A thoroughly enjoyable day was had by all – and everyone welcomed the return of the Lancefield Agricultural Show. Congratulations to Hugh and all the committee and helpers on the day, who made it such a success. It was worth the wait.


# SECOND EDITION AVAILABLE



Hesket-Kerrie CFA is located along the Northern side and lower slopes of Mount Macedon. It is a volunteer brigade run by a team of dedicated men and women fire fighters operating out of two fire stations located in Hesket at the bottom of the

mountain and Cherokee nestled

The role of the brigade is to protect the lives and properties of the community in the local area as well as being pivotal in protecting the northern interface of the mountain when fires threaten. The brigade is also

called upon to fight fires throughout the state when required.

The brigade is currently fundraising to purchase a 'Medium Tanker' which will supplement Government funding. The new, larger (more water), more technically advanced and much safer tanker will greatly assist in building the brigade's resources and strengthen its capabilities.


The target is to raise \$80,000 of which the brigade has already raised \$40,000 over the past few years by providing car parking duties and various events at Hanging Rock, tin rattling at the Gisborne Market, and of course some generous




donations from the community along the way. This amount will enable the brigade to provision the truck with breathing apparatus so structure fires can be accessed for both rescue and extinguishing fires. The target date is late April 2024.

And why did you think you had the right to sell exclusive access to our records to a foreign private commercial concern that is also a part of the Mormon religion?

A clarification from Fay Woodhouse - my information regarding Victorian records was incorrect: according to the

office of the Minister for Government Services (Gabrielle Williams)

"Open historical records from our collection have always been, and remain, free and available for all Victorians to access both online and in person at our public reading rooms. The Public Record Office Victoria has never sold public records to any corporation or genealogical body. The Public Record Office Victoria (PROV) sometimes partners with organisations like Ancestry or Family Search to allow for the digitisation of historic records. The historic records they digitise do not contain private information about individuals who are living, as it set out in the Public Records Act 1973.

The State of Victoria doesn't surrender any rights under these partnerships.

Examples of records now available for free on the PROV website as a result of some of these partnerships include historic "wills and probate files, passenger lists and rate records up to 1930."

#### A NUMBER OF PROJECTS ON THE GO

The Newham & District Landcare Group has been continuously busy this year by providing members with information evenings, newsletters packed with great articles and links, conservation projects and of course their Autumn and Spring tube stock sale.

The Group is delighted to report that a Victorian Landcare Grant of \$19,982, administered through North Central Catchment Management Authority, will assist with a number of projects they have embarked on of late. This vital funding will enable works to further enhance the Cobaw Biolink On-Ground works on both public and private land.

Weed control and additional tube stock for the Anderson Road Triangle will continue a very exciting project which will see it converting a 10,000 m2 triangle of degraded public land into a significant patch of biodiverse woodland habitat within the Cobaw Biolink.

A stretch of seasonal waterway in the upper Campaspe Catchment that in the past was cleared for farming activities, will be fenced to exclude stock, and revegetated with indigenous native plants. Stream rehabilitation works such as this not only build a network of habitat across the landscape, but they also serve to mitigate the risk of erosion and improve water quality.


#### PHYSIOTHERAPY APPOINTMENTS AVAILABLE

#### TWO STRIKING EVENTS

The middle weekend of October was a busy one in Lancefield with two striking events taking place. The first was a Lebanese meal presented by Amal Malouf; the second was the return of the Lancefield Agricultural Show. The Show was cancelled during the COVID-19 years – 2020 and 2021 and it was curtailed in 2022 by the October floods – the event was welcomed by locals and visitors alike.

#### A TASTE OF LEBANON IN LANCEFIELD -SATURDAY 14 OCTOBER

Nearly 80 people gathered in the Lancefield Mechanic's' Institute hall to experience a feast of Lebanese food presented by chef and Lancefield local, Amal Malouf. The room looked very much like a restaurant and was decorated appropriately. The food choices were those I would have enjoyed in any Melbourne restaurant, and all for the modest cost of \$60. Despite being unable to attend myself, I spoke to Amal a day before the event and asked her about her background and how the Lebanese feast came about.

