Raetihi hub plan into next phase

The 40-page report on community consultation on the proposed Raetihi Service Centre was presented to the Ruapehu District Council on Wednesday, where councillors received the report and had a brief discussion on funding for the project.

The next stage is to develop a design brief for expressions of interest for a busi-

It was explained that the Hub, as proposed, would be a joint venture between RDC, Uenuku Charitable Trust as well as potentially other agencies such as government organisations.

The consultation, facilitated by Cathy McCartney, followed two options being put to the community in the 2018 Long Term Plan – to renovate the centre, or to build a new centre at a different location.

"The feedback was fairly split on the options," councillors were told in the agenda report on the consultation report.

"Council was then approached by Uenuku Charitable Trust (UCT) with the idea of a joint administration/community service."

The consultation has taken place from December 2020 and June 2021 and was affected by the Covid lockdowns.

Key Themes

Consultation shows that people feel that: Raetihi lacks a hub; There is a lack of public/civic spaces that enable the community to come together; there is a need to showcase Raetihi and tell the stories of its diverse and colourful history.

The town also needs: a dedicated youth space with programmes and activities; a functional kaumātua space; a creative space where activities can take place for all space for everyone to come together.

The Community Hub would address a number of community needs from a place where people can come together; to offering training opportunities; a one-stop shop that could be used by government agencies; a banking hub - including the ability to support and up-skill members of the community to access financial assistance; hot desk office spaces; a one-stop place to come and easily access advice and information.

Some groups raised the potential for operating out of the Community Hub including: REAP; Raetihi Promotions; Raetihi Information Centre; Waimarino Budget Service; Toy Library; Play Group.

It was seen that there is a need for displaying taonga and having cultural and creative activities.

Location

Several potential locations were identified, and varying views were expressed: on the corner of Seddon Street and SH4. The views suggested this would provide an welcome entry to the town from both highways.

Another view was that it would be good to face the hub towards the maunga and be a gateway.

Other views: maintain the facades of the empty shops - demolish the back of the buildings and build new, thereby maintain the heritage look of Raetihi; build to the Wellness Centre and create a link; build by the theatre to enable it to be incorporated.

Recommendations

The report includes recommendations including: undergoing comprehensive ages; a welcoming accessible community analysis of potential sites; the project Turn to Page 2

steering group (PSG) give consideration to the relative priorities and gather detailed information for future use and functions of the community hub; including identifying physical space requirements.

Further consultation with key stakeholders should be undertaken in relation to the priorities for required community hub spaces.

PSG should commence the development of a design brief and continue discussions with the key stakeholders, and keep the community informed about key decisions and progress with the project.

Other points raised in the consultation inclided:

- Bring the Toy Library into space
- Develop a space to showcase local artist's work; Hang and create exhibition that can change out students/art/things to make, temporary
- Events that bring in the country communities; building open with spaces whare shape; Something that can be used for sport, a multi-purpose space
- Finding office space retro fit rather than new build; hot desks for work – cubicles for people to work; a work hub – creating facilities – structure for an industrial centre

Iwi setup mobile covid response teams

Te Ranga Tupua Iwi Collective have setup four mobile covid response teams operating within the Whanganui, Rangitīkei, Ruapehu, and South Taranaki regions, following successfully securing funding from Te Arawhiti – the Office for Māori Crown Relations as part of the Government's Māori Communities Covid-19 Fund.

The first session for the Ruapehu van was held on Friday and again in conjunction with the Raetihi Christmas Carnival on Saturday.

The mobile units are led by the experienced teams from iwi health providers, Te Oranganui Trust in Whanganui, Ngā Waihua o Paerangi Trust in the Waimarino, Te Kōtuku Hauora Ltd and Mōkai Pātea Services who together deliver a team in Rangitīkei. Tupoho Iwi and Community Social Services will also deliver a welfare

"Our providers have been working tirelessly throughout the entirety of the Covid-19 response to provide support to our whānau no matter the need. Our teams are working six days a week at present in an effort to reach as many people as possible in the lead into the holiday period and before the country opens up," says Elijah Pue, operations lead for Te Ranga Tupua.

function in Whanganui and across the rohe.

