### Our last speaker

n February 15<sup>th</sup> it was a welcome back to Paul Whittle with another of his fascinating illustrated talks: *The Venetian Connection*.

The title says it all and it was a history of Venice and more particularly the history of The Republic of Venice from 810 – 1797 roughly from a Byzantine start to the conquest by Napoleon.

Acquiring the "stolen" relics of St, Marks in the 9<sup>th</sup> century, the city became a major sea




power and trading city with a ship building industry supplying ships for the  $1^{st}$  Crusade [1096].

By the time of its most famous son Marco Polo, and his travels along the Silk Road to China in the 13<sup>th</sup> century, the city was the major centre in the world for banking and trade.

During the renaissance period the city grew, becoming the printing capital of the world. After suffering some severe plagues and, with the rise of the European nations' sea power, the city state was ripe for conquest when Napoleon appeared on the scene in 1797.

Today historic Venice and its canals are an UNESCO world heritage site, threatened by global warming, subsidence, pollution and its own popularity as a must-see destination for visitors in cruise ships.

Although the Victorian house no longer stands, remnants of its historic landscape remain, including specimen trees and the lodge at the end of the main drive.

Found by Erin Kinsley is a very straight forward story line. A child






Although what happens to Ewan during his kidnapping is clear, it is not described in any depth in the story. Which quite frankly in this day and age, makes quite a change.

We have friends who have taken up bowls,


But only the small ones (those without holes).
