



Amidst this deeply worrying global public health crisis which confronts us all, I did just want to send my heartfelt wishes to everyone in Australia at this very difficult time.

My Australian Trust is very much committed to supporting communities across the country to prepare for and respond to a rapidly changing world. This includes helping young Australians achieve their potential, supporting defence veterans and their families, as well as engaging the broader community in helping to build a more sustainable future.

Five years ago, my Australian Trust's first programme addressed the challenges veterans face during their transition from the defence force to civilian life. Having served in the Navy myself, I understand how important it is for veterans and their families to explore new enterprises using many of the skills they learned from their time in the service.

I am also proud that my Australian Trust is helping ways we design our towns and cities, supporting stronger and more sustainable local economies and societies, that can positively affect young Australians and the wellbeing of their communities.

Now, I fear those problems have gone from serious to potentially devastating. FOREWORD FROM OUR GROUP CHIEF EXECUTIVE



Prince's Trust Australia Group Chief Executive Dame Martina Milburn DCVO CBE

We reached the milestone of helping 1 million youth worldwide.

We plan to continue to grow and have even more impact.

The Prince's Trust Group is a global network of charities founded by His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales. Our mission is to transform lives and build sustainable communities worldwide.

In 2020-21, we supported 60,146 young people in 16 countries, including Australia, Barbados, Canada, Ghana, Greece, India, New Zealand and the UK, and we started our work in St Lucia and the USA. Additionally, in Australia and Canada we support military veterans to start up their own businesses.

Our history goes back to 1976. Concerned by youth unemployment, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales used his £7,400 severance pay from the Royal Navy to fund 21 community initiatives encouraging young Britons to start businesses. These early initiatives were the founding projects of what is now The Prince's Trust Group. In the past year, we reached the milestone of helping 1 million youth worldwide.

COVID-19 has inspired us to innovate, as we have actively delivered programmes online as well as in person, and we plan to continue to grow and have even more impact.

WELCOME FROM OUR CHAIR

I have been honoured to lead Prince's Trust Australia at a time when we have had to make fast decisions to pivot. As Australia moves forward into a new year and we rebuild and recover from the economic and social impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, the support we provide to our communities is more critical than ever.

During 2020–21, Prince's Trust Australia expanded its reach and impact. We supported more than 2800 young people this year, that is 1,890 more than any previous year. Our work on building more sustainable communities and supporting veterans and their families continues to grow.

We rapidly changed the delivery of our high impact programmes in response to public health restrictions. We transferred entirely online within two months and achieved even greater engagement and scale through digital delivery.

In 2021–22, we hope to return to a hybrid online and in-person programming model.

The Black Summer bushfires devastated communities on Kangaroo Island in South Australia. We are working with the community of Stokes Bay on the Island to rebuild their community hall, which was badly damaged in the fires.

We could not deliver our programmes across Australia without the ongoing support of all our Patrons and, in particular, our Founding Patron, Anthony Pratt of the Pratt Foundation, and our Platinum Patrons, David and Sallie Prior of the Prior Family Foundation.

I thank all who have helped us in our work with young people, defence veterans and sustainable communities.

Prince's Trust Australia is proud to contribute to improving the lives of youth, veterans and communities. I think one story of a Christmas concert explains why we do it all.

For decades, the locals of Stokes Bay on Kangaroo Island, SA, have held their Christmas concert in their community hall. In 2020, the community enjoyed the spirit of the season in a shearing shed instead as the Black Summer bushfires had devastated their beloved hall. Now Prince's Trust Australia is working with the community to rebuild that facility. While our numbers below are impressive, the individual children, parents, grandparents and community members in places such as Stokes Bay are what makes our work so important.

In the year ended 31 March 2021, despite COVID-19 challenges, we have deeply engaged with the community by:

- reaching 2,243 young people
- educating 475 educators and 87 parents
- achieving 208 participations by defence members and their families.

The social impact of our programmes is measurable. Eighty-three per cent of young people reported that attending Achieve Fest had improved their career aspirations and understanding of work (see page 16 for more.) Since we began this work, more than 100 veteran-community-owned businesses are now in operation.