"Our teams have hit the road – heading directly to the people, to the areas where there are barriers to access, where people are uncertain and where there is a need for that extra bit of support. We will share a cuppa, have a korero with our whanau and provide them with the information they need to be prepared, particularly now that Covid-19 is present in our community.

"This is a 15-week rapid response rollout, which has the main goal of increasing vaccination rates across our rohe.


In doing so we are also understanding and responding to their needs - regardless of which side of the fence they sit on. The oranga of our whānau is top priority so doing anything we can to support them is paramount."

The rapid response effort is led by an operations team who actively work with our providers to ensure deployment is informed by the needs within each community. Elijah Pue (Ngāti Rangi) has been appointed operations lead alongside Danny Broughton (Ngaa Rauru) logistics and procurement lead, Chris Kumeroa (Global Risk Consulting) data and intelligence lead, and the team from Tukua Storytelling Studio who are providing communications support.

Information on the times, dates and locations of the mobile teams will be available at through the normal provider channels and promoted across Te Ranga Tupua entity platforms.





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

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Whanganui DHB hits 90% vaccination milestone

Ninety percent of the eligible population in the Whanganui District Health Board area, which includes the Waimarino, have now received their first dose of vaccination against Covid-19, according to the latest Ministry of Health data.

The new figures show the region hit the first-dose target over the weekend and its eligible population of 57,200 is now 83% fully vaccinated, with about 3900 jabs needed to reach the 90% government threshold.

Māori vaccinations in the region, which includes most of the Rangitīkei and Ruapehu districts, are still among the lowest in the country at 82% for first doses, with another thousand first jabs needed to hit 90%. The number of fully vaccinated Māori is 70%.

Just over 13,500 Māori in the Whanganui DHB area are eligible for vaccination.

Pasifika people in the region are still recording the lowest vaccination rates in the country, with 86% having received a first dose, and 78% fully vaccinated.

The number of Pasifika people in the region who are eligible for vaccination is 1381. The community needs only about 60 jabs to reach the first-dose target, and fewer than 170 to become 90% fully vaccinated.

As at Wednesday last week, Raetihi still had just 63% of its eligible population fully vaccinated and 76% having had at least one dose.

Ohakune had 83% fully vaccinated and 90% at least

Waiouru has 84% fully vaccinated and 93% at least

National Park has 85% fully vaccinated and 93% at least one dose.



Ātihau chair Mavis Mullins steps down

Ātihau-Whanganui Incorporation chair Mavis Mullins is stepping down after Friday's annual meeting of Māori shareholders.

After 12 years leading the Māori incorporation, which owns 42,000 hectares of farmland from Ohakune to Whanganui, the first female chair of the board says she's proud to look back on what has been achieved on behalf of more than 9000 shareholders and their descendants.

But she says she has been talking about board succession for some time and signal-ling to shareholders for the past two years that she would stand down to help create space for the next generation of young Māori leaders.

"We've got so many amazing, up-andcoming young leaders, we all have to know and appreciate that bigger picture.

"My term comes to an end next year and, as indicated last year, I intend to retire before the term ends. This will allow me to tautoko the transition to a new chair.

"The way we support and encourage suc-

cession is vital, and room must be made to allow the cohort of emerging leaders who are waiting in the wings to step forward."

Mullins says she will tell the board at the first meeting after the AGM that she will not seek re-election as chair but will remain as a board member. Next year, she will not make herself available for re-election to the board.

Mullins says stepping down from Ātihau-Whanganui will be tough for her after more than 15 years with the incorporation, but was the right thing to do to ensure the organisation is prepared for the future.

"I love where we're going, what we're doing, the resilience that we've been able to create through diversification, that we're trying harder to be better communicators to our growing whānau of shareholders.

It's just such an exciting time for Ātihau, but it's not about me, it's about how we future-proof our entity."

Mullins says she was looking forward to the incorporation's first online annual meeting on Friday. Despite a tough year in 2020 due to Covid-19, the incorporation reports positive results for the financial year, including paying down \$700,000 of debt.

"I'm really pleased with our results in a Covid world. We're on track and all the indicators are positive."

