MAKE FRIENDS OVER A CUPPA,

MAKE FRIENDS OVER A CUPPA, WHILST YOU SUPPORT PEOPLE IN NEED, WITH WALL-TO-WALL NANNAS ON HAND

You're a woman living locally, with young to teenage kids; kids still at home, anyhow. Or you're an older woman who's just retired or moved from the city. Why would you join the CWA? Really, the question: Why wouldn't you?

Not just a bunch of older women sitting around chatting over scones, bottomless cups of tea, and Anzac bikkies in April, the CWA began in 1922, just over one hundred years ago, in NSW and Queensland, with other state branches soon to follow over the next fourteen years. Its founders saw a huge need for all kinds of support – material and emotional – for women isolated in the rural parts of Australia, having to deal with everything from the usual farm tasks, to crises of drought, fluctuating income and natural disasters

It's been going now for over a century. Women of all ages are welcomed – in fact for new arrivals to the area, dropping in to make contact with the local CWA group is a sure way to get to know your community quickly, with helping hands at the ready whilst you settle in.

What would we do without the Country Women's Association? When there are local events, you will find the enthusiastic ladies of the CWA in the kitchen making tea, and proffering plates of tempting home-made sandwiches, slices and cakes – celebrations for the footy club, the cricket club, and assorted events at the Mechanics' Institute always include the CWA kitchen goodies backup. On Anzac Day, with biscuits already pre-sold at markets and plenty more freshly baked on the day, the CWA is central to the success of the post remembrance service reunion.

Rural women and children were the original focus for support, and initially, only women whose income was derived from the land could become members; today this criterion has expanded to include rural and urban members from every walk of life.

Tracy Kemp has been one of the members of our local branch for just over twenty years, and she is keen to encourage new members to join. Here are some reasons why that's such a good idea.

Did you know that the CWA is a powerful lobby group? Social justice, improving access to essential services, offering train fares to the city the medical tests; funding two scholarships for year 6 school children, both girls and boys, who uphold the best values of their community; supplying support from the CWA Emergency Funds for disaster relief in times of bushfires like Black Saturday, floods like Rochester, and other natural catastrophes.

The Victorian CWA has raised over \$30,000 per year for the last three years for disaster relief. The Thanksgiving funds this year go to the Women's Housing Limited, and the state project is disaster recovery.

With the numbers of women and children needing accommodation and support due to domestic violence and homelessness rising steadily, there is plenty of need for a helping hand, access to essential services and Pamper Packs for women, which include toiletries and female-focussed items they wouldn't buy for themselves when funds, and feelings of self-worth, are low.

CWA currently raises money for not only local, but also international women and children in need. Birthing kits are sent to Third World and developing countries. These provide a pack for hygienic birth deliveries, preventing infections

and damage that have awful effects on the mothers down the track, and can mean that they are shunned by their communities as unclean.

Gisborne has a Days for Girls group. This group is not run by the CWA, but some local CWA members are in this group as well. They sew sanitary items to send, along with new undies, holders with napkins, and waterproof pouches for discreet disposal, as any references to female monthly cycles are taboo. In some countries, for five days per month every year of fertility, menstruating girls must stay home; many give up going to school altogether. That can lead to early marriage, many pregnancies and fistulas, the damage from which is the beginning of the cycle of shunning, being called "wet women", and often descent into prostitution. So hygienic birthing kits are a necessity to help handle this avoidable outcome. CWA's birthing packs can prevent this and save lives.

The branches study different countries each year: this year it's Namibia, next year Rumania. This is a good way of discovering that women from all parts of the world, no matter what age, colour, religion or economic circumstances, have more in common than may appear on the surface.

There is a yearly Creative Arts Exhibition, but the CWA isn't about crafts, although knitting and crochet are skills many of them have, which are put to use in the packs that are sent for disaster relief, if people lose their belongings.

Contributions include donations to the Food Bank, bundles of clothes, and knitted blankets sent to places like East Timor. CWA has also knitted and sent for distribution by outreach groups blankets, hats and gloves for people living rough in Victoria. One of the projects this coming year is "fiddle muffs" for people living with dementia that will be distributed in the next year.

