SAM HASLETT

Sport is big in Lancefield, as it is in many regional and country towns – a great way to bond and to exercise, deep in the game or cheering from the sidelines, and have a drink and a yarn afterwards whilst analysing the finer points of the game, whichever one it was that day.

Sam Haslett's focus is basketball. How did he begin? He learnt to dribble one Xmas Day when he was about seven, with his cousins in Riddells Creek. If you don't know what this is, it's bouncing the ball on the ground as you move around the court – dribble at all times. is the rule. He took to it, then at 10 joined Romsev Rec basketball group; and quite soon after graduated to the Gisborne Bulldogs U14 team with his cousin Isaac and his uncle, their dad, Brendan, who is coach for that team.



Sam played representative basketball with the Sunbury Jets, where the kids are ranked in skill; he started with the 2s (there are 4 levels), and then moved into the 1s in 2019. During lockdown 2020/2021, he stayed home and practiced his shooting. He was a mere 6'1" at that time, but by 2022 he had shot up to 6'5".

Sam was then selected for the State **Development Program** (SDP) which is the pathway to playing for the state, and then the national team. In January 2023 he was selected to play in the Australian Junior Basketball Country Cup in Albury - teams from all around Australia and New Zealand participate - Sam was one of the best 20 players in the state in this tournament. He says this was his best tournament so far,

Being a total novice to basketball, (apart from netball at school, about which the less said the better) I asked Sam to explain the positions and why he plays Small Forward. This is one of three "shooter" positions (goal scorer, for the uninitiated); the others are Power Forward and Centre, who is always the tallest player of the three. Height is a big factor in basketball, in case any sightings of the impressive American players like Shaquille O'Neal (216cm), Michael Jordan (198cm), LeBron James (206cm), and Kobe Bryant (198cm) haven't given you a clue. Sam is 196.85 (6'5ish" in old money) and possibly still growing since he is currently just 15 years old. and the team won, with four Sunbury players involved. Sam was the top 3-point shooter for the tournament. This is a VERY BIG DEAL.

Earlier this year Sam was selected to represent the Victorian State Country U16 team which competed in Perth at the Footlocker National Championships in July. Ten players from the Albury tournament went with him. This is effectively a showcase of the best U16 Australian basketball talent in the country, both girls and boys. Vic Country finished 5th overall out of 13 representative state sides from around the country. Impressive stuff.

Then, he was rung personally by Basketball Victoria's Nathan Cooper-Brown, (who also talent-spots for the

national team, the Boomers) and asked to join the National Performance Program (NPP), which consists of the top 30 Victorian U18 prospects - Sam was 14 at the time - and aims to develop the most promising basketball prospects in the state.

In mid-August Sam was invited to Canberra to the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) to meet and train with other athletes as part of a 3-day camp. The AIS hosts the Australian Centre of Excellence and the NBA Global Academy which boasts such alumni as Patty Mills, Josh Giddey and Dyson Daniels.

He passed his mid-year evaluation with the NPP and then recently moved schools to the Maribyrnong Sports Academy to continue Year 9. This school is a fast-track to the US college basketball circuit.

As of early September, Sam is travelling to Maribyrnong each weekday to train at the school there – his schedule is divided between ordinary school subjects and training with the best young elite athletes in Victoria, a program which covers all sports.


I asked him how he relaxes – his only down time would seem to be the travel time from Lancefield to Maribyrnong. Listening to music is the answer. Drake is the rap artist of choice, and, as Dad Darren and Mum Megan are the taxi service when there are out of hours practice sessions (7am before school starts, or 3.30 -5pm after classes finish) Sam is now a fan of Darren and Megan's 80s choices: Foreigner and 10CC. Nice taste, that man.


As if this wasn't impressive enough, there is always the possibility of playing for Essendon FC, initially doing a 12-

week program. Sam's height and agility on the basketball court could easily translate to the footy field. Sam is as interested in this possibility as the basketball stream, so it will be fascinating to follow his career from here on. We'll keep you (goal)-posted.

WURUNDJERI CULTURAL GROUP SUPPORTS YES VOTE

Elders at the Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation have taken a formal position on the voice to Parliament to actively support the Yes vote.

The decision, made by Wurundjeri Board of Directors, comes after months of careful consideration and community consultations, including two face-to-face meetings between Elders and the Minister for Indigenous Australians Linda Burney.

Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation Deputy Chair Uncle Andrew Gardiner said the decision was not taken lightly, acknowledging the many views across the Wurundjeri community.

"We support a YES vote, and we want constitutional change that recognises us as first peoples," Uncle Andrew said. "Ultimately the Elders at Wurundjeri want a say in the matters that impact our community, those decisions made by the government that effect Country, our Culture, and our families.

"We want to be part of a representative group that goes to Canberra and says that this is what our needs are, and we want to push for those needs." The Wurundjeri community has a long history of postcolonial political engagement. Esteemed Wurundjeri Ancestors Simon Wonga, William Barak, Bebejan, Billibellary, and Ningulabul were all well-known and active participants in the political scene as Melbourne was being built around them.

"Not only was our culture passed down from our Ancestors but so was our fighting spirit, our negotiation, diplomacy, and above all, our fundamental regard for our people, our Country, and our way of life," Uncle Andrew said.

"Now we call on those living on Wurundjeri Country, the many people living in the greater Melbourne area, to vote YES in this referendum.

"Give us your vote, give us a voice and a say in how our lives are governed. It's time we're recognised. It's time for constitutional change."

The Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation was established in 1985 by Wurundjeri Elders. As a representative body for Wurundjeri Woi-wurrung people, the Traditional Owners of Melbourne, and the Greater Melbourne region, it is the oldest and longest running Traditional Owner organisation in Victoria.

We all have the rare chance on October 14, to have a say, to use our voice. It is a privilege and responsibility at the same time. It is not a good option to vote yes or no simply because you do not know – do not trust anyone who tells you to stay ignorant. The artist Charlie Acquilina says -



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ROMSEY LANCEFIELD ROTARY CLUB Inc. HIGHWAY CLEAN UP

The Romsey Lancefield Rotary Club Inc. has a two-yearly highway clean up along the Avenue of Honour Melbourne-Lancefield Road (Western side) between Hutchinson's Lane and Boundary Road, and between Boundary Road and Collivers Road.

The Melbourne-Lancefield Road regularly has rubbish littering the verges, and under the auspices of Clean Up Australia our Rotary Club has been collecting the litter since 2000. Littering is illegal and offenders can be prosecuted under the Environment Protection Act 1970.

It would surprise readers to know what rubbish and litter we have encountered over the years. Alcohol bottles and cans, ropes of all descriptions, plastics, cigarette packets and cigarette butts, used hessian bags, plasticised feed bags, shoes, toys, slippers, boots, chains, children's books, tissues, cardboard boxes of all sizes, polystyrene packaging, shirts, T-Shirts, sunglasses, glasses, babies nappies, household waste, underwear, tin foil, pencils, biros and pens, coffee cups, gardening plastic pots, plastic tubs, bolts, nuts, steel bars, tyres, tyre rims, parts of cars and trucks, tools, fast food containers, wood of all descriptions and lengths, and discarded household furniture.

Many landowners along the Melbourne-Lancefield Road are to be commended for their efforts in keeping highway land in front of their properties clear of litter. We always welcome any community volunteers wishing to assist us in Highway Clean-Ups that will be advertised through our local community papers.

Our next clean-up is on Saturday 4 November (9 am to 12 noon). We will gather at Hutchinson's Lane West Romsey for a short induction regarding procedures and distribution of safety gear (i.e hi-vis vests and gloves) and equipment as required by Clean Up Australia.

As we move into spring and then the summer months it is a timely reminder of the fire dangers posed by litter (hidden among the grass) and we'd ask all our local communities to report any littering by contacting the Macedon Ranges Shire Council on (03) 5422 0333 or report an issue (<u>https://www.mrsc.vic.gov.au/Contact-Us/Report-an-issue</u>).

SAFE SNACKS FOR YOUR DOG

So, what can you give your doggo whilst you are eating chips, nuts, and chocolate? Or what can you eat and share?

Try the following, but remember everything in moderation.

Celery sticks with peanut butter is a hit in our house. Not too much, due to its diuretic effect and not too big to avoid choking. Make sure the peanut butter has no xylitol. Watermelon peeled and seedless, great frozen in the summer, and it is full of antioxidants. It can also improve the immune system. Blueberries are a superfood for dogs as well as humans. THE BARRELS: YOUR RESPONSE

There was a great response to our survey regarding the barrels along High Street. Of the one hundred and eight people who responded, 81% think they are great and 14% don't mind them, some have not noticed them and only 3% think they are an eyesore.

