

Spotlight: Just Not Worth It Prevention Campaign

**Educating Teens on Substance Use Risks** 





The "Just Not Worth It" prevention campaign is targeted toward teens and young adults who may be at risk for trying and continuing to use drugs illegally. This encompasses both illicit drugs (like heroin and meth) legal drugs taken illegally—typically cannabis and prescription

medications.

The goal of the campaign is to educate teens and young adults on the risks to their health, well-being, life-opportunities, and relationships. However, as a critically important component of any campaign targeting young adults, the mood and method of the messaging is purposefully constructed to avoid triggering the reflexive opposition so common to young adults. Instead, the campaign's messaging allows them a way to choose a different path without losing face.

Instead of blame, the campaign addresses the issue from the perspective of friends that love and miss the person that is currently using. By showing only love and despondence on their friends' part, there is no negative accusation to push back against. As a secondary goal, the campaign serves as a discussion platform for adults to discuss illegal drug use with young adults in their care.

# **Community Outreach Happenings**

Community outreach involves being in the community and educating people about the negative effects of alcohol and drug use. Informing families about the risks of marijuana, vaping, opioids, fentanyl, meth, and alcohol helps to prevent and reduce alcohol and drug-related issues across Ventura County. We strive to develop relationships with partner organizations and members in the community for collaboration and support regarding substance use prevention.

During the past few months, we attended and participated in many

outreach events and offered presentations. Here are a few highlights:

- Pacifica High School Freshman Orientation Resource Fair in Oxnard. This was a great event to attend because not only did youth attend but many parents accompanied them. The incoming freshman can get their schedule, hear an introduction from the school administrators and staff, get a tour of the campus, and learn about the academic and athletic programs the school has to offer. Incorporating a resource fair to this event was great for the families because they had the opportunity to see what the community has to offer for their new high schoolers. Many parents were interested in our vaping and marijuana resources.
- Adelante Comunidad Conejo Resource Fair in Thousand Oaks.
   More than 120 families attended and many stopped at our table to take brochures and ask questions. Adelante Comunidad Conejo is a community organization whose main goals are advocacy, networking, and support for the Latino community. Many Spanish-speaking parents had questions regarding opioids, fentanyl, and fake pills. Several had heard about it from the news but didn't know how it may affect them or their families. Community members shared how grateful they were to have us educating them about these issues.
- 911 Emergencies in the 805 in Thousand Oaks. In July
   Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin (D-Thousand Oaks) and the city of
   Thousand Oaks co-hosted this event highlighting the local
   emergencies and challenges with respect to water, wildfires,
   medical issues and landscape sustainability. We provided
   resources about our overdose prevention program.
- Santa Paula PRIDE Resource Fair in Santa Paula. We attended Santa Paula's first PRIDE Resource Fair event. The focus was to offer LGTB youth of Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru a safe place and friendly environment where they could get resources and enjoy a day of activities. Several agencies were in attendance offering resources for LGTBQ youth. We shared our Prevention resources and how to access treatment services.

#### Tell us a little about yourself.

Almary: I was born in San Pedro Sula, Honduras. I immigrated to the United States when I was four years old and have lived in Ventura County since then. Service has always been a huge part of my life and I love getting to work with the community. I am a big believer that you can always learn something new with every person you meet, and they can learn from you as well. For 11 years I worked with the Catholic church, which opened the doors in getting to work more with diverse communities throughout the state of California. I am a public speaker and try and use my voice and platform to uplift and give a voice to the voiceless. I love Disney, Star Wars, animals, food, and traveling.

#### Tell us about the work you do in your community.

Almary: I work for the Cabrillo Economic Development Corporation, which provides housing and services to veterans, farm workers, seniors, people with disabilities, and low-income families. I help people from all walks of life and build relationships with them. I bring in different community organizations that are educational and uplifting for them.

## How has the pandemic affected you during the past years?

Almary: I was laid off in June of 2019 and then the pandemic hit. I took the time to rest and travel when it was safe. It was very much needed and I was able to focus on my health, hike, and enjoy the beautiful nature in Ventura County.

#### What are your hopes for the future?

Almary: To continue working with the community and serve others. To be more united as a community. I have seen first-hand that when you put your own beliefs aside and just talk with a person without judgement, you can learn so much from them.

#### What does a "hero" mean to you?

Almary: A "hero" can be anyone of any age and background. Whether you're seen or not, always know that you can make a difference in someone's life. You never know how a simple "hello" can go a long way. Being a hero doesn't mean you have to have any special superpowers or doing something heroic like running into a burning building. It's holding the door open for someone, giving up your seat to an elder, or wishing someone a good day. It's the little moments that can go a long way.

#### Do you have any words of inspiration for us?

Almary: "Do small things with great love" - St. Teresa of Calcutta. This has always been my motto in life, especially during those times where it feels like what I am doing is not enough. It's the little things and moments that come from the heart that will touch people more. Even if they don't tell you, I promise they will remember how you made them feel.

#### Let's test your knowledge:

- 1. True or False: Secondhand vaping affects other people too.
- 2. True or False: The chemical particles from vaping can go from room to room, even between apartments.
- 3. True or False: The indoor vaping risks from vaping can last for days.

Vaping can potentially cause harmful effects on your body; however, you might decide you want to vape anyway, but what about the people around you?

Secondhand vaping is like secondhand smoking, when someone vapes around you or indoors, it affects other people too, especially children. The chemical particles from vaping can go from room to room, even between apartments. They can go through air vents and electrical outlets so just vaping in another room is not safe for your loved ones or neighbors, if you live in homes that share walls, such as apartments or townhomes.

The aerosol in vaping sticks to everything it lands on, furniture, carpet, toys, and more, and the chemicals don't go away until it's cleaned; therefore, the vaping risks from vaping can last for days. This can be dangerous for children and even pets.