Over the years the CWA has owned property in capital cities where country members stay during city visits, at very reasonable rates. My mum stayed in the Elizabeth Bay CWA building when she came to Sydney, and then in the Toorak house when she travelled to Victoria. The CWA houses allow anyone to stay: families and couples, not just women. More recently, some properties have been sold or leased out, with the interest funding scholarships for young people who want to continue further education after secondary school.

In the Central Highlands, there are eleven CWA groups, most of whom meet monthly. Some branches also hold a chat and craft days between their meeting days.

In our immediate area some meet during the day, some at night, on various days/nights of the week:

Night meetings – Woodend, Heathcote and Sunbury Daytime meetings – Lancefield, Romsey and Gisborne The Lancefield branch of the CWA meets on the fourth

Friday of the month, in the Mechanics' Institute annex, from 10.15am till 12.30pm.

You will be welcomed with open arms, a hot drink, interest and support. And some willing "nannas" of every age, waiting to greet you and your children.

LANCEFIELD POLICE

POLICE REPORT

If you have been watching the news, you may have heard that the Victoria Police members may be engaging in Protected Industrial Action from December 1 as a result of our current Enterprise Bargaining Agreement. As you can appreciate, I am not able to comment about this. I will, however, assure everyone in our community that if undertaken, this action will not jeopardise the safety of anyone in the community. All members of the Victoria Police force took a vow to protect life and property and help those in need of assistance.

A reminder about the ongoing firearms and weapons amnesty, and the recent changes to firearms storage requirements. The amnesty gives you the opportunity if you have an unregistered or illegal firearm, to hand that firearm in to a police station or a Licenced Firearms Dealer without fear of prosecution. The law around firearms storage changed in August 2022 and we are still seeing non-compliance with the new requirements. The firearm safe needs to be "purpose built", and not the old clothing locker. It needs to be of steel construction with the thickness of the steel no thinner than 1.6mm. I know these safes are available at the hardwares' in Lancefield and Kyneton, and all licenced firearms outlets.

The Country Fire Authority have declared that the Fire Danger Period for Macedon Ranges Shire will start at 1am on the November 27 this year. The CFA and Victoria Police will act under a zero-tolerance policy and any fire lit in the open air within Macedon Ranges will result in a date before the Magistrates. Police won't be issuing warnings, and the possible consequences to the loss of life or property will not be glossed over. Remember "you light it, you own it".

CRIME:

Over the last 6 weeks reportable incidents have remained

steady. It has been noted that through the Macedon ranges incidents of burglaries and theft have involved houses, sheds and unlocked cars.

TRAFFIC:

With the warmer weather and increase in cyclist's on the roads, here's a timely reminder about the laws that came into force on the April 26 2021, involving motorists and cyclists sharing the roads. The laws state that motorists should pass cyclists at a minimum of 1 metre when travelling in 60 kph zones or less, and a minimum of 1.5m when travelling in speed zones over 60 kph. Drivers should also consider the width of anything that they are towing if it exceeds the width of their car.

The change of speed limit along Kilmore-Lancefield Road to 60kph between Main Road and Doggetts Bridge is not an advisory speed limit, it is an enforceable speed limit.

Don't forget the School Zones locations, times and the speed limit of 40 kph. Remember the speed zone starts at the first 40 sign, not the second and ends at the 60 sign.

Most of you would know the amount of patrolling that I do along Three Chain Road between Lancefield and Carlsruhe and Lancefield Tooborac Road as an enforceable but also a visible deterrent. I would like to say that the number of speed offences has dropped dramatically. It has been noted the decrease in the traffic accidents involving serious injuries along the main rural roads. This comes after a shocking year where fatalities on our roads Victoria wide are 44 higher than last year and the highest in a decade.

FIRE DANGER PERIOD AND HEAT PREPARATIONS THIS SUMMER

Residents are being urged to prepare for an increased likelihood of warmer and drier conditions over summer, with the Country Fire Authority (CFA) declaring the Fire Danger Period for the Macedon Ranges beginning on November 27, ending on 1 May 2024 (unless otherwise advised). During the Fire Danger Period, no fire may be lit in the open air without a permit.