Amal Malouf and her family migrated from Lebanon because of the civil war. Travelling via Greece, they managed to come to Australia in 1976. As a 16-year-old when they arrived, Amal attended school and quickly learnt English.

The family embraced the food and restaurant business; when they ran the Travelodge in Geelong it was a family affair. Cooking must be in her blood! When she married, Amal and

her husband Geoff ran four restaurants, including Zumzum Restaurant in Carlton as well as restaurants in other suburbs.

Amal and Geoff have been living in Lancefield for two years – they chose Lancefield because their daughter lives in Newham and they loved the small town. Soon after they moved here, Amal began volunteering at the Town House. Recently she has been cooking the monthly Feed-it-Forward lunch. One recent highlight of cooking these lunches was that in September, everything was donated – this included racks of lamb and pears that formed the basis for the lunch. For that lunch, she cooked for 40 people. The idea for the Taste of Lebanon was born out of the popularity of her cooking for the Feed-it-Forward lunches.

The menu for the October 14 Taste of Lebanon dinner sounded fantastic: starter/dips with greens and breads included Tabouli, Hommus, Babaganouj and Falafel. The entrée was a choice of filo pastry with lamb & pine nuts served with pomegranate molasses; filo pastry with haloumi & feta with fresh herbs; Bastourma – air-dried beef cut wafer thin and served with fenugreek, mixed salads, radish and cheese. The main course was slow-cooked shoulder of lamb on the bone with Middle-Eastern spices, preserved lemon and rice served with roasted pumpkin and tossed salad. The desert was Turkish delight and Baklava. I was sad to miss it.

When I asked Amal if she had thoughts of doing it again – she gave a positive response!





#### ANNE AND HELEN HUTCHINSON

# TWO WORTHY WOMEN OF ROMSEY



Born in 1838 in Lincolnshire, England, Anne Cousens was a twelve-year-old when she arrived in Melbourne in 1851 with her family on the sailing ship the Sea. By happy coincidence, travelling on the same ship was William Hutchinson also from Lincolnshire, and her future husband, although they were not known to each other while on the voyage to Australia.

For the first five years in Australia, her family lived in Tullamarine. How she and William Hutchinson met is, of course, unknown, yet Victorian records confirm that they married at St James Cathedral, Melbourne in 1855. Following their marriage, they settled in Romsey when the only other known settler was William J Smith, manager of William Dunsford's pastoral run. Soon after William and Anne settled there, Sidney Seymour and Owen Doolan also settled in the same vicinity of what was then the settlement

of Five Mile Creek.

Romsey (after the township in Hampshire, England) was first named in 1858; the township was gazetted in 1860 and was created a District in 1862. Squatters such as John Brock, Sir William J T Clarke, Captain James Cain and William Dunsford had established their pastoral runs in the 1840s. Dunsford's Run, or Dunsford Station as it was also known, extended from almost Baynton in the north of Lancefield to what is now the southern boundary of Lancefield on the edge of Romsey.

The Hutchinson, Doolan and Seymour families were the town's pioneers and were able to purchase land at the first land sales held at Kilmore in 1856. Purchasers of substantial parcels of land at the 1856 sales were George Coyle, William Hutchinson and John Pinney Bear. William Hutchinson



purchased 60 acres on what is now Hutchinson's Lane. Although it was assumed for decades that Sidney Seymour purchased land at the 1856 sales, this has recently been disproved. After acquiring his land by adverse possession (that is, proving he had lived on the land he claimed for 30 years), he purchased the land from John Pinney Bear in 1885.

When William Hutchinson and Sidney Seymour settled in Romsey in 1855, they immediately began growing potatoes. Local history books written by local historians Peter Mitchell and John Reid recount stories of the two mens' potato growing ventures. At the time of the gold rushes, diggers needed food and merchandise. Hutchinson and Seymour carted supplies of potatoes (and probably other goods) to the goldfields by bullock wagon and enjoyed a steady trade.

While William was growing and carting potatoes, Anne had 11 children, of whom five were living at the time of her death in 1924. Anne's husband William predeceased her by 43 years; he died in 1881. Most of her children married the children of other early settlers and continued living in the district. This may explain why their daughter Helen did not marry. As a young woman she had worked in Melbourne but had to give up her work 'when sickness came to the home'. She spent her life nursing members of the family and remained living with her mother until she died.

