### Introduction



It's with the greatest pleasure that we present the results of the Cinnamon Faith Action Audit for Illawarra - the first of its kind in Australia.

Embarking on this initiative was a step of faith for all involved - not least, our wonderful local partner, Together for the Illawarra - and the figures speak for themselves:

- 101 survey responses, representing over half of all faith-based organisations in the region
- 143 community service activities addressing
   15 of the greatest social needs
- 140,000+ beneficiary interactions annually
   equivalent to half the population of
   Wollongong & Shellharbour combined
- \$9.7 million in social impact value to the Illawarra community every year

Behind the numbers is the story of a region where people genuinely care about one another, where the least are not forgotten, and where faith organisations play an active role in the community. It is a testament to the efforts of local churches and faith-based organisations, as well as the willingness of local authorities, businesses and others to come together for the benefit of those across the Illawarra.

Cinnamon Network Australia exists to help churches transform communities.

One of the ways we do this is through the Cinnamon Faith Action Audit (CFAA), which enables the faith community in a local region to measure their collective social impact. More specifically, the CFAA puts a monetary value on the time given by churches and other faith organisations to serve those experiencing vulnerability, isolation or injustice.

The desire for every CFAA is that it might help increase collaboration within and between faith traditions, open doors to government and other sectors, and demonstrate that faith really can be a force for good.

In the case of the Illawarra CFAA, our hope and prayer is that the impact will go well beyond this report...

That it will spark new conversations that lead to tangible benefits for those in need in Wollongong and Shellharbour. That it will inspire regions across the nation to engage in their own Cinnamon Faith Action Audit. That it will encourage people of faith to continue serving others, as we seek to be a beacon of hope for our communities and our country.

# Methodology

The Cinnamon Faith Action Audit (CFAA) seeks to measure the collective social impact of local churches and faith-based organisations in a geographic region.

The CFAA for Illawarra was designed to include the two Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Wollongong and Shellharbour.

Before commencing the formal audit, Cinnamon Network Australia and our local partner, Together for the Illawarra, engaged in significant outreach and relationship building to develop a comprehensive database of the faith-based organisations operating in Wollongong and Shellharbour. The final list totalled 190 and included churches, places of worship, agencies, and other entities funded or operated by faith groups (e.g. Salvation Army stores, Christian schools).



All 190 organisations were invited to take part in the CFAA by completing an online survey. The survey took approximately 15 minutes and was open for the entire month of October. Follow up messages, calls, and visits were made to ensure contacts had received the survey link and understood the purpose of the CFAA. In the case of Catholic parishes and entities, key members of the Catholic Diocese of Wollongong met personally with church/organisational leaders to conduct the survey and then submitted responses on their behalf.

The survey asked respondents to outline their three largest forms of community service over the past 12 months, guided by a list of 15 areas of social need. In determining whether an activity should be classified as community service, respondents were given the following criteria:

- The activity/service is available to people of any faith or no faith (i.e. it is faith-based but not faithbiased); and
- 2. The activity is best characterised as a form of service, rather than a religious activity; and
- The activity/service is primarily aimed at those experiencing vulnerability, isolation or injustice.

As an example, the work of some Christian denominations in delivering Special Religious Education (SRE) in schools was not included in the results of the survey, however, efforts by Christian schools to provide special financial and/or pastoral support for students from disadvantaged backgrounds was included.



# Methodology

Thereafter, respondents were asked to detail the beneficiaries for each form of community service, as well as the number of paid and volunteer hours required to deliver the activities. The weekly hours for both staff and volunteers were averaged over the year, then multiplied by \$19.49 (the national minimum hourly wage as of 1 July 2019) to determine the value of social impact to the community.

While respondents were asked to distinguish between beneficiaries served weekly as compared with annually, it's possible that some of the annual figures provided include duplicates. It's also likely there is at least some overlap of beneficiaries between the various community service activities (i.e. individuals who were served by more than one program or faithbased organisation).

Where organisations delivered services in both Wollongong and Shellharbour, 75% of the beneficiaries and value was assigned to Wollongong and the remaining 25% to Shellharbour. This was guided by the difference in population as per the 2016 Census, with Wollongong being approximately three times the size of Shellharbour (203,630 vs. 68,460).

It is worth noting that, while every effort was made to capture the social contributions of faith-based organisations in the region, there were many who were unable or chose not to participate. Moreover, the dollar value of the efforts is based on human capital only (i.e. hours worked or volunteered) and does not include the buildings, goods, and other resources required to deliver the activities/services. In other words, this report is an intentionally conservative, if highly impressive, snapshot of all that is being done to serve those in need across the Illawarra.