Council is focused on working with the community to collectively reduce our shire's fire risk, including undertaking an annual roadside slashing program across Council-managed roads to reduce the likelihood of fires starting from hot vehicle exhausts, mechanical failures and collisions.

Council's Municipal Fire Prevention Officers are also conducting property inspections across the shire to check for fire hazards and issue Fire Prevention Notices where appropriate.

Residents are reminded of the importance of being prepared for fires, and to ensure their properties are maintained to ensure there are minimum flammable fuels including stockpiles of green waste and foliage in gutters. Free green waste disposal is available for ratepayers and tenants at Council's transfer stations in Kyneton, Romsey and Woodend.

Excess cardboard, polystyrene, e-waste and textiles can be recycled at your local resource recovery facility for free.


OTHER WASTE REDUCTION TIPS:

THE TRUTH OF CHRISTMAS

Jesus told him, "I am the Way—yes, and the Truth and the Life. No one can get to the Father except by means of me. (John 14:6, Living Bible).

Spoiler alert. If Santa is part of your Christmas tradition, don't read any further.

We have never 'done' Santa in our house. You know, the bloke that brings you gifts; sees everything you do; works out whether you are naughty or nice; and on one night of the year is everywhere all at once.

RURAL LANCEFIELD BIN COLLECTION CHANGES

From the first week of February 2024, properties south of Three Chain Road and some properties north of Three Chain Road (including Institute Road, Wisemans Lane, Dohertys Road, Egans Lane, Forest Road, McKinley Track and Croziers Road) will be moving from the 2B collection area to the 1A collection area.

Rural Lancefield properties will now have their bins collected on a Thursday in line with the regular Lancefield township collection.

Affected properties will receive a letter in December detailing the change. The change is expected to improve bin collection service efficiency and reduce the total kilometres travelled by waste collection trucks each week.


The Rotary Club also wishes to thank the owners of properties along the walking track who have been able to keep the grass down regularly in support of the Avenue of Honour.

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

was in preparation for Remembrance Day (Saturday 11 November) where the RSL and the whole community came together to remember the sacrifices that countless people have made in service of their country. Remembrance Day has evolved since it was first initiated by allied countries after World War I, in which more than 60,000 Australians lost their lives.

The Avenue of Honour plaques have been placed along the walking track in remembrance of all Australians who fought in wars or peace keeping missions. The Avenue of Honour was initiated by the Romsey Lancefield Rotary Club and the Romsey Lancefield RSL and continues to develop each year with new plaques being added.

ACCESSIBLE CARE

The Victorian government is delivering on its promise to improve access to health care for more Victorians, with community pharmacists across Macedon able to provide treatment and advice for a range of common conditions.

The 12- month pilot will give Victorians more choice about where and how they access basic primary care, especially for people struggling to access an affordable or bulk-billing GP close to home. Services include advice or treatment for women with uncomplicated urinary tract infections (UTIs) or a resupply of their existing contraceptive pill without needing a prescription – with a broader public health vaccination offering, travel health consultations and treatment for mild skin conditions to roll out in coming months. Part of a \$20 million investment in the Victorian Budget 2023/24, around 400 pharmacies across the state have signed up for the pilot, with another 200 set to join the program. Pharmacies who have not yet joined are encouraged to sign up.

Victorians won't be charged for a pharmacy consultation for UTIs, mild skin conditions or a resupply of the contraceptive pill – pharmacies may charge a fee for a travel health consultation and vaccinations, while the cost of medication will remain the same as a prescription from a GP. At its conclusion, the pilot will be evaluated, and any recommendations will help inform longer-term decision making around the role of community pharmacists.

Romsey Pharmacy is part of the trial, as are pharmacies in Riddells Creek, Woodend, Gisborne and Kyneton.

Congratulations to all our winners, and well done to all the competitors. It was a great day, and everyone had fun.