Ātihau-Whanganui Incorporation is one of Aotearoa's largest farmers, with 70,000 sheep, 4000 beef cows, 700 dairy cows and 3000 beehives on its whānau farms.

Visiting hospital in the traffic light system

A Whanganui is currently under the Covid Red traffic light, so what does this mean if you are planning to visit the hospital?

The Whanganui District Health Board has provided the following information about visits:

When you arrive at the entrance, you will also be asked to scan in or sign in, change your mask to a hospital surgical mask if you're not wearing one already and to use the hand sanitiser provided.

Three questions will be asked:

- Are you feeling unwell today, do you have any cold or flu like symptoms?
- Have you recently had a Covid-19 test?
- Have you visited a location of interest? Why are we doing this? Based on lived experiences regarding how Covid is transmitted we need to ensure Covid doesn't enter our hospital if at all possible.

If you are presenting as a patient, we will undertake precautionary measures, all of which will be explained throughout your patient journey but you will be seen.

Visitors with acute respiratory symptoms such as cough, cold and flu symptoms, sore throat and runny nose or have abdominal pain or diarrhoea or a close household contact with a current Co-

vid-19 case must not attend unless prior arrangements have been made. You will be declined entry if this is the case.


Social distancing is required so we ask that there is a maximum number of two visitors per bed, and we ask where possible that the two visitors remain the same each time to lower the risk.

You will not be asked to provide a vaccine passport within a clinical setting, however if you have one, that is great.

There is a requirement for booked surgical procedures and surgeries to have a Covid-19 test 48 hours prior to arrival. However, not having completed this may result in your surgery or surgical procedure being postponed. We will rely on the advice of your treating health team in these cases. The effects of Covid-19 on an individual's recovery has warranted a cautious approach, which may include deferring surgeries, unless urgent, until the Covid-19 person is no longer infected.

There is no need to have a Covid-19 test before getting an x-ray, blood test or a consultation with a health professional.

Thank you for supporting the DHB staff so that they can deliver healthcare to you as needed. Together, we will ensure our hospital is safe and functioning for all needs.

Helping each other through COVID-19



With more cases of COVID-19 in the community, it's possible you and your whānau will be exposed to the virus. To make sure you're ready, have a plan in case you or someone in your house tests positive and needs to isolate.

Everyone who tests positive for COVID-19, and those who live with them, will need to isolate for at least 10 days to stop the spread of the virus. If someone else in your house tests positive for COVID-19, they'll be advised how much longer they need to isolate.

Make a plan

If you're travelling and away from home, know how you will get home or self isolate where you are.

While isolating, you will need to have all of your food and necessities delivered. You cannot go to work, school, church or any community or private events or gatherings. No one outside of the people you live with can visit or enter the home.

Most fully-vaccinated people with COVID-19 are likely to have a mild to moderate illness and will fully recover at home.

Who can help out

Be prepared in case you're exposed to COVID-19. Speak with a neighbour, friend, or whānau about the support you could need. For instance, dropping off food and supplies, and help with activities outside the house. Being ready is about people, conversations, connections and knowing what to do, so your whānau and community can help each other when needed.

Support while isolating

It's normal to feel anxious about isolating with COVID-19.

You'll have a support person who will contact you often to check that you and your whānau are safe and supported even if you're travelling and away from home. You will also get a telephone number for 24-hour health support.

If you need more help or support to manage at home, you can access a COVID-19 welfare line.

What you'll need

Brigade sees the light

The Ohakune Volunteer Fire Brigade have received a "very large" donation from a local family that has been used to purchase 20 new UK3AA Helmet torches and Easi Glide Torch Clips.

"The old torches were getting well beyond their use-by dates and were, in some cases, failing at a crucial stage," says support officer Alan Murdie.

"The new torches are waterproof which is essential in our climate."

They have a beam that will light an object at 93 metres away and have a brightness of 110 lumens.

They also have an exceptional burn time. on one set of batteries, of eight hours. The clip enables them to be mounted on the side of a fire fighter's helmet which enables the user to operate hands-free as far as lighting goes.

They are extremely sturdy and will be able to take hard knocks in a working situation.

