

ince 1996 The Geneva School of Manhattan has existed to provide a time-proven classical education within a biblical worldview. We inspire students to love learning, pursue excellence and become leaders in scholarship, virtue, and faith.

This report seeks to showcase its work over the past 25 years as it serves as the only classical Christian school in New York City.

Classical, Christian, and urban, these are the hallmarks of The Geneva School of Manhattan.





Classical Education: An Excellent Way



he classical model of education dates back hundreds of years and was the sole model of education until the twentieth century when progressive education was introduced into American public schools. Classical learning is grounded in a cumulative three-stage methodology, called the Trivium, which brilliantly befits the natural stages of a child's development. The classical approach trains the mind to think and ignites a passion to learn by demonstrating the interrelatedness of subjects and by calling on all exploratory senses in young learners. Students develop a mental agility necessary for adapting in an ever-changing world.

Discovering a reemergence of the classical pedagogy within the context of faith-based education intrigued the two would-be founders of Geneva School. It provided the missing piece between the excellent academics of many private schools and the welcoming gospel community of Christian schools. Rim Hinckley and Myrna Anderson, both educators, sensed God calling them to start a school that didn't yet exist in New York City—one with academic rigor and gospel centeredness. When classical Christian schools began emerging in the early 1990s, Ms. Hinckley envisioned this kind of school for Manhattan. Consulting with the leaders of The Geneva School in Orlando, Florida, proved definitive in more than one way. Both a model and a name grew out of these visits.

An Interview with Rim Hinckley

What led you, a single woman at the time, to start The Geneva School of Manhattan?

I moved to New York City in 1989, the same year that Redeemer Presbyterian Church started. I was immediately struck by some of the unique things being taught there. First and foremost, the beauty of grace and acceptance found in the gospel of Jesus. And second, that God loves cities, because God loves people!

My teaching background in both urban and suburban schools as well as private Manhattan schools revealed significant gaps in educational pedagogies, diversity, and opportunities. When I discovered the classical Christian pedagogy, I was eager to see a school like this in New York City.

What was the influence of Redeemer on the founding of Geneva School?

In the early 1990s most couples, after they had children, would move out of New York City for the suburbs. Tim Keller was challenging Christians to put down roots in

the city, to desire its flourishing (Jeremiah 29:4-7). This was unconventional, and I couldn't help but consider what that meant for me and my single friends. I knew that a school would play a significant role in keeping families in the city.

What does it take to lead a Christian school in our nation's most secular city?

In a word, prayer! I know we are where we are today because of prayer. Through every year of this journey, we have had a cohort of praying parents meeting every week to intercede for Geneva School (see <u>Part 4</u>). Because it's much harder here in the city in terms of real estate and operational costs, we developed a strong reliance on prayer.

Beyond prayer, it also takes a culture of generosity–people who share the vision and invest their time, resources, and talents to bring the vision to fruition. At the beginning, gifts from donors comprised 80 percent of operating budget; many of these donors were singles who would not themselves benefit from a Christian school, but who gave start-up capital and invaluable professional expertise to start the School.

What do you want Geneva School to be known for?

I want Geneva School to be known for inspiring lifelong learners and cultivating a community of thoughtful scholars. I want it to be known for its love for God, its joyous love of learning, and its discernible love of others in the city. In a polarized age where we tend to categorize others into political tribes or other labels, I want for us to be a community of Christians who cannot be categorized, who exhibit such a care for others that even though onlookers may not agree with our beliefs, they love that we are here in the city. They see our School as a blessing and hospitable community.





Christian Faith: A Gospel Movement



n the last two decades, New York City has experienced identifiable growth in Christian ministry involvement and church attendance. One of the major catalysts of this gospel growth has been the work of church planting organizations and networks that work across denominations to train pastors and mobilize church growth.

According to researchers, Christian presence in Manhattan increased from less than 1 percent in 1989 to 5 percent in 2016 and 8 percent in 2019. Furthermore, it is projected that if a critical mass, around 15 percent, of New Yorkers affiliate with a gospel-centered church and express gospel values of mercy, friendship, justice and hope in the city, a "tipping point" in cultural renewal would be achieved.*

This is the vision that propelled Geneva School's mission from our founding and continues to sustain our work 25 years later.

The school occupies a place in the "gospel ecosystem" within New York City, an interrelated, dynamic, organic set of churches, ministries, and leaders that are seeking the renewal of the city through the hope of the gospel. As the only classical Christian school in all five boroughs and one of the only Christian schools, The Geneva School of Manhattan plays an important role. It provides a landing place for new pastors, church planters, and ministry leaders who move into the city. It provides an academic home for those already ministering here as their families expand. And it remains the primary educational space prioritizing children of ministry leaders.