DEFENCE MEMBERS AND THEIR FAMILIES

Prince's Trust Australia helps veterans and Australian Defence Force family members to build the confidence, skills, and networks they need to explore self-employment, create purpose-driven careers, and prepare for the rapidly changing world of work.



In 2020–21, we redesigned our 'Enterprise programme' for a digital audience, supporting 208 participants across 12 Enterprise programmes and 16 enrichment activities.

We also delivered our first dedicated Enterprise programme for partners and spouses of Australian Defence Force members. Unemployment, long-term underemployment and lack of meaningful employment create unique challenges for military families, particularly when this is exacerbated by fragmented social networks, regional isolation and primary caregiver duties. In response to this, the Enterprise programme was redesigned to better support military families as they explore agile, purpose-driven careers through their own businesses.

Our success would not be possible without our supporters, including the Department of Veterans' Affairs, Kay Bryan and Jules McLean, The Prince of Wales's Charitable Fund, Howden Group Holdings (DUAL Australia) and Accenture Australia.



Department of Veterans' Affairs

In November 2020, Prince's Trust Australia announced it would receive funding for entrepreneurship training and programmes from the Australian Government through the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

The grant is part of the 2020–21 Budget to broaden the Prime Minister's Veterans' Employment Program.

Trust Chair The Hon Julie Bishop remarked, "Today our veterans and their families face complex challenges as the future of work is changing rapidly. The funding support from the Department of Veterans Affairs will enable us to rapidly scale our successful and high-impact Enterprise for Veterans program."

LIGHTING THE WAY

Matt Lewis served seven years with the Australian Army and 15 years with the Queensland Police Service.

Matt created Guardian Lights- timber and resin 'night lights' - to help his fellow veterans and trauma survivors.

"It was after one of the first sessions with Enterprise Online when they asked us, 'what is your product?' I thought, this is what I want my product to be, so I better see if it works. And it did."

The 42-year-old battles with PTSD and anxiety. Matt said he turned to woodworking as a form of therapy. "It was very therapeutic in the sense that I could just concentrate on what I was doing and the attention to detail. It ignited something inside of me. I never had any ambition to start a business, it was just that I enjoyed working with the timber."



A COVID-19 BREAK

With a background in human resources and a degree in business, Ali Price was fortunate to spend the first decade of her career as an ADF partner working with the aviation industry, moving her career with each posting.

Until one day that stopped working. Ali spent the COVID-19 shutdown working on her brow beauty business – rebuilding her website, joining the Prince's Trust Australia Enterprise programme, and exploring new channels. Thanks to what she learnt, Ali created bespoke weekly videos for more than 50 of her clients, offered Home Brow Kits, and streamlined her business processes.

TAKING OFF

Alex Pryor joined the Australian Army as a commando in 2004. He was discharged in 2010 on top of his game after serving on a counter-terrorism task force and with a dozen deployments under his belt. However, the global financial crisis combined with old service injuries quickly impacted his successful transition to civilian work.

While on a DVA-facilitated placement with a defence contractor, Alex read about the Prince's Trust Australia entrepreneurial training programme in a company bulletin.

"Prince's Trust had these single day events, you know a 'come and see what it's like' on the dark side of start-up life," he said.

The 39-year-old started his small business journey with Pryority Droneworks, where he used familiar technologies from defence drones, scanners and sensors to create 3D data for the construction industry. Today, Alex is the chief operating officer of Sync Technologies, bringing technology and skills from defence into Australia's construction industry.

Alex went from commando to entrepreneur in less than a decade, successfully launching two technology-based businesses aimed at streamlining the construction industry and increasing productivity on job sites.

Business boomed during the COVID-19 pandemic - a 30% increase almost overnight, Alex said - when stakeholders and management needed to 'see' worksites without physically visiting them.

"Being military, that's where I thrive, I thrive in chaos," he said.

Alex credits Prince's Trust Australia with helping him take the leap of faith into entrepreneurship.





YOUNG PEOPLE

In 2020–21, young people faced greater obstacles to their learning and development than ever before. COVID-19 placed severe restrictions on our planned in-person delivery. In response, we rapidly innovated and adapted much of our support to online channels. We were already planning to support young people online – the pandemic served to accelerate and expand our plans.