A TOUGH YEAR

It has been a tough year for many Australians and people around the world. Our planet has endured the hottest 12 months in recorded history, climate change induced floods, droughts and bushfires. Also, wars in the Middle East and Ukraine and inflation have wreaked havoc.

Australia is not immune from the devastation; add in the despair of many of our indigenous people following the "voice" referendum debate and ensuing result, our housing and cost of living crisis. Hopefully, sooner rather than later, the higher interest rates set by the Reserve Bank curb inflation and governments across the country act to reduce the impact of the housing crisis on the most vulnerable and are able to come up with solutions to a problem that has been developing over many years.

On the cost-of-living front there is some good news, I hope, on energy prices. I think we are all aware that a number of factors combined last year to push up gas and electricity prices. The encouraging news is that the wholesale price of electricity in the September Quarter this year was half of that a year before. Win! Win? It is a win for the environment as the penetration of renewable power, particularly through rooftop solar, has reduced the reliance on fossil fuels and was a major reason given for the lower price. Hopefully the lower wholesale price feeds through to consumers when retail prices are set next year!

On a personal level, despite higher tariffs, our total energy bill has gone down. Our house is all electric. Firstly, we installed a standard 5KW rooftop solar system, secondly, we stopped buying wood and relied on our inverter split system for heating, thirdly, we replaced our outdated electric hot water system with a heat pump which uses 80% less power and I finally got rid of the 1996 Falcon and replaced it with a more fuel-efficient car. As we continue to "Rewire Australia", greenhouse emissions will decline and the cost of energy to households and businesses is expected to eventually decline. Maybe we can get to Net Zero by 2050. with regard to electric cars. We have seen sales of new electric cars increase from 33,410 in 2022 to 46,624 in the first half of this year. Looking ahead, the rapid improvements in battery technology and the economies of scale in electric car production in China, Korea, the US and Europe should lead to better, more affordable cars. Also, the "Fuels Emission Standard" that the Federal Parliament is expected to legislate should lower prices and increase the range of electric cars available to the Australian market. In the near future electric car ownership will be less costly than petrol/ diesel alternatives.

This will be a welcome development as Melbourne's population is expected to surpass Sydney in the mid 2030s and become a megacity (over 10 million people) in the 2050s. In New Delhi the air quality has been so bad recently that local government has brought in an "odd-even" vehicle rule to mitigate pollution. In Singapore, to reduce pollution and congestion locals must bid for a 10-year Certificate of Entitlement. Combined with other fees the cost of a new Subaru Forester is now more than \$230,000!

At the local level, it was great to see the return of the Lancefield Show and people streaming through the gate. The show increases the visibility of volunteer groups like us. We signed up 13 new members who hopefully will enable us to take on more projects and gather new ideas on how we can enhance the environment and liveability in the Romsey/ Lancefield area.

Deep Creek Landcare Group has nesting boxes for bats, birds and phascogales for sale from \$25. We also have Myna bird traps to lend out. Annual Landcare membership is \$20 per family. CONTAINER DEPOSIT SCHEME

Good news is that on November 1, Victoria's container deposit scheme, CDS Vic, commenced. The scheme rewards Victorians with a 10-cent refund for every eligible can, carton and bottle they return. The network of refund points will grow to more than 600 by August next year. Visy operates the scheme in our area, the Northern Zone.

Eligible drink containers display the 10-cent mark. Locals can pop along to 8/8 Mitchell Court Romsey where Andrew will be in attendance from Monday to Saturday between 8:30 am and 3:30 pm. Participants can elect to receive cash or support a charity or community organization with a donation.

We hope that this eagerly awaited scheme will reduce litter and landfill and be part of a progression toward a more circular economy.

YEAR 3 HEALTH & WELLBEING EXCURSION - KYNETON BOTANIC GARDENS

On Wednesday 25 October the students in Year 3 attended the Kyneton Botanic Gardens for a Health & Wellbeing Excursion. The purpose of the excursion was to explore the physical, mental and emotional benefits of nature and spending time outdoors. Through a playful exploration of the Kyneton Botanic Gardens, our students were encouraged to see themselves as part of the natural world and consider how being in nature could contribute to positive emotional and physical wellbeing.


