environmental Community Grants

Parliamentary Secretary for Sustainability and Environment, Donna Petrovich, is encouraging local Landcare and environmental groups, schools and community groups to lodge their applications for around \$1 million in community grants to support a range of environmental partnership

initiatives. \$700,000 in round two funding was available as part of the Victorian Coalition Government's \$20 million Communities for Nature program and \$300,000 for the Healthy Parks Healthy

People program. Communities for Nature grants are targeted towards local community groups and organisations, including schools, to support them in improving, protecting and conserving our environment.

Successful Round One funding recipients included Baynton Sidonia Landcare Group (\$6,000), Newham & District Landcare Group (\$5,310) and St Mary's School Lancefield (\$9,260). Healthy Parks Healthy People grants are available to communitybased groups and not for profit





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organisations to help them deliver projects which protect and enhance the natural, cultural and heritage values of parks and reserves.