Ninety-five percent of respondents would like the barrels as they are, to be maintained, with most comments in favour of their current shape, with their mix of edible plants and flowers.

Comments were made such as 'greening our street; rustic country appeal; a nod to our wine region; food or plants for biodiversity', indicate the thoughtfulness of the respondents in appreciating their value to Lancefield.

The Neighbourhood House acknowledges that recently they have not looked their best, as finding volunteers to look after them has been an issue. But in true Lancefield style, in asking if any community members would be prepared to adopt a barrel, thirty-one respondents said yes.

Thank you to all who took the time to answer our questions. With help from these generous people, we can look forward to the barrels once again being a colourful and productive feature of High Street, Lancefield, and can work towards a streetscape plan with the Council.

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Mencefield Mercury NEW BOOK BY LOCAL LIFTS THE LID ON BREASTFEEDING

When Romsey local Dani Malone had her first baby in 2017, she assumed feeding him would be the most natural thing in the world. But instead of the joyful days of early motherhood she had imagined for herself, she left the hospital and was launched almost immediately into days of confusion, heartache and anguish as she struggled to breastfeed and couldn't work out why it wasn't working. It was an intensely painful experience that she was completely unprepared for, and it left her feeling isolated and lost.

After many anxiety-filled weeks, Dani found Elizabeth Yip, a midwife and lactation consultant who supported her to find a feeding method that worked for her and her son, and in time she happily fed him with a mixture of breast and bottle. But the ordeal of those early days left a mark, and she was unsatisfied by how breastfeeding struggles weren't more widely discussed, despite how common they are.

"There is a lot of public conversation about birth, delivering a healthy baby being the end game, but that is only half the journey," she says. "The critical weeks of bonding with a new baby and adjusting to breastfeeding are not well understood, and the idea that feeding problems can continue into the first 12 months of a child's life rarely makes the spotlight.

"In an age where we fully understand the vital benefits of breastfeeding for good health over a lifetime, the sense of failure when breastfeeding is not straightforward or becomes impossible can't be underestimated," Dani says.

A journalist by trade, she teamed up with the midwife who had been such a help to her and together they started speaking to women about how they fed their babies. Over five years (during which time Dani had another baby) Elizabeth and Dani collated more than 80 first-hand accounts from mothers, fathers, partners and daughters, and they have published them in a powerful and comforting collection, *Spilt Milk: Honest Breastfeeding Stories*.

The book contains heartbreaking stories of intense pain but also blissful accounts from women who breastfed easily and for as long as they wanted. There are mothers who were unable to feed due to medical conditions and women who managed to feed multiple children at once with breastmilk alone. No mother and baby team fed the same way, and when you read each account back-t15150-back, the thing that stands out is how much conflicting and confusing advice is given to new mothers when breastfeeding doesn't go according to plan – and sometimes even when it does. It is such a challenging time for new mothers, and often all these women needed was someone to listen to them with compassion while they worked it out their own way.

Spilt Milk has no ideology to push or advice to pass on. "I didn't want to have any particular agenda around breast or bottle," Dani explains. "We feed our babies the way we can, and we all have had different experiences. What is normal is huge when it comes to feeding your child. I wanted to let the experiences speak for themselves."

This book is for anyone who has ever fed a baby, no matter the method, or for anyone preparing to give birth and wanting a judgement-free picture of what might lay ahead. If there's a new or expecting mother in your life, get them a copy. It might be just what she needs to read during a challenging period. You'll be supporting a Macedon Ranges local with your purchase.



Lancefield Park Recreation Reserves are two of around 1,500 Crown land reserves in Victoria which are managed by voluntary committees of management, with support and oversight from the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA). We have two reserves, one at 65 Chauncy Street and another on 76 High Street. Lancefield Park is the primary open space and recreation area in the township of Lancefield and is home to twelve different clubs or associations, many of which are represented on the voluntary committee. The Committee works to maximize the public benefit of the Crown land reserves for the benefit of the community, without any funding provided by DEECA.

