
Preparing Shmurah Matzah in Kfar Habad (Israel), 1972

Yemenite matzah is fresher and more "doughy" than other types of matzah and must be baked fresh every day or two. As all types of matzah, it must be completed within 18 minutes to qualify as kosher.

Selling Chametz, April 17, 1992

Chametz may not be eaten, seen, or even owned during Pesach. A traditional halachic solution is to sell the chametz to a non-Jew until the end of Pesach.

- What is the source of the slogan "Let my people go"?




Moroccan Jews Celebrating Mimouna Dan Hadani Archive