After an illness extending over some months, Anne Hutchinson died on 30 December 1924. In her Obituary, Anne Hutchinson is described as one of the earliest pioneers of the district. She was 'a very kindly, amiable lady, and, though never taking an active part in public matters, was keenly interested in everything that took place right up to within a few days of her death'. Her recollections of the early happenings of Romsey were said to be wonderful, 'and with these alone she could entertain her friends for hours at a time'. She was buried in Lancefield Cemetery on New Year's Day, 1925.

William and Anne's daughter Helen Hutchinson died in November 1941. She was well known in Romsey and was remembered as 'a fine personality'. It was noted in her Obituary that 'as a neighbour she was really wonderful, and many citizens have cause to remember with gratitude her ministrations in times of trouble'. She, too, was buried in Lancefield Cemetery.

#### **CARE FINDER**

A new service is being offered to help Macedon Ranges residents access My Aged Care as well as help them find aged care services and other useful community supports. It provides people with local, personalised, face-to-face support.

Delivered by Sunbury and Cobaw Community Health, the service is free and can help people with the My Aged Care assessment process, assist with finding local health and care providers, and better connect them with the local community.

Care Finder is available to those eligible for aged care services (people aged over 65 years and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people 50 years and over) and who are experiencing difficulties accessing support.

#### BAARACK THE SHEEP, FROM HEARTBREAK TO HOPE TO HEAVEN

Baarack, the much loved once woolly mammoth of a sheep has passed away aged around 10 years of age, succumbing to cancer. Found wandering the Cobaw State Forest in 2021, Baarack looked more like a moving cloud than a sheep. Burdened down as he was with some 35kgs of wool, Baarack was delivered to not-for-profit haven for formerly farmed animals, Edgar's Mission, in Lancefield, Victoria.

"I doubt he would have survived much longer as he could hardly see and barely stand," reported sanctuary founder Pam Ahern at the time.

Whilst Baarack's fleece had taken at least six years to reach its outrageously wild and woolly state, his transformational rescue story quickly went viral reaching over 12 million people around the globe.

The sanctuary's tribute post tells of Baarack's "soft and gentle" nature, along with the fact he never held fear of humans despite his many years of never being in contact with them. A recent post spoke of his penchant for offering sanctuary staff his endearing toothy grin.

And it would seem that although Baarack managed to squeeze through cracks and escape the fate of most sheep, he was unable to escape those of his genetics. His ever-growing fleece, a result of selective breeding by humans designed for at least annual shearing, along with a great susceptibility of his kind to cancer, reminds us of this.



"Whilst our hearts are indeed heavy today from the passing of our much-loved woolly friend, Baarack's legacy will long stay with us, reminding us all of just how amazing and forgiving sheep are. And too the incredible power of kindness, for had the kind heart who saved Baarack that day, all those years ago, looked the other way, Baarack would never have been seen. Seen for the soft and gentle animal who he was, and in doing so inspiring us all to be soft and gentle towards his kind," said Ahern.



#### POPULATE AND PERISH!?

In the wake of World War 2 "Populate or Perish" was the catch cry used to help the Australian public to accept a higher migrant intake in order to improve our defence. In more recent times the need for a "big Australia" has been embraced by business and our major political parties.


In 1960, we had a population of 10.3 million with a median age of 28.6 and a birth rate of 3.45. By 2023, our population has increased to 26.5 m with a median age of 37.5 and a birth rate that has declined to 1.6, well below replacement. The reality is that with an ageing population, high levels of immigration will continue in order to provide the labour and skills required. However, a big Australia is not without its challenges; unless we are careful, it could be a case of Populate and Perish!

Deep Creek Landcare Group, as part of the council's community consultation, was invited to meet with Jack Wiltshire (Strategic planner) from the MRSC and to make a submission to the Romsey Structure Plan which is currently in draft form. The plan is being developed to manage growth and development in Romsey to 2050. Over this period it is anticipated in the Macedon Ranges Statement of Planning Policy that the town will grow from around 5000 people, towards the lower end of a large town, which is between 6000 and 10,000.

