THE END OF A GREAT HISTORY

On January 15, 1878 The District Telephone Company of New Haven was incorporated. At some date this year the company will be history. Some might say that the company ended on October 1998 when SBC bought SNET. Between those many years the company was known as The Connecticut District Telephone Company, The District Telephone and Automatic Signal Company, The Connecticut Telephone Company, Southern New England Telephone Company, and Southern New England Telecommunications Company.

There were many "firsts" for the company but also for the industry because of the people who worked there. The very first telephone directory, world's first commercial exchange, the first private toll line, the world first telephone booth. The first commercial toll line in service. Let us not forget the first female telephone operator and the very first coin box telephone. All of these achievements in the first 11 years.

And that was not the end. Our company went on to be the first state in the nation to have complete dial service, first company to offer what became known as Total Phone. Now every form of communication has those features. First to bring fiber optics to local telephone exchanges. Connecticut was the 3rd in the nation to provide Enhanced Statewide 911. One second billing, one of the last to charge customers for directory assistance, the first to offer competition in the long distance arena, cable TV franchise, security systems for the home, and the purchase of the only other remaining independent company in New England known as Woodbury Telephone.

I could go on and on about floods, blizzards, hurricanes, wars, the depression years, regulatory issues, divestiture, labor issues, change of control. But in the end it has been sold. This sale really has no impact on the history except it

adds an ending to the book. This time the sale separates the people. In the selling and name changes over the years the people remained for the most part in place. Not any longer. If you are still employed by AT&T and your job function is part of the sale, on that date of closing you now are Frontier employees and will be Frontier retirees... Not SNET, SBC, nor AT&T.

We are witness to a change in history. How will the future be written is up to another board of directors. We wish them success as we regard what is in place currently as "ours".

Let us never forget the people we all called family are still family and our contributions to the success of our business in our home state was done with innovation, pride, commitment, and satisfaction to go beyond the call.

Thanks to William Kane for some of this history detail. He currently is celebrating his 49th year of service at the company.

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What AT&T's \$5 Billion Cellular Tower Selloff Says About Strategic Assets

The buy-it-or-rent-it debate is common to anyone who drives a car or needs a place to live, and big companies face the same question with their strategic assets. AT&T (T) announced an agreement late Sunday to dispose of 9,700 cell phone towers it uses for its network, in a \$4.85 billion deal. For the next 28 years, AT&T will lease 9,100 towers to Crown Castle International (CCI)—one of the largest operators of such towers in the U.S. and Australia—and sell the rest outright.

AT&T's decision to shed an asset critical to its core business isn't as counterintuitive as it may seem. Operating leases are a key financing tool for many companies, helping to free cash for other uses. Hotels and other large corporations often sell large chunks of their real estate holdings only to lease them back. Airlines do the same with airplanes, a fairly important piece of hardware in that industry. Earlier this year one of South America's largest airlines, Latam Airlines Group (LFL), sold 25 new jumbo jets—the cornerstone of its international growth strategy—to leasing firm AerCap Holdings (AER) for \$2.6 billion.

"The main thing is, can you bundle up some towers and sell them in a way that preserves your ability to access those towers as

you need new capacity?" AT&T Chief Executive Officer Randall Stephenson said last month at a Goldman Sachs (GS) conference, calling the company's towers "not strategic" to its business. "If we can do that and monetize them, then it's just something I'd like to do."

AT&T will lease capacity on the towers for at least 10 years for a monthly fee of \$1,900 per site, with the rent rising 2 percent each year; it can extend the leases for the next 50 years if it chooses. The biggest U.S. phone company has experience with

these arrangements, as it already owns about 15,000 towers mostly managed by others. For Crown Castle, the deal will make AT&T its largest customer, representing more than a quarter of its annual revenue, and boost its collection of wireless towers by one-third.

"This transaction we've announced is all about growth, pure and simple," CEO Ben Moreland said today on a conference call with analysts. Crown Castle has spent \$9 billion to add more than 7,000 towers and 10,000 small cell networks over the past 18 months, he said. Rival American Tower (AMT) had expressed interest in the AT&T towers late in the sales process, the Wall Street Journal reported, citing people familiar with the situation.

