

Co-Production Collective Journey of Change: Challenge Tree

The aim of a 'challenge tree' is to establish a single, overarching 'Challenge Statement' (the trunk) which Co-Production Collective is seeking to change. This is intended to be ambitious but ultimately something we can significantly contribute to.

Beneath this Challenge Statement are the root causes (tree roots). These are all the contributing factors that cause the Challenge to exist. In reality, these are challenges in themselves which need to be overcome. The aim of the tree approach is to ensure that all the root causes are contributing to the Challenge Statement. This allows Co-Production Collective to set a direction of travel and identify all the things that need to be done along the way to get there. The green canopy of leaves above the trunk shows the effects of the problem.

In the first workshop, the four breakout groups came up with lots of ideas relating to Challenge Statements, root causes and effects. Since then, the team have brought these ideas together into a draft Challenge Statement with three groups of root causes, plus a few examples – these are shown in the diagram and tables below. The effects are also shown in the tree image, but they will be a focus for later in the process so haven't been included elsewhere.

The diagram and tables below all share the same information, but in different formats to help with accessibility.

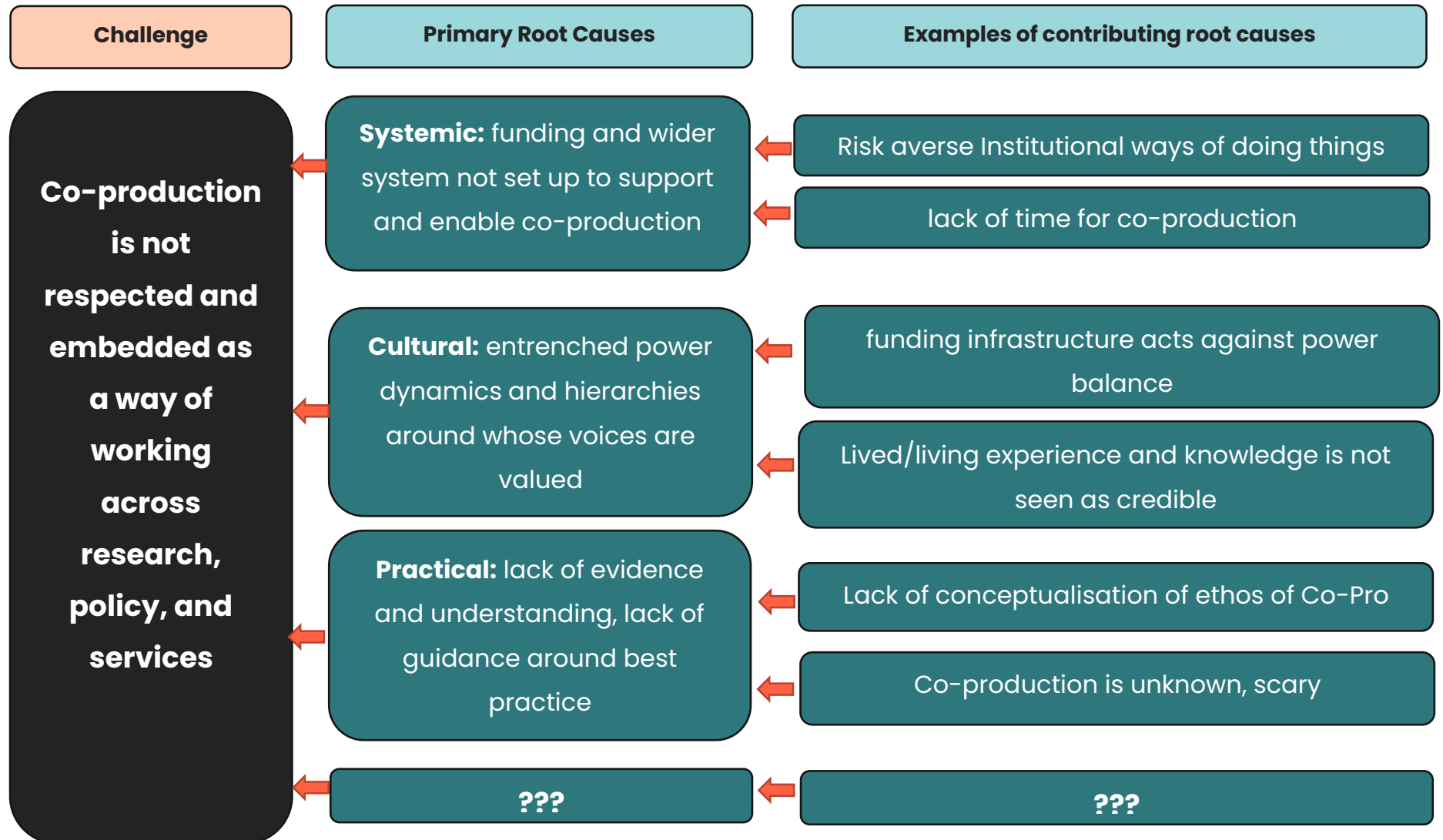