VISIT TO LANCEFIELD COURTHOUSE

As part of their Inquiry Unit our Year 1/2s have been learning about how Lancefield and Romsey have changed over time. This has included investigating the Megafauna that existed many thousands of years ago, walking around Lancefield to discover the many older buildings in the town and visiting the Lancefield Courthouse which is home to the Lancefield Historical Society. Tuesday September 5 was the day they were able to visit and tour the Courthouse.

At the Courthouse, Shirley Kishere and Fay Woodhouse greeted the students and told them a little bit about the old Courthouse. Our students were all keen to find out about prisoners, and loved having a look inside the Lock-Up at the end of their tour. Fay told everyone a little bit about the story of Lancefield, from the original township first located over Mustey's Bridge to the current township and some of its landmark buildings - such as the churches and schools. She showed students maps of the old township as well. She then talked about the early squatters and farmers and showed some photos of the potato growers and a butcher showing off a slaughtered animal which looked like a cow. Looking at the megafauna bones and the axe handles from the Mt William Quarry were also popular. After exploring the inside of the Lock-up, and thanking Shirley and Fay, our students had their photo taken before walking back to the school. They had a great time, and we would like to thank Fay and Shirley for giving our students this amazing opportunity and for generously giving up their time to share so many interesting and valuable stories. The Lancefield Courthouse is well worth a visit for anyone interested in history and we highly recommend it.

DEEP CREEK LANDCARE GROUP Covering Lancefield – Romsey and Monegeeta Districts

WHY GROW NATIVE PLANTS?

Deep Creek Landcare Group plants indigenous trees and shrubs that we either grow from seed ourselves, or source from suppliers such as The Tree Project or from Ian Taylor over at the Western Plains Flora in Wildwood. To understand the reasons why we should be planting as many indigenous plants as possible, I thought I would go to the experts at Grow Locals in Woodend; the brainchild of Tully Sumner and Marty Roberts. In addition to buying some tube stock for my garden, I received the following response from regular staffer, Lisa Gormley. In addition, Lisa and Marty generously provided some of their photos for use in the article.

Grow Locals is a local native nursery and landscape specialist. We are passionate about central Victorian communities and local plants and are committed to empowering people to act local and plant for climate resilience.

We grow locally, from locally collected seed. This has many benefits as indigenous plants are adapted to local climates and soils. Once established, they can survive the extremes and play a big role as refuge in times of drought when remnant populations are stressed.


Indigenous plants also provide for the specific needs, such as food and habitat, for local fauna and the beneficial insects



that aid pollination and keep pest populations in check. The habitat they create provides opportunities that would otherwise not exist. Native plants and native animals have evolved together over time, so planting indigenous plants can help preserve the natural balance of your local ecosystem.

Grow Locals is keen to support everyone to create diverse local landscapes for the benefit of local species and local communities and offer a range of services such as plant supply, contract growing, consultation, revegetation plans and implementation.

Tully and Martin started their ecology education as local teenagers, exploring woodlands and waterways. What they





found was often weed-infested and devoid of diversity, silent and uninspiring. This experience set them on a course to make a difference. They have both been working in conservation and restoration ecology, the restoration of systems and ecological function, for twenty-five years.

Working in diverse environments, from saltmarsh to grasslands, from damp forests to box ironbark woodlands, they have learnt by observation, they have been taught by environmental leaders, and, true visionaries; by researching stories, by doing, and by listening to the wider landscape, the ultimate teacher. These experiences have provided insight into adaptive management approaches, which is the key to restoration success and staging efforts to create resilient projects and achieve landscape scale impacts.

Restoration success requires understanding structure, timed intervention and focusing resources. It requires knowledge of the local plants, the living components, and their needs. Every plant successfully established, changes the environment where it is. This is especially true when located in fragmented landscapes, as they create critical links to remnant populations, supporting the movement of genetic diversity, providing a lifeline for many species.

Grow Locals recognises that people are key, and that with the right information and supported with the right plants, they will make a difference to their local communities.

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WINTER ROSES LOVE

I've recently discovered that Hellebores love the rich red soils of Lancefield. The cup-shaped flowers, with a slight resemblance to the petal of a rose (hence their common name Winter Rose), are an evergreen, herbaceous perennial with colours ranging from delicate whites to greens, through to rich pinks, shades of purple and deep black. They come in singles and doubles, some with speckles and some without. Hellebores won't tolerate afternoon sun, so they grow well under deciduous trees or evergreens with light foliage that





love the dappled light. They appreciate a well-drained soil and are low maintenance. Best of all, they are frost resistant – a good thing for plants in Lancefield. There are wonderful displays of them at the Garden of St Erth in Blackwood and at the Post Office Nursery in Fern Hill, just outside Woodend.