AT&T Closes Directory Assistance 411 in Connecticut

February 27, 2014 CUTW LOCAL 298 of CWA Today - Customer Information Services, formerly Operator Services closes its doors in Connecticut. Another page turned and more job losses here in Connecticut. In 1998 the SNET TIMES special addition announces that SNET's future looks bright, with a picture of Dan Miglio, President of SNET and Ed Whitacre, CEO of SBC shaking hands announcing a \$4.4 billion transaction that will "combine companies" promising a bright future for us in Connecticut.

According to the archives at the Thomas Dodd research center at UConn, The District Telephone Company of New Haven was incorporated in 1878 had the World's first directory, and the World's first private Toll line from Blackrock to Bridgeport. We also had the first telephone booth and coin-box telephone. In 1879 Marjorie Gray was hired in

Bridgeport as Connecticut's first women operator. That was then, this is now.

Instead of the 1,400 new SNET jobs pledged to Connecticut at the time of the merger, these jobs have been siphoned to other states and outside the country, far from the bright future we envisioned (New Haven Register, 1998). Ahhh yes, SBC lured Connecticut with cash and promises.

An additional factor contributing to the loss of operators was the charging for the directory assistance calls. As predicted, the charging of calls would eliminate the jobs.

Now AT&T East no longer has coin telephones and no longer has telephone operators. We say good bye to those dedicated operators today, and wish them a bright future. We are sorry to see you all leave, but know that you will not be forgotten.

AT&T to Sell Connecticut Wireline Assets to Frontier for \$2 Billion

December 17, 2013 - AT&T Inc, the biggest U.S. phone company, said on Tuesday that it would sell its wireline operations in Connecticut to regional telephone operator Frontier Communications for \$2 billion in cash, to help fund network upgrades.

Frontier shares rose more than 8 percent after it said the deal would boost its dividend payout ratio, generate savings and improve its adjusted free cash flow.

Since many people are disconnecting home phones in favor of wireless services, regional operators such as Frontier have had to look to acquisitions for growth. AT&T, which depends on wireless for growth, and has said it would look to sell non-strategic wireline assets.

Citi analyst Michael Rollins said the addition of AT&T customers would help boost Frontier's valuation.

"With broadband penetration above Frontier's average already, we view the transaction as largely a financial opportunity for Frontier to present better near-term free cash flow metrics," said Rollins, who said its shares could rise as high as \$5.15 as a result of the deal.

Frontier shares were trading at \$4.77, up 36 cents in midafternoon trade on Nasdaq.

Credit Suisse analyst Joseph Mastrogiovanni said the price implies an enterprise valuation of 4.8 times earnings before

interest, tax, depreciation and amortization for the phone lines and compares with a multiple of approximately 4.5 times for assets Verizon Communications sold to Frontier in 2009.



Atlantic Equities analyst Chris Watts said it made sense for AT&T to exit its Connecticut wireline business as it is the only state in the U.S. Northeast where it operates traditional phone service. Its main operations are in the South and Midwest.

AT&T cited the deal as a source of funding for ongoing upgrades of its wireless and wireline networks. But along with its sale on December 16 of wireless towers to Crown Castle for \$4.83 billion, the Frontier deal could also help support global ambitions as AT&T is considering expanding into Europe.

"Two billion dollars in additional cash financing wouldn't harm that at all," said Watts.

But on its own, the deal does not move the needle much financially for AT&T, which said the Connecticut operations bring in \$1.2 billion in annual revenue, or less than 1 percent of its expected 2013 revenue.

AT&T said the deal will not affect its 2013 results and that it does not expect significant changes to its project VIP network upgrade, which involves a

wireless upgrade with faster data speeds and an expansion of its U-verse service.

AT&T said it still plans to keep serving wireless consumer and business clients in Connecticut and will continue with its planned wireline network upgrades in its remaining 21 states.

FINANCIAL BOOST FOR FRONTIER

Under their agreement, Stamford, Connecticut-based Frontier will buy more than 900,000 phone lines, about 415,000 broadband connections, and about 180,000 of AT&T's U-verse video subscribers.

The deal, expected to close in the second half of 2014, is subject to review by federal and state regulators.

Frontier, which operates in rural areas and smaller towns in 27 U.S. states, said it expected the deal to improve its adjusted free cash flow per share in the first year after closing and help it achieve annual savings of \$200 million after integration.