YEAR 6 MEN'S SHED VISIT - GROUP 3

EMRBATA THRIVING VILLAGES FUNDING SUCCESS

EMRBATA has been successful in its application to the State Government Flood Relief Grant Program. With the assistance of a professional consultancy (www.villagewell. org), "Town Activation Plans" will be developed for Romsey and Lancefield. These will identify and address deficiencies in both towns as they relate to visitor economy product, economic leakage and identification of opportunities. It will ultimately aim to build business resilience and thriving communities. The Romsey and Lancefield projects will dovetail into Tourism Macedon Ranges' Thriving Villages Project (also funded through this State Government Grant Program) which addresses the broader regional situation. The project will commence in May and be completed by November. Stay tuned for further developments on this exciting opportunity for our eastern region.

SUBMISSION TO MRSC BUDGET

EMRBATA has made a submission to the 2024-2025 MRSC Budget to support a Specialist Horticulture Position to be responsible for the specialised parks and gardens in the Shire. Of particular interest to the eastern corridor is the Romsey Ecotherapy Park which (along with the Shire's Botanical Gardens) needs specialised care in order to retain its visitor and local appeal. The Romsey Five Mile Creek was acknowledged as an important local asset in the Draft Romsey Structure Plan. As such, EMRBATA will be lobbying for the implementation of Stage 2 of the Five Mile Creek Master Plan. The Lions' proposed skate park upgrade in Romsey is an important project for both locals and visitors to the region and is also worthy of Budget consideration. With skateboarding now an Olympic sport, the appeal and need (especially amongst younger people) is not in doubt. Congratulations to the Lions' Club for pursuing this important infrastructure project.

By the time you are reading this, the EMRBATA Annual General Meeting will have occurred and a new Committee installed. This has been an incredibly busy year for EMRBATA, with much work going into development of a Strategic Plan and Governance process review as well as the usual activities and ongoing advocacy. As a result, the organisation has clear direction and a renewed commitment and strategy to engage its members and advocate for the region. EMRBATA is looking forward to 2024.

CHRISTMAS TIDINGS

Christmas is the most wonderful time of the year for sharing delicious repasts with family and friends. Followed by the requisite New Year Resolutions of post-Christmas pound shedding with weight loss at the top of many of our agendas. Given this is the last edition for the year I thought I would end with an explanation of a little-known fact that carries much wonderment when revealed - where does excess weight go when we lose it?

Drum roll - the majority of weight loss occurs via breathing. The mass that you lose doesn't simply disappear, the majority of the "lost" weight is actually breathed out as carbon dioxide, making your lungs the primary excretory organ for weight loss.

When you lose weight, the carbon atoms from the fat molecules you are burning are released in the form of carbon dioxide (CO2). This carbon dioxide is then expelled from the body through the lungs when you breathe out. So, as you burn fat for energy, you are essentially exhaling the majority of the by products in the form of carbon dioxide. Thus, when you lose 10kg of fat, 84 percent of that will be breathed out as carbon dioxide from your lungs. This is why, in terms of mass, a significant portion of weight lost is expelled through the breath.

It is worth noting that this doesn't mean simply breathing more will make you lose weight. The body needs to be in an overall calorie deficit for weight loss to occur, but the excretion of carbon dioxide through the lungs is a fascinating aspect of the metabolic processes involved in losing weight. And on that note, Happy Christmas and New Year to all.

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ROMSEY STORM WASTE FACILITY WINS SUSTAINABILITY AWARD

Council's flagship storm waste facility now has a trio of awards to its name, having been recognised at the 2023 Keep Australia Beautiful Victoria Tidy Towns & Cities Sustainability Awards. Taking out the EPA Waste Prevention and Reduction category, it is the facility's third award following recognition in the Health & Safety Excellence (Small to Medium Enterprise) category at the 2022 Australian Workplace Health & Safety Awards (in partnership with Tree Mason and Action OHS Consulting) and the Special Projects Initiative category at the 2023 LGPro Awards for Excellence. Located near Romsey, the Council-managed facility was developed out of the need to respond quickly to the severe destruction caused by storms in June 2021, with a focus on eliminating green waste by creating repurposed products for impacted councils and communities. CEO Bernie O'Sullivan said Council was thrilled that the storm waste facility had been recognised for another award and that it again highlighted the benefits of regional scale, upcycling products back to affected landowners and a strong partnership between local and state government.

