About the Friends of Dane County Parks, Inc. and the Endowment

The Dane County Park System has grown to more than 15,000 acres of parks, trails, wildlife and natural resource areas as well as two working farm parks, seven dog parks and three cultural sites. Additionally, the system receives over 2.5 million visitors per year. The park system is run by dedicated professional staff and supported by a legion of over 4,000 volunteers and 16 active parks Friends groups.

The Friends groups are composed of people who love the parks and are willing to help support the parks. These Friends groups are the main stewards of our natural resource areas, helping to restore native landscapes, creating and maintaining hundreds of miles of trails, and providing over 150 public education and outreach activities for visitors.

In 2013, the County Board and Executive authorized the Friends of Dane County Parks Endowment to provide a permanent, self-sustaining non-supplanting fund, to support these Friends groups and volunteers. The fund is held and managed by the Madison Community Foundation. With the financial support of individual private donations, the fund has grown steadily each year. Currently it has raised nearly \$500,000 and the goal is to grow it a million dollars over the next years.

Dane County Parks is teaming up with The Friends of Dane County Parks, Inc. and United Madison to host a one of a kind Parks & Trails Unite Festival from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday, June 2. This free community event will encourage unity, give us the opportunity to lift each other up to better understand and learn from each other, and celebrate our amazing parks and trails and the community connections that they provide.

The festival will take place in BOTH Lake Farm County Park and McDaniel Park, which includes the new Lower Yahara River Trail and its mile-long boardwalk bridge that connects the two parks and provides an off-road trail connection between Madison and McFarland that didn't previously exist. The festival will include live music, food carts, motivational speakers, educational and cultural displays, live demonstrations, local TV and media personalities, activity stations for adults and kids, pontoon rides, a biergarten, and other activities too numerous to list.

The funds raised from the event will be stretched far and wide to benefit our community in a way never done before. A majority of the proceeds will help build the capacity of Dane County volunteers and the 16 friends groups that support individual county parks. The work that these individuals do for the betterment of Dane County Parks and our communities is essential. Last year the parks had over 3,500 volunteers that put in an unbelievable 66,880 hours.
