


It was hard to keep track of the many characters woven into the story. I think there was even a ghost telling her bits but I'm not certain!

Last September Fleet u3a started a pickleball group. In the first term 26 members played on four badminton courts at Hart Leisure Centre. This term 39 members on six courts.

Reet is big enough to support a group on its own but there are some members on a waiting list who cannot play at the selected time. Also, some would like to play more than once a week. Odiham uSa have a group that plays every two weeks, although some members would like to play more often.

Smaller u3as in the area might have a problem getting enough members together to support a group themselves. There are probably enough potential members around to start another group, although they may be spread over a number of u3as.

Financially, Reet Group share the costs of the court hire, members purchasing their our own paddles and balls without the support of Reet u3a. A new multi-u3a group could set its own rules and handle its own finances, with the agreement of the various u3a committees.


It is hoped that a group leader for the new group could be found from within Fleet's existing group so some experience and continuity would be carried over.




