

• Anderson Hall:

• Houses over 770 student residents.

- Has a traditional residence hall design that has fully furnished double and triple rooms.
- Each floor has a lounge space with a kitchen, lounge furniture, and television. Also, a study area and a laundry room.
- Single, double, and triple-style furnished rooms with twin beds that are adjustable.

Hughes Hall:

- Houses 300 student residents.
- Has the traditional residence hall design with corridor-style rooms and shared bathrooms.
- Each floor has a lounge space, kitchen, lounge furniture, television, and laundry room.
- Connected to the McDowell hall.
- Nearby is the Woods Brown Amphitheatre.

Leonard Hall:

- Houses 275 student residents.
- Has the traditional residence hall design with corridor-style rooms and shared bathrooms.
- Each floor has a lounge space, kitchen, lounge furniture, television, laundry room,
 and a computer lab.
- Overlooks the Woods Brown Amphitheatre.

• Letts Hall:

- The second-largest first-year population on campus.
- Houses over 600 student residents.
- Has a traditional residence hall design that has fully furnished double and triple rooms.
- Shared bathrooms are north and south of the building.
- Each floor has a lounge space with a kitchen, lounge furniture, and television. Also,
 a study area and a laundry room.
- Has in-room wifi.
- Connects to Anderson Hall.

McDowell Hall:

- Has a traditional residence hall design with corridor-style rooms and shared floor bathrooms.
- Each floor has a lounge space with a kitchen, lounge furniture, and television. Also, a study area and a laundry room.
- Connects to Hughes Hall.
- Nearby is the Woods Brown Amphitheatre.

• Roper Hall:

- Houses 50 students.
- Has a traditional residence hall design with fully furnished double and triple rooms and shared bathrooms.
- Each floor has a lounge space with a kitchen, lounge furniture, and television. Also,
 a study area and a laundry room.

• East Campus:

- Home to sophomore students.
- Houses 590 residential students.
- Has mostly double rooms with private bathrooms.
- Aims for LEED Certification with efforts taken to limit the number of greenhouse gases emitted, produce less waste, and increase energy efficiency.
- Is a step away from Bleeker St. Cafe, Don Meyers Technology & Innovation Building.

• Cassell Hall:

- Has 350 student residents.
- Designed for suite-style living, where two students living in one room share a private bathroom.
- Above the Cassell Fitness Center.
- Nearby is the Woods Brown Amphitheatre.
- Includes nearly 5,000 square feet of ground-level green roof and a 46 percent decrease in water.

• Centennial Hall:

• Houses 400 residential students.

- Designed for suite-style living, where two students living in one room share a private bathroom.
- Connected to the Anderson Hall.
- Each floor has a lounge space with a kitchen, lounge furniture, and television. Also, a study area and a laundry room.

• Nebraska Hall:

- It Houses 250 students.
- Designed for apartment-style living.
- Each apartment shares a bathroom, kitchen, and common area. Each floor has a laundry room.

• Frequency Apartments:

- AU leases apartments at the nearby Frequency apartments.
- Offers an ideal off-campus location for AU students looking for apartment-style living and a short commute to the AU campus and DC.
- Located on the AU campus shuttle line, minutes from the Tenleytown/American
 University Metro Station and Whole Foods, and is in close proximity to
 Tenleytown restaurants.
- 16 parking spaces are available at the rate of \$561.29.

On-Campus/Environment/Dining:

- Freshmen are not required to live on campus.
- 98% of freshmen live on campus.
- 90-acre campus
- Urban city
- Invites neighbors to be able to attend lectures on campus, enjoy musical performances, and openings at the Katzen Art Center.
- There are multiple Capital Bikeshare stations adjacent to the campus.
- Bender library is available to every student and staff

- Students attend skill-building workshops (including AU alumni panels).
- AU offers evening activities that are chaperoned: to Smithsonian museum, Georgetown, and National Zoo.

- Any changes or payments for meal plans are made via the AU student accounts system.
- Undergraduate students are assigned a meal plan based on their housing assignment.
- Having a meal plan is optional for graduate students.
- On-campus housing is guaranteed for first and second-year students.