It also promised a 5 percent increase in its dividend pay-out ratio for the first year after the deal close.

About 2,700 AT&T employees, most of whom are part of the Communications Workers of America union, will join Frontier after the deal closes and Frontier has agreed to honor their existing labor contract, according to the companies.

Companies Test Plans to Cut Their Health Costs

At Walgreen, the giant drugstore chain, employees now have a much broader choice of insurers and plans. Once limited to two options, either from a local Blue Cross plan or UnitedHealthcare, workers can now choose among as many as 25 plans from five insurers, depending on where they live, including Kaiser Permanente, the well-known California-based H.M.O.

As health care costs continue their steady climb, employers are looking for ways to slow the pace. A survey of large employers released on Thursday showed that companies were shifting more costs onto their employees but were also experimenting with concepts like private exchanges that allow companies like Walgreen to offer their workers more choices in health care plans.

The average annual cost of coverage for both employers and workers increased to \$12,535 in 2014, compared with \$11,938 last year, according to the survey of 595 large companies by Towers Watson, a benefits consultant, and the National Business Group on Health, a Washington-based employer alliance. Employees are paying almost a quarter of the amount, now \$2,975 a year, up nearly 7 percent from 2013.

While there are few signs that the nation's large employers are likely to drop coverage for their workers anytime soon, companies continue to hunt for new concepts, like private exchanges. Similar in design to the public exchanges created under the federal health care law, they are available only

to employees of certain companies and are not offered on the open individual market. Like the public exchanges, though, the theory is that by being part of an exchange that offers multiple plans, insurers will compete more aggressively on price. They would also push for better deals with hospitals and doctors and do better managing potentially expensive diseases.

The other appeal of the exchanges is to allow consumers to choose the kind of plan they want instead of having the government or the employer choose a plan for them. "Private and public exchanges epitomize the shift from wholesale to retail," said Ceci Connolly, a managing director for PwC's Health Research Institute, an arm of the consulting firm PricewaterhouseCoopers.

Employees, like individuals in the public exchange, can also switch insurers if they think their share of premiums has risen too quickly or if they struggled for hours on the phone trying to get a claim paid.

Only a small fraction of the 122 million workers now getting coverage through employers is currently enrolled in these private exchanges, but the number could rise to tens of millions by the end of the decade, according to Bruce Ballentine, who recently wrote a report on exchanges for Moody's Investors Service.

Several private exchanges are also being offered by large benefit consultants like Aon Hewitt, Mercer and Towers Watson, which are making significant investments and promoting the idea with their existing corporate clients.

"These benefit consultants have longstanding relationships with employers," he said.

Some insurers are offering exchanges themselves, with marketplaces looking more like an old-style cafeteria plan and limited to a single insurer but with a broader array of plans than an employer might typically offer.

"There are so many things that have the exchange name, and there are significant differences," said Cary Grace, the chief executive of Aon Health Exchanges.

Early results from Aon Hewitt, released Thursday, show that premium increases for companies on the exchanges are lower than companies without them. The average cost of premiums for 2014, for the 150,000 or so workers enrolled in its exchange the previous year, is expected to rise just 5.1 percent, compared with the 6 or 7 percent estimated for large employers over all.

Aon's model requires the insurers to assume the risk of paying the employees' medical bills rather than simply managing claims for the large employers that self-insure. By forcing the insurers to be responsible for the costs of the employees' health care, "we're realigning the incentives," said Ken Sperling, the Aon Hewitt executive who helped lead the effort. Aon says it has now enrolled more than 600,000 employees from different companies.

Like the public exchanges, Aon's private exchange also relies on dividing plans into tiers that offer varying levels of coverage. The

bronze plan, for example, has a deductible of \$2,500. Premiums vary by employer, depending on that company's history of medical claims.

Walgreen offered the Aon exchange for the first time for plans that went into effect this year. "We got overwhelmingly favorable response in the sign up process and the choices that were available to them," said Michael Polzin, a spokesman. With a broad mix of employees, the company was looking for a way to offer a variety of plans.

While employers could use private exchanges as a way to cap how much they will pay for health benefits, much the same way they use a 401(k) to replace a pension plan, Walgreen said it was not viewing the exchanges as a way of reducing its share of health costs. "We want to make sure our benefits are competitive," Mr.