"The brigade is very grateful for this important addition to our firefighting kit."

Taumarunui Well Prepared **For First Covid-19 Case**

Ruapehu's mayor Don Cameron said that Taumarunui is well prepared for its first positive case of Covid-19 that was confirmed on Wednesday afternoon last week.

He said the Waikato DHB, Kokiri Trust, the Te Taumarutanga iwi collective comprising Ngāti Hāua, Ngāti Tūwharetoa and Ngāti Maniapoto, the pharmacy together with other NGO's, government agencies and Council have been preparing for this moment.

"People should have every confidence that local health providers and iwi are well prepared to support the health and community response as needed including caring for people with Covid-19 at home," he said.

"It was only a matter of time before Covid-19 reached Ruapehu with the virus having been in neighbouring regions for a while and a lot of preparation has gone into getting ready.

Anyone displaying cold or any flu-like symptoms should immediately isolate at home and arrange to get tested even if they are vaccinated.

For people in Taumarunui a testing site is in place at the Miriama Club, Taumarunui (entry from Katarina Street) operating from 9am to 3.30pm tomorrow (Thu 9 Dec).

For people outside Taumarunui they can call Healthline on 0800 358 5453, or see their doctor, nurse or iwi health

"If you are still unvaccinated you should do so immediately," said Mr Cameron.

Later, health authorities confirmed that there were no locations of interest in Taumarunui.

A Ministry spokesperson has since confirmed the investigation into the case did not discover any locations of

interest that required publication.

"On many occasions public health staff identify exposure sites rather than locations of interest.

"Exposure sites are locations where attendees are well known or have registered their attendance such as a general practice or other locations that require check-ins. We only publish locations of interest where we cannot identify contacts."

"Confirmation of Taumarunui's first case highlights the importance of being disciplined about using the CO-VID-19 tracer app or keeping a note of your movements, along with mask wearing, regular hand washing and social distancing," said Mr Cameron.

Ski club in liquidation

A ski club with lodges on the Whakapapa ski area and in National Park Village has gone into liquidation.

In March this year the Downhill Ski Club Inc. surrendered their licence for their lodge situated at the National Downhill area, after offers to sell the lodge didn't result in a sale.

The lodge in National Park Village was originally moved from Turangi as a ski hire and accommodation business and later sold to the Club.

Murray Wilson, National Park resident, said the Club had found it difficult to attract members to use the lodge on the mountain once the Downhill Chairlift was removed by RAL and having a base in

National Park Village then became popular.

"Covid seems to have delivered the final blow to the Club.

The liquidators officially took over on 29 November "and from that date they control everything," stated the Club on their Facebook page.

The Club says they made a trading profit of over \$8000 for the 2021 season - "in a winter destroyed by Covid".

"With Resurgence pay-

ments and two permanent guests for the season, we were able to pay the bills and keep National Park Lodge functioning. No mean feat with only 15 member nights booked all season."

Mr Wilson said he has heard nothing about the liability for removal of the building from the ski area.

"Usually the club would be liable, but now the club is in liquidation that it will be difficult to be enforced," he said.

RDC awaits **RAL** shareholder decision

Ruapehu District councillors voted to hold off on deciding what to do about transferring a debt to a new entity proposed by Ruapehu Alpine Lifts.

RDC is an investor in the Sky Waka Gondola and councillors received an update report from RAL regarding its anticipated move to a new entity, and the draft Debt Novation, for Council's consideration, should this change go ahead.

The report was presented in the public excluded part of the meeting, but the decision made public through the public business minutes.

"Members decided to record the resolution in the Public Business Minutes of the meeting because it was important for the community to be aware of Council's position on the matter," states the minutes report.

The interim decision was that the RDC "awaits a Shareholder decision before making a decision on transferring the debt to a new entity, as the proposed structure and conditions will impact on any assessment of Council's risk".

Mt Ruapehu Crater Lake heating up

Another heating phase has started at Mt Ruapehu and Crater Lake temperature has now reached 31°C, reports GNS

Typically, over periods of months, Ruapehu's Crater Lake (Te Wai ā-moe) undergoes heating and cooling cycles, says GNS.