strong collaboration between Council and a number of hardworking Council staff, Emergency Recovery Victoria and the community," he said. "We were not only able to act swiftly to solve a major problem in a very practical and cost-effective way, but the most pleasing thing is to have been able to give back to affected communities." Since its implementation, the facility has processed over 65,000 tonnes of tree and storm debris, while returning recycled or repurposed products back to impacted communities with a total market value of over \$35 million, including: timber for community projects, fencing supplies and retaining wall sleepers, stakes for Council tree planting programs, free firewood for nearly 2,000 Macedon Ranges residents, 90 truckloads of root balls to enhance fish breeding habitat within rivers and water systems, hundreds of cubic metres of sawdust for local pig farmers, and over 180,000 cubic meters of mulch.

"The facility sets a new standard for post-disaster clean up and is a model that could be easily replicated anywhere, so hopefully our learnings will also help give other councils an idea for a practical solution for emergency recovery, should they ever need it," Mr O'Sullivan said.

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BE INVOLVED IN SETTING A NEW VISION FOR LANCEFIELD PARK

The Lancefield Park Committee of Management and the Macedon Ranges Shire Council have commenced a planning process to prepare a new master plan for Lancefield Park. The master plan will be a review and refresh of the 2012 master plan, and will set a new vision for Lancefield Park that will help us guide future use and development.

Simon Leisure, a recreation planning company, has been appointed to assist the Committee and Council with the preparation of the master plan. A building architect (Brand Architects) and a landscape architect (MEMLA) are also members of the consultant team. The consultant team undertook a comprehensive review of Lancefield Park facilities and buildings on in November, with the Committee.

Workshops for the CoM and representatives from all user groups are being planned for December 5. The workshops will be facilitated by Richard, from Simon Leisure. They will provide an opportunity for each user group to meet with Simon Leisure individually to share their ideas for future use and development at Lancefield Park. Richard will also circulate a short questionnaire to each user group to collect base data on club membership and numbers of teams (or numbers of participants for non-sporting groups), and facilities/ spaces used and frequency of use, etc. The workshops will be an 'Open Forum' for the CoM and user groups to raise other issues and opportunities for the park in general.

The Committee and Council share a view that the new vision for Lancefield Park will embrace new ideas and suggestions from the Lancefield community; we want to strengthen residents' sense of belonging and ownership of the park. To help progress this, a Community 'Drop-In Session' will be scheduled in early December to encourage local residents and community groups to tell us their ideas and suggestions to improve the park, particularly if there is an activity or setting that they believe could make Lancefield Park even more attractive as a destination for community recreation and socialising.

There will be more opportunities early in 2024 for Committee members, user groups and the broader community to contribute to the development of the master plan, when a draft master plan is completed and ready for review.The Committee look forward to working with the community to develop the new Lancefield Park master plan.

SUPPORTING THE COMMUNITY TO BE POWER READY IN AN EMERGENCY

The storms of 2021 demonstrated the importance of many services made possible with electricity and how crucial a resilient energy back-up is to keep them available during and after emergencies.

An advanced backup energy system has been installed at Lancefield Park; it includes solar panels, batteries, and a backup generator. The Victorian Government has funded the program at the Park along with 23 others across the state. Lancefield Park will act as a hub for the local community during any prolonged power outages providing some limited access to electricity for the community. The backup energy system will also provide considerable carbon and electricity savings for the Lancefield Park Laurie Green Pavilion.

MARTINS ROAD CULVERT UPGRADE TO START NEXT YEAR

Preparations are underway for works to upgrade a key culvert in Baynton near the northern border of the Macedon Ranges.

The Martins Road culvert is located over Todds Creek in Baynton, about one kilometre east of the Feeneys Lane intersection.

Works are set to include:


- the replacement of the existing culvert