Polzin said.

What the private exchanges like the one from Aon do not offer — yet — is an abundance of new entrants, like the co-ops created to offer nonprofit consumer-based alternatives on the state exchanges, or smaller plans offered by a large health system. Benefits consultants and others say the long-term goal is to achieve a diversity of offerings, but the current exchanges now favor large well-established insurers. "This is going to be iterative," Ms. Grace said.

Companies are turning to exchanges more aggressively for retirees, according to Ron Fontanetta, an executive with Towers Watson, and they are looking closely at the public exchanges for their part-time employees. The concept of these marketplaces is "a very clear trend," he said. "There's no question that many employers are

asking about private exchanges."

Employers are also looking closely at other ways of controlling health costs, including using on-site clinics or experimenting with different kinds of networks of hospitals and doctors, Mr. Fontanetta said. And while they plan to continue to pay for coverage, they are looking at ways they could reduce their financial commitment by scaling back what they pay for dependents' coverage, for example.

While health care costs have been rising more slowly in recent years than they have in decades, they continue to outpace inflation, Mr. Fontanetta said. Employers are thinking hard about what steps they can take to reduce their exposure, he said, at a time when health care is changing rapidly. "The current time period represents a watershed moment for employers."

2015 Health Care Changes

AT&T will be moving some retirees and/or their Medicare dependants to a Private Health Care Exchange for the year beginning in 2015. If this applies to you or a dependent covered by your plan a letter from AT&T was mailed to you earlier this year.

If you retired before 1/2/1992 you are not involved in this change for 2015.

and goes forward.

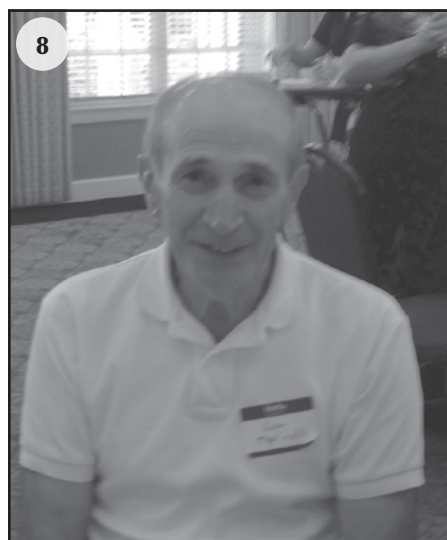
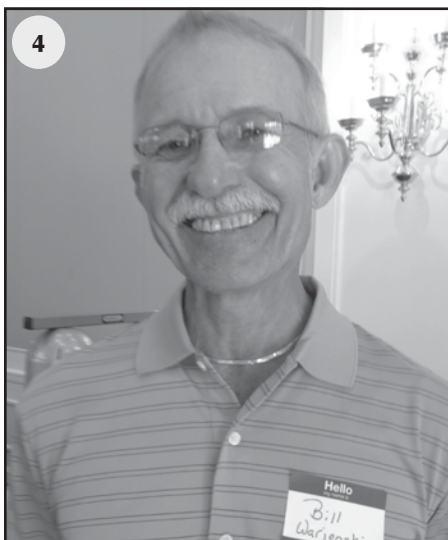
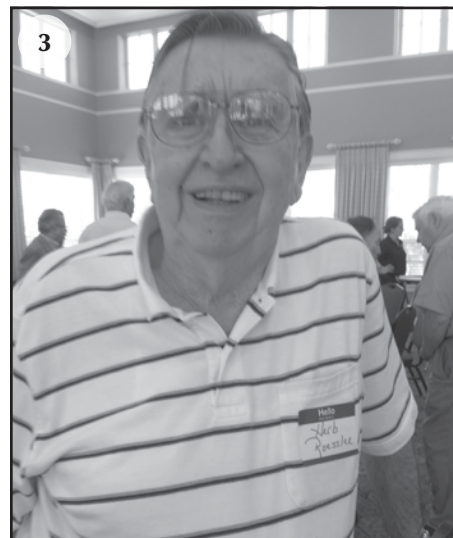
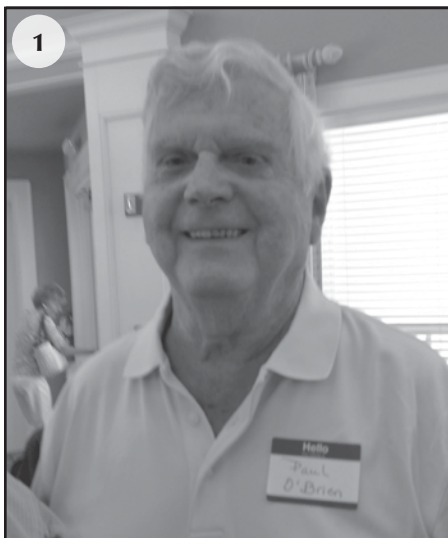

