



### Regional Commission on Homelessness



- No. 1 in the nation for our efforts to house people more than 3,400 individuals during the past year
- Federal funding to our region has increased by 70% since we implemented a Housing First strategy in 2015, including a record \$12 million dollars this year
- Private funding has tripled, including a \$5 million grant from Jeff Bezos Day 1 Family Fund

## City of Orlando Three-Year Action Plan on Unsheltered Homelessness



### Three-Year Action Plan on Unsheltered Homelessness

- Reduce the presence of unsheltered on the streets of Orlando by 50%
- No child spends the night on the streets of Orlando
- ·Clean and safe streets for all users



### City's Role in Homelessness

- City funds \$3.8 million annually to partner agencies focusing on city priorities within our regional system of care
- Focus on city priorities within that systemurban core has unique needs
- Outcome-based
  - Shelter
  - Housing
  - Employment
  - Next step toward ending homelessness
