## Question 1

$$
\frac{d y}{d x}+y \tan x=\mathrm{e}^{2 x} \cos x, y(0)=2 .
$$

Show that the solution of the above differential equation is

$$
\begin{equation*}
y=\frac{1}{2}\left(\mathrm{e}^{2 x}+3\right) \cos x . \tag{7}
\end{equation*}
$$

## Question 2

$$
y=(1+x)^{2} \cos x \text {. }
$$

Show clearly that ...
a) $\ldots \frac{d^{3} y}{d x^{3}}=\left(x^{2}+2 x-5\right) \sin x-6(x+1) \cos x$.
(6)
b) $\ldots y \approx 1+A x+B x^{2}+C x^{3}$, where $A, B$ and $C$ are constants to be found.

## Question 3

$$
\frac{d^{2} y}{d x^{2}}+\frac{d y}{d x}-2 y=6 \mathrm{e}^{-2 x}
$$

with $y=3$ and $\frac{d y}{d x}=-2$ at $x=0$.

Show that the solution of the above differential equation is

$$
\begin{equation*}
y=2 \mathrm{e}^{x}+(1-2 x) \mathrm{e}^{-2 x} . \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

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## Question 4

Use the method of differences to show that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\frac{1}{1 \times 2 \times 3}+\frac{1}{2 \times 3 \times 4}+\frac{1}{3 \times 4 \times 5}+\ldots+\frac{1}{n(n+1)(n+2)}=\frac{n(n+3)}{4(n+1)(n+2)} . \tag{8}
\end{equation*}
$$

## Question 5

a) Sketch a detailed graph of the curve with equation

$$
y=\operatorname{artanh} x
$$

defined in the largest real domain.
b) Obtain a simplified expression for $\frac{d y}{d x}$, in terms of $x$ only.
c) Use integration and the answer of part (b) to show that

$$
\operatorname{artanh} x=\frac{1}{2} \ln \left[\frac{1+x}{1-x}\right]
$$

No credit will be given for any alternative methods used in part (c).

## Question 6

$$
z^{3}+4=4 \sqrt{3} i
$$

By considering the sum of the three roots of the above cubic equation show that

$$
\begin{equation*}
\cos \frac{2 \pi}{9}+\cos \frac{4 \pi}{9}+\cos \frac{8 \pi}{9}=0 \tag{10}
\end{equation*}
$$

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## Question 7



The diagram above shows the curves with polar equations

$$
\begin{aligned}
& C_{1}: r=\theta^{2}, 0 \leq \theta \leq \frac{\pi}{2} \\
& C_{2}: r=2-\theta, 0 \leq \theta \leq 2
\end{aligned}
$$

The curves intersect at the point $A$.
a) Find the polar coordinates of $A$.
b) Show that the area of the shaded region is $\frac{16}{15}$.

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## Question 8

$$
\int \frac{\ln x^{2}}{x^{3}} d x, x \neq 0
$$

a) Show that the substitution $y=\frac{1}{x}$ transforms the above integral into

$$
\begin{equation*}
\int 2 y \ln y d y \tag{4}
\end{equation*}
$$

b) Hence evaluate

$$
\int_{1}^{\infty} \frac{\ln x^{2}}{x^{3}} d x
$$

showing clearly the limiting process used.