The SRA has been assured that AT&T is committed to timely communications though out the process of change and will be monitoring the vendor closely.

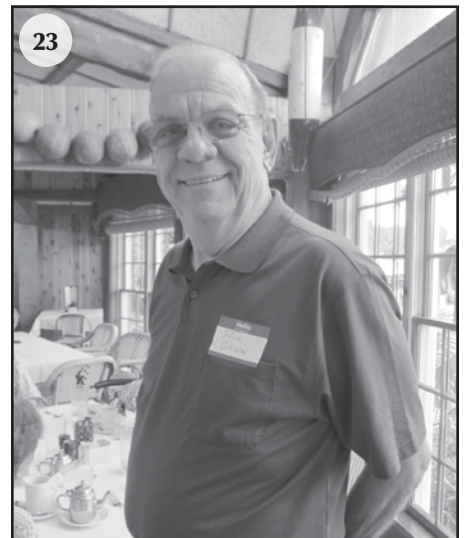
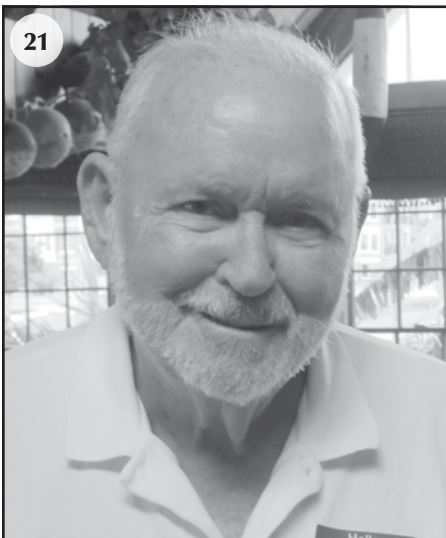
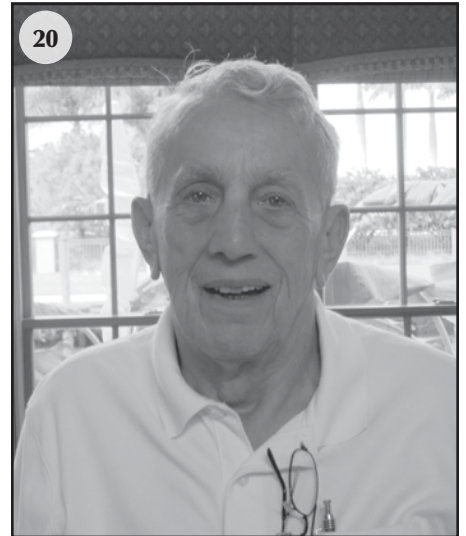
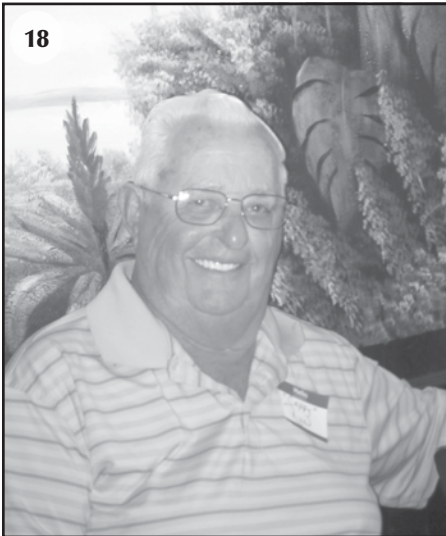
Annual enrollment will be in the October timeframe, but prior to that you should be well versed for selections. The next communication from AT&T is scheduled for April.