From early July to early September 2021, the lake temperature rose from 20°C to 39°C. Through to mid-October the lake temperature declined to around 23-25°C. Since early December a heating trend has become established, and the lake temperature is now 31°C. As is common during these heating phases, small volcanic earthquakes have been recorded since the lake temperature started to rise, caused by an influx of hot steam into the lake.

The modelled heat flow into the lake is currently estimated at about 250 MW (megawatt), up from 50 MW in October/November.

The lake colour is a dark grey colour. This is typical as sediments on the lake floor are disturbed during the influx of hot fluids and are suspended in the lake water. The lake

is currently overflowing into the Whangaehu river.

The results from GNS continuous monitoring of seismic activity, lake temperature and water level indicate that key monitoring parameters remain within normal ranges.

The Volcanic Alert Level stays at Level 1 which reflects the current level of volcanic unrest. The Volcanic Alert Level should not be used to forecast future activity.

The Aviation Colour Code remains at colour Green.

Mt Ruapehu is an active volcano and has the potential to erupt with little or no warning when in a state of volcanic unrest.

Volcanic Alert Level 1 indicates the primary hazards are those expected during volcanic unrest: steam discharge, volcanic gas, earthquakes, landslides and hydrothermal activity. While Volcanic Alert Level 1 is mostly associated with environmental hazards, eruptions can still occur with little or no warning.

Gondola locals weekend to support rescue chopper

To celebrate the opening of Mt Ruapehu's summer season and give back to one of the region's most critical resources – the Greenlea Rescue Helicopter – this weekend (18-19 of December) has been confirmed as a "Locals' Weekend".

Locals can enjoy discounted Sky Waka gondola sightseeing passes and know that half of the proceeds from the weekend

will go to the Greenlea Rescue Helicopter.

The helicopter service was founded in 1985 and has touched the lives of more than 5000 patients since. It serves the Central Plateau and Lakes region across the Central North Island, providing 24-hour emergency service, 365 days a year. The Greenlea Rescue Helicopter is partially funded by a government contract but relies heavily on the generosity of the community to help fund the shortfall.

Each winter, the Greenlea Rescue Helicopter undertakes missions at Mt Ruapehu's two ski areas, performing medical evacuations when required, alongside its wider Central North Island rescue helicopter network.

The Helicopter also plays a critical role in partnering with both Mt Ruapehu and other organisations, including the Ruapehu Alpine Rescue Organisation (RARO), on many technical search and rescue missions within the Ruapehu area.

Steve Manunui, Whakapapa ski area manager, says the Mt Ruapehu team "greatly appreciate the importance of life-saving equipment and intensive care paramedics reaching a patient without delay, and therefore how important the Greenlea Rescue Helicopter is to the region.

"We hope that locals come out in support of this fundraising effort for the Greenlea Rescue Helicopter, while also getting to experience the heights of our Sky Waka gondola and unique dining experiences."

The Mt Ruapehu summer season, which is open through to 1 May 2022, includes the Sky Waka gondola sightseeing experience and dining experiences at the award-winning Knoll Ridge Chalet. Short walks, varying from just 15 minutes to up to four hours, from both the base of the Sky Waka gondola and from the Knoll Ridge Chalet, also give guests the opportunity to explore the unique volcanic terrain, on foot.

For the duration of the Locals' Weekend, return Sky Waka gondola sightseeing passes will be \$20 an adult and \$10 youth (aged 5-17 years), normally \$39 and \$19 respectively.

A local is considered a resident residing anywhere within a one hour 30 minute radius of the maunga, stretching from Taupō down to Waiouru. The team also welcomes residents of Whanganui as locals.

The Sky Waka gondola runs daily, 10am – 4pm. The Pinnacles restaurant and buffet lunch operates daily, 11am – 2pm. Adults can dine at the buffet for \$25, and youth (aged 5-17 years) for \$19. Bookings are recommended. A coffee corner will be open from 10am – 3pm each day

Proof of address will be required to redeem the Locals' Weekend rate. Passes can be purchased on the day on mountain. Vaccine certificates will be required to access all facilities, in line with the government's move to the Covid-19 Protection Framework, and the introduction of the My Vaccine Pass.
