Welcome back to the start of our summer term. Yes, that's right, we did say summer term! We can't believe how quickly this academic year has gone. We hope that you had an enjoyable and restful break. It is lovely to be back and whilst we enjoyed our Easter break, we were very excited about getting back to school and seeing the children.

A gentle reminder regarding completion of homework

In preparation for upper key stage 2, we would like the children to ensure that they are completing their homework each week. Most children should be able to complete this independently, however we do ask that it has been uploaded to seesaw by Tuesday evening. All children have been given a seesaw login. Merits are also awarded to children on completion of homework. Thank you in advance for your support with this.

What have we been doing?

This week in English, we started our new writing genre 'Biographies'. We have been finding out all about a member of our class and writing our first biography about them. Please remember to help your child to complete the sheet that was sent home and attached to the final newsletter/homework of the spring term (also attached at the end of this newsletter/homework). It is important that the children bring this in on Monday 25^{th} April (thank you to those who have brought this in).

In Maths, we have started the topic 'decimals'. Specifically, the children learnt about tenths and hundredths on both a number line and a place value table. This is the first time that the children have learnt about decimals and they are working very hard to grasp this new concept.

In Science, we started our new topic 'living things and their habitats'. This topic will allow the children to understand how living things are grouped and classified. They will also explore how environments can change and subsequently pose a threat to living things.

In History, we started our new topic The Scots and Anglo-Saxons'. This is very exciting as it allows the children to learn about what happened once the Romans left Britain. We have booked an external company to come in and lead a workshop around this topic on Monday 9th May. This does however incur a cost and has been set up on the parents pay. Please may we kindly ask that you make payment as soon as you are able to. Please do speak to your class teacher if you would like to discuss anything.

This term in Art, the children will be having a go at weaving and embroidery. We haven't forgotten about the pictures that we said we would include of the Roman Sandals. We are in the process of making a display for these in the corridor and as soon as it has been completed, we will include a picture in the newsletter.

In PSHE, our topic is 'Relationships'. Please have a look at our curriculum page on the Danegrove School Website for more detail as to what will be covered within this topic.

The windows in the classrooms will continue to remain open, therefore it is important that children wear a jumper or cardigan should they feel the cold. <u>Please ensure that children are wearing the correct school PE kit on both days (Tuesday all classes, 4SI Thursday and 4TK and 4JJ Friday).</u> Please see the school website or speak to your class teacher if you are unsure. Finally, please can we have some boxes of tissues for our classrooms. Thank you to those parents who have already donated.

Anglo-Saxon and Scots Invaders

By around 410AD, the last of the Romans had left Britain to go back to Rome and England was left to look after itself for the first time in about 400 years. Emperor Honorius told the people to fight the Picts, Scots and Saxons who were attacking them, but the Brits were not good fighters.

The Scots, who came from Ireland, invaded and took land in Scotland. The Scots split Scotland into 4 separate places that were named Dal Riata, Pictland, Strathclyde and Bernicia. The Picts (the people already living in Scotland) and the Scots were always trying to get into England. It was hard for the people in England to fight them off without help from the Romans. The Picts and Scots are said to have jumped over Hadrian's Wall, killing everyone in their way.

The British king found it hard to get his men to stop the Picts and Scots. He was worried they would take over in England because they were excellent fighters. Then he had an idea how he could keep the Picts and Scots out. He asked two brothers called Hengest and Horsa from Jutland to come and fight for him and keep England safe from the Picts and Scots.

Hengest and Horsa did help to keep the Picts and Scots out, but they liked England and they wanted to stay. They knew that the people in England were not strong fighters so they would be easy to beat. Hengest and Horsa

brought more men to fight for England and over time they won.

However, men from other countries also wanted to take over in
Britain and they attacked too. These invaders are called the
Anglo-Saxons because the two biggest groups were called the
Angles and the Saxons. Other invaders were the Jutes, Franks
and Frisians. They came from Germany, Holland and Denmark.

The Anglo-Saxons ruled in England until the 11th century AD.

In 1066AD, William the Conqueror from Normandy beat

King Harold II at the Battle of Hastings. This was the end

of Anglo-Saxon England and the start of Norman rule.
