NEW KINDER ON THE HORIZON



Early site works are set to begin this month to prepare for construction of a new Kindergarten and Maternal and Child Health centre in Lancefield. A planning permit has now been approved for the project at 76A High Street, with the modern three-room facility to be complemented by accessible and secure entries as well as a dedicated rear playground area. Early works will include the installation of temporary fencing, site clearing and levelling works, and installing building footings and stumps. This will then pave the way for installation of the modular buildings transported to site, building fit-outs, landscaping and all other required works.

Council's Director Community Maria Weiss said the priority project for Council was expected to be operational by mid-2024. "This project will provide many benefits for the community including increased kinder places for local children, local Maternal and Child Health services, and space for community-based and supported playgroups," she said. "We're grateful to many groups for collaborating with us to make this a reality including the Lancefield

Park Recreation Reserve's Committee of Management, the neighbouring Men's Shed and the Lancefield Playgroup committee."

"We look forward to seeing the project take shape and will continue to work closely with these key stakeholders and others – including contractors, the neighbouring primary school, residents and current kinder families – to enable a smooth build and transition once the new centre opens."

Key features of the current site will be protected and retained, including heritage gate pillars at the entrance and the mature trees bordering the west and south of the site. The off-site construction of the modular buildings means a more efficient and less disruptive build. The project has received \$3 million in funding through the Victorian Government's Building Blocks Capacity Building Grants stream and will be delivered by the Victorian School Building Authority. Council has allocated a further \$144,000 to ensure the new centre is fully furnished and has improved environmental and sustainable design elements.

Ann Shipcott made it successive wins in the women's final by defeating Greta James.

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

MYGRAND FATHER'S CLOCK

The Romsey &Lancefield Districts Historical Society is starting off the year's events with not a bang but a chime! Renowned historian, Emeritus Professor Graeme Davison is coming to the Lancefield Mechanics' Institute on February 10 to talk about his latest publication: My Grand Father's Clock – four centuries of a British-Australian family.

When the 200-year-old grandfather clock in his great-aunt's bequest finally came to live in Graeme's house it started him on a journey deep into his father's family's past. From the Scottish Borders to Carlisle to Birmingham to Edwardian Australia; from the Great War to his own suburban childhood. Graeme's inheritance started him on a contemplation of time and how we think about it, and he wrote the book having already explored his mother's family history in a previous book, Lost Relations.

Graeme's interest in history began in childhood, way before the clock was bequeathed to him. His grandfather was a printer, and a Methodist preacher, whose interest in books was both professional and artistic; his father was a tradesman with an ear for stories, and the tales suggested by historical artefacts like books and family treasures. It is a paradox most of us would recognise that the death of parents is often what spurs us to explore previous generations of our families – just when our access to memories which may enlighten us with facts and details has been lost to us.

Time regimes shape our lives, says

Graeme, who is, ironically, "notoriously unpunctual"; he endured more than one school detention for lateness, which made no difference after he left school and continued his tardy way into adult life. So much for watches and the regime of time!

Time and the clock are the unifying motifs tying this story together. This current book looks at how we are formed by previous generations, and it encourages us to reflect on the people and events, small and large, that affect our lives. The clock itself was made in Annan on the Scottish border with England around the beginning of the nineteenth century. An horologist has described it as "a good middle-class clock".

Graeme's uncle reported that when he was in the UK in 1929 for a Boy Scout Jamboree, their great grandfather said, when the clock whirred and struck: "Listen – our ancestors."

This fascinating talk takes place on February 10, with doors opening at 1.30pm, and the talk beginning at 2pm in the Annex of the Lancefield Mechanics' Institute, High Street, Lancefield.

Cost is \$35 which includes country style refreshments, including tea and coffee, local wines and beers. Graeme's book will be on sale for the special price of \$40 on the day; usually \$50 in bookshops or online.

Gwen, who grew up in Lancefield, has been receiving a printed copy of the Mercury for many years, mainly to read to her husband Ken who also had a connection to our town. This letter was written before the new floods hit Rochester.

JARROD SHAW




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

This year is continuing to look good for our ever-diversifying Lancefield & District Farmers' Market with a full spread of local and regional producers booked to attend Saturday February 24 along the High Street from 9am to 1pm. Twenty years on from its inception the market continues to offer locals the best opportunity to buy direct from farmers and food producers in the local district (and beyond).

We are pleased to announce that this year two super local farming families will be joining the fold at Lancefield. Macedon Ranges Lamb is produced in Sidonia by John Stewart and his family. The farm has been in John's family for six generations and is now also a regenerative farming enterprise, committed to leaving the land in an improved state with a farming model that sequesters carbon, builds topsoil & creates conditions for healthy animals that are naturally more robust and healthy. Macedon Ranges Lamb has been available from online orders, with hampers of various meat cuts being sold prior to Christmas through the farm's online store. John is looking forward to trading at Lancefield.


