

Always With Us, Christopher Robinson

For nearly three decades, local man Christopher Robinson devoted himself to conservation causes all around the world. Bruce Atkin is collecting stories about Christopher's life and work with Greenpeace, to be launched in Port Albert late December when he would have turned 70.

It was inevitable that Christopher Robinson, one of Port Albert's most famous sons, would grow up with a love of the sea and sailing. His parents ran a couple of fishing boats and his grandparents on both sides were also fishers. Kids at Port Albert were able to safely wander the port, spending time at the sea baths and around the wharf watching boats come and go. Young Christopher attended Port Albert Primary School and Yarram High, then Melbourne High.

Chris finished his formal education at the end of Year twelve; he was active in sport, including rifle shooting and sailing dinghies, but sustained a spinal injury at football, that plagued him for the rest of his life. He worked at a variety of jobs, spending leisure time at Lorne, joining the surf lifesaving club, and swimming, paddling and surf ski-ing. He also loved surfing but his back problem limited this. He had a rebellious streak, was fond of a drink and a smoke, was unsettled in his work and often short of cash. On occasions he took to the road, picking up jobs and sometimes living out of his Holden panel van.

In 1977 in a life-changing move, he went overseas. In London he fell in with some young activists from the new Green-peace organisation, who were busy working on a major refit of former trawler Sir William Hardy. They were planning to sail to Iceland to disrupt and publicise that country's whaling operations. Christopher quickly became an invaluable member of the workforce and spent months chipping rust, painting, and preparing for departure.

The renamed Rainbow Warrior departed London in Spring 1978 with Christopher on board. His experience with boats and the sea meant he was a natural choice as a Zodiac operator – the inflatables Greenpeace crew used to disrupt the whalers, positioning themselves between harpoon gun and whale so the gunner couldn't safely fire. Chris once said his anger at what was being done gave him courage.

Over the next couple of decades he took part in many Greenpeace campaigns including:

- attempts to stop ships dumping nuclear waste in the Atlantic ocean;
- publicising dangerous transport of nuclear fuel rods by sea;
- preventing ships leaving Rotterdam to dump toxic waste in the Atlantic;
- stopping the massacre of Hooded Seals in Canada
 - (he was arrested for spraying dye on the pups rendering their skins unusable as fashion garments);
- undercover work recording illegal whaling operations in Spain.
- anti-whaling actions off Spain (Spanish authorities impounded the Rainbow Warrior and disabled her. Chris and two colleagues escaped in an
 inflatable, travelling 800km to Jersey. They had a replacement part smuggled into Spain,
 enabling the escape of the Warrior after five months.)
- delaying the entry of nuclear powered and armed ships into Auckland harbour (Later the NZ government banned nuclear powered or armed ships.)
- multiple trips to Moruroa atoll for protests against French nuclear testing there, on Vega and later on his own yacht Fand. He was arrested by the French on several occasions.
- expeditions to Antarctica
- circumnavigation of Australia on Vega with various protests against uranium mining and nuclear weapons operations against the Talisman Sabre US-Australian war games in Queensland waters

During one period back home he attempted to cycle around Australia but his back problem caused him to pull out after a few thousand kilometres. He also joined the Franklin River blockade in the summer of 82/83 and was arrested with Tasmanian activist, and later politician Bob Brown.

Tragedy struck in 1985. Chris was aboard the Rainbow Warrior in Auckland, on the night French agents bombed the ship, sinking her and killing one of his friends. Undaunted the planned Moruroa protest went ahead with increased world attention. In 1995 Christopher and fellow-Greenpeace veterans Henk Haazen and David McTaggart famously eluded capture by French authorities for days, helping focus world attention on Moruroa.

Between campaigns he helped his brother plant native trees on the family farm at Alberton; the results are clearly visible from the South Gippsland Highway. Christopher later also planted natives at his own home in Port Albert. Tragically he died of cancer at the age of just fifty-six.

<u>The Port Albert Poultry Farm</u>

The Port Albert poultry farm was established in 1958 by Sid and Britta Balhorn, it was located on the Yarram-Port Albert Road between the Old Port Foreshore Road and the Northwest boundary (Langsborough side) of Dave Kirkups earthworks and ran back to the Taxidermist which is located on the Old Port Foreshore road. The area was approximately 100 acres, John Pacey and his wife now live in the main house.

The track on the Langsborough side of Dave Kirkups boundary led to the rifle range which was well attended when the poultry farm started. Initially it was a small concern but as it grew and as it supplied more outlets with eggs and fresh chickens it required extra people. At the start four local Port Albert people were employed and toward the end up to ten were

employed. The farm supplied eggs to local shops in Yarram, Sale, Melbourne the oil rigs in Bass Strait and to local people. The poultry farm also supplied starter pullets to people in the area and to others further afield. People living near the train service to Melbourne received their chicken or hens by rail and others by the Mail Person who serviced their area. The chickens would be boxed and taken to the Alberton railway station (located where the pine treatment plant is now), the station Mistress would weigh the boxes and the appropriate sticker attached on the box and placed in the guard's van, the train transported all types of goods including coffins. If the chickens were going by mail the mailman would pick them up. The most popular hens were the September hatch because they started laying in March and laid through the colder months when the days get shorter. Usually this is the period when chickens have a rest from laying. This is not so important now because no matter what the season most foods can be sourced from the Supermarket.
