⁶They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it.

⁷Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it.

⁸Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields.

⁹Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

¹⁰Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David!

Reflection: The Rev'd Canon Bob King

Well here we are.

Palm Sunday and the second one in lockdown. The second Palm Sunday and Holy Week where instead of being in Church and mixing with our families and friends we are living under restrictions, restraints, almost curfew.

I guess, in a way, this is what the people of Jerusalem felt like.

They were living in a land that was restricted, occupied where civil liberties had been removed and nothing was easy.

The Jews, of course, were living under Roman Occupation and subject to the laws that were imposed upon them.

We are living in a world that appears to be under occupation as well.

We are being controlled by COVID19. Coronavirus.

For the past year we have fought, moaned and struggled.

We have been, and remain, angry, sad, frustrated, sickened and generally fed up as we try to stick to the rules and regulations that have been imposed on us all.

Yes, all of us, no matter our job, ability or status.

COVID knows no boundaries. It just crashes in wherever it sees a chink in the armour.

COVID has no respect of traditions or celebrations.

COVID tries to change everything and turn every situation, country and community upside down.

I have to say it has succeeded.

Our world has changed.

The attitude of everyone has had to adapt to a new way of living.

Of course, we all fight and rebel.

We all want to hang on to that which is dear to us and none of us like being told what we can and can not do.

"How dare those politicians tell me that I can not go and visit my family, or pop down to London to see a show, or have a haircut"

On the whole I think we have done pretty well and looked out for ourselves and those around us.

Rather like the Jews on Palm Sunday there is light at the end of the tunnel.

Many of us have received our first Vaccine shot.

On the news we are seeing some positive results of the amazing job done by the NHS and 1000's of other bodies in producing, distributing and administering the Injections.

I am sure that like me you are feeling more confident that everything may, just may be ok and we will get back to normal.

Normal?

Normal?

What on earth is normal?

Its certainly not going to be as it was.

The future is going to be different and as we build the new future we may well have to be prepared to shed the chrysalis of the past.

Things will never be the same again.

And that, my friends, is what happened on Palm Sunday 2000 years ago

People were desperate for something to change, to get better, to release them from the purgatory they were living in.

And here it was.

A young man.

The Son of God riding on a borrowed donkey into the capital city.

Jesus brought with him the hopes and dreams of generations.

They had been praying for relief. Praying like we have done, for a cure to the dreadful ailments that had been dominating their lives.

And so, they rushed out with their arms extended to welcome the Saviour.

The answer to their prayers.

They shouted "Hosanna, welcome to the Sone of David" and they jostled for position to rip off their coats, wave, shout, post on Facebook that the answer was here at long last.

In the unlikely form of a young country boy from Galilee, the Saviour who was Christ the King, had come to offer them new life and protection.

What excitement, what joy, what hope. What could ever go wrong?

At last, people could hug, kiss, ignore the rules, feel free to do what they wanted.

But this King, this Jesus who brought Good News for all people, also challenged everyone.

He challenged the authorities, and he challenged the ordinary people in the street.

Remember, as Grace told us a couple of weeks ago, one of the first things that he did was to head off to the Temple, the centre, the Holy of Holies, the home of the Establishment and turn over the tables.

Not only turning over the tables but he drove the traders out.

He challenged the corrupt economy that was prevalent and part of the everyday.

And that is what he still does.

This Jesus who we remember in such graphic detail this Holy Week still challenges us to take the Gospel off the Page, to make it more than just a trite story and to make it real. To make it an integrated part of our new lives.

I imagine that Coronavirus is going to do the same.

It too will force us to always be on the lookout and always respect it. Even if we think we are vaccinated and safe. It will be there. In a similar way Christ is too. But Christ, the risen Christ is there with love and compassion as opposed to the virus which is there to destroy and maim.

One of the things that I have been really impressed with over the past year is the way in which major festivals have become very important and focal points.

Christmas and Easter are on everyone's lips. Suddenly everyone is expressing their strong need and desire to celebrate it. People speaking out saying how important these great feasts are to them.

That is Good News. That is taking the Gospel off the Page and putting it firmly into the centre of people's lives.

I believe that we have a huge opportunity this year to share our faith and to tell our stories.

It is more than lip service. It's not just rushing out to wave palms and shout Hosanna.

This Holy Week we can make a difference.

We need to stick to the rules. To love and to care. I know it's hard, but we must try to resist the temptation to say, we are safe now, we have been saved, and then return to exactly as we were before.

That is selfish. Jesus calls us to be his hands, feet, eyes and ears in the world today.

He came to set us free and release us.

We do need to remember though, that when the people just presumed everything was sorted out, they forgot Jesus and rejected him resulting in the pain and crisis of Good Friday.

Our vaccine gives us the chance to slowly start to rebuild and form anew the world in which we live.

Christ does the same, and as we look forward to Easter Day in our lives and the resurrection, let's not take our eye off the ball and suddenly be plunged into the darkness that he had to go through on Good Friday.

He came to serve not to be served.

We must do the same
