### **HBS OPERATIONS**

The serviceability of our Explosives Detection Systems (EDS) continues to exceed our expectations, with the availability at all stations well above our internal target. The excellent performance is in part due to our intensive maintenance regime on critical EDS units.

- The Security of supply for spares continues to be a challenge as most of our EDS units are at the end of their useful lives.
- The need for replacement of all our EDS units remains heightened.

The commissioning of our new Explosive Trace Detection (ETD) units is underway, and we look forward to feedback from our teams.

### **AVSEC**

The transition or handover between the outgoing and incoming AVSEC service providers took place successfully on 31 January 2024 at 22h00. As with any change process, there were minor niggling issues that needed to be ironed out. However overall, the transition has been seamless.

In the short term the ACS AVSEC team will direct their focus on compliance related matters to ensure the incoming service providers fulfil their statutory requirements.

Incidences of slippages (i.e., undesirable goods going through EDS undetected) have been stable for the period (i.e., with no noticeable increase).

### **CUTE & BRS**

The CUTE operations were handed over to the ACSA IT team with no noticeable disruption to the service as expected. ACS has conveyed their appreciation to all stakeholders for their cooperation and support over the years on the CUTE operations.

The BRS service has remained resilient during the period, with no notable disruptions to the service despite the increase in the frequency of loadshedding.



# AIR PASSENGER MARKET ANALYSIS




- Industry-wide revenue passenger-kilometers (RPKs) increased 25.3% year-on-year (YoY) in December. In 2023, industry RPKs reached 94.1% of 2019 levels.
- Available seat-kilometers (ASKs) grew by 24.1% YoY and recovered to 94.4% of pre-pandemic capacity over the whole year. Global passenger load factor stood at 82.3%, slightly under the 2019 threshold.
- Domestic markets have seen diverse developments as the year closed, total domestic traffic in 2023 nevertheless surpassed 2019 numbers by 3.9%.
- International traffic achieved great recovery this year while attaining 88.6% in 2023.

### 2023 WAS MARKED BY STRONG INDUSTRY-WIDE RECOVERY

Strong demand for air travel continued to propel the recovery of passenger markets in 2023. The total industry achieved a remarkable 36.9% year-on-year (YoY) growth, as



traffic, measured in revenue passenger-kilometer (RPKs), reached 94.1% of 2019 levels, a significant increase from 2022 when it stood at 68.7%. The supply of seats slightly exceeded the demand for travel compared to 2019 (pre-pandemic), resulting in an industry-wide load factor of 82.3%, which was only 0.3 ppt lower than the load factor in 2019.

Domestic traffic set new highs in 2023, most of the monitored markets surpassed the pre-pandemic levels by mid-2023. The definitive reopening of China in January 2023 shaped the industry's recovery profile as total domestic RPKs remained largely above pre-pandemic levels for most of the year reflecting the buoyant activity this major market has observed (Chart 1). In 2023, total domestic RPKs grew 30.4% YoY and stood 3.9% over 2019 levels.

On the other hand, international traffic remained lower than its levels of 2019 while maintaining a stable yet robust growth pace. Industry-wide international RPKs increased 41.6% YoY and totaled 88.6% of pre-Covid levels. Although airlines across the globe saw various outcomes, all regions contributed to those developments by achieving resilient growth in international passenger traffic.

Asia Pacific airlines more than doubled their RPKs, growing 126.1% compared to 2022, overcoming a large part of the setback caused by past strict travel restrictions, however, they remained 27.3% under pre-pandemic levels. On the other hand, North American carriers have surpassed their 2019 record by 1.4%, leading the regions in terms of international recovery.

While the airline industry had recovered the majority of its traffic 2019 levels as of December 2023, network restoration remained relatively uneven as connectivity and passenger demand to and from Asia Pacific has not yet reached its pre-pandemic status.



In December, global air cargo traffic saw a notable year-on-year increase of 10.8%, marking the most substantial annual growth in air cargo tonne-kilometers (CTKs) over the past two years. This surge brought the annual average 2023 figures to within 1.9% of the traffic seen in 2022.

Global International Cargo Tonne Kilometres (CTKs) increased year-over-year by 11.5% in December, with growth in all major trade lanes. This resulted in the year 2023 concluding just 2.2% below the international traffic level reached in 2022.

December saw new highs in Available Cargo Tonne-Kilometers (ACTKs), a metric for global air cargo capacity. This increase, largely due to the expansion of international passenger belly capacity, resulted in a 13.6% year-on-year (YoY) rise in December's ACTK. Consequently, 2023 concluded with an 11.3% increase in total air cargo capacity compared to 2022.

The expansion in global air cargo capacity also resulted in a small drop in cargo load factors (month-on-month), closing the year at 44.0% on average.




# DECEMBER CONTINUES STRONG GROWTH IN AIR CARGO TRAFFIC

Global air cargo demand reached 22.8 billion CTKs in December, the highest traffic in two years, representing a 10.8% increase year-on-year (YoY) — the most significant annual growth since October 2021. While this performance is partly due to a base effect (the decline in CTKs for most of 2022), it also reflects strong, continuous YoY demand growth over the past four months and robust month-on-month growth since April. This narrows the gap between 2023 and the previous year to 1.9% yet remains 3.6% below the total air cargo traffic achieved in 2019.

SEASONALLY ADJUSTED (SA) CARGO TONNE KILOMETRES (CTKS) MAINTAINED THEIR UPWARD TRAJECTORY, INCREASING BY 10.7% YEAR-ON-YEAR (YOY) THIS MONTH. THE CONTINUED ANNUAL GROWTH IN SA CTKS, EVIDENT SINCE AUGUST, MARKEDLY STRONG REVERTING FROM THE DECLINING TREND OBSERVED THROUGHOUT 2022. THIS UNDERSCORES THE PROGRESSIVE RECOVERY OF THE GLOBAL AIR CARGO MARKET, CONCLUDING 2023 ON A ROBUST NOTE WITH STRONG MOMENTUM MOVING FORWARD.

# CARGO CAPACITY SUSTAINED DOUBLE-DIGIT GROWTH THROUGHOUT 2023

In December, air cargo capacity, measured in Available Cargo Tonne Kilometres (ACTKs), reached 49.8 billion. This figure exceeds the levels of 2022 and 2019 by 13.6% and 5.7%, respectively. Annually, 2023's air cargo capacity was over 10% higher than that of 2022. This growth was largely attributed to Asia Pacific carriers, who recorded a 28.5% increase from 2022 and surpassed their 2019 capacity by 6.7% (Chart 2).
