 - Get involved in research projects

 - Earn in between \$9 and \$11 an hour
 - 160+ students participate each year
- National Conference on Undergraduate Research
 - Highlights research done by undergraduates in all fields of study
 - Students can give oral presentations, present their original artwork, give a performance in dance, music, or theater, or participate in poster sessions
- LEARN Program
 - Connects students with a neuroscience major with alumni who work in the neurosciences
 - Participate in cutting-edge research and receive a full-time salary for 8 to 10 weeks
