

## Welcome to the Eighth & Forrester Historic Neighborhood

Primarily built between 1905-1930, this historic neighborhood sits north of Lomas Blvd, and south of Mountain Rd (see the map on page 2). According to the MetroABQ Landmarks and Urban Conservation Commission, this area represents a "rare collection of Anglostyle homes" built for working class families. They generally consist of late adaptations of the Queen Anne style, one-story or one-and-a-half-story Bungalows, and Spanish Pueblo Revival homes--the later the year, the more modest the ornamentation.

To the right are two early Queen Anne homes. Notice the front gables often decorated with colorfully painted wood 'scales' (see page 3).



The Harwood Art Center, left, borders the Eighth & Forrester Historic neighborhood and often has art installations scattered on the property for all to see. This recent installation featured acrylic snowflake art in the front.




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One of my favorite elements of the Queen Ann style is the polychromatic wooden 'scales' as seen above and middle, and on page one. They decorate the front gables and draw attention to the half-storying above the first floor. These four houses are 'Hipped Box' designs, all have gables, and prominent front porches, a few are enclosed. Walking around this neighborhood is a treat!

Welcome to 710 Slate Ave NW
Built in 1925 in the Eighth & Forrester
Historic District, this Craftsman
Bungalow has 3-over-1 windows, a
classic enclosed porch, wood sash
windows, a prominent front gable,
wooden support brackets and an
extended fireplace chimney stack.

Inside, 710 Slate Ave has great wood floors, original (unpainted) wood trim and wood sash windows, a brick fireplace living room focal point, and an original clawfoot tub in the updated bathroom. In the basement, there are charcoal hand-written dates indicating coal deliveries for the furnace. Updates include granite counters, slate bath flooring and a HUGE walk-in closet with skylight.