The envisaged growth represents many challenges for residents and the environment. It is crucial that Romsey retains its rural character, and that development does not replicate many of the mistakes made in the outer suburbs of our cities. Lancefield faces the same challenges.

A warmer, drier climate necessitates that these factors are front and centre when planning the future development of our towns. To retain Lancefield's character and improve the liveability and walkability of the new estates and to counter the "heat island" effect, a number of provisions need to be included. The inclusion of trees providing shade along roads and footpaths, where possible, the use of lighter coloured roofing, building materials and pavement and appropriate urban design with the inclusion of eaves, double glazing and a limit to large, west-facing windows. The inclusion of a variety of block sizes to meet the demographic profile, with some blocks large enough to have a reasonably sized backyard that could include gardens and trees and importantly, the provision of ample shade along the new residential streets.

Bike paths and walking tracks are important from a transport and recreational point of view, but they too should be shaded and separate from the roads to enable access to children and aged/disabled people, either walking or on scooters. To maintain Lancefield's character and liveability,

#### JESUS AND THE WOMAN AT THE WELL

In John chapter 4 in the Bible, whilst travelling, Jesus stops at a well and meets a Samaritan woman. What follows is a deep discussion about living water, where the centre of worship should be, and the coming Messiah. It is a striking account of Jesus crossing numerous 'boundaries' to change a person's life.


The first boundary He crossed was a geographic one. It is accepted that Jews would go the long way around to avoid going that particular way through Samaria, but Jesus broke the custom of the day. Once he had crossed that geographic boundary and in his interaction with the woman at the well, we see Jesus break through ethnic, religious, gender, moral and social boundaries of the day to radically change this person's life. So much so, that the woman went back to her village and through her testimony, many believed in Jesus (John 4:39). Still more believed in Jesus when they heard from him, seeking him out directly (John 4:41-42).

Jesus has crossed the boundary between heaven and earth (John 6:38), so that the boundary between God and people would be removed. That is why the curtain in the Jewish temple of the day was torn in two when Jesus died (Matthew 27:51) – the curtain representing the boundary between people and God, and that boundary had now been broken through. Jesus' blood shed on the cross is to reconcile and



make peace with all (Colossians 1:19-20).

#### STUDENT ART SHOWCASE

The St Mary's Art Showcase at the end of Term 3 was a wonderful way of celebrating and recognising the artistic efforts of our students. Each child had several pieces of work displayed from Term 1 to Term 3 and proudly shared their pieces with their peers, teachers and families. Prep students completed projects such as ripped paper bears and parable lamps inspired by literature.

They also crafted textile birds and dot painted boomerangs as a result of being immersed in the Australian Indigenous Culture unit. Lastly, they worked on collages and drew pictures using a variety of shapes. Year 1/2 students engaged in personal mixed media collages, as well as a Lent/Easter collaborative collage that represented a LED light cross. They also created paintings which expressed shape and feelings through lines and colour inspired by Jimmy Pike, an Australian indigenous artist. 
Our Branch AGM was held at the end of October. All office bearers presented very pleasing reports.

# CUMQUATS AND ARTICHOKES

Spring. When cacophonous daffodils celebrate the end of winter, where gardens burgeon and blossoms crown in glory - the sheer luxuriance of it all. And the sounds!

There is no better reason to celebrate spring than by throwing a dinner party with a menu that suitably showcases darling spring fruits and vegetables to tickle your guests' fancies. Braised artichokes should accompany the main fare of spring lamb, whilst the swan song of cumquat bavarois to bequeath its own delirious monologue of deliciousness would be the only appropriate conclusion.


Artichoke lovers can thank Zeus for the creation of this unusual vegetable. Ancient Greeks believed that as punishment for deceiving him, Zeus transformed his beautiful lover Cynara into this prickly plant. High in fibre, vitamin K and folate, artichokes are also a grand source of magnesium and vitamin C. Traditionally, artichokes have been used as a remedy for indigestion and upset stomach. With only 60 calories per medium

artichoke and around 4 grams of protein (which is above average for a plant-based food), it is no wonder Italians eat 40,000-tonnes of them annually.