#### Hope Church 2508

Youth suicide and drug use is common across our country - made worse by the prevalence of mental illness - and the Illawarra is not immune. So, when the local community youth centre in Helensburgh was forced to close for lack of funding, Hope Church 2508 saw an opportunity: to revamp and re-imagine a place where young people can come together to connect, have fun, learn skills, and help tackle the issue of youth mental health.

The Hope Youth Centre is a free youth drop-in centre open on school afternoons that offers a safe space for young people to hang out, while being supervised by trained youth workers. There is basketball, a skate ramp, snooker, air hockey, a coffee machine, music equipment and other activities, with plans to offer job skills and barista training in the near future.

Already, the church has seen a significant number of youth in the area respond to being in a positive community and recover from previously devastating mental illness including depression, anxiety, self harm and suicidal ideation. On one occasion, the Hope team was able to prevent a planned suicide and help the person get the help that they needed.

"We love our community and consider it a privilege to offer the Hope Youth Centre to the young people of the 2508 postcode. We have a heart to see our town drug and suicide free, working with the younger generations to help them understand their true value."



#### Central Church Port Kembla

One of the missional values of Central Church in Port Kembla is to encourage and support its members to model the unconditional love of Jesus in all elements of life, including the things about which they are most passionate. Inspired by this, five women from Central Church who care deeply about birth education and equal access to healthcare pioneered the Peaceful Birth Partnership.

In collaboration with YWAM (Youth With A Mission) Wollongong, they formed a group of committed volunteers to provide pregnant women - especially those from refugee backgrounds - with prenatal, birth and antenatal support. What began as a small initiative has grown, thanks to word-of-mouth recommendations from others in the church and new connections that have been made in the local community.

"We wanted to provide a service for women who would otherwise not have access to it, because of language, cultural background or finances. It's a beautiful thing to walk alongside women as they navigate the powerful vulnerability of pregnancy, birth and early motherhood."

The Peaceful Birth Partnership has now begun offering education about puberty for children and their parents. They recently brought together a small group of Ethiopian and Syrian girls and their mums, teaching them about the female reproductive system and the physical and emotional changes associated with puberty, while encouraging the girls to hear from their mums about the cultural specifics of the journey into womanhood. There were many questions, much laughter, and conversations that continued well after the session had ended!



#### CatholicCare

The work of CatholicCare in Australia is highly regarded and with good reason. Thanks to their multi-service capabilities, they support individuals and their families during some of the most challenging times in their lives, from childhood through to ageing.

CatholicCare in the Diocese of Wollongong has significant operations across both Wollongong and Shellharbour. This includes providing direct support and social visits to 200 ageing people in their own homes and aged care facilities, with 75 staff and 65 volunteers contributing a combined total of over 1,000 hours a week.

One of those beneficiaries is Glenda, who lives alone and receives home care visits twice weekly by CatholicCare staff. The imposed isolation due to COVID-19 had a significant impact on Glenda's lifestyle, as she could no longer go into town or receive visits from her family in Sydney. In response, CatholicCare staff secured a friendly volunteer from one of the local Catholic parishes for her to connect with. Glenda and the volunteer have had many phone conversations and a lovely relationship has formed. They are both looking forward to meeting one another face-to-face soon!

"I love that we journey alongside those we serve, knowing they are the experts in their own lives with the capacity for growth. We assist anyone in need, believing that by helping one person we help everyone."



### St Mark's Anglican Church, West Wollongong

The St Mark's "Food and Friends" program started off as a traditional soup kitchen, until the church realised that no one really liked soup!

So, thanks to the efforts of a dynamic father-daughter team, Scott & Emily Stark, they upgraded to a two course home-cooked dinner, using ingredients from the local Aldi store where Scott was the manager. Members of the community who were experiencing homelessness could come with an empty shopping bag, fill it with healthy food, then sit down for a warm meal and conversation.

By the start of 2020, the church was catering for up to 100 people on a Monday night, thanks to a team of 25 volunteers, including students from The Illawarra Grammar School. Local NGO, Orange Sky, also began bringing their free mobile washing and drying truck, so those in need could leave St Mark's with fresh food and clean clothes.

After COVID-19 hit, the church made the courageous decision to keep their doors open but with some changes: meals were made to take away and hours of operation were extended to avoid congestion. St Mark's also stepped up as a distribution partner for Anglicare's local Food and Financial Assistance team, receiving and handing out donations of food and other necessities from Anglican parishes across the Illawarra region.

Now, when Senior Minister Peter Hutchinson walks the streets of West Wollongong, residents from the local housing estate will often yell out: "Hi Pastor Pete!"

"Being recognised as part of the community is exactly what we hoped for. Sure, we serve those in need as part of our witness as Christians, but our primary purpose is just to share God's love."