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CHARGE UP NOW

Many of us will have noticed that an electric car charging station has now been installed on the corner of High Street and The Crescent, across from the Garage and next to the Toilet block. I think it arrived about four weeks ago. But where did it come from? Keen to find out about it, I emailed the Council and asked when they decided to instal them and why; whether it was in response to local demand; how long the charge lasted and how much it cost to charge a standard EV. Director Planning and Environment, Rebecca Stockfeld responded to my questions.

Installing electric vehicle (EV) charging stations across the shire is among Council's 'endorsed priority projects, consistent with the 2021 Environment Strategy and response to climate emergency'. And I now know that Lancefield is among three 'strategically chosen new public stations being added to the existing network', delivered in partnership with Evie Networks and 'funded through the Victorian Government's Department of Environment, Energy and Climate Action'. Expanding the EV charging station network aims to support residents who have - or are planning to transition to electric vehicles. And to 'cater for visitors who drive electric vehicles and plan trips according to the location of charging facilities'. I wonder whether this installation has anything to do with an increased level of tourism since the opening of the Lost Watering Hole? Charging costs, times and range for chargers vary, however, our Lancefield

'fast charger' charging stations and can take between 20 to 60 minutes and can add 250-500km of range per hour. Charging is priced at about 50c per kWh and 'payments are digital' – credit card, mobile app or debit card.

Jennifer Anderson, Cr Geoff Neil and Cr Mark Ridgeway. Almost 100 people arrived by 7am to attend this event. The Mount Monument location – with its astonishing collection of sculptures within the landscape – and the building's spectacular architecture and views – was reason enough to attend. However, the guest speaker, Annie Smithers certainly wowed the crowd she drew.

After telling us that she has had a connection with the region for nearly thirty years, Annie revealed to her audience some of the complexities of running a restaurant and becoming an author of cookbooks/memoirs. She described the hardships the hospitality industry had endured during the COVID years, and the difficulties she dealt with running a small business during that time. At the end of the day, she said: 'You need to find who you are and how to cope with it'. Annie's life is about growing food and presenting it to her customers. I suspect Annie's sentiments were shared by many in the audience.

RECYCLE YOUR TEXTILES, POLYSTYRENE AND SOFT PLASTICS FOR FREE

Council is now accepting textiles and clean polystyrene at resource recovery facilities (formerly transfer stations), in addition to soft plastics. Council has partnered with Upcycle4Better to offer residents a sustainable recycling solution for their damaged clothes, shoes, linen and more. This free service is only for damaged or well-used textiles. Items that are in good condition should still be donated to your nearest op shop.

You can also recycle clean, white expanded polystyrene for free as part of a new trial, with the recycled product turned into items such as picture frames, skirting boards, decking and other household products. To be recycled, the polystyrene must be clean and free from dirt, tape, labels and ink.

Don't forget, you can also take your soft plastics for free too. A recent audit of kerbside general waste bins showed up to 70% of the bin was taken up by soft plastics.


At Encourage Church, we have just finished re-roofing the church. As the roofers were taking the old tin off, it reminded me of the four men who brought their paralyzed friend to Jesus to be healed (see Mark 2:1-11 and Luke 5:17-26).

Jesus was preaching in a house and there was such a crowd that the four men could not carry their friend close enough to Jesus. So, they went up onto the roof (the houses in those days had a flat roof and stairs to get up there) and dug a hole in the roof, letting their friend down through the roof into the crowd right in front of Jesus.

I'm not sure how I would react if people cut a hole in our newly done roof (hopefully with grace), but what is most striking is the effort the friends went to in helping their friend. When a difficulty arose, they came up with an innovative solution and one that wasn't easy to do. Mark 2:5 says "when Jesus saw their faith..." – the faith of friends.

I was recently listening to Lucy from LightFM talk about a difficult time in her life when she was depressed and suicidal. One of her close friends would ring her daily, and sometimes hourly, and then had Lucy move into a granny flat on her property. That's the modern-day equivalent of cutting a hole in your roof for your friend.

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ARE THERE ANY CONVICTS IN YOUR FAMILY CLOSET?