Gospel momentum pulses through New York City in part because of Geneva School's presence. Our founding mission, vision for the city, and sustaining commitment to ministry families fuel the decades-long gospel work.



eneva School has been an enormous help and a crucial part of the current gospel movement in New York City. Without its unwavering commitment to ministry families and its generous financial aid, many of my staff and other ministry leaders would not have been able to make the transition to city ministry. One Family's Ministry Move to New York City

hen we first sensed that God was calling us from our comfortable, settled life of ministry in Texas to plant a church in New York City, we had a lot of questions: What does ministry look like in New York City? How do you raise a family here? Where will our kids go to school?

At the time, our two children were beginning middle school grades, hardly an ideal time to move a family, let alone to such a big city and new environment. I remember calling Geneva School for more information and having a hour-long conversation with the director of admissions, who empathized with my hopes and fears and answered my barrage of questions. Through generous financial aid for our children, we were able to settle into a new city, new neighborhood, new ministry, and also meet new families.

I can honestly say that Geneva School has been an incredible blessing to our family in countless ways. Even though our children have graduated from the school, we continue to praise God daily for the education and relationships made in that season of life. Our children remain connected with several of their Geneva School classmates, and some of our closest family friends are still Geneva families.

Because of the gospel-minded mission of Geneva School, our family was able to transition smoothly and put down family and ministry roots in the city. We launched Resurrection Life NYC in 2017 and in spite of the pandemic, it remains committed to gospel ministry on the Upper East Side of Manhattan.

We believe God is up to something here in New York City through a groundswell of church plants, and The Geneva School of Manhattan through its generous financial aid for ministry leaders, is playing a huge part in it.

much rosier report could have been written two years ago: Class of 2019 was our largest class of Eighth Grade graduates since the School's founding and were heading to their top choice high schools and boarding schools.* Enrollment was projected to continue its upward march. We had just completed our first full year in our new school home on West 90th Street, adjacent to a soon-to-be renovated playground and tulip-laden community garden.

Two years later, we still marvel at the magic of spring tulips and the joys of our renovated playground. Our graduates remain impressive rising high school freshmen, who for the first time have the option of continuing their education at Geneva School as part of our inaugural Ninth Grade class ("a dream come true," according to one Upper School parent).

But our beloved city has been shaken by the pandemic. It bears the scars of suffering the hardest, initial impact of the pandemic last spring. Empty storefronts abound. Tourism lags. Many citizens remain haunted by ambulance sirens.

Nevertheless, as we have demonstrated this year, we are committed to the flourishing of the city. Because of prayerful dependence on the eternal God, we proceeded with reopening last August. We were the first and one of the few schools in New York City to reopen with a full, five-day, in-person academic program. "It's not lost on me that we were the first school to reopen its doors and the only classical Christian school in New York City. These two things are not unrelated; it is only because of our faith that we had courage to take this step," attests Rim Hinckley.

We recount God's faithful acts this year: committed and creative faculty, timely advice from the medical professionals in our parent community, and generous donors to our COVID campaign (see <u>Geneva Fund giving chart</u>). We remember God's attentiveness for those in cities (Jonah 4:11). And we know that city-ward migration throughout the world will continue. Today, more than 50 percent of the world's population lives in urban areas today, and it's estimated that in 25 years the world's urban population will increase one and a half times to 6 billion people.¹

While we cannot predict the foreseeable future of cities, we anticipate a rehabilitated Manhattan, one that may look a little different from before but perhaps more livable. According to the <u>World Economic Forum</u>: Cities will see even greater emphasis placed on creating the best possible human experience, with more focus on supporting learning and development, creativity and collaboration - the real reasons people and businesses want to work together.

Our confidence remains fixed in God who began a good work here at The Geneva School of Manhattan. We trust him to bring to completion our high school, commencing with Ninth Grade this fall and adding a grade each year to our first senior graduates in 2025.

H istorically, classical Christian schools are not planted in urban settings. In fact, [we] have struggled to find models of classical Christian schools in city centers. "The Geneva School [Manhattan's only classical Christian school] is the only one we could find."²



Donors: A Culture of Generosity



rom the very beginning, Geneva School has been blessed by a culture of generosity.

The cycle of generosity began in 1990s when Manhattan singles gave to the founding of the School, even though they would not themselves benefit from it. When the School first opened its doors, 80 percent of the budget was met by charitable giving from our donors. As the years have passed and the School has grown as an institution, our budget is sustained by tuition, foundations, and Geneva Fund giving.

One of our most significant accomplishments as a growing institution is the annual giving participation rate. Geneva School embodies a culture of generosity, in which parents, faculty, and staff support the Geneva Fund with 100 percent participation. We also recognize the varied forms of generosity present within our School community: generosity of prayer, volunteering, and parent involvement.

The work described in this impact report is attributable to our faithful, generous donors of 25 years.


GOAL 1 FACILITY. We seek to establish one permanent campus where our oldest and youngest students learn alongside one another in community.

GOAL 2 FACULTY. We seek to retain and recruit faculty with passion for classical teaching and to be living witnesses of Christian faith to our community.
