Ho-Chunk Nation Youth Programming

Funded by a grant from the Foundation, The Friends of Capital Springs Recreation Area (FOCSRA) hosted Ho-Chunk Nation youth for a week of outdoor and cultural activities at William G. Lunney Lake Farm County Park in June. The Park and surrounding Capital Springs Recreation Area is the ancestral homeland of the Ho-Chunk Nation (HCN).

The HCN youth group is led by Shelley Thundercloud, who coordinated cultural activities for the week. Clare Carlson is the naturalist for FOCSRA, who coordinated outdoor park activities. Youth spent time learning about prairies and observed wildlife like turtles, deer, and many birds such as blue herons. Youth used binoculars to view birds and look out across Lake Waubesa from the Lower Yahara River Trail boardwalk. Youth also discussed traditional Ho-Chunk uses of plants found at the Park (signs are made courtesy of the grant), participated in HCN traditional games, canoed on Lake Waubesa, and caught fish.

In addition, FOCSRA along with Dane County Parks and other partners welcomed the HCN historic dug-out canoe journey through the four lakes and down the Yahara River. The welcome event on June 21st included the HCN youth. The canoe was made from a cottonwood tree harvested from Lunney Lake Farm Park. County Executive Joe Parisi, Foundation President Bill Lunney, along with others welcomed the paddlers accompanied by drummers from the Madtown Singers. Ancestral food was catered by Wild Bearies of Tomah. It was a memorable event.

Board Member Announcements


The Foundation welcomed two new board members this spring who will bring a wealth of experience and insight to our work:

Foundation Grants Feed People

As the President of Anderson Park Friends, Inc. (APF), I've seen firsthand how impactful Foundation grants have been for our organization's efforts to help members of our community. We are growing vegetables in our quarter-acre garden at the Anderson Farm Center in Oregon to feed hungry families, seniors, and children in southern Dane County. Fresh produce is expensive in grocery stores and is beyond the budgets of many people, and food pantries are limited by the small amounts of fresh produce and only on an ad hoc basis.

The food pantry garden utilizes only volunteers to plant, maintain, and harvest the garden. Two Foundation grants made a dramatic difference in our operations by funding a new Troy-Bilt rototiller (2021) and partially

Centro Hispano Junior Naturalist Session

The Foundation is again supporting the Junior Naturalist Program at the Lussier Family Heritage Center as a way to introduce more youth to nature through the Dane County Parks.

After a successful pilot program during summer 2021, the Junior Naturalist education program is back in full swing this summer! The Foundation secured a grant from American Family Insurance Dreams Foundation to fund the program last year, and with another generous donation from the Dreams Foundation in 2022, a special session of Junior Naturalist is being hosted for youth from Centro Hispano.

Staff from the Lussier Family Heritage Center built upon their relationship with Centro Hispano to offer this special session. Throughout July, a group of 25 students explored various Dane County Parks, learned about plant and wildlife identification, and participated in other hands-on conservation experiences. The program aims to teach participants about their local ecosystems, familiarize them with Dane County Parks, and teach them about careers in conservation. By offering a session specifically for youth from Centro Hispano, Dane County Parks and the Foundation hope to dismantle barriers that can impede access to parks and careers in conservation for people of color. Thanks to the funding secured by the Foundation, all program costs were covered for Centro Hispano participants.

To mark the conclusion of the session, the Healthy Parks Healthy You partnership hosted a celebration for participants and their families with dinner and fun activities at Lunney Lake Farm Park. The event was designed to celebrate the accomplishment of all the Centro Hispano youth and provide an opportunity for family members to enjoy the parks as well.

Parks Director Update

We are thrilled that **Joleen Stinson**, who succeeded Darren Marsh in an interim role in 2021, has recently been hired as the Dane County Parks Director. Joleen serves as ex-officio on the Foundation's Board and is the liaison between Dane County Parks and the Foundation. Joleen grew up on the west side of Dane County and has been recreating in Dane County Parks her whole life. Joleen started volunteering with one of the Friends groups as a high school student. She graduated from UW-Stevens Point with a degree in natural resources management and environmental education in 2006. Most of Joleen's career has been in

Parks, Recreation and Forestry in smaller municipalities in Dane County, including the City of Sun Prairie and Villages of DeForest and Waunakee. In 2020, she was chosen as the Outstanding Park Professional of the year by the Wisconsin Park and Recreation Association. The award recognizes park professionals who show outstanding leadership and dedication to their communities and the park industry.

funding a new irrigation system to provide water to 12 acres of land (2022). The equipment increases the amount of food we can grow and leverages our volunteers' talents and time by decreasing the need for manual labor in the garden. The irrigation system installed in early July 2022 has enabled us to harvest vegetables during July's recent heat wave. Last year we didn't have the system and lost about 300 pounds of broccoli because of high heat and drought.

This year's goal is to raise over 3,000 pounds of fresh vegetables. Onions, zucchini, kohlrabi, and broccoli have already been harvested. The August-September harvest will consist of green beans, 3 kinds of squash, peppers, cabbage, and sweet corn. Research shows these are the most requested vegetables by pantry participants. New varieties are experimented with each year to learn if they are a better match for the soil and are resistant to insects and disease. Volunteers come from APF members, community groups, and high school students. For example, the Oregon High School girl's cross country team volunteers about 60 hours each year. We are thankful for the Foundation's and community's support!
