This season Austrian Saxophonist **Andreas Mader** has performed in 12 major Dutch concert halls as part of the prestigious Dutch Classical Talent Tour. His debut CD "Lilith & Lulu" (2019) received rave reviews for Dutch, Austrian and German press, as well as Bavarian Radio. He has been a prize winner of the first International Piano Chamber Music Competition Birmiongham, the International AEOLUS Competition and Andorra International Saxophone Competition. As a soloist he has performed with the Düsseldorf Sinfoniker, the Krakow Philharmonic Orchestra, and others. Andreas received a master's degree of Live Electronics at the Conservatorium van Amsterdam, where he also received his bachelor and master of music degrees.

Casey Dierlam Tse is an avid performer of contemporary music. She was a recipient of the Urbana Public Arts Grant, won first prize at the Rose Petroff College Piano Competition held in San Antonio, TX, and won the "21st Century Piano Commission Competition," at the University of Illinois. Since 2014 she has been teaching piano and serving as collaborative pianist at Knox College in Galesburg, IL. She regularly performs for student and guest artist recitals throughout the country, and is the collaborative piano coordinator for the North American Saxophone Alliance conference.

Saxophonist, composer, educator and content creator Valentin Kovalev's unique performing style was developed following studies in Russia, France and the United States. He is the winner of several international competitions: Manhattan International Music Competition, MTNA Young Artist Woodwind Competition, Classic Winds Competition (Israel), Anches Simples de Toulouse (France), EkaterinburgSaxFest (Russia) and GoldenSax (Ukraine). Valentin has soloed with prestigious orchestras in his native Russia, toured China, and performed throughout Europe through the Rostropovich Foundation. He is a Henri Selmer, Paris artist and is represented by Astral Artists of Philadelphia.

Pianist and composer Yoni Levyatov made his recital debut at Lincoln Center's Alice Tully Hall and his New York City concerto debut under the baton of Philippe Entremont. He has appeared with the Jerusalem Symphony, Manhattan Chamber, and Bogotá Philharmonic orchestras; the Philharmonic Orchestra of the Americas; and the Denver Brass. Mr. Levyatov is the winner of the San Jose International Piano Competition, the Dorothy McKenzie Recognition Award, and the silver medal at the Bösendorfer International Piano Competition. As an active composer, Mr. Levyatov has written works for solo instruments, chamber ensembles, and orchestras.