Cumquats are nutritional powerhouses that provide vitamin A, B vitamins, calcium, iron, and even some heart-healthy omega-3 fatty acids. Munificent with water and fibre, they make a great low-calorie, but filling, snack. Just five cumquats provide about 6 grams of fibre, which is 20 percent of the daily recommendation. This cute-as-a-button fruit not only packs a manorial bittersweet taste, but its tree symbolises wealth and good-luck. Perfect for you inside and out.

Let spring provoke your tastebuds to courageously explore recipes with cumquats and artichokes whilst we await for full throttle summer to arrive.

#### UPDATE ON RATES CHARGES

During a recent review of Council's rates income for the year, an error was discovered in the calculation of Council's rates and charges.

The error meant that the amount of the municipal charge applied was too great, and a credit of \$23 for each rateable property was required to correct the error.

To make this adjustment, Council adopted a revised Budget 2023/24 on 28 September 2023 correcting the

declared municipal charge.

The revised Budget 2023/24 included the updated municipal charge of \$189 per rateable property for 2023, down from \$212 (the difference of \$23.)

You don't need to take any action to receive the credit on your rates account; the credit has already been processed and was applied to all rateable properties on Thursday 29 September 2023.



Since the last time we met, Sharon Pappas has been busy, and has had a change of direction in her art practice. As she is about to have an exhibition over the last weekend in November (24, 25, 26) at Double Oaks Estate Winery, we thought we'd have a chat about what's happened lately.

Sharon was working in pastels until recently; she has switched to oils, the medium in which her grandfather worked, and taught her as a child, and she has been very productive, with her exhibition focussing on her connection to nature. This has evolved since her return to living in the country. Born in Queensland, then living in Melbourne, but now in the unique landscape of the Macedon Ranges, Sharon has been inspired to make work that depicts a female form appearing to manifest from the trees or water or rocks in the landscape she is depicting. She often starts with a quote as inspiration for a particular piece.

Kristy and Travis Chehab from Double Oaks Estate Winery are great fans of Sharon's art, and began as patrons, then selling her artworks to their own patrons at the Double Oaks cellar door. They've been at the vineyard since 2016, and as they've upgraded it and brought their own personalities to the business, the idea of displaying art followed – what better than to share their enthusiasm for Sharon's works?

Their seven acres of vines are currently growing chardonnay, pinot noir and cabernet sauvignon, and they have Riesling and Shiraz made with grapes purchased in from the Bendigo region; newly planted, the less well-known (to me) gruner veltliner (first vintage 2023) and saperavi, a Georgian red, whose name means "ink", so you get the sense of how dark it is in the glass (first vintage 2024) - have been expanded to include five acres of truffles.

All I knew about truffles was: French and Italian, pigs or dogs snuffling around to find them and...expensive. Now was

my time to pump Travis for more detailed info. They have French winter black truffles maturing under in the roots of oak trees where the truffle development helps the trees with nutrients. Next year will be the first harvest. Kristy and Travis are hoping for 10 kg by the first year, and 200kg by the ten-year mark. In 2024 the Truffle Hunt will be on, for up to ten weeks, starting officially on June 15, and open to all to come and help Perri the beagle cross, and maybe a second truffle-sniffing dog (they are thinking of a field spaniel called a Lagotto, also known for its fine nose) to find and collect them. As with wine, the nose is all-important!

Truffles only last a week to ten days before they must be conserved (vacuum packed), so immediacy is key. Travis and Kristy intend to offer truffle oil, butter, honey and maybe down the track, ravioli. The ideal is to harvest 200kg/year, so some will be sold to local restaurants, included in their products and possibly also exported.

Sharon's exhibition opens at the Double Oaks cellar door, Ashworths Road, Lancefield, on Friday night November 24, from 6pm till 9pm, and runs until Sunday that weekend. Entry is free, so come along and enjoy some of the estate's wines, snacks and lovely nature-focussed artworks. The QCode is included here to assist catering with an idea of

how many people to expect on the opening night, so do register your interest in helping to launch Sharon's latest collection of works in this lovely setting.