Digital innovation is now at the heart of our work, as part of our overall 'blended' approach to delivery – combining online and in-person support as appropriate. With our partners, we have innovated and piloted new ways of engaging our community online, while continuing to support face-to-face where possible.

Inspired by the highly successful work of The Prince's Trust UK, we created our signature 'Achieve' education framework. This was developed in consultation with key stakeholders to meet the current needs of young Australians.

During 2020–21, Prince's Trust Australia supported 2,243 young people through 'Achieve Fest', a series of two-day immersive online experiences. Most of the young people were from Victoria (51%) and New South Wales (36%), the two states most severely impacted by the pandemic. Five per cent of participants identified as Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander or South Sea Islander.


In 2020–21, we delivered three Achieve Fests, two-day immersive online festivals supporting over 2,800 young people, educators and parents.

We launched a free online resource hub. All Achieve resources and materials are available at no cost to our community of students, educators and parents – particularly useful during lockdown.

We worked with our national network of schools to champion issues that matter most to young Australians.



SUCCESS STORIES

FINDING PASSION

Emma is the Assistant Principal at Viewbank College, a public state school in the northern metropolitan region of Victoria.

In October 2020, Emma and her team introduced 'Achieve' across the school's middle year levels. This engaged students aged 12 to 16 years in leadership opportunities, career pathways, education and enterprise skills development.

In March 2021, more than 200 students from Viewbank College attended 'Achieve Fest', a two-day online event. Emma says students have "continued to identify their passions



and strengths by building transferable skills" through the online resources designed by Prince's Trust Australia.

"Integrating Achieve into our school programming allows for informal mentoring and leadership opportunities for our year 10 students to pass on their learning to year 7, 8 and 9 students."

MEETING THE COVID-19 CHALLENGE

Shanae lives in Yarrawonga, a rural town on the border between Victoria and New South Wales. She is a year 11 student at Yarrawonga College and, like many young people, she could not see a clear path forward after school.

In 2020, Yarrawonga College moved to online learning due to COVID-19. Before participating in Achieve Fest online in March 2021, Shanae was unclear what life looked like beyond school. Achieve Fest helped her explore her interests, develop skills and connect to potential career pathways.

Shanae was supported by local legend Jim, a teacher at Yarrawonga College. After 36 years of teaching, he has not lost his passion for inspiring the next generation of young Australians.





Jim says, "We were experiencing remote learning and I thought, here is a great opportunity to engage our students in these challenging times. Achieve is great for students to work through at their own pace and to develop skills, confidence, career aspirations and understanding of the future of work."

Since attending Achieve Fest, Shanae has enrolled in a fitness course through her school and started working at a local gym. Post-school, she has decided to pursue a career in the fitness industry

ROLE MODELS

Research tells us that that many young people feel underprepared to transition from school and to make informed career decisions. On top of studying, exams and lockdowns, the prospect of choosing 'the right subjects' to set up a career path can be really daunting. But what if we stop asking young people what they want to be when they grow up, and start asking what they value, what they enjoy, and what they're good at?

Achieve Fest featured more than 20 diverse and inspiring changemakers, creators and leaders who shared their experiences in navigating nonlinear careers and creating a life of passion and purpose. Through interviews and live panel discussions, these role models shared their pro tips for success and insights to help attendees unlock potential careers.

Speakers include Code Like A Girl founder and CEO Ally Watson, social entrepreneur Mikhara Ramsing, abolitionist and Walk Free co-founder Grace Forrest, surgeon and author Ranjit Rao, international party DJ YO!MAFIA, Australian Consul General to the US Benson Saulo, The Man Cave and STUFF founder Hunter Johnson and motivational speaker and activist Spencer West.













SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES

The way we design our buildings, towns and cities matters. Increasing social and environmental challenges are having a profound impact on our communities and the places that sustain them.

Prince's Trust Australia is committed to helping communities create better places to live. It does this by delivering new exemplar developments and championing sustainable building and environmental projects, and through education programmes.

Our mission is to inspire design professionals and the development industry to be leaders in sustainable place making and to create better buildings and places for communities.