Well, I knew that William Woodhouse, my (who knows how many times) grandfather had arrived in Victoria in the late 1840s. What I did not know was that he first arrived in Van Diemen's Land (now Tasmania) in 1841 and had served time there before coming to Victoria. And I had no idea how to find out more about him. That is, until I attended the Gisborne Genealogical Group's Convict Seminar on Saturday 26 August. The full program began with an introduction by the President, Lynley Hall and was followed three main talks – all varied and informative.


First up was Bronwyn Quint from the Descendants of Convicts Group. This group, a member of the Royal Historical Society of Victoria and located in Carlton, offers assistance with research and holds regular talks. Bronwyn is an expert in her field, and her PowerPoint Presentation was so informative, and full of details of links to websites as well as documents and published books.

While much of the searching for ancestors and convicts has been made easier through Trove, regrettably, much of the formerly State-held original documents have now been sold to Ancestry.com, meaning that they are no longer free. Nevertheless, Bronwyn talked us through all the steps necessary to find our ancestors. For example, my first step will be going to the Tasmanian Library website to find all the links that will take me to various aspects of William Woodhouse's life as a convict. The very detailed documents held will include much more information than his full name, status, age, height, distinct marks etc. It will be fabulous to see what more I can find out about him. I now have a copy of the list of links which was generously given to attendees.

After morning tea, six members of the Gisborne Genealogical Group presented their research. Each speaker gave a ten-minute talk on their subject – all were varied and equally as interesting. Not only did these speakers talk about their in-depth research, but they also provided the background to their research as well as the outcome and the life history of their chosen convict. Some of these talks told the story of their family member.

Janet McCalman, Emeritus Professor of History at The University of Melbourne, presented the final paper of the day. The enthusiastic audience of around 45 people listened intently as Janet gave the context to the arrival of convicts in Van Diemen's Land and Norfolk Island. Many, like my ancestor William Woodhouse, chose to steal to be transported. Sadly, it is not clear just how many of the 160,000 British convicts elected this risky route to the new world. Some of the transportees enjoyed safe and healthy journeys; for other passengers, many suffered illness. Many of the convict ships suffered high mortality rates.

After they served their time and were pardoned or given a ticket-of-leave, many of the convicts crossed Bass Strait to Victoria; these were the subject of Janet's latest book, Vandemonians, published in 2021. It is estimated around 30,000 ex-convicts arrived in Victoria from 1851 and tried their hand at gold-digging. Like most of the thousands of gold-seekers, few succeeded in their pursuit. However, many ex-convicts changed their ways and went on to live fruitful







lives; others did not, and for many, their lives ended in tragedy.

One aspect of Janet's talk I found particularly interesting is that the Macedon Ranges became the home of many ex-convicts. How does she know this? So, won't that be an interesting way to begin looking at our local history? However, as Janet made clear, many ex-convicts who made a success of their lives, chose not to reveal their former lives to their families. And I can now hear you thinking: does our family have a convict lurking in a closet somewhere?

NEW COMMUNITY LOCAL LAW 2023

Council has adopted a new Community Local Law 2023 – replacing the General Purposes and Amenity Local Law No. 10 of 2013 – which will come into effect from 25 September 2023.

The new Local Law was designed for the community to protect safety and amenity throughout the Macedon Ranges over the next decade.

Some of the key changes include:

burning in the open air now prohibited on land less than 2,000 square metres

broadening of accountability to include landowners – not just perpetrators

gambling advertisements now prohibited on Council land or on a road

new clause added to allow fireworks (conducted by a pyrotechnician) on private land, under strict conditions heavy vehicle parking now prohibited on land 2,000 square meters or less

events, filming and busking now its own clause

smoke-free zones added to the Local Law, allowing Council to prescribe and declare smoke-free (including e-cigarettefree) zones

prohibiting collection of wood from Council land or a road stricter regulations around:

unsightly and dangerous land and buildings

scare guns

building sites

shopping trolleys

Thank you to everyone who provided feedback earlier this year which helped shape and enhance the new Local Law.

HPV VACCINE

Council's immunisation clinic is offering catch-up HPV vaccinations for people aged 25 or under who have missed out.

The HPV vaccine protects against nine types of HPV that cause almost all cases of cervical cancer, other HPV-related cancers and genital warts. Australians aged 12-25 years can receive the HPV vaccine for free through the National Immunisation Program.