Larder Mouse Farm is 130 acres located on Bryce's Lane, Newham and are producers of British White cattle, one of the oldest breeds of cattle native to the United Kingdom. Farmers Barnaby and Lucy Olson are also both from the UK. British White cattle are considered a rare breed, they are actually on the critical list of breeds with the Rare Breeds Trust of Australia. They are a resilient and hardy breed and also highly productive.

'LMF' will be supplying market-goers with individual beef cuts, sausages, mince and burgers, all vacuum sealed and labelled along with value boxes to give customers options when they commence at the market later in the year. The farm launched its farm gate shop in November last year and while this has been a great development for their farm plans, farmer Lucy Webb-Wilson said, "We would also like to give customers the option to pre-order online and collect from our stall at the market which would give them a chance to browse the market and purchase from other stall holders." Till they start trading at the market you can go online (www.lardermousefarm.com. au) to make an order to pick-up direct from their farm.

The Lancefield & District Farmers' Market is an initiative of the Lancefield Neighbourhood House and aims to connect local and regional food producers with the local community and build on farming and food production enterprises across the region. Community groups can participate in a 90-minute training on supporting youth in healthy relationships, led by experts from CASACV. These workshops were crafted by a team of 14 local young people, with assistance from various experts and organisations.



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TEA FOR YOU?

In colonial times tea-trees were unloved; to be cleared to make way for crops and grazing pasture. An exception was when tea supplies didn't arrive from England and an infusion of native tea-tree leaves in hot water had to suffice – hence, their common name.

Tea -trees are a favourite of our Landcare group. Over the years we have planted plenty of Prickly Teatrees (leptospermum continentale) and Woolly Teatrees (leptospermum lanigerum); often in damp areas and along creeks. Prickly Teatrees grow quickly to around 2 to 3 m and flower profusely in late spring and summer. Woolly Teatrees flower around the same time and grow quickly to about 4 m, both can be cut back and hedged if desired or used in flower arrangements. Teatree flowers attract a myriad of insects and birds. They are important in the production of honey with Manuka honey coming from the nectar of leptospermum scoparium which is indigenous to New Zealand and some parts of coastal Australia. Teatree oil, however, does not come from teatrees but from Melaleuca

alternifolia.

A couple of other similar shrubs that we love are Sweet Bursaria (bursaria spinosa) and Bushy Needlewood (hakea decurrens). Like tea-trees, the flowers on both are fairly small and sweetly scented. Sweet Bursaria grows quickly up to about 8 m and flowers during early summer. Bushy Needlewood grows to about 5 m and has white, sometimes pink flowers during winter. Both are great habitat plants — they are prickly and offer protection for small birds such as blue wrens and their flowers attract bees and insects which in turn attracts micro bats and birds that feed on insects.


Varroa mite poses a real problem for the European honey bee and insecticide use and climate change are impacting on insect populations around the world; consequently we must aim to improve habitat and the diversity of pollinators.

Australia is home to 400 butterfly, 11000 moth and 2000 bee species. There are 1300 known species of ants, 3000 species of beetles, 5650 species of bugs and up to 30000 species of flies!! Add in caddisflies, dragon flies,

earwigs, cockroaches, wasps, lacewings, grasshoppers, phasmids, mantids, mayflies, scorpion-flies, spiders and others. No wonder, when I pop outside and have a close look at plants, particularly indigenous plants, I see a vast array of insects, many of which are beautiful and unknown to me. However, what I do know is that they are all important -they are doing their bit to sustain ecosystems, millions of years in the making. These insects need shrubs, trees and grasses and the plants, in turn, need insects. Planting shrubs such as Tea-trees, Sweet Bursaria and Bushy Needlewood is a great step in the right direction and their scale allows for many of the insects to be at eye level. This means that they are easy to find and observe, but be patient! Many insects are skittish but get used to our presence after a while and resume activity. Combine this with the beautiful, scented flowers and we are on a winner!


And after the run, runners and volunteers usually adjourn to The Lodge for a delightful breakfast – or just coffee. It's a good start to the day.



PROTECT YOURSELF FROM MOSQUITO-BORNE DISEASE

Mosquitoes can carry diseases that may be passed on to people through mosquito bites. In Australia, some of these include Murray Valley encephalitis virus, Ross River virus, Barmah Forest virus, Dengue virus, Japanese encephalitis and West Nile virus. Periods of heavy rainfall or floods can lead to ideal breeding conditions for mosquitoes, even in non-tropical areas. Diseases that are spread by insects are known as 'vector-borne' diseases. Mosquito-borne diseases can make people ill and, in severe cases, can cause death.

