



Status of Issues and Topics in the 2021 Legislative Session

March 18 is the 67th legislative day in the 105 day session. There are 38 days left.

Bills have passed their chamber of origin and are now in the opposite chamber policy committees.

There are still several bills alive we're tracking.

Budgets for 2021-23 are expected in the next few weeks.

Revenue Forecast:

Both chambers will build their operating and capital budget proposals based on the March revenue forecast.

Forecast was released yesterday, March 17:

- Revenue (GF-S) for current fiscal year is up \$1.3 billion.
- Revenue (GF-S) for next biennium is up \$1.9 billion.

Unclear impacts to proposed 15% reductions in current FY.

Senate and House Budgets:

The Senate and House will now finalize their operating and capital budget proposals.

Possible release of these proposals will be delayed as they figure out what's in the recent recovery funding passed by Congress.

Washington could potentially receive up to \$7 billion in Recovery Act funding. State and local funding.

Key Bills Still Alive:

Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA)

ESHB 1056 Concerning open public meeting notice requirements and declared emergencies.

SHB 1329 Relating to public meeting accessibility and participation.

Salmon Recovery

<u>E2SHB 1117</u> Relating to promoting salmon recovery through revisions to the state's comprehensive planning framework.

E2SHB 1382 Streamlining the environmental permitting process for salmon recovery projects.

ESB 5220 Concerning the taxation of salmon recovery grants

Food System

2SSB 5045 Establishing a state meat and poultry inspection program.

Habitat Restoration

2SSB 5253 Implementing the recommendations of the pollinator health task force.

Forests and Forest Health

<u>2SHB 1168</u> Concerning long-term forest health and the reduction of wildfire dangers.

E2SHB 1216 Concerning urban and community forestry.

Carbon and Climate Change

<u>2SHB 1099</u> Improving the state's climate response through updates to the state's comprehensive planning framework.

SB 5126 Concerning the Washington climate commitment act.


Environmental Justice

E2SSB 5141 Implementing the recommendations of the environmental justice task force