Prince's Trust Australia Executive Director, Sustainable Communities Director Justin Hewitt states, "The UN estimates the built environment accounts for 36% worldwide energy use and 40% C02 emissions. Traditional design principles offer us a new pathway towards building a more sustainable future."



Prince's Quarter, Glebe

The Prince's Quarter in Glebe, Sydney, is a partnership with the New South Wales Government to deliver 75 new social dwellings. Comprising two 'woolstore' apartment buildings and a terrace, the project is sustainable and uses traditional design to respect local heritage and character.

Enduring Design Masterclass

A partnership with the University of Queensland, the Enduring Design Masterclass teaches design students and trade apprentices traditional design and building techniques, from First Nations perspectives through to timber-framing and stonemasonry as part of a two-week programme.

Stokes Bay, Kangaroo Island, SA

Prince's Trust Australia is working with the community of Stokes Bay, Kangaroo Island, SA, to rebuild the Stokes Bay Community Hall, which was devastated during the 2019-20 Black Summer bushfires. The hall was a central place in the life of the community and the rebuild is essential for its recovery.

ENDURING DESIGN MASTERCLASS

Prince's Trust Australia has established a partnership with the University of Queensland to create an Australian first – the Enduring Design Masterclass.

The masterclass is a two-week intensive programme where students will learn traditional design and trades skills, and knowledge from Australian building traditions.

Together with the university, Prince's Trust Australia designed and developed the course's structure and content. The masterclass has been accredited as a two-unit Master of Architecture course.

There was high student demand to register and

There was high student demand to register and the June 2021 course was oversubscribed. The programme, however, was postponed to 2022 due to the ongoing impacts of COVID-19.



PRINCE'S QUARTER

As part of our continued partnership with the NSW Land and Housing Corporation, Prince's Trust Australia has supported the development of detailed design documentation for planning approval.

We have collaborated with the project architect and design team to achieve traditional design and sustainability objectives. This includes the confirmed use of sustainable timber framing, a first for mid-rise social housing in NSW.

A GATHERING PLACE FOR DECADES TO COME

Prince's Trust Australia is working with the community of Stokes Bay in Kangaroo Island, SA, to assist in the rebuild of the Stokes Bay Community Hall, which was severely damaged during the 2019–20 Black Summer bushfires.


The Stokes Bay Community Hall was a central place in the life of the community, a place where they could gather for celebrations, church services, sports tournaments and Christmas shows.

First established in 1960, a large proportion of the hall's structure, the original school hall and the recently completed kitchen extension were lost to the fires.

Through design services, project management, community consultation and fundraising, the Prince's Trust Australia is supporting the community at Stokes Bay. Together we are ensuring that the new hall can be rebuilt as a genuine place where the community can gather again, both today and for generations to come.



LOOKING TO THE FUTURE



In late 2021, Prince's Trust Australia delivered its worldfirst Enduring Design Masterclass at the University of Queensland.

A WORLD OF DIFFERENCE

Prince's Trust started in London, but today operates around the world.

We monitor and evaluate our support for young people, to understand how they progress after completing our programmes.

IN THE UK

Over the last five years, three out of four young people supported by The Prince's Trust in the UK reported that they had moved into work, education or training after completing one of our programmes. In 2020-21, The Prince's Trust in the UK continued to gather outcomes data from young people three months after they completed one of our employment programmes.

Of the 1,555 respondents to our survey, 1,107 young people were in a positive outcome after three months:

- 519 young people reported being employed
- 127 went onto further training
- 298 were engaged in education
- 170 launched a new business.

The outcomes rate for the young people we support in the UK remained stable during 2020-21, despite the challenges of supporting young people during the global pandemic. (Note: some young people reported that they achieved more than one outcome.)

STILL GROWING

Together with our partners during 2020-21, Prince's Trusts around the world supported 60,146 young people in the following 16 countries across the Commonwealth and beyond: Australia, Barbados, Canada, Ghana, Greece, India, Jamaica, Jordan, Kenya, Malaysia, Malta, New Zealand, Pakistan, Rwanda, Trinidad and Tobago and the United Kingdom.

Also during 2020-21, we started work in St Lucia and the USA are yet to begin supporting young people there.