How to avoid mosquito bites:

There are many simple things you can do to avoid getting bitten by mosquitoes, including:

- wearing long, loose-fitting clothes if mosquitoes are around
- covering up as much as possible
- · using an effective mosquito repellent, containing either

- picaridin or diethyltoluamide (DEET) on all exposed skin
- using plug-in mosquito vaporisers or diffusers with repellent-treatment pads in enclosed external areas like verandahs and decks - these should be switched off as soon as the area is no longer in use
- · preventing mosquito breeding around your own home
- maintaining fly screens on windows, doors, vents and chimneys (screens should be no coarser than 12 x 12 meshes per 25mm, or 1.2mm - use an even coarser mesh if you wish to keep out other smaller biting insects, like sandflies)
- using mosquito coils in outdoor areas these should be supervised at all times.

AROUND THE RANGES

REMOVAL OF LANCEFIELD DEVELOPMENT PLAN OVERLAY DECLINED

A request to the Minister for Planning to remove the Lancefield Development Plan Overlay, which would have simplified development requirements for affected landowners, has been declined. The request to remove the Development Plan Overlay Schedule 24 (DPO24) from the Macedon Ranges Planning Scheme was submitted in April 2023 following a resolution by Council.

In reviewing the application, the Minister acknowledged that DPO24 was introduced to provide certainty and guidance for landowners, and coordination and conformity of residential development in the three development areas of Lancefield. In addition, its introduction occurred via a statutory process that included public exhibition; that provided an opportunity for interested parties to make submissions and to have their views considered by an independent planning panel.

In declining the request, the Minister explained that the removal of DPO24 may give rise to potential risks associated with land being developed in an uncoordinated manner and create further difficulties for residential development to take place. Director Planning and Environment, Rebecca Stockfeld, said Council was disappointed with the outcome. "We have worked closely with impacted residents and listened to their concerns and frustrations with the current

planning overlay," she said.

"Council will continue to work with the affected landowners on future options for development in the area."

RAGLAN STREET CLOSURE

Council also endorsed the closure of Raglan Street – at the intersection of Chauncey Street – in Lancefield, in consideration of feedback through earlier community consultations. The information presented to Council at their October 27 meeting stated that pedestrian access would be maintained.

The new Lancefield Kindergarten is expected to be ready on site in the second quarter of this year. It will be built off site and moved to the block beside the Primary school.

Funding of \$550,000 has already been committed by the Victorian Government towards construction, while Council allocated \$20,000 towards initial planning works in the Budget 2023/24.
- Draft Complaint and Unreasonable Behaviour
 Policy this policy outlines how Council will manage complaints and unreasonable behaviour and provides clear guidance for both the complainant and Council.

- Draft Special Charge Scheme Policy this policy applies to Special Charge Scheme (SCS) infrastructure projects such as resident-funded upgrading of roads and drainage.
- Draft Fair Access Policy this policy supports Council in the identification and removal of systemic factors contributing to gender inequality relating to the availability of quality community sports infrastructure at times that are suitable.

The launch of Your Say supports a strategic priority in the Council Plan 2021-2031 to 'Enhance customer experience through the transformation of our services, to ensure they are easy to access and provide user-friendly experiences'.

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YOUR SOUL

If you try to hang on to your life, you will lose it. But if you give up your life for my sake [that is, for Jesus], you will save it. And what do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul? Is anything worth more than your soul? (Matthew 16:25-26, NLT)

Your soul is where the physical (your body) meets the spiritual. Your soul is all of you, your 'life'. When you refer to "my soul", you are literally saying "I, myself". The original word in Greek in the verses above is psychē ($\psi u \chi \eta$), which sums it up pretty well. Even the translation of 'life' in the verses uses the Greek word psychē.

I have always found "And what do you benefit if you gain the whole world but lose your own soul?" an evocative question. A

number of bible translations actually say, "forfeit your soul", making it sound like you have cancelled yourself. An attribute of your soul is its existence beyond physical survival and success. The verses above are saying that the things of this world will not do you any good if you "forfeit" your eternal existence.

We often think about "gaining the whole world" in terms of material possessions, but for me it also means instances of lowering my standards or compromising my morals. Romans 12:2 says, "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind."

Are you chasing after the things of this world, or are you compromising the things that you shouldn't? Is anything worth more than your soul?


RURAL BIN COLLECTION CHANGES


GLOBAL FINE WINE CHALLENGE

macedonrangesdogclub.org.au). Induction is the first Sunday of the month and once you have done your online member registration you will be contacted by email with your induction date and time.




